

Each EMT spends 120 hours in training and each Paramedic spends 750 hours. Our county should be extremely proud of these people as we have 5 Paramedics in our County. We have 1 paramedic per every 1200 people and 1 EMT per every 500 people.

Two or three firemen at a time from the department, go to A&M for one week every year for training. They try to spend one night a year in Canyon training. They spend innumerable hours in on-thejob training.

mail by December 18th. The postmaster also emphasized the importance of using ZIP Codes and adding a return address to all Christmas mail. It takes only a couple of extra seconds, but pays big dividends.

ZIP Codes enable postal employees to sort and handle the mail faster. A return address insures that mail that can't be delivered because of illegible or incomplete address will be returned to the sender.

"A return address might not seem very important," the postmaster noted, "but last year over 32 million pieces of mail went to postal dead letter branches because the mailing address couldn't be read and there was no return address on the envelope. If you estimate the worth of each of these pieces at 25c, including postage, postal customers lost over \$8 million last year to dead letter offices. None of this would have happened if the envelopes had contained a return address."

A common abbreviation used in prescription writing is PRN. These three letters are from the Latin words pro re nata which are loosely translated "as needed", "if needed", or "when needed". The directions on a medication may read "take two tablets every four hours PRN pain." PRN directions give the user some discretion in determining whether or not medicine is taken.

Why would a prescriber direct the patient to take medicine in this manner? There could be several reasons . . . the most common being that the symptom or problem is expected to disappear with time or from time to time. Examples of such problems include itching, pain, sleeplessness, constipation, diarrhea, fever, and nausia.

For many health problems, medicines must be taken on a routine basis . . . day after day, month after month. Chronic diseases such as high blood pressure, for example, are not well controlled with PRN use of high blood pressure medicines. It is important that the patient understand whether medicine is to be taken on a routine basis or prn basis. When a medicine calls for "as needed" use, there is a responsibility to take that medicine only when needed. For most chronic diseases, however, medicines are taken day in and day out.






