



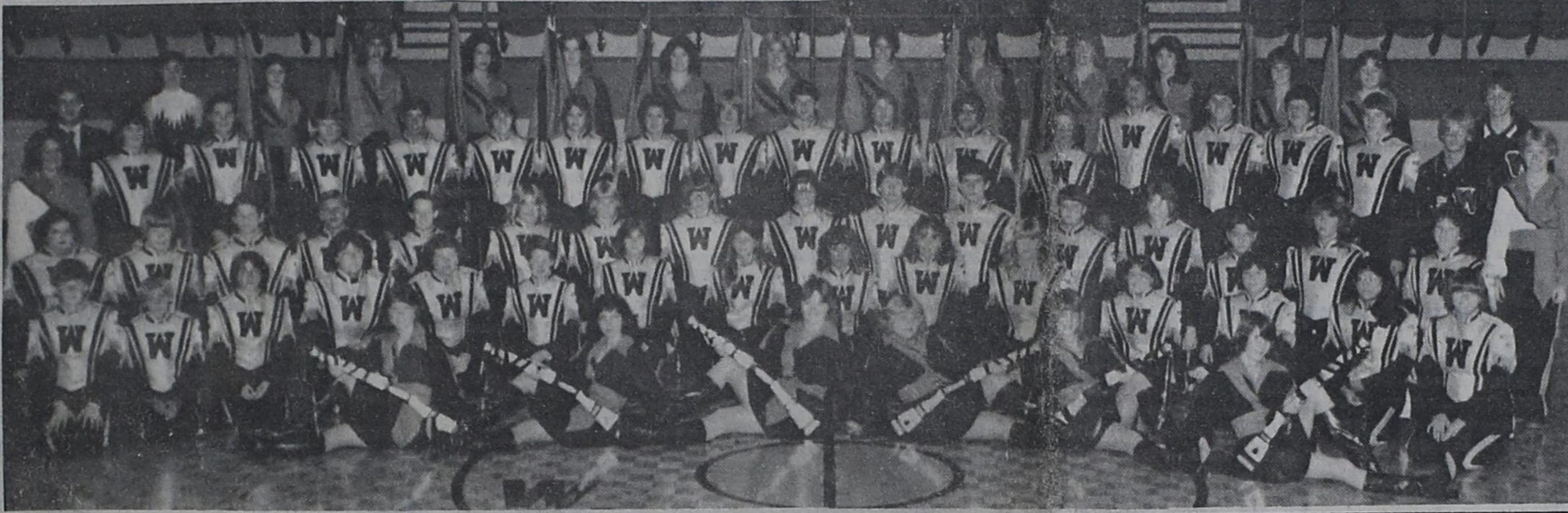

MUSTANGS SINK LEFORS PIRATES, 28-7



Wheeler's Mustangs overcame a touchdown deficit and went on to crush the Lefors Pirates 28-7 last Friday night and upped their district record to 2-0.

It was really no contest after the Pirates scored their only touchdown at 1:38 in the first quarter but inconsistency once again plagued the Mustangs or the score might have been higher as the Mustangs dominated the Pirates.

A 40 yard pass interference penalty on third and six against Wheeler gave the Pirates life on the Mustangs 32 late in the first quarter and John Winegeart went up the middle from the 3 to cap the 76 yard scoring drive.

Being behind must have done something to the Mustangs as they took the ensuing

Wheeler certainly can't be looking down the road to the Booker game next week when they battle Claude this Friday. "Claude poses a lot of problems for us defensively as they run out of a lot of formations on offense and it is mighty hard to prepare for what they will do", coach Preston Smith said.

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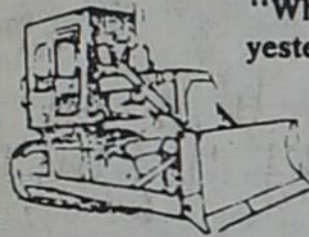

SERVICES TO HELP STUDENTS UNDERSTAND TEST RESULTS

Three new services to help students and school officials better understand and interpret scores on the PSAT have been introduced by the College Board to coincide with this year's national test date of October 19, according to Dewey Shepard, director of guidance at Wheeler High School.

The three services are:
1. A Summary of Answers Report, which indicates how many students in each school, district, or state chose each answer to each question on the test, as compared to all students taking the test.

2. State Summary Reports of Sophomores, which show career choices, intended college majors, ethnic background, and similar demographic data, identical to information currently provided for juniors.
3. A Counselor's Guide to Helping Students Learn from the PSAT/NMSQT, a new publication designed for counselors to help students more clearly grasp the general nature of the tests and the implications of their test results.

Students also receive, before taking the test, a Student Bulletin containing a complete test with an answer key and scoring instructions; a Report of Student Answers, in December, including the corrected answers and their own responses and score; the test booklets so that they can review the original questions; and a booklet, About Your PSAT/NMSQT Scores, that helps them to interpret their test results and to plan for college.

The PSAT/NMSQT is sponsored by the College Board and the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. Since 1959, more than 25.5 million students have taken the test, which measures verbal and mathematical abilities.

By taking the test, students discover how they rank among juniors across the country. It also provides a preview of the SAT, which many seniors take when applying for college. The PSAT/NMSQT is also the

qualifying test for students wishing to participate in competitions of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. Test fee for the 1982 testing on October 19 is \$4.25. Interested High school juniors should contact Mr. Shepard.



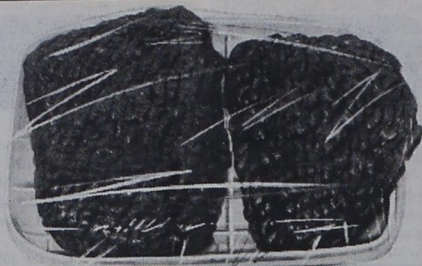

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

But Jesus did not trust himself unto them, for he knew all men, and because he needed not that any one should bear witness concerning man; for he himself knew what was in man. (Jn. 2:24-25)

In the previous verse, John says the Jesus had gone to Jerusalem for pass-over. While he was there many believed on him when they saw the signs that he did. Then comes this statement. It is both terrifying and comforting at the same time.

If that is a terrifying thought to you, think about this aspect of it. He loves you. He knew many of those would desert him in his hour of need. Yet he healed their sick, cast our demons, and preached to them of the coming of the kingdom of heaven. When they nailed him to the cross, he cried, "Father forgive them for they know not what they do." He gave his life for those very people because he loved them. He knew what they were, but he also knew what they could become. He died so that we might through him become "citizens of heaven" (Phil. 3:20), members of the family of God.

Do you try to hide from God? You can't! But come to him through his Son, Jesus Christ, and he will give you a new life, eternal life.

Mobeetie Ordinance

ORDINANCE NO. 14
AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE GROWTH OF ANY NON-CULTIVATED PLANT ABOVE THE HEIGHT OF TWELVE INCHES; PROHIBITING THE ACCUMULATION OF TRASH AND RUBBISH; PROVIDING FOR THE REMOVAL OF SAID PLANTS, TRASH AND RUBBISH; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF SAID ORDINANCE; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS, OR PARTS THEREOF, IN CONFLICT THEREWITH; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any owner, lessee, occupant or any person having supervision or control of any lot, tract, within the corporate limits of the City of Mobeetie to suffer or permit grass, weeds or any plant that is not cultivated to grow to a greater height than twelve (12) inches on an average or to grow in rank profusion, or trash or rubbish to accumulate upon said premises to such an extent as is reasonably calculated to create a fire hazard or to become injurious to the health of the citizens of Mobeetie in the following places:

(a) Upon such premises;

(b) Along the sidewalk or street adjacent to the premises between the property line and the curb, or if there is no curb, then within ten (10) feet outside the property line;

(c) In an alley or adjacent to the premises measured to the centerline of such alley or easment.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of any owner, lessee, occupant or any person having supervision or control of any lot, tract, parcel of land, or a portion thereof, occupied or unoccupied within the corporate limits of the City of Mobeetie to remove or cause to be removed all such grass, weeds or plants or trash or rubbish, or both, as often as may be necessary to comply with Section 1.

Section 3. In the event that the owner of any lot, tract, parcel of land, or a portion thereof, situated within the corporate

limits of the City of Mobeetie shall fail to comply with Section 2, then it shall be the duty of the City Council acting through the Mayor or Code Enforcement officer to notify such owner of his failure to comply with Section 2 in one of the following ways which is applicable:

(a) Personal Service. By a letter addressed to such owner at his post office address.

(b) Publication. By publication as many as two (2) times within ten (10) consecutive day in the official newspaper if personal service may not be had as provided in subparagraph (a) of this section or the owner's address be not know.

Section 4. At the expiration of ten (10) days after notification as provided in Section 3, the City of Mobeetie may enter upon such premises and may do such work as necessary or cause the same to be done in order that the premises comply with the requirements set forth in Section 1.

Section 5. A bill for the cost incurred by the City of Mobeetie resulting from the abatement of the condition existing by reason of the owner's failure to comply with Section 2 shall be added to the owner's trash bill and/or shall be mailed to the owner of the premises and must be satisfied within thirty (30) days of the date of mailing of the bill. In addition to all other costs, an administrative charge of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) shall be added to cover the City's cost of inspection, reinspection, mailing, publication, book-keeping and other related administrative expenses.

(a) In the event that the bill has not been satisfied within thirty (30) days of the date of mailing of the bill, the Mayor may file a statement with the County Clerk of the expenses incurred in the abatement of the above described condition on the premises including the administrative costs set out in the Section.

(b) The City of Mobeetie shall have privileged lien on any lot upon which such expense incurred, second only to tax liens and liens for street improvements, for the cost and the percent (10%) on the amount from the date such payment is due as stipulated in this Section.

(c) For any such expenditure and interest as aforesaid, suit may be instituted and recovery and foreclosure had in the name of the City of Mobeetie.

(d) The statement made by the Mayor as provided in sub-paragraph (a) of this Section, or by copy thereof, shall be prima facie proof of the amount expended in any such work performed or caused to be performed by the City of Mobeetie.

Section 6. Failure to remove or cause to be removed all such grass, weeds or plants or trash or rubbish, or both, when notified to do so as set out in this ordinance, by any party obligated to do so by this ordinance, shall be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50.00) and each day that such violation shall continue after the time for abatement as herein set out shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 7. All ordinances, orders, or resolution or parts thereof, heretofore passed and adopted by the City Council in conflict herewith, shall be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 8. The validity of any section, subsection, paragraph, sub paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, word or words shall not invalidate any part of this Ordinance. It is the intention of the City Council in enacting this Ordinance that the provisions are separable and no provision hereof shall become inoperative or fail by reason of the invalidity of any other provision.

Section 9. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after October 21, 1982.

Section 10. Publication of this Ordinance after its passage, shall be made one(1) time as provided by the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, which publication shall contain the caption of the Ordinance as well as the penalty for the violation of same. **PASSED, APPROVED AND ADOPTED,** this 11th day of October, 1982.

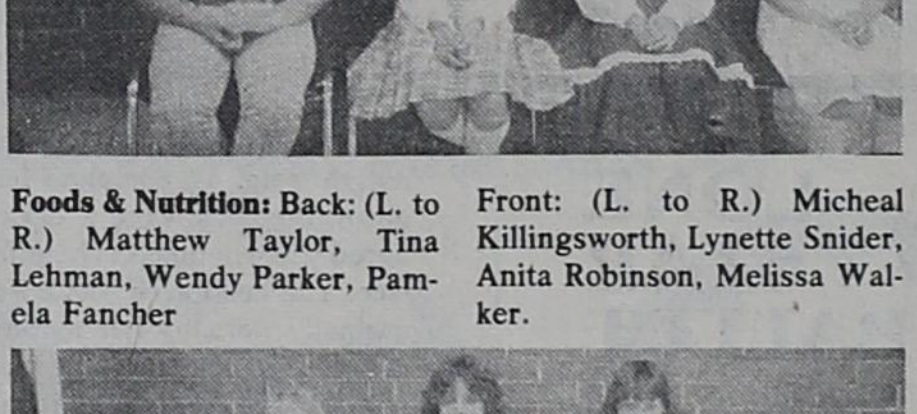

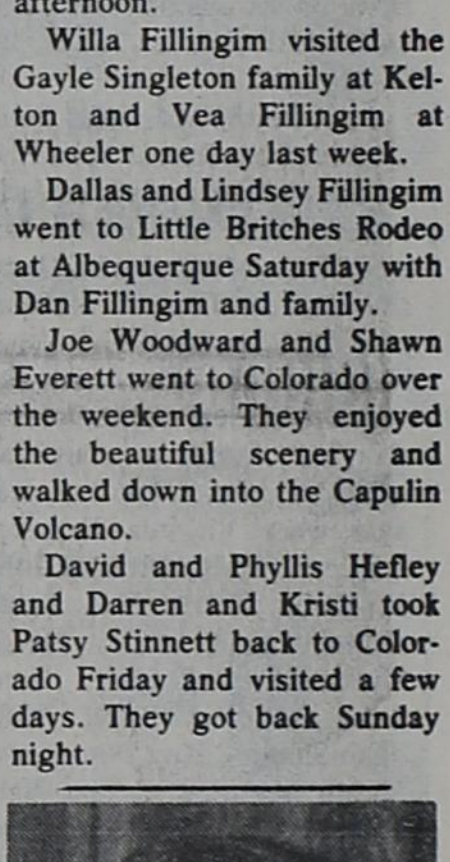
