ACT Testing Schedule Given

The 1982-83 school year has started and juniors and seniors at Wheeler High School are facing some big decisions. One of those decisions is what to do after graduation—whether to go on to college or trade school, get a job, or try to do both. An important role in student's planning will be played by guidance counselors, parents, friends, and the ACT Assessment program. Designed to provide guidance information for education and career planning, this national program is recommended for use by student applicants at more than 2700 colleges and universities.

Wheeler students will have five opportunities during the 1982-83 school year to make use of the testing program, which consists of four tests and a two-part questionnaire. Students complete the questionnaire at home as part of the registration process. The test is then administered at area centers on any of five weekend national test dates, explained Dewey Shepard, school counselor. The five 1982-83 national test dates and the corresponding registration deadlines are:

June 11, 1983	May 13

On any of the above test dates, most local students will take the ACT at Amarillo College. The basic student fee for using the ACT Assessment is \$9.50.

It takes students about three hours to complete the ACT Assessment's four exams (English, math, social studies, and natural sciences.) In order that students may be familiar with the character and format of test items and responses, a copy of a full-length test booklet has been sent to all high schools. This booklet is available to interested students through the Counselor's Office at the high school. Students who wish copies of additional tests may obtain them upon request from ACT at cost.

Shepard said the test scores provide an assessment of general educational development, while the questionnaire information focuses on academic and nonacademic accomplishments and interests, as well as career and educational plans.

ACT Assessment information is also used by colleges for academic advising, admissions counseling, course sectioning and placement, student services, and institutional research. Student's ACT Assessment reports are sent only to those colleges specifically designated by the respective students.

One of several educational services provided by the American College Testing Program (ACT), the ACT Assessment Program is used each year by about one million students as part of their education and career planning.

and raised their record to 3-0. Two big plays, one a third and eight pass completion that gained 18 yards into a stiff wind that kept the Bucks second TD drive alive, the other a questionable pass interference penalty on the Mustangs that set the Bucks up on the Wheeler 1 from where they scored, really drove nails in the Mustangs coffin.
The visiting Mustangs really deserved a better fate than a 25-7 beating but their inability to stop the Bucks ball control in the second half was too much to overcome.
Wheeler could have easily been ahead by three TD's at the half but all they could muster for their efforts was the one touchdown the Mustangs scored in the second quarter. Scott Wright, who was moved to tailback last week, went over from one yard out to culminate a 43 yard drive. Wade Willis booted the extra point and the Mustangs were clearly dominate at that point.
In the first quarter the Mustangs drove to the White Deer 6 but came up four yards shy on a fourth down passing effort.
Justin Miley recovered a White Deer fumble at the Bucks 25 on White Deer's second possession of the game to give Wheeler a big break early but a pass interception at the 14 killed the threat.

White Deer took the second half kickoff and drove 80 yards in 13 plays to get back in the game and used nearly 7 minutes of the quarter and from that point on it was a fruitless uphill battle for the Mustangs. Wheeler had the ball only 7 plays in the third quarter and then had to face the wind and rain in the final 12 minutes and were behind 7-13.
The questionable pass interference penalty came five plays into the fourth quarter and White Deer scored their third TD and for all intents and purposes, the game was settled save some miracles which didn't come.
"We had our chances but didn't cash in on them and then let White Deer get the momentum in the third quarter when we needed to get more points on the board". Coach Preston Smith said after the game.
The Mustangs shut down the Bucks running game for the most part and led by Wright's 159 yards in 42 carries, outgained the Bucks 226 to 63 yards on the ground but White Deer hit the big pass play when needed.
The loss gives the Mustangs a 1-1-1 record going into district play and Wheeler will have two weeks to prepare for the invasion of the Phillips Blackhawks in an early season showdown in District 1-A as the Mustangs are open this week.

Leroy brought me home Saturday. We were 81 miles from home when we got the word (at Nelsons). We never came home, tore out up there to be with Ted.

Well, I am in the doghouse. I left out Weldon Parker and family at our party. Also Terry Dougherty and family, Nelson Parker and family, Donnette Dyers, and probably someone else. I sure hated it. Just in to big of a hurry that morning. Coile had to take the news to Wheeler as no mail Monday.

Mable Parker and Dorothy Ogle visited us Sat. She brought us some drill bits to use.

Strake Talk

CRIME: IT'S THE VICTIMS WHO ARE LOCKED UP

I want to talk to you this week about an issue that troubles me greatly and which I know is of great concern to Texans. It seems that whenever I have spoken about crime in the past 12 months I have gotten a strong and troubled response. No matter where I am—Jewett, Roma or Dalhart—people tell me they are angry and afraid about crime in our state.

This anger and fear concerns me for two reasons. First, because this kind of anger and fear serves as a sort of "jail" for innocent people. They are the ones locked in their homes at night while criminals go free. The second reason I am concerned is because unless something is done to stop the crime epidemic, people will be ripe for the kind of politician who will play on citizens' fears. The result could be that Texans lose their liberty in return for their "safety". In that sense, the crime problem is like a cancer gnawing at democracy.

The incumbent Lt. Governor's response to the crime issue has been shameful. While he has been in office the crime rate has risen 131%. He has done nothing to attack crime in a substantial way. In fact, he has fought stronger anti-crime measures. He openly opposed the new wiretapping law designed to catch drug dealers. He openly opposed the Governor's anti-crime package by putting it in a legislative committee run by a hostile Senator, who promptly bottled it up. Much of the package passed anyway and now Mr. Hobby has the gall to go around the state taking credit for it!

His sympathies in the fight against crime are evident. Not long ago he allowed the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) to hold a fundraiser in his Houston mansion and he proudly defends it. The ACLU has consistently opposed laws that would make it easier to deal with the crime problem.

I think such two-faced maneuvering is disgraceful. It is obvious that if we are going to attack the crime problem, if we are ever going to give law officers, judges and prison guards the tools they need to make us safer, Bill Hobby will have to go.

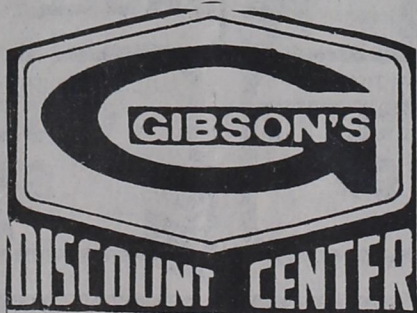

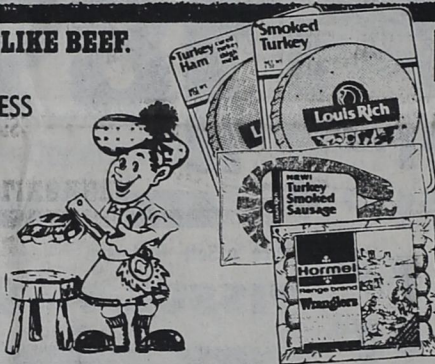
