#### dows, by Cecil Meadows; Postal Service To Test Use Polly, by his grandaughter, Of Official Mail Stamps

In early 1983, the U.S. Postal Service will begin testing a new system which will permit U.S. Government Agencies to use official map postage stamps, postal cards and stamped embossed envelopes instead of the current official mail indicia printed on government envelopes.

The design of the Official Mail Stamp, which will be the same for stamps and postal stationery, was unveiled today by Assistant Postmaster General Gordon C. Morison during the National Postal Forum in Washington, D.C.

The purpose of the nationwide test is to develop procedures for the possible future introduction of an Officail Mail Stamp system which, when combines with meter postage, business replies, Express Mail, E-COM and permit imprints, will provide total official mail accountability and the collection of proper postage revenue from official mail users.

If the test is successful and the concept is adopted, it would replace the present officail mail indicia and the system whereby government agencies reimburse the Postal

ed on Mail samplings. The stamps will be produced in seven denominations in order to provide customers with the full range of service for single-piece mailings. The denominations are one cent, four cents, 13 cents, 17 cents, 20 cents, \$1.00 and \$5.00.

Thirteen-cent postal cards will be provided, as well as 20-cent embossed stamped enelopes in the Number 10 size with or without windows.

The design features a stylized eagle and will bear the phrase "Official Mail USA-Penalty for Private Use \$300." To ensure compatibility with Postal Service facing and canceling equipment, the stamps and postal stationery will be "tagged" with green phosphorescent ink. The stamps will be distributed in sheets of 100, except for the 20-cent stamp, which will be issued only in coils of 100.

The Postal Service emphasized that the stamps and postal stationery will be restricted to official government mail, and may not be used on private mail. Envelopes bearing the stamps must have a government return address.

For collectors, the stamps and postal stationery will be sold by the Philatelic Sales Division, Washington, DC 20260-9997 by mail order. The Official Mail Stamp test is expected to involve elements of the Department of Agriculture and the U.S. Air Forct initially. The field offices of these agencies will requisition stamp and stationery supplies from designated Stamp Distribution Offices within each state.

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
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


