TIMESAIVING SEWING FOR BUSY LIFESTYLES

Timesaving sewing techniques head the "wish list" of homesewers who create wearables amidst today's busy lifestyles.

They want quick techniques that result in a professional, quality look, most say.

Such techniques start with planning, and they involve pattern choice, fabric selection and actual sewing "step savers."

START WITH PLAN
Start with a plan, although it takes time. It will save even more time in the long run.

Be organized with sewing, and you'll be more efficient. Begin with your sewing area -- know what supplies you have and where they are.

Organize storage areas with an index of fabric yardage on hand, the colors, types, amount of interfacing and other similar information.

This will give quick access to needed materials at sewing time.

CHOOSE EFFICIENT PATTERNS
Choosing efficient patterns also will save time. Some are designed for quick-and-easy sewing.

Of course, making any pattern repeatedly is another way to save time. Many patterns are readily adaptable, so even when you use the same one several times, you'll have as many different-looking garments simply by changing fabric, trim or other details,

such as pockets or sleeves. Before buying a pattern, you can ask to see it first. Scanning

the pattern guide may help you decide whether it will be a good choice.

Before using any pattern for the first time, read the guide from beginning to end to avoid unnecessary backtracking of steps or any time-consuming "surprises".

SELECT NO-HASSLE FABRICS

To save even more time, select "no-hassle" fabrics. Remember, fabrics that ravel, require matching, lining or special seaming techniques will take more time.

SEWING STEP SAVERS

Sewing step savers start with a "sew-as-much-as-you-can" before pressing idea. Then press as much as you can at one time.

Do test seams on a fashion fabric and inner fabric before stitching -- to set up any machine adjustments needed and to make the best thread and stitch selection.

Also experiment with top-stitching or machine blind-stitching of hems to avoid time-costly mistakes.

Do as much machine work as possible -- sewing on buttons, putting in hems and tacking down facings -- to avoid time-consuming hand-work.

Finally, remember that fusibles save time -- fusible interfacing and fusing layers of a garment together, such as hems.

Before fusing, always pre-test -- some fabrics are more sensitive to heat and steam than others, and a few will not fuse satisfactorily.

To eliminate basting, consider using adhesive or glue designed to hold layers together to hold layers together for this step.

UPDATE IDEAS, SKILLS

Stay in touch with new ideas and techniques for the "last word" on saving time. Study ready-to-wear garments similar to items you plan to make so you'll create the look you want with the "first try".

Also, take note of homesewing and women's magazines that feature timesaving techniques and tips.

FABRIC QUALITY -- HOW TO KNOW

In choosing a fabric, quality need not mean expense. Consumers may check a fabric this way:

--Rub the fabric against itself several times. Watch for flaking, which means the fabric is heavily sized and may lose body after laundering.

--Stretch the fabric--then release it. It should spring back. If not, areas of strain will bag later.

--Wad a corner to check for wrinkling, but remember that some crinkle cloth and puckered fabrics are supposed to wrinkle.

--Check for vivid, clear colors. Dull colors signal dyes that may not wash well.

--Make sure fabric designs are printed on the "straight" of the grain. Noticeably off-grain designs are difficult to match in sewing.

--Rub the fabric against another fabric to detect crocking.

Crocking means the color rubs off. When a brightly colored fabric crocks, it is almost impossible to set the dyes at home.

Look for the term colorfast on bolt ends or hang tags to insure that the fabric will not fade.

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SPS Sells Revenue Bonds

Southwestern Public Service Company today announced the sale of \$45 million of Red River Authority Collateralized Pollution Control Revenue Bonds, 1981 series (Southwestern Public Service Company Project) to finance environmental control facilities at the Company's power generating stations.

The bonds are being sold by the Red River Authority of Texas and will be collateralized with First Mortgage Bonds of the Company.

The \$45 million principal amount of the bonds is divided into two series having different maturity dates. The first series, aggregating \$25 million principal amount, will bear interest at 13.5% and will mature in the year 2001. The second series, aggregating \$20 million, will bear interest at 14% and will mature in 2011.

Dillon, Read and Co. Inc. is underwriter of the offering.

Southwestern Public Service Company, based in Amarillo, Texas, provides electric service for the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

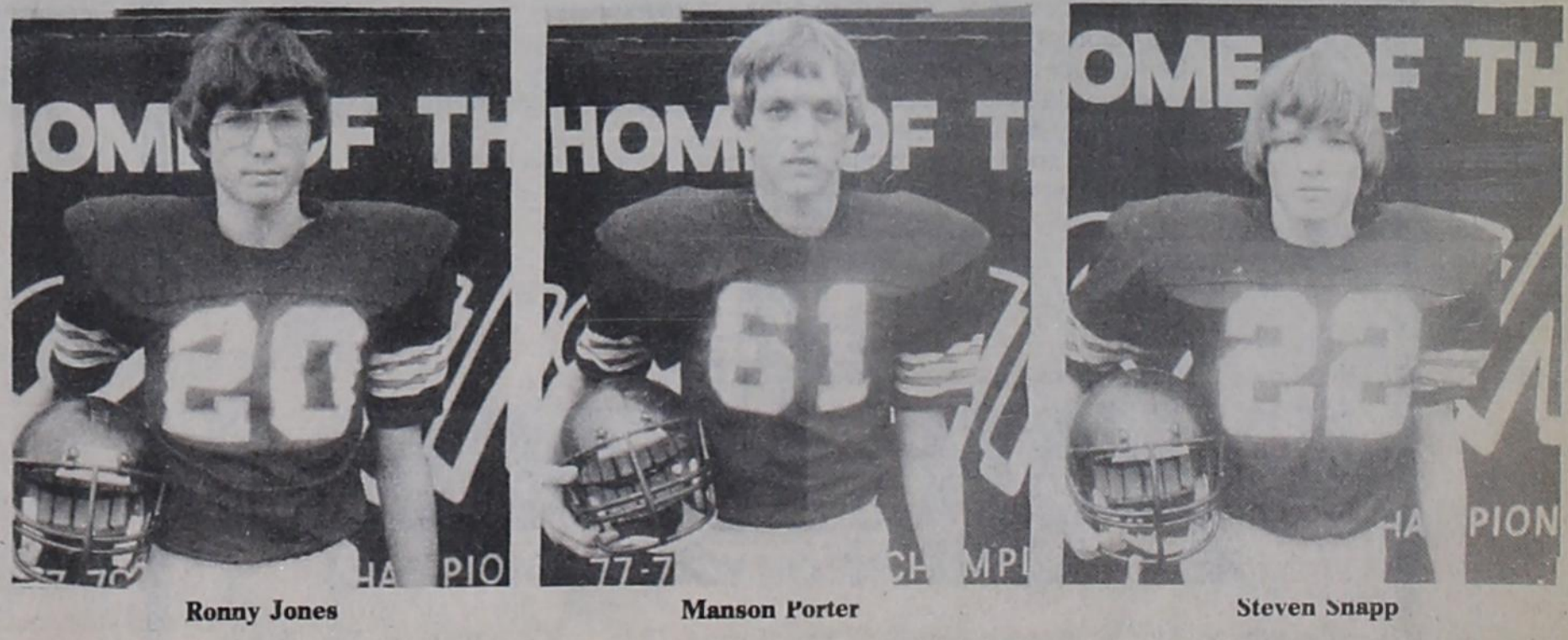
Students To Take PSAT Test

Intense itching may be due to infestation by lice or mites. These tiny creatures rely on the bodies of animals . . . including those of humans . . . for their survival. Lice infestations are termed pediculosis; mite infestations are termed scabies.

Lice and mites move from one person to the next with relative ease. Intense itching is produced when females burrow beneath the skin to lay eggs. Scratching may temporarily relieve itching but may lead to secondary skin infections caused by bacteria.

Pubic lice affect the groin area and represent the most common form of infestation in the United States. Head lice infestations are common in school children who may bring the "critters" home to mom and dad. Body lice infestations occur less frequently. Mite infestations are typically seen on the hands and in the pubic area. They produce characteristic sores . . . small and red.

Prescription and nonprescription medicines are available for pediculosis; a prescription medicine is available for scabies. It is important that all infected family members be treated adequately and that all clothing, bed linen, and infected furniture be disinfected, washed, dry cleaned, or otherwise rid of lice or mites.

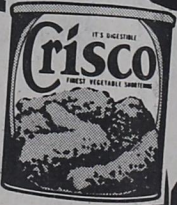

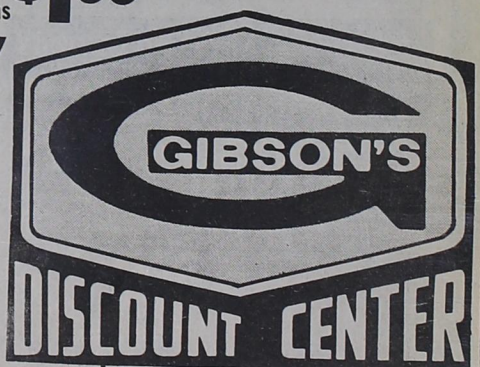
