### CONTRACT LET FOR 8" WATER LINE INTO TOWN

Regular meeting of the City Council, July 19, 1982 opened with Mayor Louis C. Stas opening bids on the water project. This consists of running a 8 inch line from the underground storage tank to 8th and Osage then on to Mobeetie Street.

Six bids were received namely: Novak, Bowen, Jordan, Wes-Tes, NAVC, and Stubbs. After reviewing each bid, Kirven Roper motion Thurman Bowen's bid of \$19,811.00 on base and \$14,243.15 on alternate bid #2, this being a total of \$34,054.15 be accepted. Joe Montgomery second, motion carried. Mr. Bowen is to begin in 10 days and will take 30 days to complete the project.

**[Editor's Note:** This water project is designed to bring more water into town and correct a bottle-neck situation which now exists. An eight inch line and a six inch line bring water as far as the underground storage tank at 801 West Oklahoma; these lines are reduced to an 8 inch line which brings the water to the tower. With the completion of the project, an eight inch line will be laid approximately 900 feet South from the aforementioned point; the line will then be turned east and run down the alley behind seventh street to Mobeetie Street. At Osage and Mobeetie, the line will be joined with existing lines to increase water pressure in these areas. At a later date the line will be taken across on east across town.)

Berniece Hall motion to accept minutes as written, Jimmy Hill second, motion carried.

Jimmy Hill motion to pay bills as presented, Kirven Roper second, motion carried. Mayor Stas declared there was an emergency needing to clear up the congestion on the north side of the Courthouse that is caused by peddlers parking with their wares. In light of this situation Mayor Stas presented an extension to Ordinance #11 Art. 1, being Section 4-4 Spacing.

Peddlers and hawkers who hold a permit to sell merchandise on public property within the city limits of the City of Wheeler, Texas, will be limited to one vehicle per business and a space not to exceed 8 feet in width (width being parallel to curb).

Joe Montgomery motion to adopt said addition to Ordinance #11, Berniece Hall second, vote was unanimous.

Wesley Master's met with Council to discuss the water situation and presented a letter of request for an increase in water rates.

Frank Coate and Johnny Valesquez met with Council to discuss peddlers in the City limits. After much discussion, the men were told the Council has Attorney Ken Fields looking into the legal side of the problem.

Mayor Stas reported on the Fire Department's report on the need of repairs to some fire hydrants in the City. It was determined the City employees will repair some when they have time.

Berniece Hall reported on progress of getting equipment for the park. Kirven Roper motion to purchase 4 picnic tables and benches with Revenue Sharing monies. Jimmy Hill second, motion carried.

Hill second, motion carried.

Berniece Hall motion to advertise for bids on a new pick-up for the water and sewer dept. This bid is to be submitted with and without trade-in. Jimmy Hill second, motion carried. Bids are to be opened at regular meeting August 16, 1982. Kirven Roper is to write the specifications which can be picked up at the City office.

Kirven Roper motion to advertise for bids to sell used sprayer, Joe Montgomery second, motion carried.

Berniece Hall motion at the end of the swimming season this year the phone at the pool would be put on "vacation." Kervin Roper second, motion carried.

Jimmy Hill motion, Berniece Hall second that a 7.00 dollar fee be charged for each returned check for non payment. Jimmy Hill second, motion carried.

Joe Montgomery motioned the meeting adjourn, Jimmy Hill second, all voted for adjournment.

### Rites Read For Mrs. Ayner Cole

Funeral services for Mrs. Ayner Cole, 81, were conducted Saturday morning, July 10 at 10:30 at Schooler-Gordon Funeral Chapel in Canyon with Don Browning, minister of University Church of Christ, officiating.

Born August 18, 1900 in Snowball, Arkansas, Mrs. Cole died Friday morning at High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo after a lengthy illness. She married Jeff Cole on Feb. 14, 1916 at Sayre, Oklahoma and was preceded in death by her husband in October 1967.

### Briscoe I.S.D. Tab Test Results

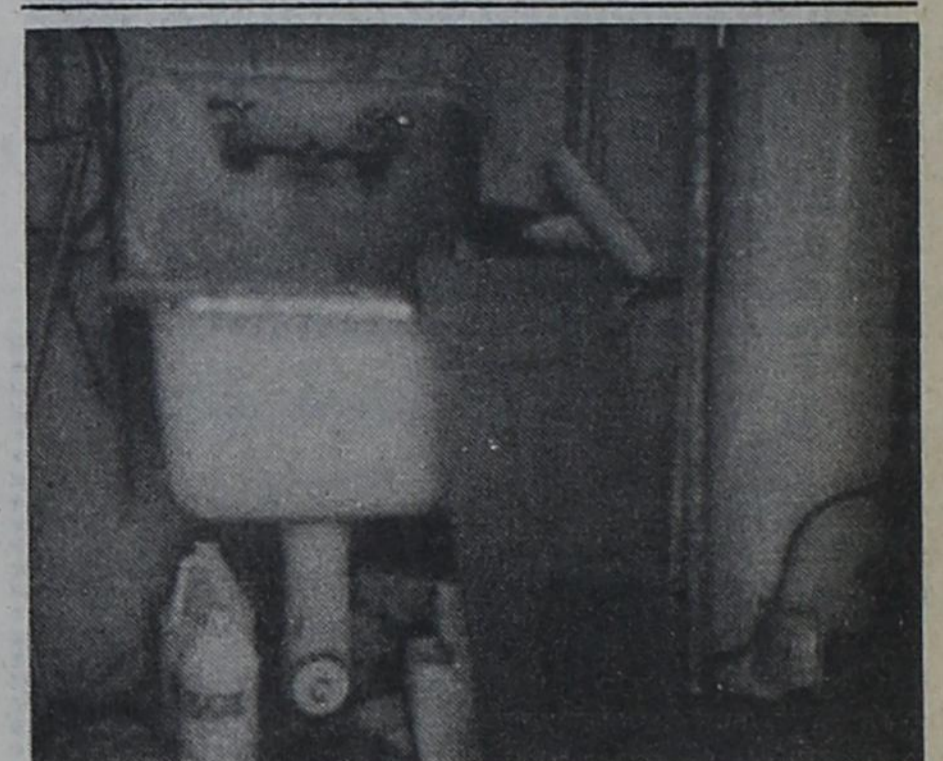
The Texas Assessment of Basic Skills Test Battery (Mathematics, Reading, Writing Skills) was administered to the Briscoe School's third, fifth, and exit level (high school) students in February, 1982. The results were received in May, 1982. At the elementary level, eight third grade students and seven fifth grade students were tested. At the exit (high school) level, five freshmen and one junior were tested.

At the third grade level, 50% of the students tested showed mastery in math, 14% showed mastery in reading, and 100% showed mastery in writing skills. At the fifth grade level, 100% of the students showed mastery of math skills, 100% showed mastery in reading, and 86% showed mastery in writing skills. 100% of the freshman showed mastery in all three areas, and the junior tested showed mastery in math and reading.

### A.S.C.S. News

**DISASTER--**Only producers who have signed up to participate in the Acreage Reduction Program are eligible for any disaster benefits. Wheat and grain sorghum production will qualify for a payment if the total farm production is sixty percent (60%) less than the established yield. To determine your eligibility for a wheat disaster payment of \$1.75 per bushel, the total production from the farm needs to be brought to the office.

If you have had some acres destroyed on your grain sorghum and cotton, we will be able to figure a payment on part of the destroyed acres. Then, after the harvested production is submitted, we can adjust these payments.

Grain sorghum disaster level is sixty percent of the established yield, or less, and

payment rate is .18 cents per bushel. Cotton is figured on 75% of the established yield at a rate of 20.5 cents per pound.

Remember that you MUST have certified your crops and have enough Conservation Use Acres to be eligible for any payment. Non-participating farms are not eligible for any program benefits. Please come in and visit us on any questions you might have.

**CERTIFICATION--**August 2 is the final day to certify your spring-seeded crops and Conservation Use Acreage. Remember that your CUA must be protected from wind and water erosion.

**LOANS--**If you are going to put wheat in the loan program, either in the elevator or on the farm, please allow some time for these warehouse receipts to be processed.

**ACP--**We have some money left for this program and the COC has added the application of Graslant for the control of rangeland brush to its approved practices. All applications need to be submitted by September 15, 1982.

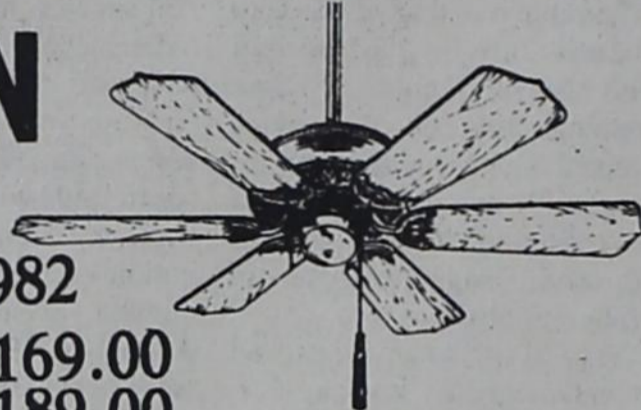

## THE BIBLE SPEAKS

He that hath ears, let him hear. (Mt. 13:9)

The willingness to hear has always been a prerequisite to being acceptable to God from the very earliest times. God gave the first man and woman a commandment concerning the eating of a certain tree in the middle of Eden to see whether they would actually heed his commands. We can see the contrast between a willingness to hear and an unwillingness in the case of Cain and Abel. The Hebrew writer says that by faith Abel offered a more acceptable sacrifice than Cain (Heb. 11:4). In Genesis 4:6-8 we see that when God sought to counsel with Cain, he still refused to hear and killed his own brother.

Someone says all you have is faith in order to be saved. No one who accepts the Bible denies the necessity of faith. But how do we receive such faith? The apostle Paul put it quite plainly in Romans 10:17.

So then belief (faith, KJV) cometh of hearing, and hearing by the word of Christ (God, KJV).

The hearing that is meant is not simply the physical receiving of the sensation of sounds upon our ears. Rather, it is the receiving, understanding, and heeding of the message contained in this word. In this sense we can hear the written word as well as the spoken. God speaks to us today through his written word, The Bible. Let it not be said of us as Jesus said of some in his day:

And unto them is fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah, which saith,

By hearing ye shall hear, and shall in no wise understand; And seeing, ye shall see, and shall in no wise perceive: For this people's heart is waxed gross, and their ears are dull of hearing, And their eyes they have closed; Lest haply they should perceive with their eyes, and hear with their ears, and understand with their heart, And should turn again, and I should heal them. (Matthew 13:14-15)

The first unit of Roy Tolk Station, Southwestern Public Service Company's new coal-fired generating plant near Muleshoe, Texas, will begin manufacturing electricity this month. The unit has the capacity to generate 561,000 kilowatts of electric power—it's Southwestern's largest. A second unit, the same size as the first, is being built next to the one which will be fired up this month. The units cost more than \$200 million apiece. They can each provide enough electricity to supply a city of 225,000 people.

Ben Green, Plant Manager, Muleshoe.

Tolk Station will burn coal — ground as fine as talcum powder — to produce electricity. The coal SPS uses comes from mines near Gillette, Wyoming. It is a low-sulfur coal. Tolk Station Unit No. 1 will burn approximately 315 tons of coal per hour. That's about 7,560 tons per day. The coal is delivered by 110-car trains directly from the Wyoming mines. Coal-fired plants are significantly more economical to operate than natural gas-fired plants.

Morris Rantz, Fuel Administration Manager, Amarillo.

The "stack" at Tolk Station is 400 feet high. The "smoke" it emits, however, is "smokeless." Although burning coal naturally produces "smoke" (flue gas and fly ash), our state-of-the-art environmental protection equipment cleans up the emissions long before they get into the air. The protection system, called a baghouse, contains 13,000 fiberglass bags. They filter the boiler's emissions and remove the ash residues, making the coal "smokeless."

## THE OLD MOBEETIE FLAG POLE

As I was showing people around the Old Mobeetie Jail and Museum one day, I realized to my shame many times

we all forget to stop and look at the most historic thing left from the days of the early Panhandle. This day the wind was blowing strong and the

American Flag was lovely flying up on the old flagpole.

I couldn't help but wonder, what has happened to our respect and patriotism for Old Glory. It represents the history of our nation. Each color, and pattern a chapter in the story of blood, hardship, and sacrifice that gave birth to the flag. The flagpole is in 2 sections with guywires and braces in the middle holding it up. One day while standing under the flag, a brace fell off and I saw my first square headed nail.

It is safe to say our land in the Panhandle is a land of faraway spaces with rolling hills, wind and dust. One soon forgets this as you see the lovely fields of wheat, cotton, and pastures of cattle. The Eastern Panhandle Gas Field is the deepest and most productive field in the world. To realize what our land is we always go back to the men and women of the Old West who fought the indians, tilled the land, and raised their families. If you are going from Wheeler to Pampa on Hwy 152 at the Mobeetie Intersection, there is a sign saying Old Mobeetie Jail and Barber Shop. You are invited to stop and see your heritage.

Texas history will come to life as you read the plaques below the flag. J.J. Long — 1875 who established the fort to protect the Texas Panhandle from the indians.

Temple Lea Houston who gave the dedicatory speech for the Texas Capital in 1888.

Frank Willis Sr. 1881-90 first judge of the 35th district coming to Texas in search of new horizons.

Capt. G.W. Arrington — 1844-1923 a great peace officer of era of early settlement in the Texas Panhandle and lived near this site. He was one of the most daring scouts in the famous Guerilla command of Col. John S. Mosby in Virginia. He settled in Texas in 1867, became a Texas Ranger and had an outstanding record. With courage and distinction he served 1882-90 as sheriff of Wheeler and 14 attached counties. He still has relatives in Mobeetie.

Emanuel Dubbs was the last I read. 1843-1929, First County Judge in the Panhandle. He came to know Texas as a Buffalo Hunter and was famous in the Battle of Adobe Walls 1874. He gained wide respect when as a judge he had a lawless U.S. Marshall arrested.

The Old Mobeetie Jail Museum dated 1886 was the first jail in the Panhandle and still stands. It has been made a museum furnished as it was in 1882. The jail was then the central holding place for all the badmen. The jail is built of native stone at the cost of \$17,500 including \$1,200 for the hangman's device which the state required at this time. The hangman's noose has been restored to the jail from the Canyon Museum. The record shows no one was ever hanged on it.

In May 1898, Mobeetie suffered a killing tornado. It left 6 people killed and left few buildings standing. Once a year a festival is held on the stage behind the jail. It is held on Labor Day with free barbecue, speaker's, music and singing. It is called "Old Settlers Reunion".

The Mobeetie Little Theater presents a play called "Old Mobeetie" on the outdoor stage once a year. It is about Mobeetie in 1875-1885. The Blue Grass Festival is held once a year on July 23rd, 24th, and 25th. This will be its 3rd. year.

The Mobeetie flagpole first stood a mile northwest of the jail at Fort Elliot. In 1875, Major Biddle of the 6th. Cavalry established the Fort to protect the Texas Panhandle from the indians. J.J. Long, teamster, and merchant who arrived with the soldiers was hired to provide the flagpole for the Fort. He found, the huge trees in Cedar Breaks near Antelope Hills 30 miles away. He cut 2 huge trees and hauled them by wagon to build the 50ft. flagpole. When the Fort Closed in 1890, Long brought the flagpole and placed it in front of the store. It stood in front of the Mobeetie School for 20 years. In 1949 at last it came home to rest in the lovely valley by the Old Mobeetie Jail and Museum.

If it is mentioned at all, it is treated as a theory. Situation ethics is one of the major doctrines of the humanism religion. Therefore, you won't find a public school textbook that advocates traditional moral absolutes. Humanists strongly believe in abortion and the right to divorce. Therefore, you won't find a public school textbook that speaks out for the right of the unborn or for the righteousness and sanctity of one man being joined to one woman for one lifetime. Also, you will not find an encouragement to patriotism nor will you find our founding fathers presented in a heroic light because humanists want a one world government. Therefore, patriotism has to be subtly destroyed.

Now, here is why I cannot subject my children to a system that is built on this type of philosophy. Psalm 1:1, "Blessed is the man (includes children) that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly...nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful." Proverbs 19:27, "Cease my son, to hear the instruction that causeth to err from the words of knowledge."
