Mrs. Jim Helton shares a party phone line with the Heltons and heard the phone making a strange jingle. When she checked, she found the line dead and preceded to check the cause. Spotting the red glow in the direction of the Helton home, she drove to the home of her daughter and phoned for the fire depart-

When the fire department arrived, it was too late to save any of the structure. It had apparently been burning for some time before discovery.

The Heltons were returning from a trip to California and were not notified of the fire until they returned home. The cause of the fire could not be determined.

Should a funnel be cited approaching Wheeler, the siren will be sounded for citizens to take shelter. Two (2) thirty second blasts of the fire siren are sounded for the citizens to take shelter immediatly.

On occasion, the fire siren blasts to call firemen to a fire; a series of blasts 5-10 seconds in length.

snapping or cutting them into 1 or 2 inch pieces-or you might leave them whole. Pack them tightly into clean jars to 1/2 inch of the top of the jars while still raw. Cover them with boiling water leaving 1/2 inch space at the top of the jar. If salt is desired, add 1/2 teaspoon for a pint and 1 teaspoon for a quart. Wipe off the sealing surface of the jars and close according to the type of lid being used, following the manufacturer's directions.

Place the closed jars of hot beans in a pressure canner, which has 1-1/2 to 2 inches of boiling water and a rack to hold the jars off the bottom of the cooker.

Place the lid on the canner and fasten securely. If the lid has clamps, tighten opposite clamps moderately at first. Then go back over the whole

fingers only. Leave the petcock open until the steam escapes steadily for 10 minutes so that no air is left in the cooker then close the petcock. If air is left in it causes a vacuum and draws the liquid off the beans. Count the processing time as soon as the pressure reaches 10 pounds. Keep a uniform

set to tighten each pair as

much as possible, with your

pressure by adjusting the heat or by moving the canner carefully.

Process the snap beans 20 minutes for pints and 25 minutes for quarts.

At the end of the processing time, remove the canner from the heat.

Allow the canner to cook until the gauge registers zero.

Open the petcock gradually, and remove the cover. Leave the beans in the canner about 5 mintues. Take them out of the canner and place them right side up on a rack far enough to cool quickly. Do not place them in a draft or on a cold surface to prevent them from breaking.

Remember-no better beans will come out of the jars then went into them, so be sure to use good quality beans, If you do this and follow the directions carefully, you will come out with beans that are olive green and have the flavor of freshly cooked green beans.

It soon will be peach season again. Do you have a surplus or can you purchase them at a reasonable price? You can have them any time of the year by canning them. You haven't canned before?

Well here is how. Wash and peel them just as

you would prepare them to be eaten fresh, or plunge them in boiling water for 2 minutes or until the skins slip. They can be halved or sliced, but be sure to remove the pits. Pack the peaches into clean jars, leaving 1/2 inch at top of the jars. Cover with boiling syrup made with 2 cups sugar to 4 cups water. If you like a sweeter syrup, add more sugar. Wipe off the sealing surface of the jar close according to the type of lid being

Place the jars in a boiling water bath canner which is a large container with a rack in the bottom to hold the jars about one inch from the bottom. It should be tall enough to have space to cover the jars with one to two inches of water and about the same amount of space above the water.

The water should be hot but not boiling when you place the filled jars in the canner. Place lid on canner and bring the water to a rolling boil, but reduce the heat just to boiling. This prevents the juice from being drawn out of jars.

Boil pint jars 25 minutes and quart jars 35 minutes. Remove the jars from the

water bath and let them cool away from a draft. The peaches can be canned

Every New Testament writer believed in speaking in tongues. Most of them, other than Paul, were there in the upper room on the Day of Pentecost when all were filled with the Holy Spirit and spoke in tongues (Acts 1:13-14 and Acts 2:1-4). Next week, I will state some benefits that


