

# MUSTANGS TOUNCE TIGERS, 42-14

The Wheeler Mustangs kept their playoff hopes alive last Friday night with a convincing trouncing of the upset minded Groom Tigers 42-14 and once more used the rushing of Scott Wright to spur their victory.

Jumping into a 21-0 lead, the Mustangs, appeared on their way to a very easy win over the rival Tigers but Groom fought back to pull within seven points in the third quarter.

Wheeler then took the ensuing kickoff and drove 69 yards in 7 plays to give them a comfortable margin again and then scored twice more in the fourth quarter to win going away.

Wright continued his onslaught on the ground as he had a whopping 252 yards for a 9.7 average on 26 carries and established himself as one of the premier runners in Class A in this region.

On their first possession of the ball game the Mustangs showed their superiority as they covered 87 yards in a quick 7 play drive that saw Wright totting the all every play and getting to paydirt

with a 2 yard plunge at left guard. Wade Wills booted the Mustangs into a 7-0 margin at 5:31. Appearing to be unstoppable, the Mustangs cranked up a 71 yard scoring drive the

Wheeler Colts won the District 1A Championship last Thursday by defeating Groom Cubs 25 to 0. Groom, the winner of the South zone, lost their first game in two years. Wheeler finished the year with a perfect 7-0 season. Wheeler had outscored their opponents 234 to 20 this year. This is the second straight District Championship for the Colts. Last year they won the 2AA District with a 8-2 record.

In the first quarter last Thursday, Wheeler scored on the second play from scrimmage with Dicky Salyer going 52 yards for the score. Wheeler missed the two point conversion which made the score Wheeler 6 and Groom 0. Salyer scored again in the first quarter with a 3 yard run to increase the lead 12-0.

In the second quarter Wheeler scored on a 24 yard drive in 3 plays with Augie Hennard scoring from one yard out. Richard Smith added the extra point kick to increase the score 19-0. Wheeler scored again in the second quarter on a 54 yard drive in 4 plays. Charlie Miller passed to Cody Wiggins on a 45 yard touchdown play which gave Wheeler a commanding 25-0 lead. Wheeler had one touchdown called back in the third quarter. Wheeler did not allow Groom past the 50 yard line all night.

Leading the Colts on Defense was Miller with 16 tackles, Kenneth Daughtry with 14, Jesse Brown with 13, Danny Benefield, Salyer, Smith and Sammy Zepeda with 8 tackles each. Hale Hughes, Shane Whiteley, David Jones, and Drew Thomas had 5 tackles. Leading the Colts on offense was Charlie

make one teaspoon of pollen. Correction, Mattie Jackson went to Wichita Kansas instead of Wichita falls.

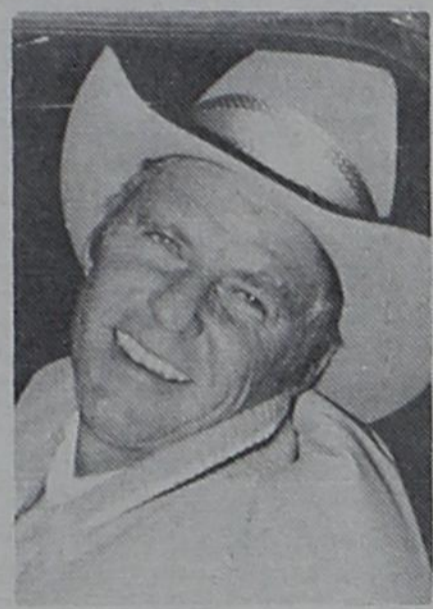
Mattie was in Canadian on business Friday. Mattie and Effie Renfro attended Gageby singing Sunday night.

## New Scholarship At West Texas

A scholarship fund has been established at West Texas State University to honor the contributions to education made by Claude Zevely, who retired in 1981 as an associate professor of education.

Zevely, who has been involved in education for more than 30 years, was forced by health problems to retire in December of 1981.

"We are grateful that his health is now such that he can enjoy his retirement," said Dr. Wilma Jo Bush, a retired professor of education at WTSU. "His doctors, however, had advised him that he must not again become involved in the work pressure of today."

Bush is chairperson of the Claud "R" Zevely Scholarship Fund Committee. Other members are Anne Foster; Frank Rapstine; Louise Rapstine; Suzanne Hewitt, director of education at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum on the WTSU campus and a former student of Zevely; and Dr. Fred Stoker, Dean of the College of Education at WTSU.

The committee has sent letters to friends and former students of Zevely in the Texas Panhandle area.

Names of donors will be included on a list which will be framed and hung in the Education building.

Zevely, who earned a master's degree at WTSU, taught and served as a principal in public schools from 1948 until 1966 when he joined the WTSU faculty. He served as director of the WTSU Center for Exceptional and Handicapped Children from 1967-73. He also has been a popular speaker for workshops and reading conferences across the United States and received several awards for his service to education.

He is the senior author of "Breaker, Breaker for Better Communications, which was written in 1977 with Bush and Dr. Kenneth Waugh, professor of education.

"There is no one who has contributed more time to our area here in the Panhandle of Texas than Claud. He has worked tirelessly and most of the time his services for workshops and inservice training were free to the public," Bush wrote in the letter.
