ACT Testing Schedule Given

The 1982-83 school year has started and juniors and seniors at Wheeler High School are facing some big decisions.

One of those decisions is what to do after graduation -whether to go on to college or trade school, get a job, or try to do both.

An important role in student's planning will be played by guidance counselors, parents, friends, and the ACT Assessment program. Designed to provide guidance information for education and career planning, this national program is recommended for use by student applicants at more than 2700 colleges and universities.

Wheeler students will have five opportunities during the 1982-83 school year to make use of the testing program, which consists of four tests and a two-part questionnaire. Students complete the questionairee at home as part of the registration process. The test are then administered at area centers on any of five weekend national test dates, explained Dewey

On any of the above test dates, most local students will take the ACT at Amarillo College. The basic student fee for using the ACT Assessment is \$9.50.

It takes students about three hours to complete the ACT Assessment's four exams (English, math, social studies, and natural sciences.) In order that students may be familiar with the character and format of test items and responses, a copy of a fulllength test booklet has been sent to all high schools. This booklet is available to interested students through the Counselor's Office at the high school. Students who wish copies of additional tests may obtain them upon request from ACT at cost.

Shepard said the test scores provide an assessment of general educational development, while the questionaire information focuses on academic and nonacademic accomplishments and interests, as well as career and educational plans.

ACT Assessment information is also used by colleges for academic advising, admissions counseling, course sectioning and placement, student services, and institutional research. Student's ACT Assessment reporta are sent only to those colleges specifically designated by the

respective students. One of several educational services provided by the American College Testing Program (ACT), the ACT Assessment Program is used each year by about one million students as part of their education and career planning.

White Deer took the second half kickoff and drove 80 yards in 13 plays to get back in the game and used nearly 7 minutes of the quarter and from that point on it was a fruitless

uphill battle for the Mustangs. Wheeler had the ball only 7 plays in the third quarter and then had to face the wind and rain in the final 12 minutes and were behind 7-13.

The questionable pass interference penalty came five plays into the fourth quarter and White Deer scored their third TD and for all intents and purposes, the game was settled save some miracles which didn't come.

"We had our chances but didn't cash in on them and then let White Deer get the momentum in the third quarter when we needed to get more points on the board". Coach Preston Smith said after the game.

The Mustangs shut down the Bucks running game for the most part and led by Wright's 159 yards in 42 carries, outgained the Bucks 226 to 63 yards on the ground but White Deer hit the big pass play when needed.

The loss gives the Mustangs a 1-1-1 record going into district play and Wheeler will have two weeks to prepare for the invasion of the Phillips Blackhawks in an early season showdown in District 1-A as the Mustangs are open this





But let the brother of low degree glory in his high estate: and the rich, in that he is made low: because as the flower of the grass, he shall pass

(James 1:9-10)

There is a curious phenominon spreading across the land these days. It is the practice among some preachers of seeming to almost guarantee that if a person will but give his life to Jesus he will enjoy great material and financial prosperity; when, in fact, our Lord nor his apostles, never promised any such thing.

Now, don't get me wrong. am not opposed to a Christian being prosperous, if he can do so by honest labor, and if he can keep his material goods in proper perspective. But notice with me what James, the brother of our Lord, said in James 1:9-10. The very poorest Christian, materially speaking, is in actuallity already far richer than the greatest billion-heir because he has the possession that is more valuable than all the treasurers of the whole material universe. He has eternal life.

On the other hand, the follower of Christ, thought he might be rich in this world's goods, has to know that all of those possessions are of no real value when viewed in terms of eternity. He must be willing to give them all up at a moments notice, if to keep them means he should lose his eternal soul.

For what shall a man be profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and forfeit his life? Or what shall a man give in exchange for his life:

(Matt. 16:26) How about it? Would you rather be poor or rich? Most of us would probably say "rich." But, in what way? Materially or spiritually? While they are not necessarily mutually exclusive, they are certainally not the

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
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

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CRIME: IT'S THE VICTIMS WHO ARE LOCKED UP

I want to talk to you this week about an issue that troubles me greatly and which I know is of great concern to Texans. It seems that whenever I have spoken about crime in the past 12 months I have gotten a strong and troubled response. No matter where I am-Jewett, Roma or Dalhart—people tell me they are angry and afraid about crime in our state.

This anger and fear concerns me for two reasons, First, because this kind of anger and fear serves as a sort of "jail" for innocent people. They are the ones locked in their homes at night while criminals go free. The second reason I am concerned is because unless something is done to stop the crime epidemic. of politician who will play on citizens' fears. The result could be that Texans lose their liberty in return for their "safety". In that sense, the crime problem is like a cancer


gnawing at democracy. The incumbent Lt. Governor's response to the crime issue has been shameful. While

he has been in office the crime rate has risen 131%. He has done nothing to attack crime in a substantial way. In fact, he has fought stronger anti-crime measures. He openly opposed the new wiretapping law designed to eatch drug dealers. He openly opposed the Governor's anti-crime package by putting it in a legislative committee run by a hostile Senator, who promptly bottled it up. Much of the package passed anyway and now Mr. Hobby has the gall to go around the state taking credit for it!

His sympathies in the fight against crime are evident. Not long ago he allowed the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) to hold a fundraiser in his Houston mansion and he proudly defends it. The ACLU has consistently opposed laws that would make it easier to deal with the crime problem.

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
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


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
