Threatening skies greeted the fans at Nicholson Field as the Mustangs met the Stinnett Rattlers for the season opener Friday night. Winds from the south brought rain and victory as the Mustangs prevailed 7-0.

Wheeler won the toss and elected to receive and Stinnett inexplicably chose to defend the north goal with the wind in their face. Wade Moore returned the opening kickoff to the Mustang 27. From there, Bond and Bentley ground out consistent yardage and Wright gained 7 to move the ball across midfield into Rattler territory. The drive stalled and Wills punted out of bounds at the Stinnett 15.

Stinnett used counteraction plays and sweeps to advance the ball into Wheeler territory. Zepeda made a strong tackle for a loss of 5 at the Mustang 42 which stopped their drive and Sinnett punted with Wheeler taking possession at their own 22.

Wheeler ground out a first down and began a drive but was flagged for holding at the 36. Unable to overcome the penalty, the Mustangs were forced to punt and Wills booted the ball to the Rattler 18. The Rattlers ran three plays and had to kick as the first quarter ended with neither team on the scoreboard.

Drugs Is Subject Of Area Meet

Panhandle area citizens will have an opportunity to comment on the appropriateness of regional drug abuse and treatment programs during a public session scheduled for Thursday, Sept. 17.

The hearing is being sponsored by the Panhandle Health Systems Agency. It will be held in the Amarillo Hospital District Psychiatric Pavilion Main Auditorium beginning at 7:00 p.m. on the 17th. The pavilion is located at 7201 Evans in the Medical Center complex.

The hearing will be conducted by a group of citizens volunteers who serve on the Appropriateness Review Task Force. All comments made during the meeting will become part of the permanent record of the committee and will be used to arrive at findings about drug abuse and treatment programs.

This is one of three tasks forces organized by the Panhandle Health Systems Agency (HSA) to look into various facets of the health industry in the 25 counties of the Panhandle. The other group will be looking into the status of psychiatric care and alcoholism during this month. All three reviews must be completed by Sept. 29.

The findings will be reviewed by the HSA's governing body and then be transferred to the Texas Health Facilities Commission where they will be used for statewide health planning.

The reviews being conducted during this month are a continuation of appropriateness investigations that go on year round. During the past 12 months, the agency has sponsored reviews of radiation therapy, cardiac catheterization, open heart surgery, emergency medical services, and end-stage renal disease.

The task forces are chaired by Amarillo attorney Pamela House, Dallam County Judge Rebecca King and Dr. Ralph LaVarta, an Amarillo chiropractor.

Stinnett tried to run a draw but lost 4 as the half ended in a scoreless tie.

The second half showed the Mustangs playing with more enthusiasm on offense and defense, much to the dismay of the Rattlers. After kicking off to Stinnett to open the second half, the Mustang defense rose to the occasion and Bond forced a fumble on the second snap of the ball with Bentley recovering.

The Mustangs began a drive from the Stinnett 39. Two carries by Bentley and one by Bond netted a first down at the 27. Three carries by Bentley netted nine yards. On fourth and one Bond wouldn't be denied at left guard gaining 4, which gave Wheeler a first down at the 14. On first down Bond blasted through a big hole opened by the Mustang line to the 3. flagged for holding on first and goal from the 12, the Mustangs fumbled away a great opportunity and the Rattlers recovered at the 15.

The Mustang defense was aroused and allowed Stinnett only eight yards in three plays, forcing the Rattlers to punt. A short punt of 18 yards gave the Mustangs the ball on the Rattler 43.

Information On Bike-A-Thon

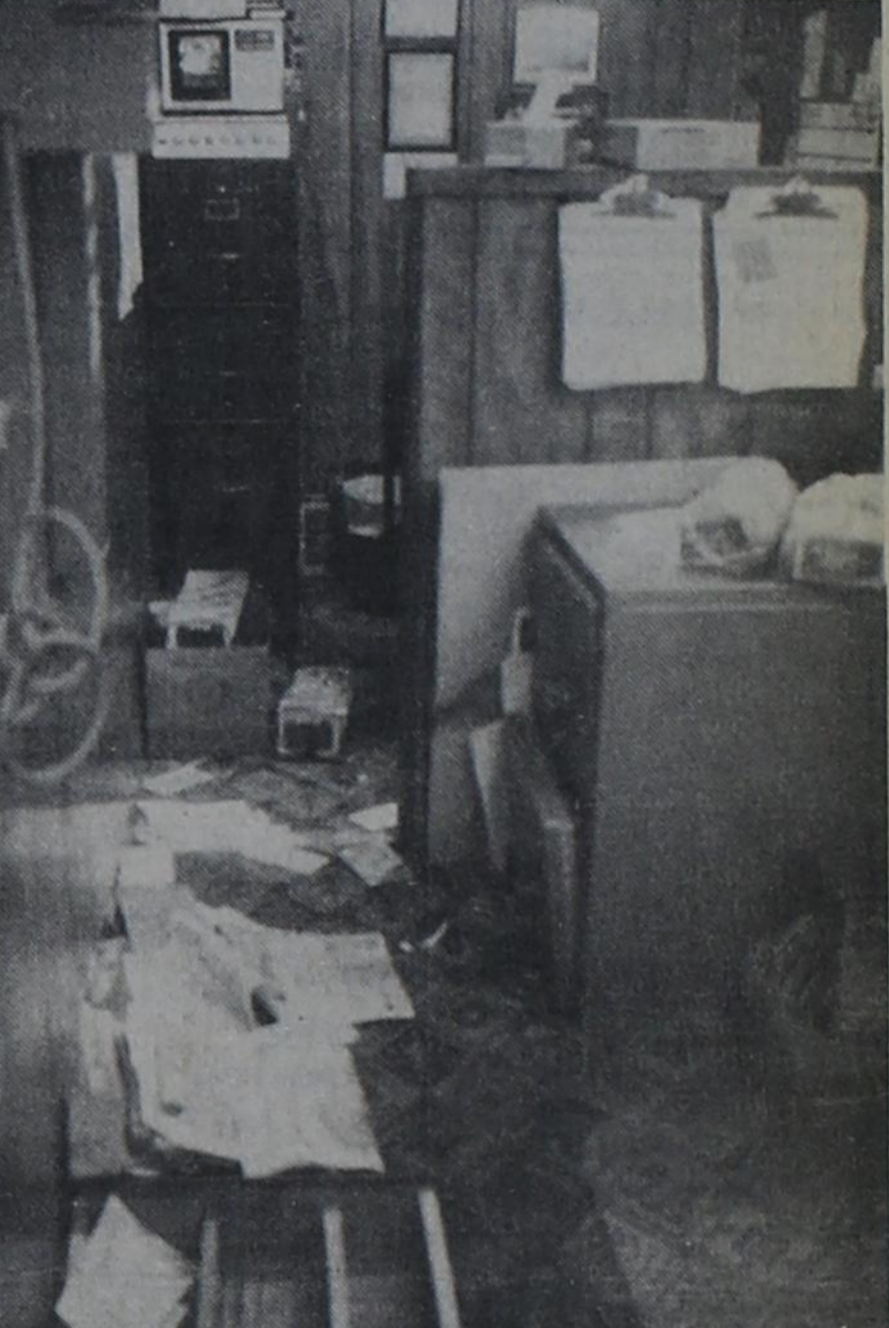

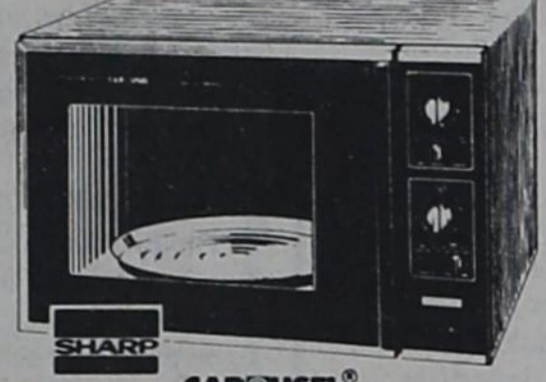

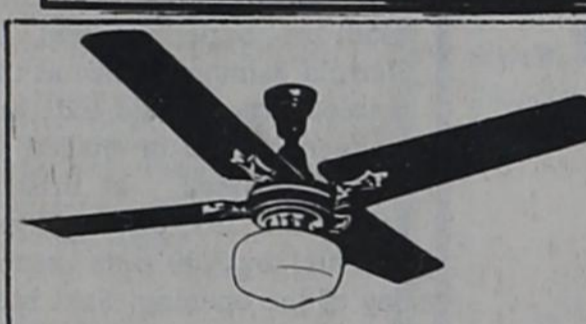

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt from taxation a portion of the market value of a residence homestead. The portion exempted may be as much as 40% for 1982-1984; 30% for 1985-1987; and 20% for 1988 and after. The amount of an exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislature by general law prescribes other monetary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other applicable exemptions provided by law. An exception is made where ad valorem tax has previously been pledged for the payment of debt.

The amendment further directs the legislature to require that notice be given to property owners of a reasonable estimate of tax on their property in certain situations.

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; authorizing the use of the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guarantee the bonds of cities, counties, towns, and other units of local government in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on previously approved, but unissued, state bonds; and authorizing a program to retire state bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt livestock and poultry from taxation. Currently, farm products in the hands of the producer and family supplies for home and farm use are exempt.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of additional bonds to finance the veterans' land program and to increase the maximum interest rate allowable on veterans' land fund bonds."

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 3, 1981

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. The amendment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of November 15, 1981."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. Funds constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the State Affairs Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land from the Commissioner of the General Land Office under certain conditions. Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public free school land not previously patentable. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land, which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predecessors in interest have held for at least 50 years. The person and his predecessors in interest must have continuously claimed the land and paid the taxes for at least 50 years.

This amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands. An applicant may not use this provision to

above the spending limit provided by Article VIII, Section 22, of the Texas Constitution would be placed in a Water Assistance Fund to be used as provided by law, including projects for water development and conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes or any combination of these purposes.

The amendment also provides \$500,000,000 of the general credit of the state to guarantee bonds issued in commercial markets by local political subdivisions, including cities, counties, and special districts. The amendment allows amounts to be established to decrease or retire state debt, which is defined as that debt secured by the full faith and credit of the state. The amendment would raise the interest that could be paid on authorized, but unissued, bonds guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the state from 6% to 12%.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; authorizing the use of the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guarantee the bonds of cities, counties, towns, and other units of local government in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on previously approved, but unissued, state bonds; and authorizing a program to retire state bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that one-half of the surplus tax revenues

About the letter we read last week about the lighting and facilities at the tennis courts.

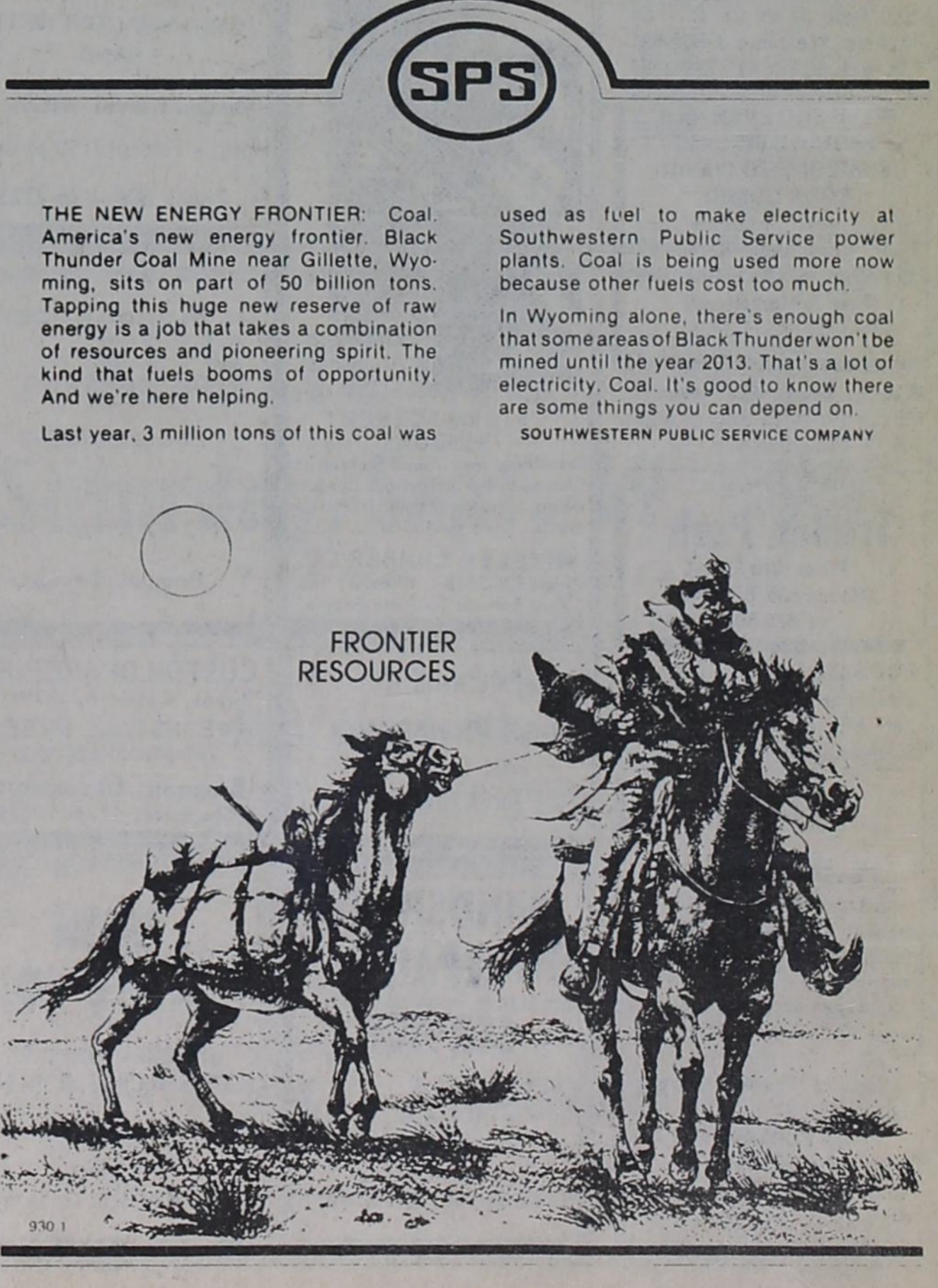
The Wheeler Schools are generous enough to let the public use their fine facilities at no charge except for a quarter to help pay for the lights.

Their "lessons" focus on cooperation, positive attitude and a bright look to the future.

History tells us that when the economy conditions of a given population begin to deteriorate, family behavior changes to meet economic needs.

Many families return to the "extended family system" because it becomes more difficult for individual family members to maintain separate households.

This means other family members come to live with "Mom and Dad and the kids".

Aunt Suzy may come to share housekeeping and child-care responsibilities in return for lodging, or Cousin Bill may join the family while he attends the local university, or a grandparent may come to stay during the winter months to avoid the high cost of heating a separate dwelling.

Not only do family members tend to "pull together" during times of economic hardship, so, too, do friends and communities.

In fact, it's not unusual for non-family members to become part of one's family.

During the "depression era" single individuals would "hire on" to a family. They would help with the field work, gardening and other household tasks in return for room and board and sometimes a nominal wage.

Because these individuals lived with the family, they often became unofficial "adopted" family members.

In addition to the creation of "extended families," hard times often create "extended communities."

As resources become scarce, it becomes more difficult to employ individuals who can provide services needed by the community. So community members form their own committees, task forces and work teams to do the work--road repairs, traffic control for special events, roadside mowing, maintenance of a community building and local child care, for example.

Examples given today's families by yesteryear families who managed well in times of economic decline should give us faith and confidence in ourselves and our families.

The heritage of our earlier families has already proven that a poor economy need not be our downfall.

A positive attitude and a bright look to the future -- the coping tools of yesteryear families -- are still the most valid tools for coping with hard times today.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

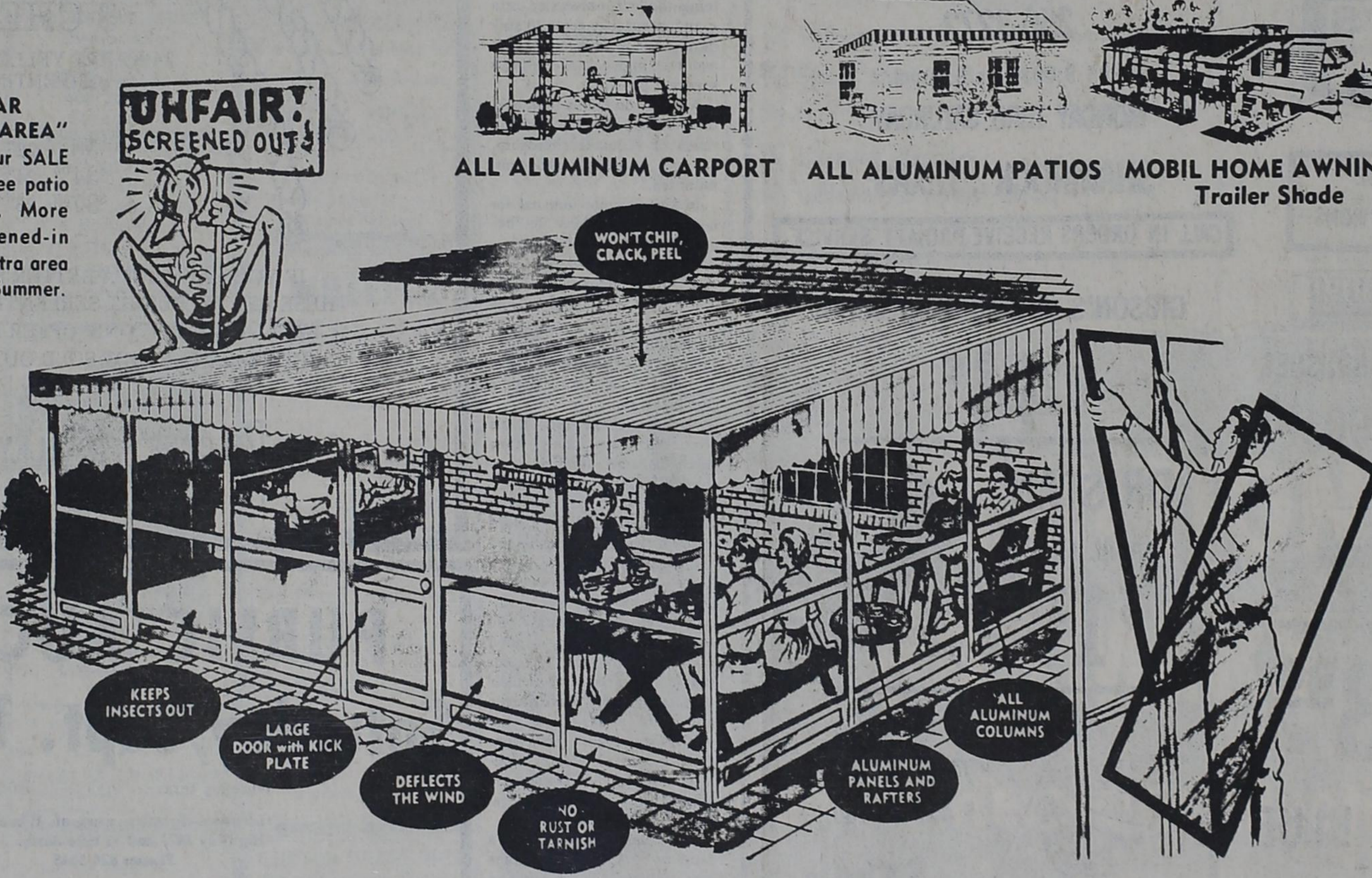
