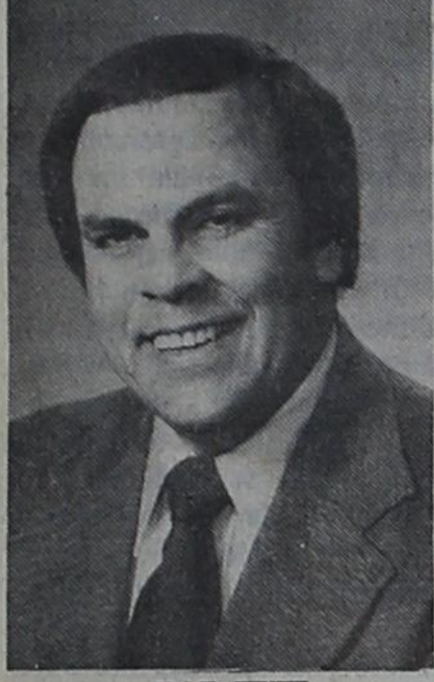

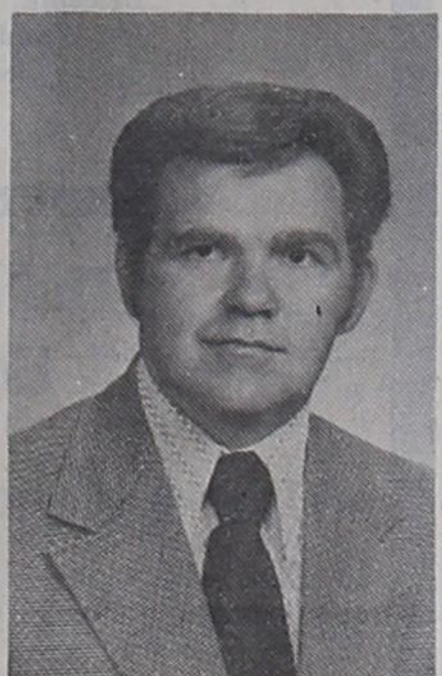
#### Services Held For Jim Clemens

#### CONTESTED RACES IN CITY & SCHOOL ELECTIONS

Wednesday, March 3, will be the deadline for filing for a place on the ballot in the Saturday, April 3, election in the City and School elections. Those seeking a place on the Board of Directors for Parkview Hospital will have until Tuesday, March 9, to toss their hat into the ring.

Five places are to be filled in the three elections at the High School Cafeteria. The Mayor and two councilmen are to be elected in the City election. The Wheeler Independent School has two places to be filled on the board of trustees. Representatives from Wheeler and Kelton are to be elected in the North Wheeler County Hospital District election.

#### CITY OF WHEELER

At press time Wednesday, four individuals had filed for the placing of their names on the ballot in the City election. Louis C. Stas is seeking election to the office of Mayor. David Cross is a candidate for re-election to Place 2 on the council. Joe Montgomery and Donald Rives are asking the opportunity to serve the community as aldermen, place 4.

#### Burton Not Candidate

Presently serving as Mayor is O.B. "Pete" Burton; an office he has held for 11 years. Prior to serving as mayor, Burton spent 5 years on the Council, serving under three mayors, Thomas Daughtry, the late Archie Hibler and Don Earnley. Mayor Burton announced to the "Times" his intention not to seek office on Monday, February 15. Burton recently purchased the Ford, Lincoln and Mercury dealership; this and other interests require his absence from Wheeler on many occasions. The announcement was made prior to the February meeting of the Council to be delivered to the council.

Louis C. Stas is presently serving as Mayor Pro-tem and

holds Place 4 on the council. Berniece Hall, Jimmy Hill and Kirven Roper were elected to the council last year.

Any individual who is a qualified voter and a resident of the City of Wheeler is eligible to place their name on the ballot for any one of the aforementioned positions. Members of the council serve a two-year term and see to the management of city affairs. Those interested in serving on the council may file at the city office for their name to be placed on the ballot.

#### SCHOOL TRUSTEE

Three candidates have filed for the two positions in the Wheeler Independent School District Board of Trustees. Bobbie C. Hill and Richard Wallace have filed for position #4. Incumbent Larry Jennings has filed for position #5.

Deadline for filing for these two positions is March 3, 1982. An application may be obtained from Mrs. Vida Brown, Secretary of the Board of Trustees, until March 3, 1982, and from the Wheeler School Business Office until February 26, 1982. The election will be in the Wheeler School Cafeteria on April 3, 1982.

Everyone who applies will need a Social Security number for one member of the family. A family will automatically qualify if they qualify under any of the following programs: Aid for Dependent Children (AFDC), Food Stamps, Free School Lunch Program, Age 60 and above and in financial need, Medicaid, Rental Subsidy, Social Security as only income, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), unemployed or collecting Worker's Compensation.

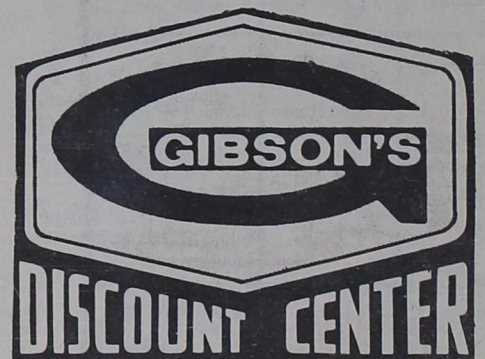

## CONCERNING DEATH

(Part 6)

In today's article I want to speak concerning the old idea that some people come out with at the death of a loved one or friend—"Well, it was just their time to go." Some folks believe that each person has a set time of death predetermined by God and that when that time arrives you will die. They think that when that time arrives that you will go whether you are driving or sleeping or working, etc. Sometimes it has been said, "Whenever your number's up, you'll go."

There are two things I want to say about this philosophy. First, the Bible does not say there is appointed to each person a certain time to die. It does say that it is appointed unto men (NOT EACH MAN) once (NOT A CERTAIN TIME) to die. In other words, it was appointed by god that men would die. Once it was appointed. God told Adam that if he ate of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil he would die. So, it was once appointed by God that because of sin, men would die. Nothing at all is said about a certain, particular time preset for each individual when his number would be up. The scripture in discussion here (Hebrews 9:27) is really referring to spiritual death anyway, not physical death specifically.

The second thing I would like to say about the idea that "it was just their time to go" is that this is just another attempt to politely blame God for death. Repeatedly I have said, DEATH IS NOT OF GOD. Death happens because Adam sinned (see Romans 5:12). God's Word gives instructions for proper living that will increase the length of life. It also talks about the days of the wicked being cut short. (Reference include Eph. 6:3, Prov. 3:1-2, 16, Psalm 91:16).

PROPER STUDY

Give diligence (study-KJV) to present thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, handling aright (rightly dividing-KJV) the word of truth. (2 Timothy 2:15)

admonition of the Lord. But, as we noticed last week, the ultimate responsibility for coming to a knowledge of God's will rests with each individual. Paul gives this notice in his exhortation to the young evangelist, Timothy. Timothy had been the recipient of the excellent teaching of both his mother and grandmother (2 Tim. 1:5; 3:14-15) and then by the apostle himself. But, in 2 Tim. 2:15, Paul placed the final responsibility squarely upon Timothy. He urged him to "give diligence" or "study" that he might present himself to God as one who did not need to be ashamed, but one who handled the word of God properly. If Timothy is urged to work hard to handle God's word properly, it must follow that it is altogether too possible to mishandle it; as Peter says, to our own destruction (2 Peter 3:15-16)

Last week we talked of the need according to the Bible for us to know the will of God, if we hope to live pleasingly in his sight. Now, let's talk about how the scriptures tell us to go about obtaining that knowledge. As we saw last week, under the old covenant the priests were charged with a large part of the responsibility of keeping the people informed concerning the law. But they weren't the sole source of such knowledge. In Deut. 6:6-9, we find that parents (specifically fathers) were charged with the responsibility of teaching their children to know and respect the law. We find that responsibility repeated under Christ. In Eph. 6:4, we find these words:

And ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath; but nurture them in the chastening and

WHEELER ISD ATTENDANCE ACCOUNTABILITY POLICY

This policy is the responsibility of the Elementary and Secondary Principal's and the attendance clerks or Principals secretary's.

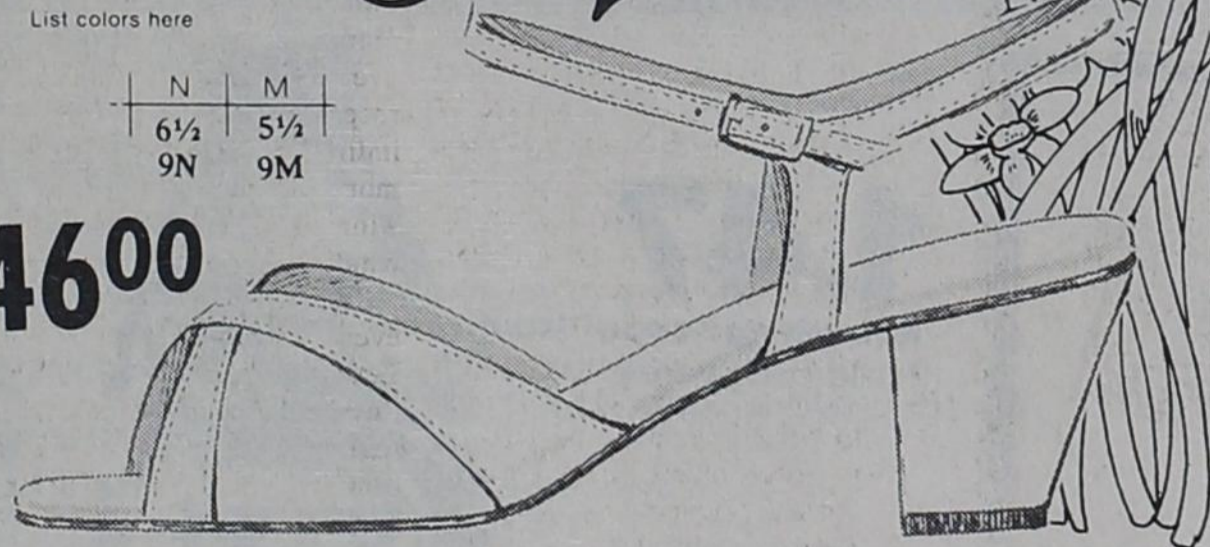

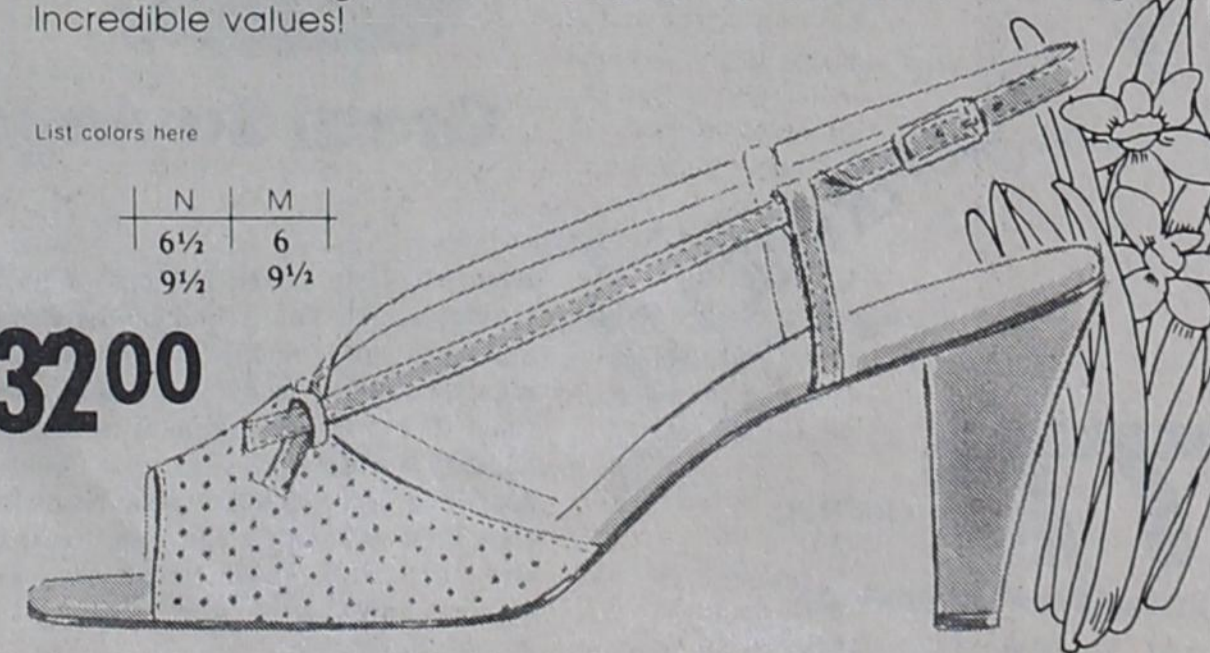
