The hunt is being sponsored this year by Loyd's and Street's Ben Franklin. Wheeler merchants and individuals are welcome to donate prize eggs for the event. 90 DAY WARNING PERIOD OVER

The 90 day DPS warning period for the new mandatory liability insurance law expires this week. After midnight Wednesday, March 31, state troopers will begin issuing citations to drivers who fail to show proof of insurance when such information is requested. The law, which became effective January 1, 1982, requires all drivers to carry minimum liability coverage for bodily injury of \$10,000 per person (\$20,000 for two or more persons) and property damage of \$5,000.

27 Ambulance Calls In Mar.

The Wheeler Ambulance Service answered a total of twenty-seven calls for the month of March. The nature of the calls were; three sick calls, seven rig accidents, three auto accidents, one pipeline accident, one tractor accident, seven heart patients, one seizure, two obs, one DOA and one DOS. Of these calls, seven were head injuries, six were fractures of legs, hands or fingers, two severe wounds and three amputations. Of these calls, fifteen were code 3 responses.

Fourteen transfers were made. Eleven to Amarillo, two to Pampa and one to Oklahoma City. The individual number of calls and hours given in patient care were; Louis Stas 11 calls, 27 hours, M.K. Christner 19 calls, 55 hours, David Cross 8 calls, 24 hours, Lee Hibler 14 calls, 34 hours, Tommie Puryear 2 calls, 11 hours, Frankie Jackson 1 call, 1 hour, Jim Jackson 2 calls, 4 hours; Dwight Tipps 6 calls, 20 hours; and Frank Coates 1 call, 1 hour.

A total of one hundred and seventy seven hours were given in patient care, bringing the number of hours volunteered this year to four hundred and ten. The total number of calls for this year are sixty six.

JAY THOMPSON DIES; SERVICES IN McLEAN

Jay Thompson, 54, president of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce and vice president of the Wheeler Kiwanis Club, died Saturday morning. The death was a shock to the town, as Jay had worked, visited and discussed community projects Friday. He called for the ambulance around midnight; he was taken to Parkview Hospital and died a few hours later of heart failure.

Services were held at 2:30 p.m. Monday at the First Baptist Church in McLean. Rev. Ernie McGaughey, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Wheeler and Jay Farber of El Reno, Oklahoma, a church of Christ minister, officiated at the service.

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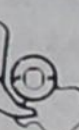

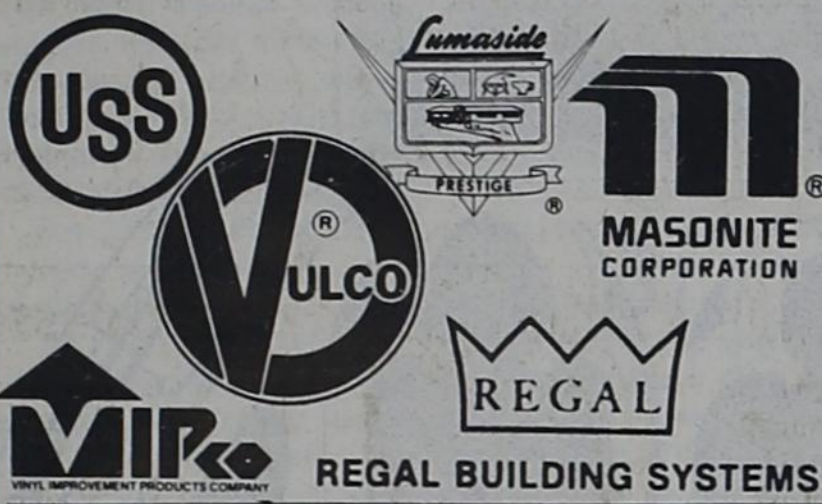
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COUNTY AGENTS COLUMN

Joe Don King—ECA Cotton Production Meeting
Dr. Robert Metzger, Extension Cotton Specialist from College Station, will be in Wheeler County on Thursday, April 8, for a cotton production meeting. The meeting will be held in the District Courtroom in Wheeler beginning at 7:30 p.m.

The program will give information that will enable farmers to do a better job of growing cotton. Topics to be covered will include varieties, fertilization, and weed control. Educational programs of the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin. All cotton producers are welcome to attend the meeting.

Grasshopper Situation

Some areas of the County will be heavily infested with grasshoppers again this year. There is a large area reaching from Allison to Mobeetie, another area north of Highway 152 from the County line to about 8 miles east of Wheeler, and a third area along the river

north of Shamrock and onto the fourth tract in the Keller-ville vicinity.

These areas are expected to have economic levels of infestation based on counts of adults made last summer. The counts were made by personnel of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service of the USDA.

The Texas Department of Agriculture and the USDA will have the cooperative spray program as in the past. Anyone wanting more information should contact the County Extension Office.

Late March and early April

is the time for ranchers to beware of oak bud poisoning in livestock.

Oak buds are high in protein and begin growth before most desirable forage plants. They are readily eaten by livestock, especially cattle.

Tannins which are thought to be the toxic substances involved are most poisonous when oaks are budding and leafing. When more than 50 percent of an animal's diet is oak, the animal becomes sick. A diet of 75 percent or more usually causes death.

Signs of poisoning are a gaunt, tucked up appearance; constipation, frequently fol-

lowed by profuse diarrhea; weakness; tendency to remain near water; reluctance to follow the herd; emaciation (wasting away); mucus in droppings; dark-colored urine; and collapse.

Move animals showing symptoms to an oak-free pasture and put them on adequate feed and water, a supplemental feed containing 10 percent calcium hydroxide may help reduce losses.

However, prevention is a better cure for oak bud poisoning. Control oak in a pasture and save that pasture as a reserve for the oak bud season. Use moderate stocking and a deferred-rotation grazing program to improve range forage production.

Consult a veterinarian if you are unsure of the cause of livestock poisoning and losses.

Cotton Farmers Advised Not To Skimp On Fertilizer

Although cotton farmers are caught in a severe cost-price squeeze and are trying to cut production expenses wherever possible, one area not to cut back in is that of fertilization.

Farmers should continue to give a high priority to fertilization for optimum crop production. Fertilizer applications should be based on soil test information and realistic yield goals.

Lack of nutrients when cotton starts fruiting can reduce lint yields. On the other hand, too much fertilizer under cotton can be just as harmful as not enough.

Excess fertilizer, especially nitrogen, can delay maturity due to a shift to vegetative growth. Lush growth and large stalks also can contribute to higher insect control costs and lower lint quality due to immature bolls and poor harvest preparation associated with a delayed crop.

While cotton does not need a large amount of nutrients before fruiting, that need increases sharply once squaring begins and during the time bolls develop.

Therefore, farmers can still put down fertilizer anytime before squaring to boost production from this year's crop.

So, despite the increasing cost of fertilizer, it's still a good investment, without adequate fertilization, the potential for a good cotton crop will be severely limited.

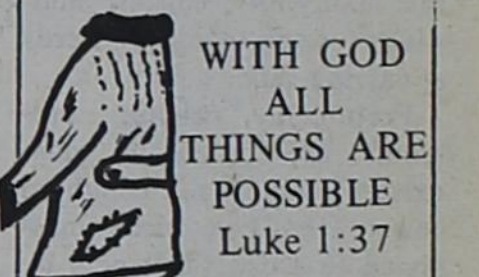

Goal of \$1 Million Set For Ronald McDonald House

A \$ million fund raising effort is planned to build the Ronald McDonald House in Amarillo. The House is to be a temporary home away from home, where families who travel to Amarillo bringing their critically ill children for hospitalization or outpatient treatment can stay.

"The committee personally, along with a taskforce they select, will contact over 500 companies and individuals in Amarillo and the surrounding area on behalf of the Ronald McDonald House," said Matthews. Members of the Financial Steering Committee are Mr. Lee T. Bivins, J. C. Brown, Ted Davis, James B. Franklin, Mrs. T. Boone Pickens, Jr., Richard Ware and James L. Whyte.

Area board members of the Children's Oncology Services of the Texas Panhandle, the not-for-profit organization who is directing the project, will help organize fund raising efforts outside of Amarillo. "The Ronald McDonald

House, even though it will be located in Amarillo, will benefit families who live outside of the city," said Matthews. "Amarillo is becoming a diversified center for medical treatment. Families from the Texas Panhandle, eastern New Mexico, western Oklahoma, southern Kansas and southern Colorado are coming to Amarillo on a regular basis for medical care. The Ronald McDonald House will give these families a place to stay when they bring their critically ill children to Amarillo for treatment."

Organizing area fund raising are Mrs. Paula Britt, Wheeler; David Fatheree, Pampa; Ray Koehler, Dalhart; Bob Knight, Borger; Tom Link, Canadian; Dr. Dan Lovin, Dumas; and Don Max Vars, Canyon.

After funds have been raised to build and open the House, a onetime endowment campaign will be organized for continuous operation of the House. The campaign will be sponsored by St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo, under the direction of Father Joseph Tash, a member of the Ronald McDonald House Board, and Director of Pastoral Care at St. Anthony's.

This situation calls for cows giving birth unassisted to calves that are vigorous and ready to get up and nurse. Ranchers can no longer afford the luxury of "cowboy midwives" for checking cow herds at calving time.

Fortunately, calving problems are practically non-existent with Texas Longhorn cows. They give birth unassisted to a calf that gets up quickly to nurse and is ready to travel. Furthermore, in recent years, many commercial cattlemen have taken advantage of the ease of calving introduced by the use of Texas Longhorn bulls. In so doing, they have discovered many other hidden dividends, such as a gene complex that will "pair off" well in crossbreeding to give a large measure of hybrid vigor.

Once a vigorous live calf is "safely on the ground," it must be safely reared to marketable age to really count. "down at the bank." Good "mothering instinct" is a decided asset, and this is another real long suit of the Longhorn cow. Occasionally, in some areas, predators cause losses during calving time, but can you imagine a coyote taking a calf away from a Longhorn mama? It is a real treat, too, when you first see a Longhorn cow "babysitting" several calves while the other mothers are out actively grazing into the brush or while they go for water.

Texas Longhorns are noted for their longer life span. Many cows live and produce regularly past twenty years of age with an occasional one past the thirty-year-old mark. This long-lived production means that the rancher can save fewer replacement heifers and still maintain his herd size. This, in turn, means that he will have more marketable calves each year.

5 Supernatural Signs That Should Follow Every Believer

Jesus had no such thought in mind. All through the Bible the term "serpent" or "serpents" are idioms (or symbolic expressions) used in reference to satanic power. Luke 10:19-20 is one example. Jesus said in these verses that He gave unto His followers power to tread on SERPENTS and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy without harm. The terms "serpents" and "scorpions" are used here in reference to the power of the enemy as He makes very clear when He adds "and over ALL the power of the enemy." Then in verse 20 He says, "Notwithstanding in this rejoice not, that the spirits are subject unto you. . . . Serpents are subject to you, but don't let this fact of the spirits being subject to you be the thing you rejoice over. Clearly, He is talking about satanic powers and influences, NOT PLAYING WITH LITERAL SNAKES. There are better things that I can do with my time and better ways that I can prove I have faith than taking a snake to church with me.

The term "take up" from the Greek means to remove or to take out of the way. So, we can see from this also, that Jesus wasn't referring to taking snakes unto you but to removing something. He is simply saying in Mark 16:18 that believers are able to remove or take out of the way the power of the devil when they come in contact with it without harm. Praise God, we believers do not ever have to be afraid of the devil or his power. It is subject to us and we can handle it if it gets in our way, and we can do so without harm. If the devil throws something at us, we can handle the situation in the name of Jesus and with the Word of God, and instead of being defeated by the devil's schemes we actually become stronger and more established in God than if the devil would have kept his nose out of our affairs. Praise God for the authority and ability to "TAKE UP SERPENTS".

Nuptial Vows are Exchanged at First United Methodist Church in Wheeler

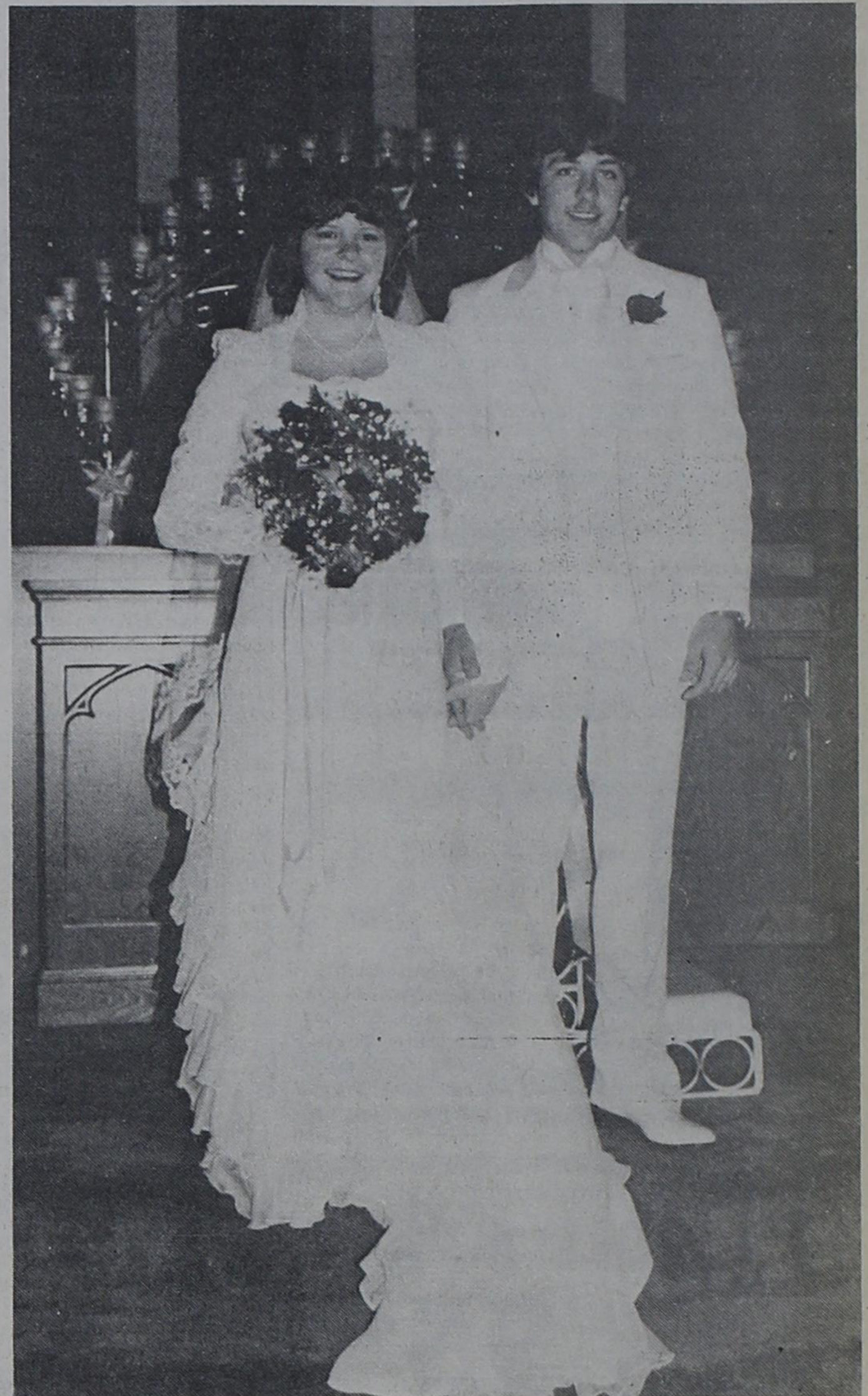

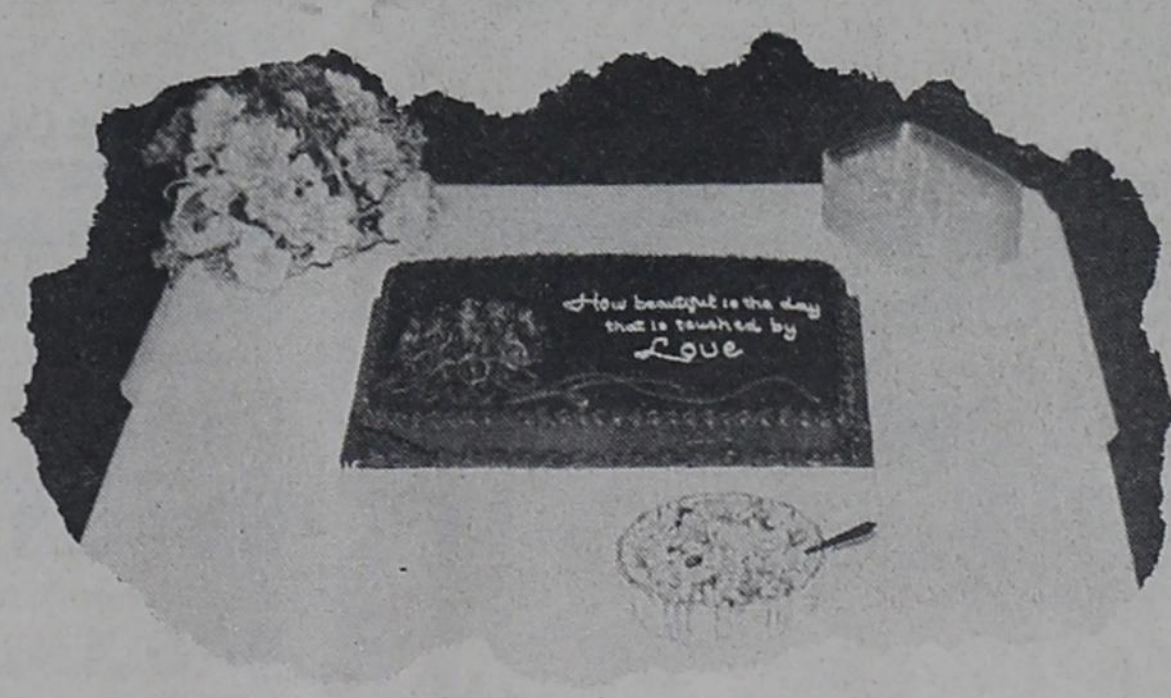
