The Pre-School and 6-9 age divisions will compete on Thursday night and all other age divisions will compete Friday and Saturday nights.

The following are the age divisions and events for the rodeo. Contestants may enter up to 4 events.

Pre-School: Stick Horse Barrel Race, Boot Scramble, Goat Ribbon Race and Sack Race.

Agnes 6-9: Barrel Race, Calf Riding, Pole Bending, Flag Race and Walking Lead.

Agnes 10-12: Steer Riding, Breakaway Roping, Barrel Race, Pole Bending, Flag Race and Goat Tying.

Agnes 13-14: Bareback Ponies, Steer Riding, Breakaway Roping, Ribbon Roping, Goat Tying, Pole Bending and Barrel Race.

Agnes 15-19: Bareback Riding, Bull Riding, Calf Roping, Ribbon Roping, Breakaway Roping, Pole Bending and Barrel Race.

A jackpot steer roping will be held in conjunction with the rodeo this year. The steer roping is scheduled for 3:00 p.m. Saturday, August 7. The charge will be \$16.00 for 3 head, progressive after 1. Entries are to be made on the rodeo entry form and will also close on July 30. The roping is open to all ages through 19 years and will not count toward high point in any of the age group. A contestant may enter 3 times.

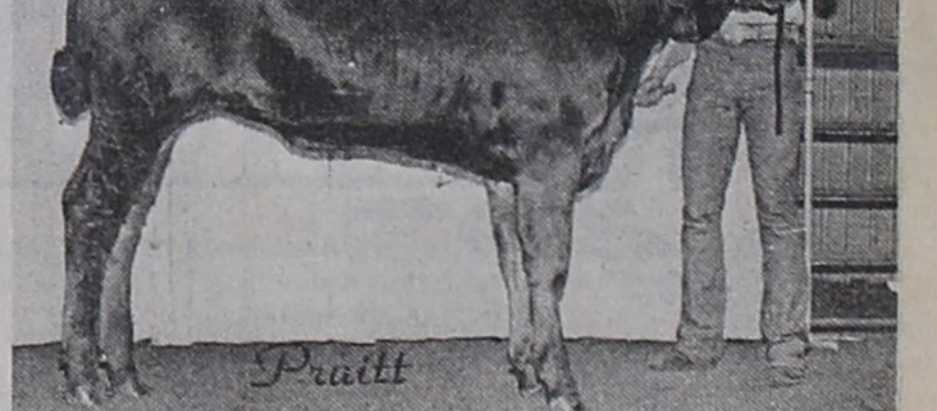
PHYSICALS

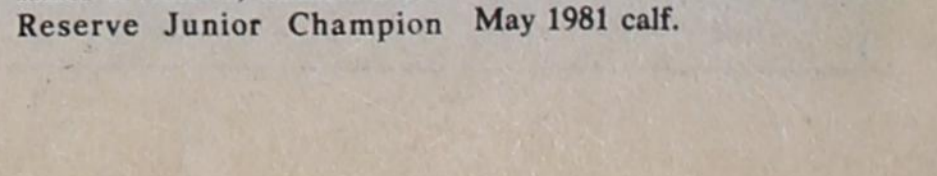

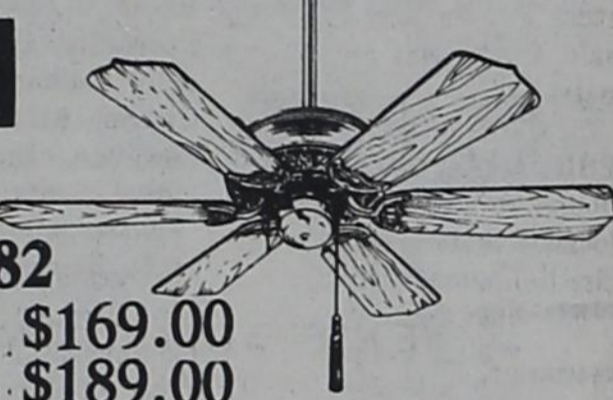

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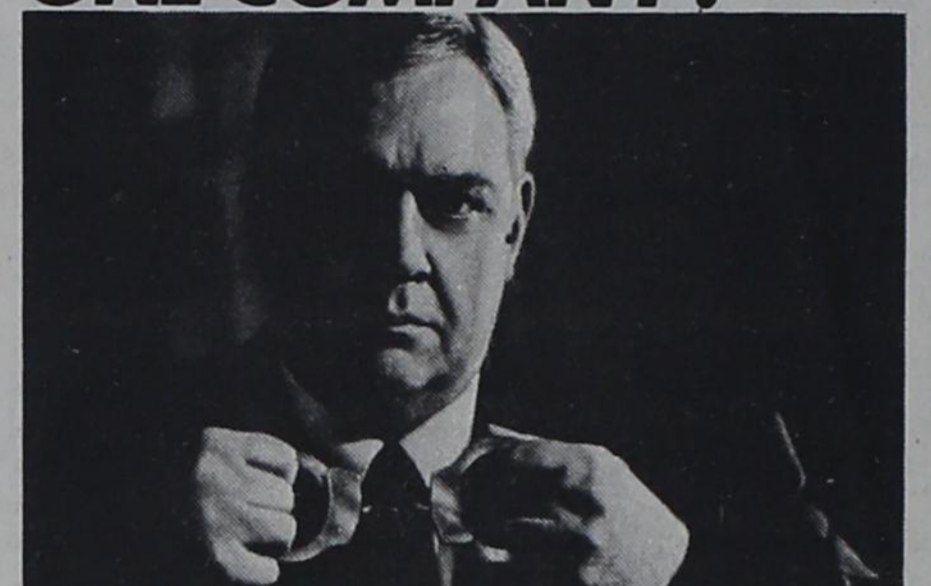

the night in a log cabin. Next to go is the old porcelain cup I found somewhere in Colorado, away off from no where. It has been set and moved around on the rocks by the camp fire so many times the porcelain is worn so thin on the bottom the metal is showing through in places.

Was it used by outlaws many years ago? I can almost see the rough weary men as they sit in the dim firelight, drinking hot coffee. Are they talking? No, they are singing songs of home and loved ones. One moves closer to the fire as he shivers in his thin worn rags. What stories this old cup could tell.

The old whisky bottles we dug up at the Old Fort dump are going fast, lots of folk are not content to buy just one, but take two or three. Perhaps they can imagine soldiers sitting in the old Fort drinking whisky. Did they drink it straight from the bottle? I guess not, for here is an old whisky glass. Its cracked and turned a beautiful purple color after so many years. I wonder if a commanding officer used it.

Here are more treasures from the old dump. How many folk ever saw the old pewter pipe covers, or would know what they were if they did? I found two and had no idea what I'd found until an old, old man told me most of the cowboys used them on the bowls of their pipes to keep sparks from blowing from them and starting prairie fires, also to keep the rain from putting the fire out. These little covers had tiny hinged lids on them, with little star shaped holes cut in them for the smoke to escape through. Friends gave me two of their old pipes to put them on.

I fixed a board covered with black felt to display the pipes along with some old gold covered army buttons, old brass door keys and an old iron shoe button hook. Can't you just see the lady of the house buttoning her high top shoes by candle light in the early morning. I'm glad a friend bought this board of treasures, because her sixteen year old son loved it.

I see the old blacksmith

shop, as some one buys the old horse shoe hammer I found at the dump site. It was shop made, most blacksmiths made their own to those days. The handle had rotted out long ago, but my husband had put one in it for me shortly after I found it.

A red fire is in the forge, as I look back into the past, a piece of iron is slowly getting red hot. The blacksmith takes the tongs, gets the hot iron, takes it to the anvil and hammers it to the shape of a horse shoe, fitting it to the horses hoof. Its very hard work, at last he has it finished and it fits the hoof perfect. Next he takes the horseshoe hammer and square horseshoe nails and nails the shoe gently in place. Each hoof has to be fitted perfectly.

I can barely remember seeing my Daddy shoe horses when I was a tiny girl. Some stood perfectly still while others had all kind of fits, but with the quite, soothing voice of the blacksmith they were usually calmed enough to get the job finished without to much trouble.

The old round flat tin box, with the red top painted on the lid, also sells quickly. Its an old red top wagon axle grease can. Few folk of this day ever saw one, but most every wagon had one in the tool box under the wagonbed in days of long ago.

It takes natural processes hundreds of years to form an inch of topsoil. This can be lost over a short period of time if the soil is neglected.

We all know that man survives on the thin layer of topsoil that surrounds the earth. Much of this valuable topsoil is being lost from production each time a shower of rain falls or a gust of wind blows. The earth does not lose this soil, it is just shifted around. Man only loses the ability to use it for production as it lays clogging our lakes and streams, blocking our roads and settling in a thin layer in our homes.

Soil loss has many sinister forms. The most evident of these is gully erosion which is easily seen and eats tons of soil in a single bite. Sheet erosion is the sneak thief that takes a layer of soil from an entire area. With these and other forms of erosion stealing our main resource natural rebuilding processes can not keep up with demand for food, clothing, and shelter. How can we return this valuable topsoil to production.

We could haul this topsoil back up the long hill from the botton of oceans and lakes. The father of our country, George Washington, tried this many years ago and found it to be an expensive lost cause. Our only answer is the prevention of this loss. This tragic loss is easily prevented by using our land in a way which will produce and yet conserve our soil.

If you some times wonder why the soil in a field may be less productive at the top of even a gently slope, just stop and think about soil erosion! The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District assisted by the Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler is interested in helping you plan and apply soil and water conservation practices.

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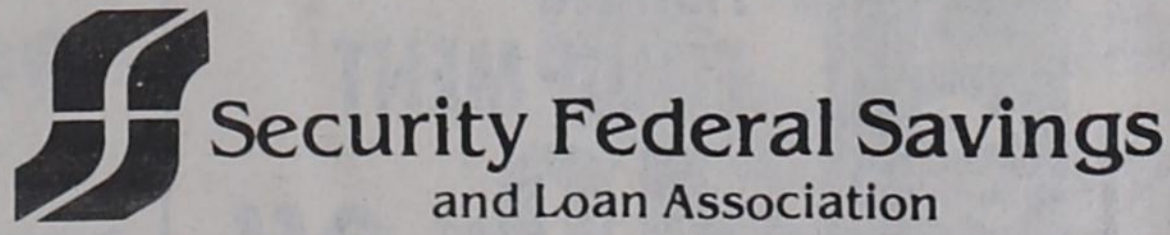


