RECORD ENROLMENT

Enrollment on the first day of school showed a gain over the spring 1982 enrollment. The enrollment was as follows by grade: K-52; 1-54; 2-42; 3-33; 4-38; 5-31; 6-42; 7-38; 8-52; 9-30; 10-42; 11-23; 12-26.

The total enrollment in elementary is 250, in Junior High 131, in High School 121. The total enrollment in the Wheeler ISD is 502.

With the increased enrollment it was necessary to divide the kindergarten,

through fourth grades. Kindergarten is divided into two classes; first into 3 classes; and second, third and fourth grades have two classes.

An addition to the elementary building was completed last spring, but the divided

classes have used all the added space. The addition was intended for use by the classes which were being held in the basement.

Enrollment Wednesday stood at 507 with K-5, 252; 6-8, 153, and 9-12, 122.

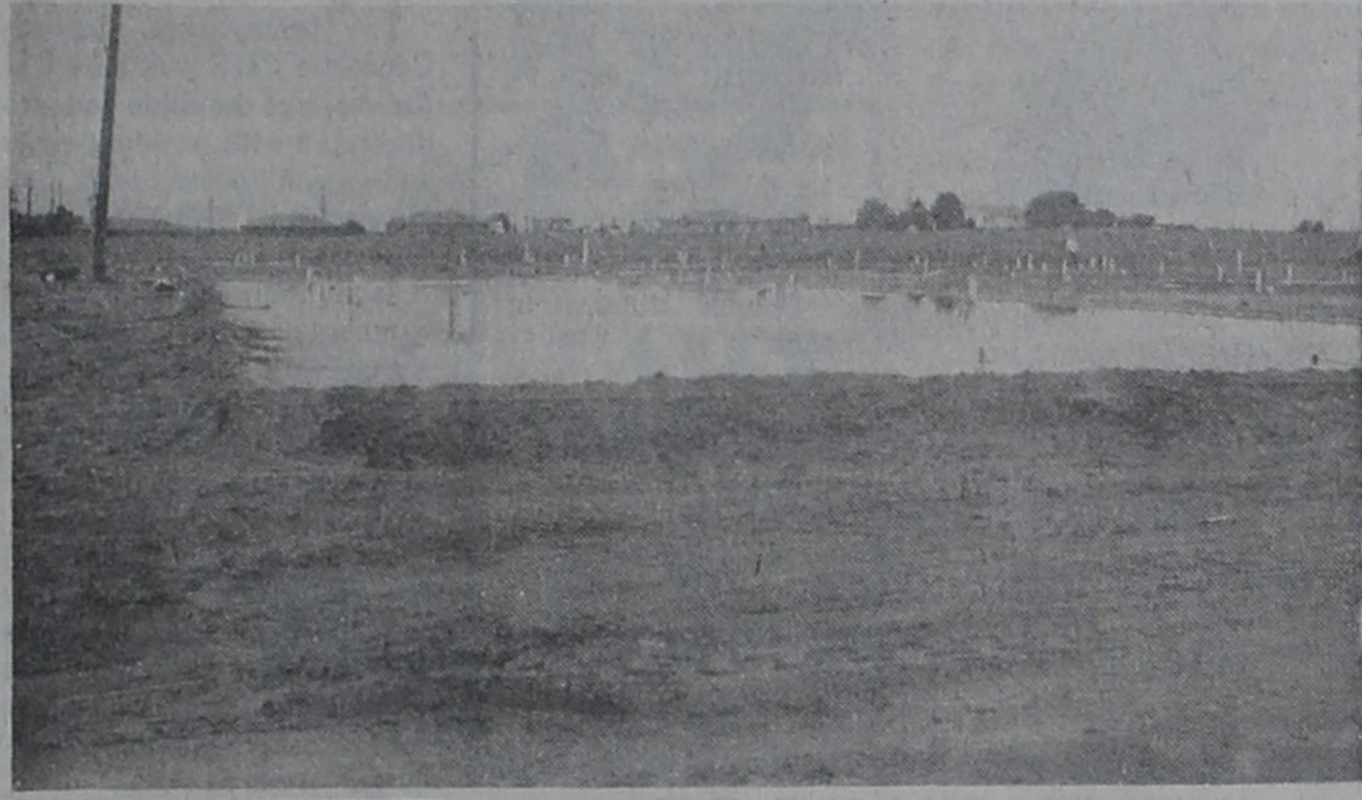
Wheeler Fire Department

Begins New Ministry

Christian Center has purchased a satellite earth station in order to expand the outreach ministry that they believe God has ordained them to do. Psalm 50:67, "And the heavens shall declare his righteousness..." The satellites above us are used for broadcasting many signals, but the people of the Christian Center church family believe that God is the one who made this media possible and that His purpose is for the propagation of the Word of God. It has been perverted and controlled, largely, up to now by ungodly people, but new things are beginning to transpire.

Some of America's best teachers and preachers are becoming increasingly involved in satellite transmission of their seminars and gospel meetings. Kenneth Copeland, a prophet and teacher from

Fort Worth, is heard daily on about 600 radio stations and seen weekly on over 100 television stations. He is one of the first to make use of the satellite technology to broadcast some of his services to auditoriums across America and around the world. A service from Kenneth Copeland's convention in Fort Worth next week will be transmitted via satellite to about 200 locations around the world. Christian Center will be receiving the signal and showing the service on a giant screen. This service will include a live segment from the world's largest church (which is in South Korea). People from all over the eastern half of the Panhandle are expected to be here in Wheeler for that occasion when Christian Center puts their new dish into operation for the first time.

Wheeler I.S.D. Approves Budget

The Board of Trustees, meeting in a regular session, approved the budget for the 1982-1983 school year. The total budget was set at \$1,713,896.00. The tax rate was also set at \$4.55 Maintenance and Operating and \$.04 Interest and Sinking. This is a decrease of 17¢ over '81-82 tax rate.

Dewey Shepard, Counselor for the Wheeler Schools, gave the results of the Spring SRA tests. Significant improvement was noted in all grade levels.

After lengthy study and discussion, the Board discontinued the Senior Trip. This year class and the 83-84 Senior Class will be the last classes to take the Senior Trip. Other activities for the Seniors will be planned.

In other action of the Board, Mr. Jeff Pierce was employed as a teacher-coach and Mrs. Tobytha Wiggins as a teacher aide.

Benny Baker of Wheeler will be among more than 75 athletes reporting to Eastern New Mexico University to begin fall football drills on Saturday, Aug. 14.

Twenty returning lettermen will be joined in camp by 14 squadmen, nine transfers, and 30 new recruits.

Eleven starters return off last year's team which finished the season at 6-4, including seven starters which anchor the defensive unit. Four starters return on offense.

Head Coach Dunny Goode, in his fifth season with the Greyhounds, has announced that players will report on Aug. 11-13 with physicals given on Saturday, Aug. 14. Following the physicals, players will report for their first full contact workout in pads at 4 p.m.

Eastern gridders will workout on Sunday at 4 p.m. with two-a-day practice sessions (9 a.m., 4 p.m.) beginning Monday and continuing through Aug. 24.

Classes at ENMU begin Wednesday, Aug. 25, and practices will occur at 2:30 p.m. the remainder of the season. All workouts will be in full pads.

Baker is a 6-2, 180-pound sophomore fullback and a one-year letterman at Easter. He is a 1981 graduate of Wheeler High.

The steam-driven turbine rotor at Tolk Station, our new coal-fired plant near Muleshoe, Texas, whirls at such great speed that if it were placed on the highway, it would travel the 125 miles from Lubbock to Amarillo in about 6 minutes. Other interesting facts about the power plant, which began generating electricity in July: At the speed the main steam — which drives the turbine — travels through the pipes, it could finish the Boston Marathon (26 miles) in about 12 minutes. At maximum output the turbine produces about 728,000 horsepower. It can provide power for 5,430,000 hundred-watt light bulbs.

The primary fuel for Tolk Station is a low-sulphur, high-heat-value coal from the Black Thunder Mine near Gillette, Wyoming. Southwestern Public Service made the decision to buy this coal because the low-sulphur rating means we can comply with certain requirements of the Clean Air Act without installing extremely complex and extremely expensive pollution-control devices.

Leo Austin, Supervising Engineer, Roswell.

We'll turn things upside down to benefit our customers. Here's an example: We use a "rotary dumper" system to unload the railroad cars which carry coal to Tolk. The cars are unloaded one by one. Each is attached to a large wheel that literally turns the car upside down, pouring out the coal. The system allows us to use lighter weight coal cars. So our freight cost is lower, and so is the fuel cost adjustment our customers pay.

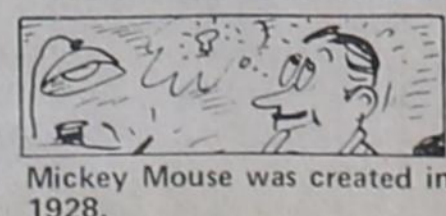

FREE EDUCATION AND THE UNDOCUMENTED WORKER

On June 15, 1982, The Supreme Court ruled, 5-4, that Texas and other states must provide free public education for the children of undocumented workers—people in this country illegally.
Our current Lt. Governor, Mr. Hobby, was happy with the decision, praising it as the "only rational decision" the court could have made.
On the contrary, I think it was a wrong decision that defied both law and logic.
One of the principal underpinnings of an orderly society is that one should not benefit from breaking the law. All around the world, thousands of people stand patiently in line at our embassies, waiting for legal entry into this country. By its recent ruling, the Supreme Court told these people that, if they are smart, they will ignore our immigration laws, find some other way to enter, and then there's a good likelihood all manner of taxpayer-supported benefits will be open to them and their families.
We can all feel sympathy for people driven to emigrate by desperate economic conditions. And I believe we should be compassionate toward the children of undocumented workers who are here through no fault of their own. We have been told we must educate these children and we will: it is our duty.
But I am deeply concerned about the effect this will have on our school systems and the quality of education. We have only a certain amount of desks and dollars with which to address the problems of educating Texas' children.
The court was essentially establishing social policy under the guise of ruling on a constitutional question. The result was bad law and bad social policy. It should now be up to the Federal Government to help pay for the mess they have created by not properly policing our borders.
