AMBULANCE MONTHLY REPORT

\$1000 SHORT

The Wheeler Ambulance Service answered 18 calls in June of 1982. One Hundred and nineteen hours were given in patient care.

The nature of these calls were: one sick call, 3 cardiacs, 2 cancer patients, 1 seizure, 1 rig accident, 3 auto accidents, one motorcycle crash, 1 severe eye injury, 1 fall, 1 unconscious patient, 1 shock patient and 2 hip fractures. One patient was DOA at Parkview. Other problems were: 2 head injuries, 2 foot injuries, 2 internal injuries, 2 severe bleeding, 1 severe wound and 2 back injuries.

Out of these calls, six were

code 3 responses, there were nine transfers to Amarillo hospitals.

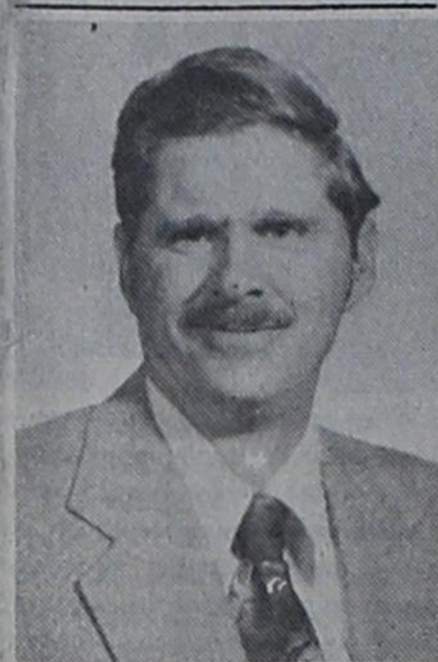

TAPE RECORD "FAMILY HISTORY"

Got a child with a small tape recorder? Teach him family history



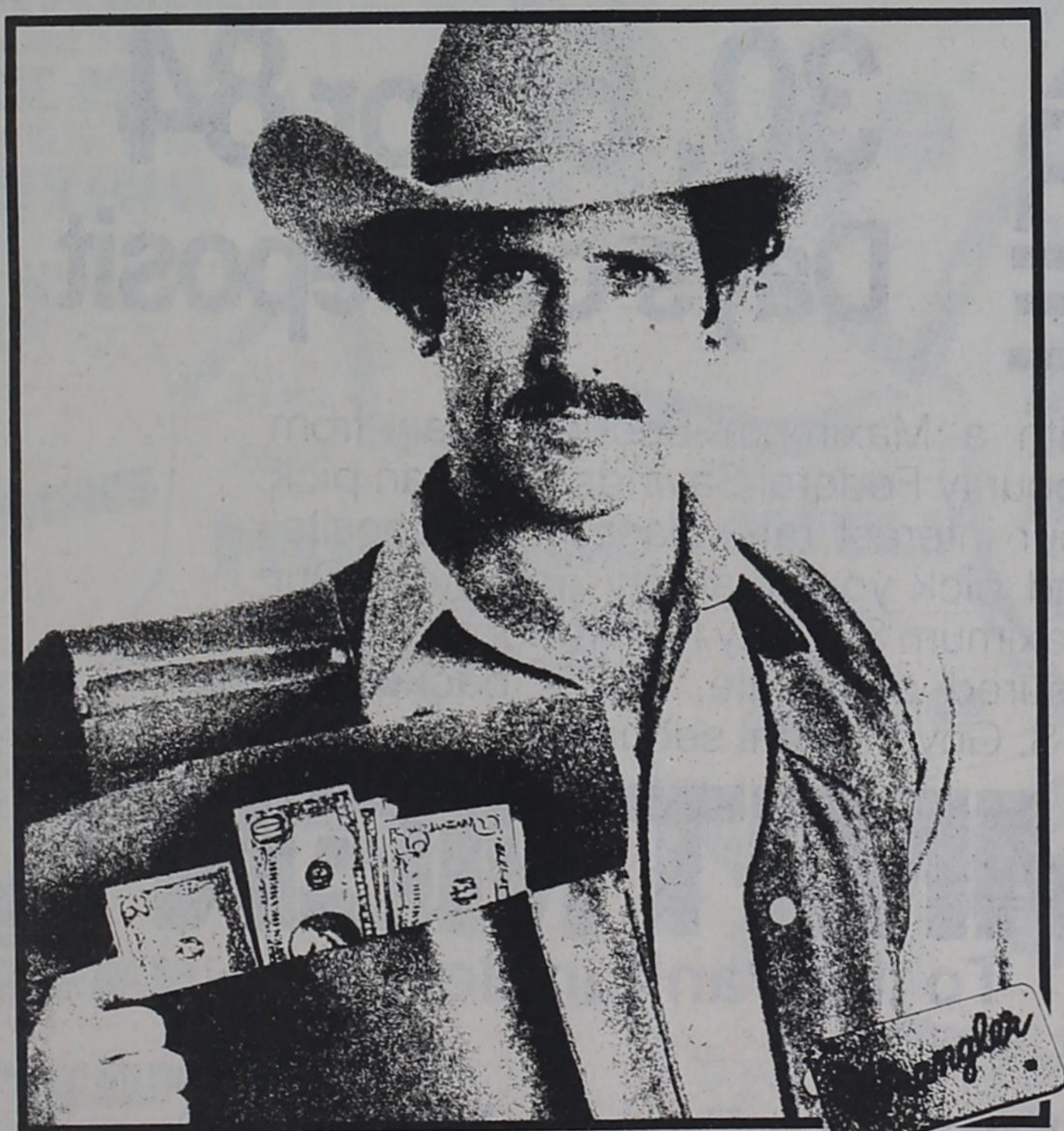

I could never send my child to a public school. The reason I couldn't is because children are a gift from God to parents. They don't belong to the government, and since they are from God, we parents are accountable to Him for their training. Every educational system is based on a philosophy of life--either Theistic or humanistic. In other words, every thing taught will either be taught from God's point of view or from man's point of view. If it is taught from man's point of view, it will be distorted. God is Creator of all things; therefore, all subjects must be taught from the Biblical philosophy of life to be accurate and right.

Sometimes, I am misunderstood and consequently strongly criticized because of my outspokenness on this matter. I want to make it clear that I am not against the local precious people involved in public education. I am opposed to the humanistic system. It is a monster. Many people that teach in public schools don't like the humanism, but it is there and they can't change it. However, I as an individual parent do not have to subject my children to it. I'm not responsible for other people's children and what happens to them (other than to preach and pray), but I am responsible for mine. Because of what I know about humanism, textbooks, God's requirements and the pliability of children, I cannot allow my children's minds to be captured by the world's system. (See Col. 2:8, Prov. 19:27, Prov. 22:6)

Secular, government school textbooks are designed around the humanistic philosophy of life. It is not neutral to Jesus Christ. It is opposite of Christianity. I will have more to say about humanism in next week's article. I have 2 cassette tapes on the subject of humanism taken from our radio broadcast recently.
