



\$130 Million In Highway Funds

HOBBY ANNOUNCES

The state Department of Highways and Public Transportation will receive an estimated \$130 million in additional funding for highway construction and maintenance through 1983, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby announced Friday.

The Highway Cost Committee provided the additional funds by updating its method of calculating the effects of inflation on the costs of highway construction and maintenance. The committee, comprised of Gov. Bill Clements, Hobby and State Comptroller Bob Bullock, adjusted its calculations to include a change in the process by which contractors bid on highway jobs and to give more stress to highway maintenance.

During the committee meeting, Hobby pinpointed a flaw in the Highway Department's method of calculating the Highway Cost Index and suggested an alternative that will provide an additional \$12 million for 1982-83.

"I am pleased that the committee saw fit to make these changes," Hobby said. "For various reasons, the Highway Cost Index needed updating to provide a more accurate picture of the effects of inflation on highway programs."

Hobby said the additional \$130 million is severely needed to help upgrade the state's highway system.

"Several states have actually suspended bidding for highway construction due to a lack of funds," Hobby said. "That is not going to happen in Texas because we have made long range guarantees of funding for this essential public service."

CONVECTION OVENS HOW GOOD ARE THEY?

Convection ovens "a la counter-top" are the latest entry into the counter-top cooking field, and, like most all appliances, they have their "pros" and their "cons".

These new models are promoted as fast-working, energy efficient and easy-to-clean.

Some save both time and energy, while others do not save energy, and most will need a good scrubbing now and then.

FAN CIRCULATES HEAT

Convection cooking is not new and it isn't complicated. Restaurant and bakery industries have used convection ovens for years. No matter what the style, all work on one simple principle: a fan continuously circulates heated air around food in the oven cavity. TIME-SAVER COOKING

Fans are their "secret of success," too, when it comes to time-saver cooking.

Any food placed in any oven to bake starts out surrounded by an "insulative blanket" of "cool air." A convection-oven fan wipes away that cool blanket and subjects food toheat immediately-hence, less cooking time necessary.

In fact, convection ovens save one-fourth to one-half on cooking time.

SOME SAVE ENERGY* OTHERS DON'T

For energy savings, consider a gas convention oven-it saves time and energy.

Electric convection ovens save time, but they use more energy than conventional-type

Range-industry advertisers cannot make claims based on direct comparisons between portable and standard-size convection ovens, since the portable units are excluded from tests regulated by the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) and the Department of

From appearances, it would seem that electric convection ovens should save energy, since they do eliminate preheating, they require a lower temperature for cooking food and cooking time is shorter.

However, it's total kilowatthour (KWH) energy use that counts here. How long the heating element is "on" affects the KWH use.

In a non-insulated countertop electric convection oven, the heating element may remain on throughout the cooking process to maintain the

oven temperature. Insulation does not affect baking time (because the heating element will "make up" any heat loss), but it does affect KWH consumption, since the heating element may

have to stay on the entire cooking time to keep an accurate steady oven temperature. **EASY CLEANING?** Some manufacturers claim easy cleaning of their ovens,

even those that already have a "continuous clean" feature (which sounds like "NO cleaning necessary"). However, a residue does

build up on all of these and its removal requires hand scrubbing. Convection ovens "a la

counter top" need a cook's fine touch for placing food just rught if there's lots of it cooking at once, but the result is a high-quality product-if you don't mind a bit of noise.

They're also great for thawing foods-just turn the temperature dial off-and for dehydrating rather small amounts of food.

However, be prepared for that bit of noise since their main feature is a fan. Of course, some are noiser than others.

PLACING FOOD

Because air circulation in today's convection ovens is not perfect, loaves of bread, pans of cookies or layers of cake loaded on more than one rack at a time do not bake evenly.

It helps to stagger the pans. Or when baking larger amounts, divide food into smaller pans.

June Drilling Report

Commission Railroad Chairman Jim Nugent announced that Texas operators reported 122 gas and 75 oil discoveries in June 1982.

One year ago, 110 gas and 53 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in the sixth month of the year included 51 in deep South Texas, 21 in the Refugio are, 16 in Southeast Texas, 15 in West Central Texas, five in North Texas, four in the Panhandle, three each in East Texas and the San Antonio Area, two in the San Angelo area and one each in East Central Texas and the Midland area

Oil discoveries included 19 in Southwest Texas, ten in West Central Texas, eight in North Texas, six each in East Texas and the Refugio, Midland and Lubbock area, four each in deep South Texas and the San Angelo area, and two each in East Central Texas, the Panhandle, and the San Antonio area.

Through the first six months of this year, there have been 730 gas and 317 oil discoveries throughout the state. For the same period last year, there were 588 gas and 332 oil discoveries. In June, operators reported

382 exploratory and field tests wound up as dry holes. New applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 2,586 in June compared with 3,704 in the same period of 1981. Applications to drill, deep-

en, plug back and for service wells in June amounted to 2,945 against 4,014 a year earlier. Operators filed 891 amend-

ed application to drill. A year earilier they submitted 833 amended requests.

March Refining Summary

Railroad Commision Chairman Jim Nugent announced that 65 refineries in Texas processed 123,601,299 barrels of crude oil and hydrocarbon blends during March 1982. Through the first three months of 1982, Texas refineries ran 357,959,345 barrels.

This volume compares with 130,769,869 barrels in the previous March, the Commission's Oil and Gas Division reported in its monthly recapitulation of Texas refinery operations. Inputs of crude oil and blends totaled 110,955,831 Barrels in February 1982.

Texas refineries 94,349,195 barrels of crude oil in March compared to 105,-153,796 barrels in March 1982 totaled 123,855,099 barrels.



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
