## WHEELER CARE CENTER OPENS

### TOM G. PURYEAR DIES; SERVICES HELD WED.

Thomas Gordon Puryear, 66, died Sunday, January 2, 1983.

Graveside services were at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, January 5, in Wheeler Cemetery with the Rev. Ernie McGaughey, pastor of First United Methodist Church, officiating. Arrangements were by Wright Funeral Home.

Mr. Puryear was born in Roger Mills County, Okla. He had lived in the Wheeler area most of his life. He married Peggy Shaw in 1944 at Colby, Kan. He was a rancher. He was a member of Wheeler Masonic Lodge, Elks Lodge and First Methodist Church in Kelton.

He was a former member of the Kelton School Board. He was the first president of the board of directors of Parkview Hospital in Wheeler, serving as president from 1963 to 1965. He served on the board

of directors of the hospital after being president.

Pallbearers included Dick DeArment, Harry Frye, Tom Henry Frye, Dr. Louie Mendiola, Denzel Reed, Domer Reed, Joe Rogers, and Hiram Whitener.

Survivors include a son, Tommy Puryear of Wheeler; a daughter, Penny Burt of Austin; two sisters, Rae Marie Royer of Boulder City, Nev., and Billie Mallot of Woodlake, Calif., and two grandchildren.

## WHEELER VOL. AMB. 1982 ACTIVITY REPORT

Eleven calls were answered for the month of December. This brings the yearly total to two hundred and thirteen calls. This involved one thousand, two hundred and sixty-two volunteer hours in patient care.

The number of individual calls and hours for 1982 are: M.K. Christner 140 calls, 351 hours; Lewis Stas 83 calls, 197 hours; David Cross 61 calls, 129 hours; Lee Hibler 64 calls, 154 hours; Tommie Puryear 19 calls, 57 hours; Frankie Jackson 13 calls, 56 hours; Pam Hibler 16 calls, 74 hours;

Lyndon Loyd 6 calls, 8 hours; Novelene Loyd 1 call, 4 hours; Jim Jackson 5 calls, 11 hours; Mimi Boedeker 2 calls, 4 hours; Dwight Tipps 49 calls, 136 hours; Panna Jones 1 call, 4 hours; Frank Coates 4 calls, 5 hours; Evangeline Wills 2 calls, 8 hours.

The nature of these calls and problems were: four infants, four o.b. calls, thirteen sick calls, eight respiratory, three burn patients, two circulatory embarrasments, two diabetics, thirty-three heart patients, four CVA's, twenty-two head injuries, twelve hip fractures, two hip dislocations, eight arm injuries, twelve leg injuries, four finger injuries, fourteen hand injuries, five foot injuries, nine cancer patients, twelve internal problems, five abdominal problems, six seizures, four hemorrhages, two kidney problems, nine severe wounds, twenty-three rig accidents, twenty-three auto accidents, 1 tractor accident, one fall from a horse, four motorcycle accidents, four DOA's, three DOS's, three football injuries, one fractured clavicle, one overdose, one amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, one fracture of the neck, one knee injury, one construction accident, three mental patients, one severe eye injury, six falls, six back injuries, one toxic shock, one heat exhaustion, three post surgical complications, one extraction from a vehicle, nine stand bys at house fires, four no pickups. Sixty-two calls were code 3 emergencies or 29% of all the calls.

The questions concern legislation which will likely be considered in the next session of the state legislature. If you received the mailing, here is your opportunity to make your feelings known to our representative.  
One question concerned the "continued Bilingual education past the third grade." I am against bilingual education ballots and legal notices. Every non English speaking person should have the opportunity to attend a class or classes to learn to speak English. After learning the language, they should enter public schools or night classes and obtain the education they desire.

Where would we be today if everyone who came to the United States was educated in their native language.

Continuation of the native tongue in the home is fine; education, work and business should be English.

If foreigners want to live in this country, learn the language. Bilingual education allows them to remain ignorant of the language and makes it more difficult for them to become employable citizens.

With all the discussion on drunk drivers, there is bound to be legislation on DWI. The main argument for the change in the present law is the presently over crowded prison system. A fine is said to be meaningless and most go free with only probation.

One hundred transfers were made in 1982 compared to one hundred and twenty-one in 1981. Also in 1981 two hundred and twenty calls were answered, compared to two hundred and thirteen in 1982.  
The main problem we encountered was heart related, representing fifteen percent of our calls for 1982. Nation wide heart is still the number one killer. This points out why we are always trying to promote CPR education for our community. However, in the past we have had very poor reception, but we will continue to offer our time to educate our friends and neighbors on this life saving technique.

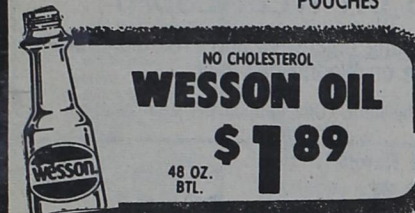
