### Use Correct Return Address

The Postmaster is reminding customers that for the best service this Christmas season they should use ZIP Codes, place their correct return address in the upper left-hand corner of the envelope, and use proper postage. "By following these suggestions," the postmaster says, "customers will be assured good mail service this holiday season, as well as all year round."

It is important, the postmaster says, that families "double check" envelopes and cards to be certain that proper postage is affixed. Envelopes without postage will be returned to senders, if possible, or delayed by postage-due procedures. When the return address is placed on envelopes bearing holiday greetings, it also helps remind friends of one's current address.

And, if the family to whom a holiday message is sent moved more than a year ago, it cannot be forwarded. With a return address, such letters are returned to the sender with a notation that the forwarding "order" has expired.

### WHEELER SCHOOL DISMISSED

### Tax Statements

The four stages in the property tax process are development of tax values; meeting the Board of Review; adopting a tax rate; and tax collecting.

The first stage begins on January 1 of each year. The development of tax values by the assessor usually will continue through July. The rendition period is the time during which taxpayers must assert their claims for tax relief. Your applications have to be filed with the Appraisal District. The rendition period is between January 1 and May 1 of each year.

Several forms of tax relief are available to Texas taxpayers. Among these are Homestead Exemptions, Disabled Veterans or Survivors, Productivity Values. The Homestead Exemption and Productivity Values must be signed for 1982, but subsequent years it is not necessary to sign unless the qualifications change. Disabled Veterans Exemption must be signed annually.

These tax relief measures will be described in detail in the coming weeks.

### NOTICE TAXPAYERS

Wheeler County Appraisal District have the following exemption applications and rendition forms available: Residential Homestead Exemptions; Disabled Veterans Exemptions; Farming and Ranching Implements Exemption; Agricultural Use and Open Space Land Exemption; Business Personal Property Renditions; and General Real Estate Renditions.

You may sign up at the District's office located on the Courthouse Square, Wheeler; or call 826-5900 and we will mail you the forms.

## Write Clearly Postmaster Says

One of the biggest problems postal employees face is illegible handwriting. "At Christmas time, when mail volumes skyrocket, this can become a major problem," the Postmaster said today.

"The use of ZIP Codes by mailers does help speed up the process because often if the city and state are unreadable, the ZIP Code will direct the mail to the post office from which it will be delivered. Clerks in that post office, being more familiar with local residents, may be able to figure out the person to whom the mail should be delivered."

Another significant problem is the number of parcels delayed or actually undelivered because of poor wrapping or packing. The Postmaster urged that special care be taken to see that each package is tightly stuffed and that nothing rattles around inside.

Parcels are generally shipped in bags, and often heavier items rest on top of smaller, lighter packages. The Postmaster encouraged mailers to be a bit cautious and insure all packages.

All parcels should be addressed on only one side, and should have the address written somewhere on the inside of the package in case the exterior wrapping should come off. It is a good idea to also enclose a list of the contents.

Poor packaging and illegible or incorrect addressing account for about half a million undelivered parcels each year.

## Use Zip Codes

The Postmaster reminded customers that for the best service this Christmas season they should use ZIP Codes, place their return address in the upper left corner of the envelope and use proper postage.

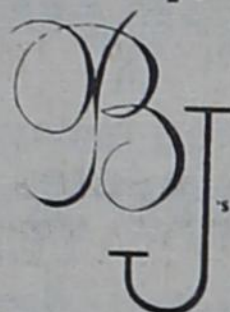

## ANOTHER SPIRIT

Two weeks ago in my article, I asked if we had a different gospel than what Jesus and Paul preached. What they preached was confirmed by God with signs and wonders, miracles and gifts of the Holy Spirit. If what we preach today has nothing supernatural in it, if we don't believe in miracles for today, in healings, in tongues and casting out devils, then we are preaching another gospel.

Last week in my article, I asked if we had a different Jesus than the man the Bible talks about. The one the Bible talks about heals the sick, releases the captive, restores sight to the blind, cures the cripple, looses the oppressed, and performs miracles. Many Christians don't believe He does these things today. They believe He used to. They believe it is going to be wonderful when we get to Heaven, but He doesn't do much today except save people so they can go to Heaven when they die (and even with that miracle, most people believe that He can't change the old sinful nature—just fix up the old lousy sinner so He will go to Heaven in the end). However, the Word of God says that Jesus is the same today as He was yesterday. What He did before He was crucified, He will still do today for people who believe it.

Now, I want to ask you--Do we have a different Spirit than what Jesus and Paul had? In the beginning days of the church, He performed miracles through the followers of Jesus (NOT just the apostles, by the way; consider Stephen in Acts 6 and 7 and Philip in Acts 8, neither of which was an apostle). He gave people supernatural utterance in other tongues, interpretations of tongues and prophetic utterances. Gifts of healings and miracles were performed when people used the name of Jesus (see Acts 3 and Acts 16 for examples). Since the very same Holy Spirit is still here, and since He has not lost His power or desire to help people, and since we can still speak in the name of Jesus who has all authority in Heaven and earth, it is still the same today as in the Bible when believers believe it and yield to Him. **Paid adv. by Ricky Pfel**

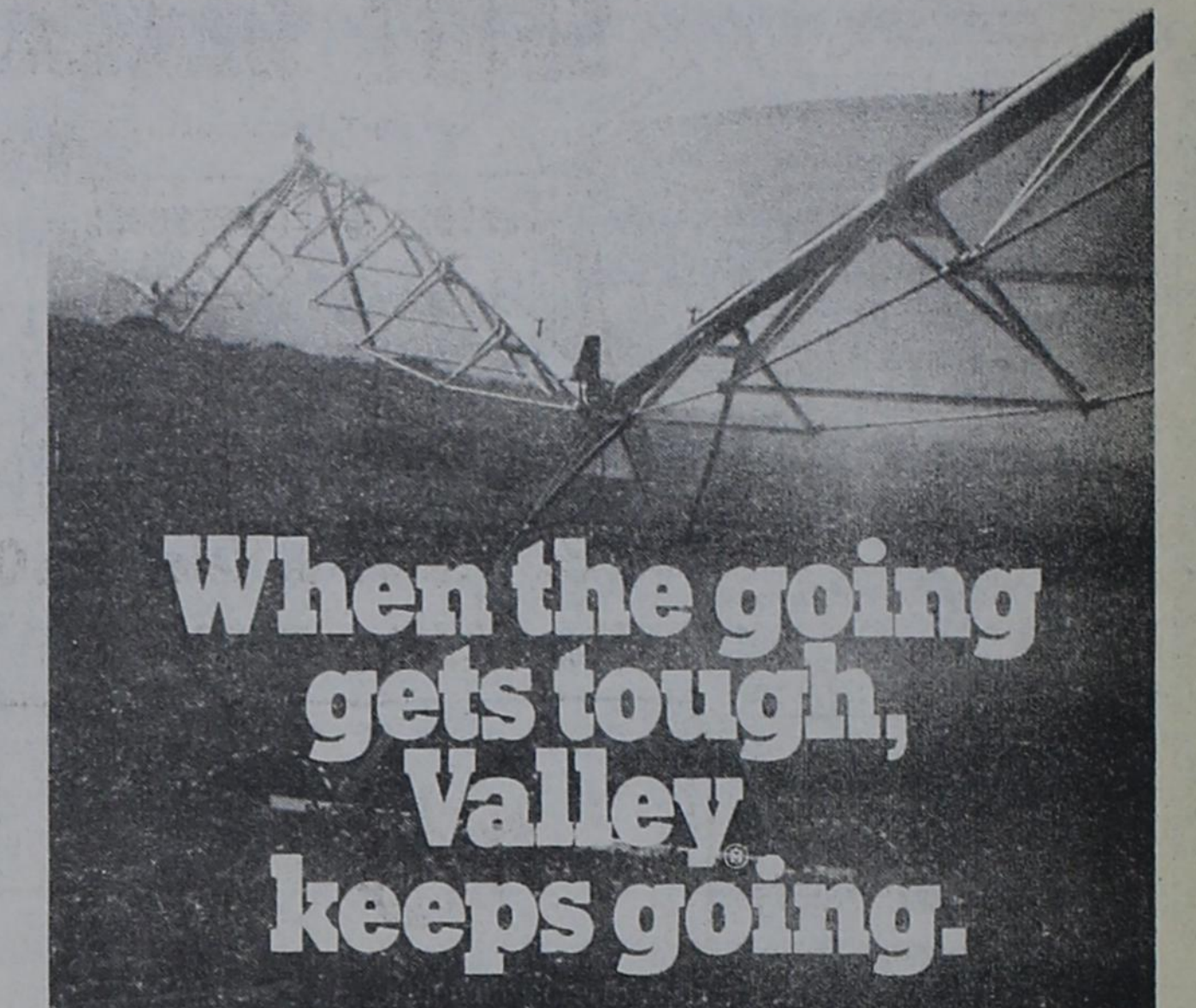
