Directory Assistance Charge

Beginning Aug. 1, General Telephone customers in Texas will be charged for calls to directory assistance that exceed a 10-call per month limit.

"The increasing volume of calls to directory assistance is one factor that has made local basic monthly rates paid by all customers go up in the past," James H. Davis, Operations Manager-Western Division Operations for General Telephone, said. "With the directory assistance charging plan, the local rate increases recently placed in effect were less than what they would have been without directory assistance charging."

Davis pointed out that charging for calls to directory assistance exceeding a 10-call per month limit will have little effect on the majority of the company's customers, except to help keep basic rates lower than they would be without the charge.

"Our studies have shown that approximately 9 percent of the total directory assistance users make nearly half of all calls to directory assistance." Davis said.

"Under the previous method, the cost of providing directory assistance was spread among all customers, regardless of whether they use the service or not," the telephone company manager said. "Customers formerly could make an unlimited number of calls to directory assistance without paying a separate

"As a result, customers who never use the service or who used it very little were paying just as much through their local rates as the heavy users for this service.

"Charging for excessive use will transfer the costs to those who use the service extensively, resulting in keeping basic local rates lower than they would be otherwise."

Each General customer will have a 10-call per month per line allowance without charge. The caller can also obtain a maximum of two telephone numbers during each call under the plan approved July 14 by the Public Utility Com-

"We feel this will take care of new listings and number changes most customers will need during the course of a month," the manager said.

"After the 10-call limit, a 25-cent charge per request will

be assessed.' Calls for which no charge would be assessed will be those made from coin telephones, from hospitals, by certified handicapped persons who cannot use a telephone directory, and calls for longdistance assistance which are



Education—Our Money's Worth?

In my travels over Texas, it has become clear that Texans rate crime, the economy, and the education of their children among their principal

This week I would like to discuss education. As the father of six children, this has long been one of my principal concerns also.

We currently spend over half our tax revenue on education, and many people raise the question to me: "Are we getting our money's worth?" The questions put to me indicate some think we are spend-

ing too much; others, not enough. I too am concerned about the amount of money we spend on education, but I am more concerned about the quality of that education. I believe the quality of education our children receive can be improved by making some fundamental changes in the way we pay and treat our teachers. I believe in merit pay for

than poor teachers. A good, conscientious teacher cannot help but become discouraged and disillusioned when he or she ends the month with the same pay as one whom they know to be indifferent. The result is apt to be that they leave the teaching profession altogether.

teachers ought to be paid more

I also think we ought to enter a system of competency testing not only for new teachers, but for those who are currently teaching. We test our kids, why not also test those who teach them?

In short, I think we ought to bear down on the basics. relieve our teachers of burdensome paper work now placed upon them, and recognize and reward our better teachers with better pay, for the sake of our children, and



82-83 SCHOOL YEAR

Wheeler I.S.D. breakfast and lunch prices for this school year will be the same as last year. Breakfast for all grades K-12th will be 25 cents and adults will be 60 cents. Lunch prices for K-4th will be 55 cents, 5th-12th grades will be 65 cents and adults will be \$1.25.

Advance meal tickets will be available for students and adults to be purchased for ten meals. Prices for a ten-meal ticket will be: Breakfast K thru 12th-\$2.50 and adult-\$6.00, lunch tickets for K thru 4th-\$5.50, 5th thru 12th-\$6.50 and adult-\$12.50.

Buying meal tickets in advance will greatly improve the efficiency of the lunch room program. Free and reduced forms will again be available for students and will need to be filled out by parents and returned to the school as soon as possible.

Students and adults will only be able to charge meals for one month and then their bill must be paid or they will not be allowed to charge the next month.

This policy change is due to overdue bills from last year that would accumulate over several months of unpaid charges.
