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Rustler Arrested, Cattle Returned

An estimated \$8000 worth of livestock was recovered by Dr. Mike Smith this past week, thanks to the investigation conducted by Jerry Bob Jernigan, constable for precincts 3 and 4 at Shamrock. As a direct result of the work by Jernigan, a cattle rustling operation which has operated in Texas, Oklahoma, Missouri and Kansas and dating back to 1978 was broken.

Eleven heifers, 2 baby calves, a bull and a cow were taken from Dr. Smith's farm on the evening of Thursday, March 31. The cattle were located 2 miles southeast of Pagan.

Jernigan was advised of the theft and began checking area motels for leads. The motel at Erick is operated by an older couple, who remembered a 1:30 a.m. "wake-up" call left by one of their lodgers. The name registered was a man from Dallas; investigation showed this man had sold a pickup to the individual who signed the register and the correct name was obtained, but no address.

The correct address was obtained from the records kept by the R.C.A. Roping Association. Gerald Russell, an R.C.A. roper lives near Dr. Smith's place and keeps a check of the cattle; he was interested in the recovery of the cattle. When the name obtained by Jernigan was mentioned to Russell, it "rang a bell"; Russell seemed to remember roping with an individual by the name of Roger Marlow some 10 years ago. The roping association had a Clarksville, Arkansas, address.

Jernigan, Smith and Russell left immediately for Arkansas. A warrant was issued and Roger Marlow was arrested on Wednesday, April 20. Marlow was arrested just as he had finished burning most of his records and was in the process of changing tires on his pick-

up. (Several pickups and sets of tires were owned by Marlow and as it happened, the set he was changing matched a tread mark taken from Smith's lot.)

Smith's cattle were reported to be in a national forrest, Stolen Mountain. Marlow owned a number of places and leased others. Arkansas has no

brand registration, so it was possible for the brands to be returned and/or peeled, making it possible for the cattle to be sold in the sale ring. One of Smith's cows had been sold and the remainder were rounded up Thursday and Friday and penned in a makeshift corral until they could be

loaded and brought back to Wheeler County. It was estimated Marlow had 300 head of stolen cattle on the places he owned or leased; the number stolen during the past five years could reach as high as 1500 head.

A 6x24 aluminum gooseneck trailer was used; if the trailer scrapped the corral, no paint would be left.

Dr. Smith estimated the value of the cattle recovered at \$8000. He praised the work of Jernigan and Russell in their investigation, arrest and recovery.

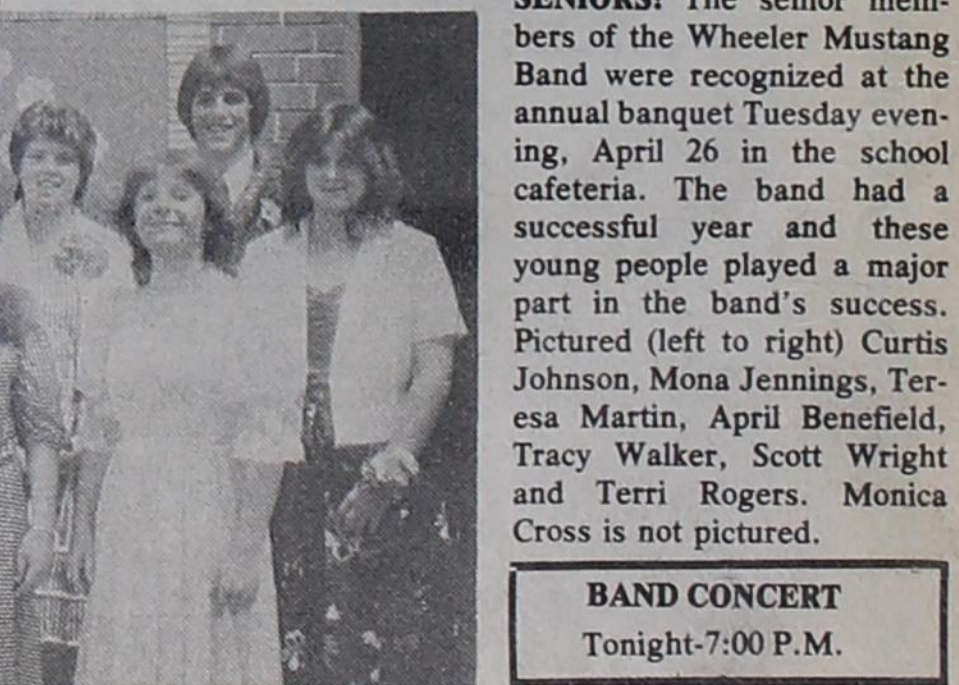

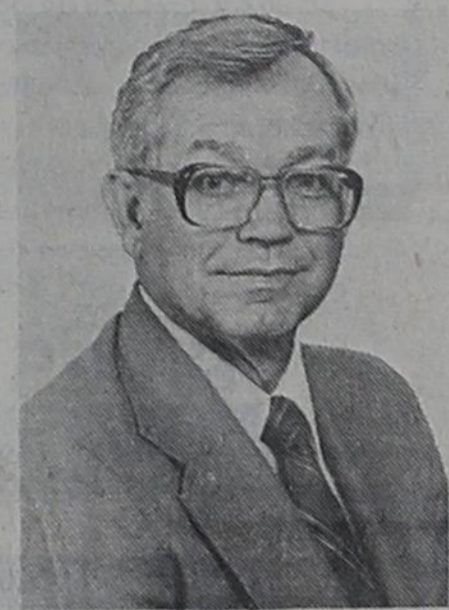
Sports Banquet Monday

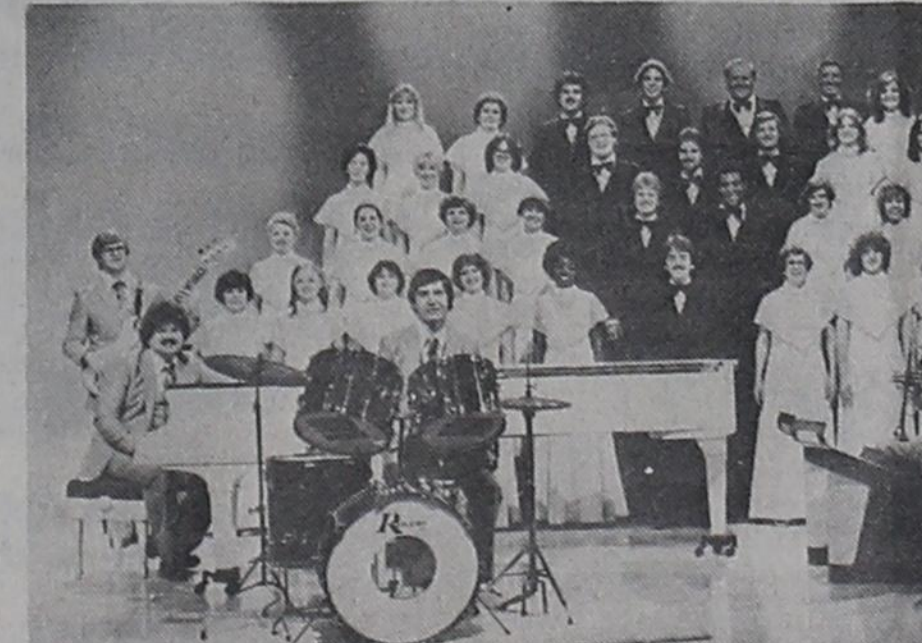
duties as A.C.U.'s Athletic Director, elder for the Highland Church of Christ in Abilene and as a goodwill ambassador for A.C.U.

Pertaining To Veterans

Are you a veteran with a service-connected disability, or a surviving spouse or a minor child of a deceased disabled veteran or of a person who was killed while on active duty?

Someone who fits any one or more of these descriptions may be eligible for a property tax exemption which can amount to \$1,500 to \$3,000 or more, according to Marilyn Copeland, chief appraiser of the Wheeler County Appraisal District.

"But an application noted

that the Texas Constitution permits the Legislature to provide a property tax exemption on property owned by a disabled veteran or surviving spouse or minor children of a deceased disabled veteran.

Those listed by Copeland as eligible to qualify for the exemption are: a disabled veteran; a surviving spouse of a deceased disabled veteran, as long as the spouse remains unmarried; a surviving minor child of a deceased disabled veteran, if the veteran's spouse does not survive the

veteran and if the child is both under 18 and unmarried; a surviving spouse of a person who was killed while on active duty, whether the spouse is remarried or not at the time of application; a surviving minor child of a person who was killed while on active duty, if there is no surviving spouse and the child is both under 18 and unmarried.

Copeland said that qualifications for each applicant are explained further in the Texas Property Tax Code and in pamphlets published by the State Property Tax Board. Appraisal district personal can also provide information on specific qualifications.

In order to qualify, a person must be a Texas resident. The amount of the exemption, Copeland said, is based on the percentage of the veteran's disability. An individual may be entitled to an exemption ranging from \$1,500 to \$3,000 from the assessed value of any property owned on January 1 of the tax year.

The exemption may also be applied to any one piece of property which the applicant designated, such as a home, taxable personal property or any other property owned on January 1.

Copeland emphasized that applications must be filed or a renewal signed each year with the chief appraiser; this year the application deadline is May 2. On the application, the individual must designate the single piece of property which will receive the exemption.

The applicant may be required to present documents which state the percentage of service-connected disability which are provided by the Veterans' Administration or by a branch of the armed services. Depending on the applicant, proof of marriage, death or age may also be required.

To obtain an application for the disabled veterans' and survivors' exemption or more information about specific qualifications, Copeland urges taxpayers to contact the appraisal office at the County Courthouse Square in Wheeler, Texas. 806-826-5900.

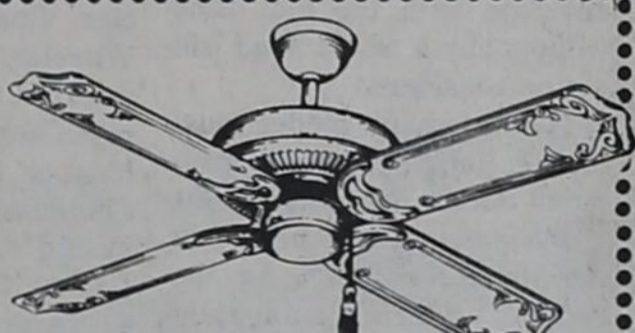

TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

Basil: A Delicious and Easy-to-Grow Herb



Probably everyone has heard of basil, but not everyone knows what to do with it. Basil is an easily grown herb that is used in sauces, soups, and with tomatoes, and it is the main ingredient of the mouth-watering pesto, an elegant, uncooked green sauce for pasta.

Basil is not really that fussy about soil, light, or water. Like a good friend, basil enjoys attention, but forgives neglect. Basil likes full sun, but it does well in partial shade, too, and can take dry spells and wet spells with little problem.

Basil doesn't have much of a bug problem, either. It seems to shrug off the many insects its spicy fragrance attracts. In the

spring, pests sometimes nibble at the tender edges of the leaves, but as the summer wears on, the vigorous young plants usually outgrow the pests.

During the spider mite season, you may have some problems, but those can often be taken care of by spraying the undersides of the leaves with soapy water as needed.

Though basil will grow under poor conditions, it is better to plant it as follows for the best results.

Prepare a seed bed in the spring that has been enriched with manure and 5-10-5 fertilizer. You can plant seed 1/2 inch deep in rows, or broadcast the seed and cover it with 1/4 to 1/2 inch of soil. Thin the plants to 12 inches apart, and don't forget to save the thinnings for cooking.

If given room, basil will grow to 18 inches, and some varieties even grow to 36 inches high. You should keep the young plants weeded, but as basil grows taller, it tends to shade out anything below it, so it almost weeds itself.

As the plants and your need for basil grow, you can pull off the outer leaves and stems, and new growth will constantly follow. For

maximum production of leafy shoots, pinch off the clusters of white flower buds that form on the ends of the stems. Even if you don't pinch these buds or thin the plants, you will probably still end up with more basil than you can use.

Now, what do you do with mass quantities of basil? Give it to friends, eat it with tomatoes, or hang it up and dry it for your herb shelf. Or better yet, look through your cookbooks for a recipe for the delicious pesto, and then make all your freezer can hold.

Coin Phone FaceChange

As of April 1, 1983, coin telephone users wanting to charge a long distance call to a third number will be subject to having the charges approved by someone at the third number.

The verification procedure is being initiated to help eliminate fraudulent billing of long distance calls and ensure customer protection from having unauthorized charges appear on their monthly statements.

Under the new procedure, if an individual at the third number does not answer and approve the charges, the caller will be asked to provide alternate billing, such as another third number that will approve the charges, a valid calling card, a collect card or correct change to pay for the call.

Jimmy Bennett, General Telephone Operations Manager in Memphis said "Customers who frequently use public coin telephone facilities for third number billing may find that the calling card may represent an attractive alternative. Besides being faster and more convenient than the third number and collect calls, most calling cards calls are cheaper." In a growing number of locations, customers can direct dial calling card calls without operator assistance from public telephones. The calling card also provides the customer with a printed monthly statement of long distance calls placed.

Customers can call their local telephone business office to obtain a calling card. There is no charge for the card.

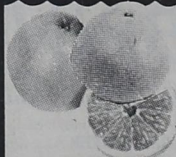

MUSTANGS WIN DIST.

The Wheeler Mustangs claimed the 1983 District 2-A Track Championship Saturday at Booker. The Mustangs amassed 232½ points while claiming ten of fifteen first place finishes. 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A FLOOD IS COMING

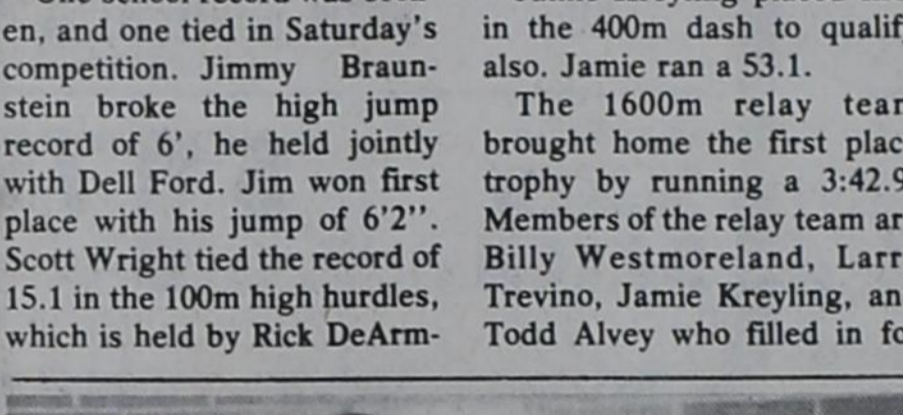
