GWYN EDWARDS CLAIMS \$100 IN SCRIPT

MARK GILL IS NAMED BANK VICE PRESIDENT SECOND DRIVE-UP WINDOW TO BE ADDED AT FIRST NAT'L.

Charles R. Brown, president of the First National Bank in Wheeler announces the employment of Mark Alan Gill. Mr. Gill will hold the position of Vice President and Loan Officer and will begin his duties at the bank on Monday, January 4, 1982. The Board of Directors for the bank voted to hire Mark at the December meeting.

Mark Gill, a native of Miami, holds a Master of Agriculture — Agricultural Finance degree from Texas A&M University, received in December, 1977; he received a Bachelor of Science—Agricultural Economics from A&M in May, 1976. Prior to taking the position at the Wheeler bank, Gill was employed with the Texas Banking Department; he was commissioned as a state bank examiner in June of 1980 and worked in the Odessa region. Mark is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Gill of Miami

and a graduate of Miami High School.

Mark and his wife Karren will make their home at 904 South Mobeetie Street in Wheeler. The couple has an 11-month-old son, named Alan.

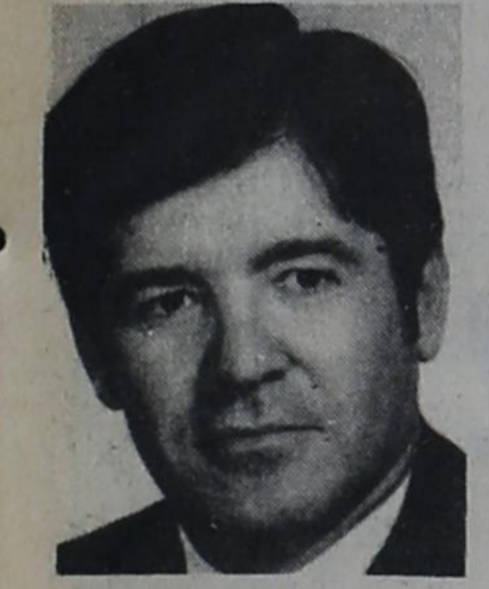

CRUDE OIL SALES BOOST WHEELER CO. ECONOMY

The Sale of crude oil and natural gas from Wheeler County wells in 1980 boosted the county economy and accounted for \$174.4 million of the \$31.2 billion value placed on Texas production last year.

In a report on the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in the top producing counties of Texas, Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent

Oil and Gas Association said the county ranked 46th among Texas' 254 counties on the basis of the value of its marketed petroleum production. This includes condensate and casinghead gas.

The county's wells produced 1.3 million barrels of crude oil, valued at 28.4 million, and 98.2 million Mcfs of natural gas, valued at 146 million.

Owners of royalty in the county received \$21.8 million as their share of the output, the Association said.

"Although crude oil and natural gas production in Texas declined slightly last year from 1979 levels, we in the industry are encouraged by the fact that drilling starts in 1980 were up 16-percent over the previous year," said the Association's chairman, Avery Rush, Jr., of Amarillo. "Since petroleum remains the cornerstone of our state's economy and its tax base, Texas must continue to encourage the development of its energy resources," Rush added.

In addition to paying local, county, and state property taxes, producers in the county also supported state government through production tax payments estimated at \$12.3 million, according to the Association. Crude oil taxes amounted to \$1.3 million while natural gas levies totalled \$11 million.

Based on Texas Employment Commission figures, some 336 oil and gas industry employees in the county received wages of about \$6.3 million in 1980.

In the search for new petroleum reserves in the county, oil and gas operators spent a reported \$41 million in the drilling of 74 wells, including 12 wildcat, or exploratory, wells. This effort resulted in the completion of 13 oil wells and 39 gas wells, although some \$9.8 million was lost in the drilling of 22 dry holes. As of March 1, 1981, there were 1,213 producing wells in the county; 611 oil and 602 gas.

Petroleum processing also contributed to the county economy, with two natural gasoline plants, having a total daily capacity of 12.3 million cubic feet of natural gas and one carbon black plant in operation.

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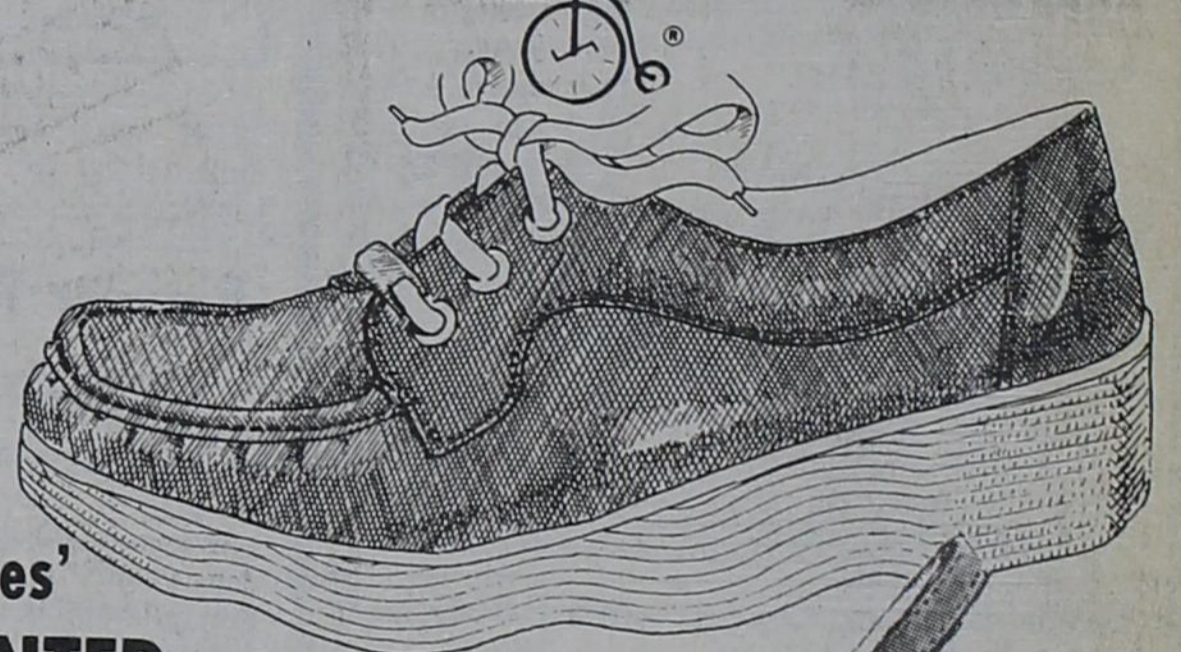

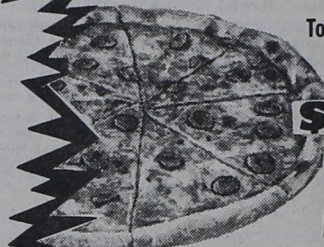

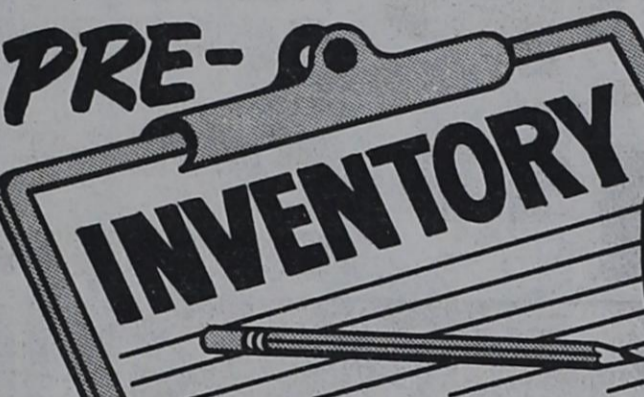
