Sweetwater Creek Project Discussed

The Thursday Review Club sponsored a County wide forum concerning the proposed Sweetwater Creek Reservoir system on Monday, March 21, 1983 in the Wheeler High School Auditorium. Approximately 50 people heard

Ron Glen, Assistant General Manager of the Red River Water Authority, address many issues involved in the project. He states that it would be a supreme sacrifice on the part of the lane owners who would be required to sell their

land to the water district in order that an adequate water supply can be furnished to their neighbors in Wheeler County and to ensure that future generations living in the municipalities of Wheeler, Mobeetie and Shamrock will

have enough water to sustain their residents. He pointed out that Red River Authority hoped that the water district would also develop the reservoir as a recreational area for boating, fishing, camping and other recreational activities. He stated that it was also the hope of Red River that the area around the lake would develop as a park system with abundant wild life refuges for animals which are indigenous to Wheeler County.

Mr. Glen assured land owners that they would be allowed to retain the ownership of the maximum amount of land that the lake did not cover. He also

stated that the rules governing the surface water or water which will fill the reservoir did not pertain to the ground water which is currently being pumped for household and agricultural use. Land owners can still retain and develop windmills and water systems as they have in the past.

Mr. Glen added that an effort is being made to obtain a deferred loan from the State of Texas which will lower the initial cost of the dam by 1/3. At this time exact cost can not be ascertained because of the legislative work still to be finished in Austin and cost are changing rapidly.

LOCAL ELECTIONS SET

Wheeler City

The filing deadline for the Wheeler city council was Wednesday, March 2. Three places are to be filled in the Saturday, April 2, election.

Each person on the council has filed for their respective places.

Filing for re-election are Kirven Roper, place 1; Berniece Hall, place 3; and Jimmy Hall, place 5.

Kirven Roper has filed for re-election to his place on the council. He is completing his second term on the council as head of the transportation.

Mrs. Hall will be completing her fifth year on the council. She was elected in 1978 to fill an unexpired term and re-elected in 1979 and '81. She has been working with the park and swimming pool.

Jimmy Hill was appointed to the council in September, 1980; he has been overseeing the maintenance of the streets. Hill filed for his place on the council preceding the council meeting Monday, February 21.

Absentee balloting in the April 2 election will begin Monday, March 14; voters may cast their absentee ballots at the city office until Tuesday, March 29.

Hospital Board

Filing closed Wednesday, March 9th, at 5 P.M. for three places on North Wheeler County Hospital District Board of Directors. The election will be held Saturday, April 2, 1983, in conjunction with the respective school districts.

Filing for re-election from the Mobeetie School District is Melvin May, from the Briscoe School District is Dean Tipps for his first full term, and Louis Grayson from the Allison School District. Absentee voting will begin March 16 and continue through March 31. Any qualified voter who will be unable to vote Saturday, April 2nd, at the regular polls, may cast his ballot at the office of

the hospital Administrator between the hours of 8 A.M. and 5 P.M., Monday through Friday, within the above dates.

Wheeler ISD

Two incumbents have filed for two places on the Board of Trustees of the Wheeler Independent School District. Mrs. Vida Brown has filed for position 6 and Mr. Richard Brown has filed for Position 7. March 14 is the first day to vote absentee and March 29th is the last day of absentee voting. The place on the council now held by Leona House remained open with no Mobeetie citizens having for the position by the March 2 deadline. It will be necessary to write in an individual's in the April 2 balloting.

Roy Stribling is completing his first full two-year term and Leona House is completing her second two-year term.

Jimmy Selby, Mayor, has served on the city council since the incorporation of the City of Mobeetie in November, 1972. Selby announced his decision not to seek re-election to the office and Leona House filed for the office of Mayor.

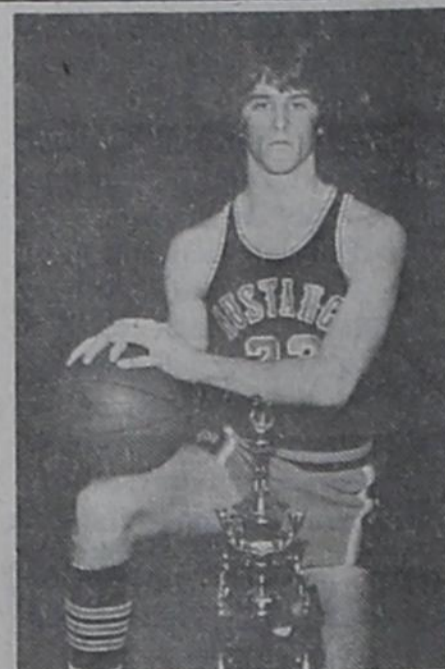
Band Boosters Plan Tourney

Appraisal District Comments

Marilyn Copeland, chief appraiser for Wheeler County Appraisal District, reminds district residents that everyone required to render their taxable property for taxation

must file these statements with the appraisal office by May 2.

The Texas Property Tax Code is specific in listing property which must be rendered to the chief appraiser for taxation. A taxpayer must render all bills and employees with IOU's.

taxable personal property used for the production of income if, on January 1 of the tax year, he owns the property or manages and controls it as a fiduciary.

Tax law also requires banks located in Texas to file a statement listing assets and liabilities.

The chief appraiser may also require a person to render any

other taxable property that he owns or manages and controls as a fiduciary on January 1. The chief appraiser will deliver written notice that a rendition statement is required and attach the appropriate form.

According to Copeland, rendition statements are filed with the chief appraiser of the appraisal district in which the property is located.

Any taxpayer who believes that his property's value has decreased during the preceding tax year, for any reason other than normal depreciation may submit a "report of decreased value" to the chief appraiser. This report describes the property involved and states and nature and cause of the decrease.

Forms for rendition and the report of decreased value are obtainable from the Wheeler County Appraisal District office. Anyone filing a rendition or report must include all the information requested on the form, and it must be signed by the property owner or an authorized individual.

When rendering property, it is not necessary to state a market value for it, Copeland said. However, a taxpayer may continue to include his opinion of its market value and thus be assured of official notification in case the appraisal office places a different value on the property.

Copeland also said that rendition please notify us.

The forms should be filed with Copeland by May 2 at the appraisal district office at the County Courthouse Square in Wheeler Texas. For more information, call 806-826-5900.

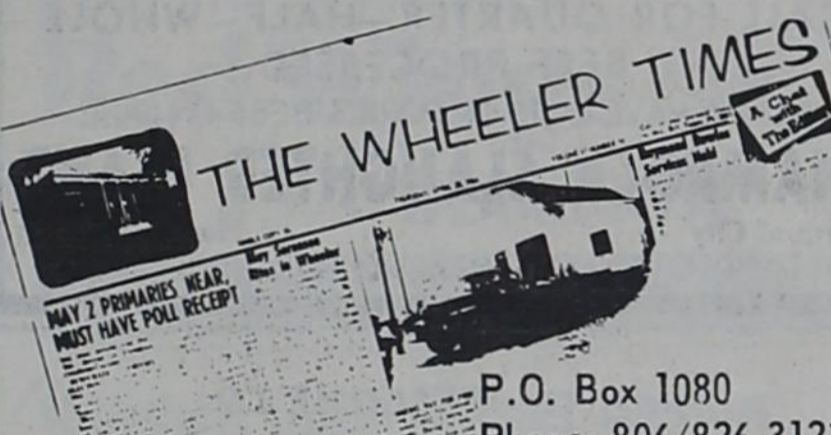

WHAT IS TAX RENDITION?

This public service message from the State Property Tax Board, local taxing authorities and this newspaper explains the process.

Rendition is the method through which a taxpayer reports or lists the taxable property he owned or managed and controlled on January 1 of the current tax year. It is also the means by which a taxpayer is allowed to record his own opinion of what the value of that property should be.

Not every taxpayer is required to file a rendition, but there are important reasons why a taxpayer may wish to do so.

Renditions must be filed: (1) for all tangible personal property used for the production of income; or (2) on any other taxable property if required by the chief appraiser.

Renditions may be filed by any taxpayer who wishes to preserve certain valuable rights.

Even if you aren't required to prepare and file a rendition on your property, there are several good reasons why you should do so:

- As previously noted, by filing a rendition, you have placed into the record your own opinion as to the value of your property.
- You create a responsibility on the part of the chief appraiser and the appraisal review board to notify you if they intend to increase the value of your property by any amount over what you have rendered. Further, you have the right to protest to the appraisal review board either the increase in value or any other decision affecting the taxability of your property.
- For property that is not rendered by the owner, the chief appraiser makes his own

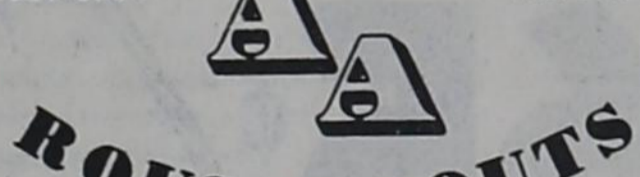

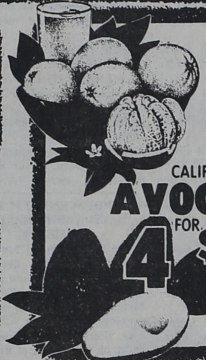
