## LOCAL BOOK-A-THON PROJECT A SUCCESS

The First National Bank in Wheeler will close at noon on Thursday, December 24, for the Christmas holidays. The announcement was made this week by Charles R. Brown, president of the bank.

The third of the \$300 drawings will be held Saturday, December 19, 1981. A total of \$1300 will be divided into 65 who shopped in Wheeler with Wednesday, December 24.

Sixteen people will be handed script Saturday. The \$300 will be divided into 2-\$50; 4-\$25 and 10-\$10.

The script given each week can be spent just like money with any of the businesses sponsoring the drawings. The list of businesses where the "money" can be spent is listed on the back of each of the \$5 bills.

Some lucky person will receive \$100 in script December Here And There 24 just in time for Christmas. The \$100 will be added to \$300 which will again be divided into \$10s, \$25s, and \$50s.

Wheeler Merchants and businessmen donated the \$1300 to show their appreciation to their customers.

Tickets will be available at all stores sponsoring the drawings. The businesses began giving the tickets Friday, November 27.

The first drawing was December 5 at 2:00 p.m.

The Christmas Season is upon us and it is time to start thinking about getting out the decorations. The street decorations are put into position and the Chamber of Commerce will again sponsor a Christmas Decoration Contest.

Each resident owner is asked to decorate their home by December 18th and our secret judges will begin judging the decorations on that date. The first place home decoration contest winner will receive \$25.00 from the Chamber of Commerce and the second place winner will receive \$15.00 The first and second place prize winners will have their pictures and a picture of their home in the Wheeler Times and be honored at the Chamber of Commerce ban-

Wheeler businesses are also asked to decorate their windows and inside their store to be judged beginning Decem-

The business that wins first will receive a large plaque to be displayed in their store for

one year. The second place business winner will receive a plaque to be displayed in their store. They will be honored at the Chamber banquet.

To make this project a great success the citizens of Wheeler must all put forth an effort to help make Wheeler the most beautifully decorated city in the Panhandle.

For those living in the immediate Wheeler area, the Chamber has placed a two mile limit on the contest. Persons living within two miles of the city limits are eligible to enter the contest.

#### lax Statements

The four stages in the property tax process are development of tax values; meeting the Board of Review;

The first stage begins on January 1 of each year. The development of tax values by the assessor usually will continue through July. The rendition period is the time during which taxpayers must assert their claims for tax relief. Your applications have to be filed with the Appraisal District. The rendition period is between January 1 and May 1 of each year.

are available to Texas taxpayers. Among these are Homestead Exemptions, Disabled Veterans or Survivors, Productivity Values. The Homestead Exemption and Productivity Values must be signed for 1982, but subsequent years it is not necessary to sign unless the qualifications change. Disabled Veterans Exemption must be signed annually.

These tax relief measures will be described in detail in the coming weeks.

## Write Clearly **Postmaster Says**

One of the biggest problems postal employees face is illegible handwriting. "At Christmas time, when mail volumes skyrocket, this can become a major problem," the Postmaster said today.

"The use of ZIP Codes by mailers does help speed up the process because often if the city and state are unreadable, the ZIP Code will direct the mail to the post office from which it will be delivered. Clerks in that post office, being more familiar with local residents, may be able to figure out the person to whom the mail should be delivered."

Another significant problem is the number of parcels delayed or actually undelivered because or poor wrapping or packing. The Postmaster urged that special care be taken to see that each package is tightly stuffed and that nothing rattles around inside.

Parcels are generally shipped in bags, and often heavier items rest on top of smaller, lighter packages. The Postmaster encouraged mailers to be a bit cautious and insure all packages.

All parcels should be addressed on only one side, and should have the address written somewhere on the inside of the package in case the exterior wrapping should come off. It is a good idea to also enclose

a list of the contents. Poor packaging and illegible or incorrect addressing account for about half a million undelivered parcels each year.



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



Two weeks ago in my article, I asked if we had a different gospel than what Jesus and Paul preached. What they preached was confirmed by God with signs and wonders, miracles and gifts of the Holy Spirit. If what we preach today has nothing supernatural in it, if we don't believe in miracles for today, in healings, in tongues and casting out devils, then we are preaching another gospel.

Last week in my article, I asked if we had a different Jesus than the man the Bible talks about. The one the Bible talks about heals the sick, releases the captive, restores sight to the blind, cures the cripple, looses the oppressed, and performs miracles. Many Christians don't believe He does these things today. They believe He used to. They believe it is going to be wonderful when we get to Heaven, but He doesn't do much today except save people so they can go to Heaven when they die (and even with that miracle, most people believe that He can't change the old sinful nature--just fix up the old lousy sinner so He will go to Heaven in the end). However, the Word of God says that Jesus is the same today as He was yesterday. What He did before He was crucified, He will still do today for people who believe it.

Now, I want to ask you--Do we have a different Spirit than what Jesus and Paul had? In the beginning days of the church, He performed miracles through the followers of Jesus (NOT just the apostles, by the way; consider Stephen in Acts 6 and 7 and Philip in Acts 8, neither of which was an apostle). He gave people supernatural utterance in other tongues, interpretations of tongues and prophetic utterances. Gifts of healings and miracles were performed when people used the name of Jesus (see Acts 3 and Acts 16 for examples). Since the very same Holy Spirit is still here, and since He has not lost His power or desire to help people, and since we can still speak in the name of Jesus who has all authority in Heaven and earth, it is still the same today as in the Bible when believers believe it and vield to Him. 
