



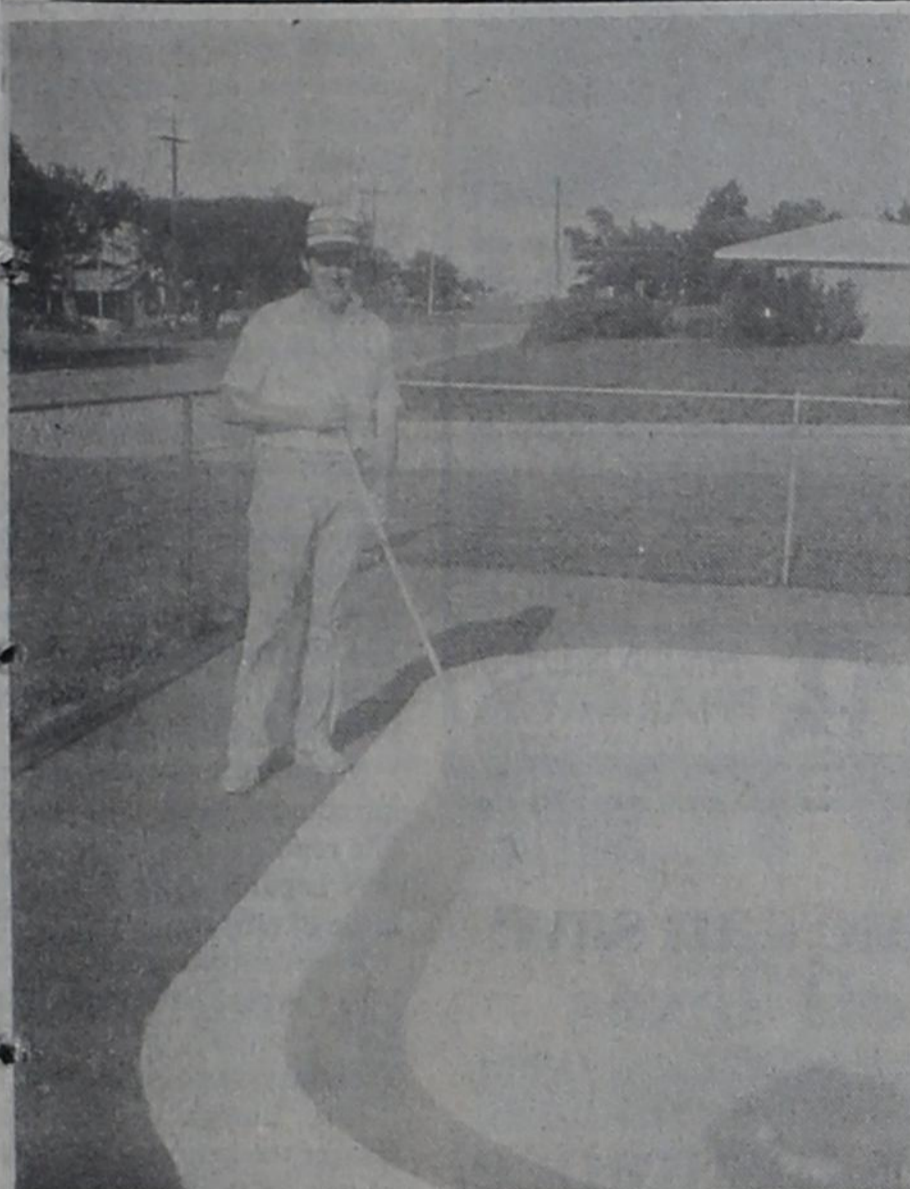

Shower For Fire Victims

A Fire Shower will be given Rex and Lucille Helton Tuesday, June 3 at the Briscoe Cafeteria, beginning at 7:00 P.M. The Heltons lost their home and its contents in a house fire early Friday morning, May 20.

Mrs. Jim Helton shares a party phone line with the Heltons and heard the phone making a strange jingle. When she checked, she found the line dead and preceded to check the cause. Spotting the red glow in the direction of the Helton home, she drove to the home of her daughter and phoned for the fire department.

When the fire department arrived, it was too late to save any of the structure. It had apparently been burning for some time before discovery.

The Heltons were returning from a trip to California and were not notified of the fire until they returned home. The cause of the fire could not be determined.

SIREN SOUNDS WARNINGS

The sirens were sounded in Wheeler Tuesday evening for the residents to take shelter from the storm. The volunteer firemen over the entire county were watching the weather with Briscoe and Allison watchers being called out at 7:53.

A funnel cloud was reported to have been spotted between Wheeler and Kelton about 9:15. Wheeler firemen watched the clouds and sounded the alert for Wheeler at 9:30. The volunteers remained at their posts until 11:30 after the U.S. Weather Bureau cancelled the watch of the area.

High winds and dirt preceded the storm. The winds and dirt hit Wheeler before the sirens were sounded and shortly after the alert a deadly calm fell upon the immediate area. Hard rain and some hail followed and left 0.91 inches of moisture before the front moved on past.

With the sounding of the sirens, members of the fire department who were on storm watch were dispatched to Parkview Hospital and Wheeler Care Center to assist in the moving of the patients from their rooms into the halls. After the storm appeared to be over, the men again went to

the two locations and helped move the patients back into their rooms.

The electrical power failed only two instances during the storm. One of the two "black flashes" resulted in the loss of power at the hospital. Parkview Hospital only recently had work done on the electrical system to speed the switching from the normal power to generator power; on their first opportunity to use the improved system, it failed and Wheeler Firemen and Southwestern Public Service came to the rescue.

Eleven of Wheeler's volunteer firemen reported for

storm watch. Spending their time out in the weather for the protection of the local citizens were Fire Chief Daryl Snelgroves, Lyndon Loyd, Steve Walker, Larry Jones, Ken Daughtry, Gary Davis, Jerry Koelzer, Phillip and Russell Gaines, and K.D. and Robert Ford.

These men are stationed at a number of locations surrounding Wheeler for the purpose of pinpointing and determining the movement of a cloud, if a funnel is spotted.

WARNING TORNADO ALERT

With the issuing of a Tornado Watch for the Wheeler Area, members of the Wheeler Fire Department report for duty to stand guard and report any threatening clouds approaching Wheeler for the duration of the watch.

Should a funnel be cited approaching Wheeler, the siren will be sounded for citizens to take shelter. Two (2) thirty second blasts of the fire siren are sounded for the citizens to take shelter immediately.

On occasion, the fire siren blasts to call firemen to a fire; a series of blasts 5-10 seconds in length.

Amarillo Weather Bureau calls the Sheriff's Office to notify the city of approaching weather.

For citizens who have barometers set for this altitude, a reading of 29.30 indicates it is time to take shelter.

DIFF. IN WATER BATH AND PRESSURE PROCESSING IN HOME CANNING

Have you wondered about the difference in water-bath and pressure cooker processing of foods in home canning? The water-bath method is used for processing fruits, rhubarb, and tomatoes and is done using a container with a lid and rack. The rack is used to hold the jars off the bottom of the container. The container must be large enough to cover

the jars with one to two inches of water, so that the jars are surrounded with boiling water. The lid is used to help retain the heat.

However, low acid fruits and vegetables must be canned using the pressure cooker. The spores ("seeds") of some bacteria are highly resistant to heat, which makes it necessary for them to be destroyed by high heat. This is accomplished with the pressure cooker.

What are foods processed by these methods? The water-bath is used for such foods as peaches, plums and tomatoes. The pressure cooker is used for foods as beans, peas, corn, beans, greens and okra.

JARS AND LIDS FOR CANNING
Have you had problems of spoilage of home canned foods?

Take a look at the jars and lids you have been using.

Do the jars have chips or nicks at the top? If they do this can cause a poor seal—thus spoilage. Do not use these jars for canning.

Do you tighten the two piece lid as tight as you can get it before and after processing? If you do, this can cause the sealing material to be broken and again spoilage.

What can you do? Run your finger around the tops of jars and inspect them visibly to make sure they are smooth and free from nicks and cracks.

If two-piece, self-seal lids are used, follow the manufacturer's instructions in adjusting the lid and tightening the metal ring. After processing, when the canned product is thoroughly cool, take off the metal ring, if possible without forcing. If the ring sticks, cover it with a hot, damp cloth for a minute or two to loosen. Then wash them to prevent rust and they may be used again. However, the lid may be used only once.

STORAGE OF CANNED FOOD
What is the best way to store canned foods? They should be stored in a clean, cool, dark, dry place. Canned food kept in a warm damp place may change in color and flavor.

How long should home canned food be stored? It is wise to use all of it within a year. Freezing does affect canned foods. Canned foods that have been frozen may have undesirable changes in flavor and texture. However, they will not spoil unless the seal is broken.

That is almost set camp, when we started to screw the hose on the facet for water there was no threads on the thing. So we are off for ports and adapters to convert this no thread faucet to my threaded garden hose. Another \$10.26, so what? Ok, well, tomorrow morning we'll hit them bright and early for sure. This wind will blow itself out before dawn and besides, we're having fun already (I think).

Thursday morning the wind and I got up at the same time. So it was decided to go to another lake back west and north of our present location but to leave the trailer at Spring Creek. After winding through pastures and plum bushes and dragging high center on the wagon, there is in all its splendor with about half the lake washing up shore. The only way you could keep your line in the water was with an engine block for weight. And the only one handy was attached to the car. Anyway, after a family conference it was decided to try Dead Indian Lake only a few miles north of Cheyenne, so off we go again leaving the trailer till we decide what to do. Boy I'm sure having fun I kept telling myself. And we found just the spot up at the north end of the lake there is a slough of sorts that runs kinda east and west, sure looks fishy to me. So it's back to Spring Creek for the trailer and then back to Dead Indian. Set up the trailer, no water faucet with or without threads. It's only 5 miles back to Roll and they will let me fill some milk bottles I'm sure. By this time it's 5:30 in the evening, but with the time change theres nearly 4 hours of light left. Off to the old fishing hole through the grape vines and over fences. And at last a place where theres hardly any wind. Look perfect. I just knew this was going to be a fun trip. Lord, I never knew turtles grew so large in Western Okla. To say nothing of how many there must have

been. I don't know if you ever tried to get a fishhook out of a 12 or 14 lb. turtle's mouth or not. If you never tried don't, its a full time chore for 2 men and a boy. I found out the hard way. From now on any turtles as big as that one can have the

hook and rod plus reel if he wants it. Anyway, we did catch some fish, four to be honest. All McDonald size. That is, 1/4 pounders. But as luck would have it, there was a couple come back and just out of friendliness and to make conversation I said we had caught a few there in that basket. Of course the poor jerk wanted to

see how big they were but in the process of holding a beer in one hand and cigarettes in the other he dropped the basket in the lake with the lid open. Should I say more? Anyway, Friday morning, we're up at the crack of dawn and off again. There is no wind and the lake is calm. The water is blue and the sky is blue, the turtles are still asleep and so are the fish. After four hours nothing. Another family discussion and it is decided we must not have the right bait. Well, nothing can stop us now from having a fun filled fishing trip, and besides, it's only 11 miles back to Cheyenne and we'll buy some more minnows. The only thing is after we found some minnows at \$1.50 per doz., some nut-head left the minnow bucket at home. I can't believe the going price of a minnow bucket these days. I finally settled on a styrofoam one for \$3.00 plus tax, which when filled with water and picked up by the rope handle, the handle pulled through the holes in the side dumping minnows in the middle of the parking lot. But they are easy to pick up, providing you don't mind crawling around on hands and knees while passer-bys stare or wonder if you are having some kind of fit. By the time we got back to the old fishing hole, the wind had risen, well not really risen, thats not the word I would like to use. Anyway, its was blowing like thunder. The radio from Elk City said 45 mile gusts. That must have been inside the studio. Where I was, 45 was the low point. Tomorrow morning I'm coming home. You see, I've enjoyed this about all I can stand. That is as soon as I go get another tank of gas.

Box 98, Wheeler, Texas 79096 has applied to the Texas Department of Water Resources for an amendment to Permit No. 10382-01 to authorize the disposal by irrigation of treated domestic sewage effluent at a volume not to exceed an average of 120,000 gallons per day and to revise Biochemical Oxygen Demand discharge limitations from 20 mg/l to 30 mg/l. The applicant proposes to lease 37 acres of pasture land for irrigation purposes and to utilize an existing pond for effluent storage. The existing permit authorizes the disposal by evaporation of treated domestic sewage effluent at a volume of 70,000 gallons per day. Application rates for irrigated land shall not exceed 3.94 acre-feet/acre/year. No discharge of pollutants to water in the State is authorized.

The plant site is located on the east side of U.S. Highway 83 approximately 1 mile north of FM Road 152 in Wheeler County, Texas. The plant site and irrigated land are located in the drainage area of the North Fork Red River in Segment No. 0224 of the Red River Basin.

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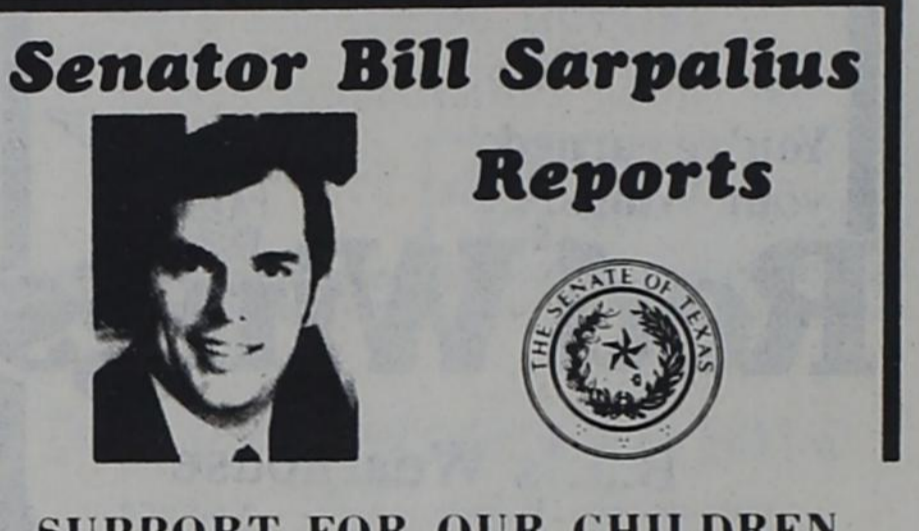

SUPPORT FOR OUR CHILDREN

AUSTIN — The Texas Senate has approved legislation which could save the taxpayers of Texas millions of dollars a year. The Senate, by a vote of 27-3, has called for a constitutional amendment which would permit courts to garnish wages of parents who fail to pay court ordered child support. We feel this crackdown on parents, who are delinquent in child support payments, will provide the state with an additional tool for collecting child support, and in so doing, will foster more parental responsibility and reduce the dependency upon the state for financial assistance.

Texas taxpayers last year, provided welfare assistance to more than 155,000 children in one parent households in which the absent parent refused to support their children, despite having the resources. We feel that we must crack down on parents who have abandoned their children financially, before we appropriate more and more money for child welfare payments.

Every state in the nation, with the exception of Texas and South Carolina, have garnishment statutes to ensure child support payments. From their experience, it has been determined that the most effective tool for securing regular support payments involved an order for the garnishment of income.

A garnishment order is a court order which requires payment of child support by an employer out of the obligated parent's income. The Texas Constitution has prohibited the garnishment of wages for personal services since 1876. Before this ban on garnishment with respect to seizing wages of parents who duck child support can be lifted, Texas voters must approve a constitutional amendment in November of 1984. Under the proposed amendment, a court could order employers to deduct up to one-third of the parent's wages, after taxes, when child support payments have been missed for at least two months. The use of garnishment would be used solely for child support purposes.

We feel this action will benefit not only the taxpayers of Texas, but it will also help the children and parents involved. Garnishment wages could provide future security for dependent children and could reassure the custodial parent that payments will be regular. If a custodial parent is receiving regular support payments, then the need to seek public assistance is often reduced.

We believe that parents have the primary responsibility to provide for their children. However, as legislators we feel we must see that those responsibilities are met. The children of this state don't have political clout; they don't have the right to vote. We must see that their needs are recognized and cared for. We're confident that a constitutional amendment will help meet the needs of many children in this state. TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

Check For These Six Tomato Problems

Now that your tomato plants are well-established and are blossoming and have fruit on them, don't think the battle is already won. There are still many problems your tomatoes may run into, especially as our hot Texas summer approaches.

The following are six common tomato problems, and what you can do about them. In all cases, follow label instructions carefully when applying pesticides.

Early blight: Most tomato foliage diseases can be controlled with a combination of Maneb and Benomyl applied at 7 to 10 day intervals.

It is best to try to prevent early blight and all diseases by: maintaining good sanitation (get rid of all dead and diseased foliage and plants); keeping plants well fertilized, especially during heavy fruit load; keeping plants caged or staked and off the ground; maintaining good soil drainage; growing varieties that are resistant or tolerant to diseases; rotating crops each year; fumigating the soil if necessary before planting; and using a good fungicide program before blight sets in.

Leafminers: Spray with diazinon or malathion when "trails" first appear in the leaves.

Blossom end rot: Remove affected fruit, maintain good, even soil moisture, and mulch around your plants. This is not a disease, so don't spray for control.

Nematodes: If your tomato plants are stunted or yellow and wilt in hot weather, check the roots for knots or galls. These elongated nodules are a sign of nematodes. When you clear out your garden at the end of the season, check all plant roots for these nodules. If you have them, treat the soil once the garden's empty with Vapam, carefully following the label instructions.

Bloom drop: This is usually caused by poor weather conditions and planting the wrong varieties. A product called "blossom set" will help, as will good weather.

Spider mites: If you catch these tiny red mites early enough, you can try

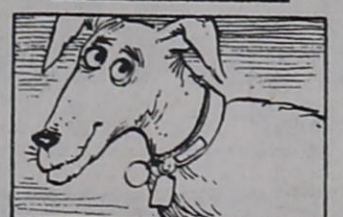
Texas Gas Production
