



BURGLARY AND VANDALISM CHARGES FILED AGAINST PAIR

After an investigation headed by Deputy Sheriff Lonnie Miller and Deputy Art Allison; Charles Shea, 23 yrs. old, of 200 S. Choctaw, Shamrock and Robert Rawles, 21 yrs. old, of 508 S. Austin, Shamrock have

been charged with the burglary and vandalism of the Ruth Ledbetter residence located 3 mi. E. and 1 mi. north of Kelton. The burglary occurred Wed. March 9th during the

day. Recovered items were a T.V., a video game, a 38 revolver and a scanner.

Shamrock Chief of Police, Art Taylor, assisted the deputies with the investigation in Shamrock.

Shea and Rawles were arraigned before Clark Reagan, Justice of the Peace, Pct. 1, on Monday, March 14th and bond set at \$25,000.00.

Deputy Miller also started an investigation during the early morning hours of March 8th, which resulted in the solving of several barn burglaries in Wheeler, Gray, Roberts, Carson and Armstrong Counties.

These burglaries had been occurring regularly during the past several months.

Deputy Miller received a

theft in progress call during that morning and caught one of the barn burglars. Most of the property stolen from a barn near Mobeetie on Jan. 1, 1983 was recovered. The barn belonged to Monroe Seitz Jr. of Mobeetie. Approximately \$1,500.00 worth of property was recovered for Seitz. Recovered property included a tool box, air compressor, tires and wheels, a vacuum cleaner and other items.

The property was recovered from Leslie Derlle Mize who was living in a trailer park just over the state line east of Wheeler. Mize has been charged in Gray County with

burglary but has not been charged in Wheeler at this time.

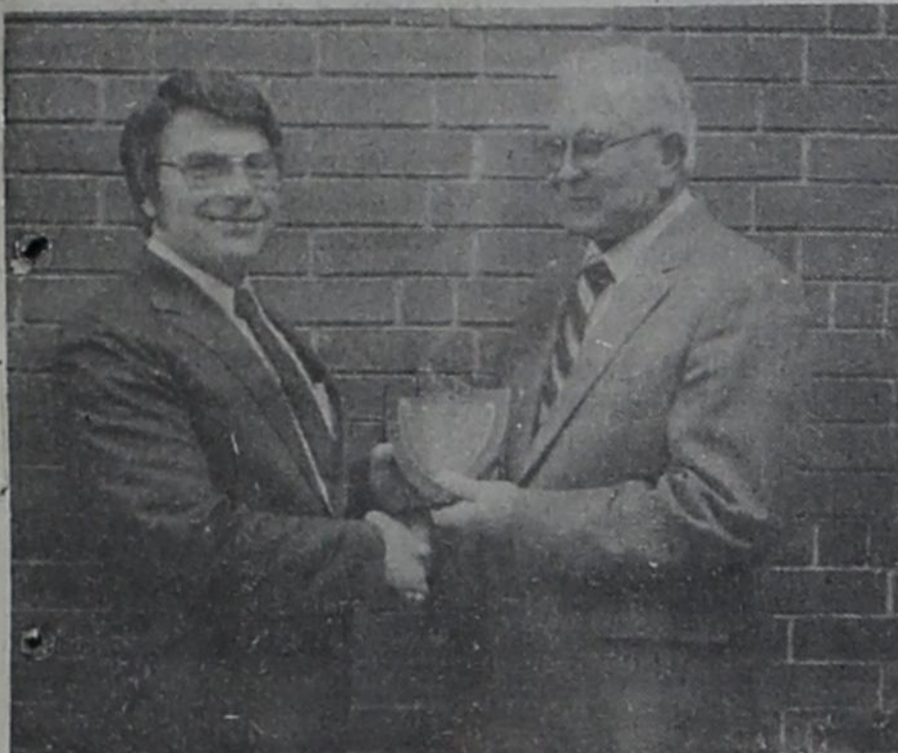

The bill was passed from committee and will be voted on by the full senate at a later date. The bill was introduced by Senator Sarpalius. Fred Parkey with the Red River Authority spoke before the committee and introduced Seibert Worley, mayor of Shamrock and me.

STRIPED FABRICS FOR SPRING

Striped fabrics are more fashionable and available this

spring than in past seasons. Although anyone can wear stripes, it takes thought when planning to select the most

becoming pattern for the individual.

Look at a striped fabric or garment in a mirror before buying to see what kind of effect it produces. Consider the size of the stripes, color and design as used or as you plan to use it.

When vertical stripes are too far apart they may make the eye move in a horizontal direction from stripe to stripe going across the body. This can make the wearer appear heavier. Similarly, if a horizontal stripe is wide enough, it creates a ladder effect and makes the eye move upward. This adds an appearance of

length or height to the wearer.

When sewing with a stripe, pattern selection is particularly important. If the pattern is illustrated in a stripe on the package, then stripes are especially suitable and have been checked for possible matching problems. Avoid patterns that are labeled "not suitable for stripes" because

they cannot be properly matched and will distract from the garment's appearance.

As you buy yardage, include extra for matching. The amount depends on the size of the stripes and the number of lengths to be laid out. Use the most dominant stripe in the center of the major garment pieces as the bodice, skirt or sleeve. Place a definite horizontal stripe at the hemline or garment edge. It can then be

matched to other pieces or a separate garment.

Striped fabrics may seem a little more difficult to work with, but they can also provide opportunities for creativity. You can create many interesting effects by tucking or pleating stripes, or designing other unusual details.

So experiment with striped fabrics this spring—you'll be glad you did when you see the fashionable results.

SPRING FABRICS

Crepe is a fabric that many people know very little about. The term crepe refers to any plain woven or knitted fabric in which the yarns are tightly twisted in all directions. The result is a surface effect that is easy to identify.

Most crepes dry clean very well. When there are complaints, they are usually with shrinking, stretching, separation from bonding, color loss or change, rings around spot removal, or yarn slippage.

Always identify any problem areas or damage requiring special care when having a crepe garment dry cleaned. This will help insure that your crepe is cared for properly. Carefully follow cleaning instructions to get the most use from this fashionable fabric.

Silk is another great fabric for spring.

Silk is a beautiful, exotic fabric that comes in many varieties. Spun silk is not the highest quality of silk, but it is still a pretty fabric. In spun silk, some of the silk fibers are taken from cocoons that were pierced, possibly by the emerging silk moth. These fibers also come from the beginning or end of a cocoon, and from waste in processing. Spun silk usually has been heavily sized to give it body, luster and texture. Unfortunately, this sizing often causes problems when water or moisture comes in contact with the product. Although it has some drawbacks, spun silk can be used to create very attractive garments.
