## **County Wide "Stress** Management" Siminar

Are life's day to day hassels getting the best of you? Do you find it hard to cope with the stress of your job, personal and family relations? If so, come to a County Wide "Stress Management" Semifor to be held Thursday, April 21 from 7:00-9:00 p.m. in the Wheeler School Auditorium.

The program is being sponsored, free of charge, by the Wheeler County Extension Homemaker's Council and Family Living Sub-Committee. Speaker for the evening will be Patsy Ramsey Britting, R.N., M.S.N. Mrs. Britting is currently Assistant Professor of Nursing at West Texas State University. She is a native of Wheeler County having grown up in the Briscoe Community an graduated from Briscoe High School. She received her diploma in nursing from Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, her B.S. in Nursing from Texas Woman's University. She has been a member of the West Texas State University nursing faculty since the School of Nursing began in 1972. Prior to that she held various nursing positions in medical-surgical nursing and psychiatric nursing in

The two-hour program she will present on "Stress Management" is based upon the content of a 3 semester hour course she teaches at WTSU. Her presentation will begin with data on the stress response, both physiological and emotional responses. She will discuss how we create our own stress and how we can learn from our stress. However, the major focus of her program will be upon techniques of stress management, such as, progressive muscle relaxation, imagination and visualization, assertiveness, laughter and play as adults, relabeling, and saying "no". Her presentation will include some lecture but most of it will involve group participation and discussion.

The problem of stress is one that affects many men and women and this program is directed toward both.

Programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to all persons regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.



The unit would allow Tipps to begin treating a heart patient upon his arrival at the scene which may be as much as 15 minutes ahead of the Wheeler ambulance. Being considered for the purchase is a ALS Model 95 Heart Aid; the cost is in the

neighborhood of \$7500.

Each of the ambulances is equipped with a heart monitordefibulator. With the purchase of the monitor, Tipps would be able to provide all the treatment offered by the ambulance with the exception of 4-16 transporting.

### Tanks To Be Painted

Three of the city's water storage tanks are being painted. Work began Monday on the overhead tank. The tanks will be emptied, sand blasted and painted-both inside and

Citizens are informed of the possibility of a variation in pressure during the procedure. The city will be supplied water through pumps which will allow the pressure to vary according to use. There may also be some air in the lines. but the city should at no time be without water.

The cost of the project to the city is \$38,951.00. Bids were taken and opened at the March 7 meeting of the council. The finish which is being applied should last 12 to 15 years. The project is to be completed within 60 days.

The repainting is necessary at regular intervals for the prevention of deteriation of the tanks. Where the paint peels, rust forms and this must be removed by sand blasting to prevent holes in the tanks.

### Veterans Information

The "Times" recently ran an article concerning a refund in veterans insurance. Most who responded to the article reported the letters returned, marked "no such address."

This letter was received by one of our readers and forwarded to us.

"We are returning your request for payment of a special dividend based on your prior military service. The information you received regarding such a dividend is a hoax. Congress did not pass any new legislation authorizing the payment of a special dividend. The information you received refers to a dividend which was declared in 1950. As a result of this misinformation the following provisions of the law (38 United States Code 707b) was passed:

"No claim by an insured for payment in cash of a special dividend declared prior to January 1, 1952, shall be processed by the Veterans Administration unless such claim was received within six years after such dividend was declared. Whenever any claim for payment of a special dividend, the processing of which is barred by this subsection, is received in the Veterans Administration, it shall be returned to the claimant, with a copy of this subsection, and such action shall be a complete response without further communication."

We are aware that this rumor has been spreading throughout the country. 'Although we have attempted to dispel the rumor through every means available to us, the hoax continues to crop up in new areas of the country.

The only dividends we are currently paying are on certain Government policies that are still inforce. No application is needed for these dividends.

You can help us to eliminate this rumor by passing this information along to any friends of yours or to any veterans group to which you may belong."

## Texas Farm Bureau

Wheeler County Farm Bureau was represented by five persons at the area Texas Farm Bureau Safemark meeting March 28 in Amarillo.

Attending from this county were: (Farm Bureau leaders, titles, and servicing agents) Wheeler County Farm Bureau President and Mrs. Eddie George, State Affairs Committee Chairman John Vermillion and Tim Ray of C&H Supply in Shamrock.

Area meetings are held each spring to give county Farm Bureau leaders and Safemark servicing agents an opportunity to meet with management and representatives of suppliers of the Farm Bureau group purchase programs, according to Eddie George of Wheeler, president of the local farm organization.

The purpose of the Texas Safemark program is to provide Farm Bureau members with high quality tires, batteries and tillage tools at the lowest possible cost through volume and low-cost distribution, he said.

The meeting was one of the area meetings in Texas.

Representatives from tire, battery and tillage tool suppliers were on the program, as well as state FB Safemark staff and a representative from the American Farm Bureau Federation. They gave presentations and answered questions.

According to Travis McMorrough, manager of the Texas Safemark program, Texas is one of 42 states currently participating in the program and accounted for one third of the national sales last year. In 1982, Texas Safemark sales totaled \$35 million.

The Safemark group purchasing concept began with the South Carolina Farm Bureau in the early 1960s. Texas joined the service-to-member program in 1965, and since that time, sales in Texas total \$368 million with savings to members estimated \$100 mil.





ALLEVIATE ALLERGIES

Allergic illnesses affect an estimated thirty-one million people in the United States. Alergy victims are often prevented from leading normal lives. Many days of work are missed due to allergy-related illnesses.

The most common allergic diseases include exzema (allergic dermatitis), poison ivy (contact dermatitis), hay fever, asthma, hives (urticaria), and digestive disturbances.

Allergic diseases are a major cause of illness among children. Allergy symptoms usually appear during the first fifteen years of life.

Many parents believe their children will outgrown allergies, and therefore do not treat them. But allergies can become more severe without specific treatment, and should be identified early and treated fever. adequately.

The physician makes a careful review of the patient's life for clues to the causes of the allergy. The medical procedure may include: A complete medical and environmental history to detect the allergens involved. A Physical examination with appropriate laboratory tests. Specific allergy tests to discover the substances to which the patient reacts. Desensitizing treatments, such as injections, to gradually build up immunity. A general care plan involving advice on living, supervision of the diet, drugs for temporary relief of symptoms, and other recommendations according to the

patient's needs. Certain treatments will relieve the symptoms but will not cure the allergy. Antihistamines provide relief from mild allergies, especially hay

Severe allergies, such as asthma, usually require a more potent drug treatment. Examples of these drugs include the corticosteroid hormones, epinerphrine for treating asthma, and aminophyllin

for severe asthma. Once they are determined, allergy causing substances should be avoided whenever possible. There may be times when allergens can not be avoided. Then the patient must acknowledge the limitations that allergies cause, and learn to live with them.

Allergy victims expect to achieve favorable results by following their physicians advice, understanding their own case, being aware of their sensitivities, avoiding substances that cause trouble, regulating medication, and knowing when to seek help from their physician.



# Productivity MAY BRING YOU TAX RELIEF ON YOUR PROPERTY TAXES

Under the Texas Property Tax Code, farmers and ranchers who qualify may have their agricultural land taxed on the basis of productivity rather than market value. Productivity valuation may lower the 1983 taxes on your agricultural or open-space land.

There are two types of productivity valuation. Qualifications for open-space (1-d-1) valuation is determined by the land's usage. Agricultural (1-d) valuation qualification is determined by usage and proof that agriculture is the owner's primary

occupation and source of income. To receive either type of valuation this year, you must make application to the appraisal district office in this county by May 2, 1983. Once you qualify for open-space (1-d-1) valuation in 1983, you will not need to reapply unless the usage or ownership of the land changes. Annual applications are required, however, for agricultural (1-d) valuation.
