30th Annual Old Settlers Reunion Is September 4-7

September 7, 1981 will be the 30th Anniversary of the Labor Day Celebration of the Mobeetie Community. The Mobeetie Community has paid special tribute to the Mobeetie Old Timers, by inviting all those who once lived here to return on Labor Day to meet their old friends, make new ones and enjoy a day of visiting, eating and listening to music by talented musicians all over the area. Everyone brings a basket lunch of cakes, pies and salads to go with the barbecue.

This was first held when the Old Jail was the Legion home for Mobeetie Legionnaires and Auxiliary in 1950. The first Labor Day Celebration was held in 1951 with the entire community going together to entertain all old timers who ever lived in or around Mobeetie. The ladies had a choir led by Juanita Matthews all dressed alike in early day costumes, sang several anthems then served as hostesses. The men built a shady arbor of chicken wire top covered with brush and limbs for shade. Some improvement has taken place, as everyone can notice, the large concrete floor covered with a tin roof is always ready and it and the stage were doubled in size last year. Local and other musicians such as fiddlers, guitarists, pianist and accordion came and furnished music while the crowd quietly visited and listened. Sheriff's Report

On Tuesday, August 22, 1981 in District Court in Wheeler, Michael Joseph Fallon appeared before Judge Grainger McIlhany on a charge of Probation Violation. Fallon, 19 years old of Baton Rouge, LA had received 6 years probation for car theft in June, 1981 in District Court in Wheeler. Judge McIlhany revoked Fallon's probation and sentenced him to 6 years in the Texas Dept. of Corrections. Fallon has been transported to Huntsville by the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department. On the same date, Martin Lee Clymer, 20 years old and Ernest Lee Wade, 21 years old, each received 5 years probation and a \$500.00 fine for the theft of a motorcycle and other items in Shamrock in July 1982. Judge McIlhany presided in these two cases, also. Clymer and Wade are both from Okla. City, Okla. and worked for Gregory and Cook Pipeline Construction while in Shamrock.

Final testing by the state will be Oct. 29. All current EMT licenses will expire Nov. of this year. Attending the ECA course and testing will renew the EMT's for 2 years. All people interested in taking the ECA course are invited to attend the first meeting, Sept. 10th. Books may be purchased at the first class. Classes will be on Tuesday and Thursday nights from 8 till 10 o'clock. Oct. 22 and 27 will be used for reviewing and final testing will be Oct. 29.

The state requires 40 classroom hours, a written exam and 3 skills to be certified as an Emergency Care Attendant. People who certify may apply for ambulance membership and will be considered as openings become available.

According to Pam Hibler, Wheeler Pledge Center Coordinator, the Telethon will be carried by KFDD-TV, Channel 10 in Amarillo beginning 8:00 p.m. Sunday, September 6, and continuing through 6:30 p.m., Monday, Sept. 7.

Some 50 superstars will appear on the 1981 show, including Sammy Davis, Jr., Tony Bennett, Johnny Cash, Bill Cosby, Crystal Gayle, Larry Gatlin and the Gatlin Brothers, Ben Vereen, Don Rickles, Pearl Bailey, Wayne Newton, and Tony Orlando. The show will be broadcast live from the Space Center of Del Webb's Hotel Sahara in Las Vegas for the ninth consecutive year. Many performances will also be telecast from cities around the country such as Dallas, Nashville, New York and Atlantic City.

**PRIVACY--
AND YOUR FINANCES**
How much privacy do you have concerning your finances?

Consumers today are facing changes in the financial world regarding their right to privacy.

In the past, consumers have always had certain expectations of confidentiality about the privacy of their personal

financial records. During the 18th and 19th centuries in the United States, personal financial records were kept in the home, protected by the individual and the Fourth Amendment (which states the right of people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures). In the 20th century, con-

sumers relied on financial institutions to make many of their financial transactions and they looked on financial officers as a sort of "trustee" of their account and financial activities.

However, after the 1976 Supreme Court decision in U.S. vs. Miller, which held that a customer of a financial institution has no constitutional standing to contest access to the institution's records of his transactions, the consumer has been deprived of that expected degree of privacy.

Privacy in financial transactions is an important concern among many customers, since these transactions reveal so much about a person's activities, associations and beliefs.

So, almost a year ago the Fair Financial Information Practices Act (SB1928 and H.R. 5555 and 5559) was introduced in the Congress.

This has not become law yet.

It covers five major areas: consumer-reporting agencies, credit grantors, credit and check-authorization services, depository institutions and insurance companies.

The Act has two functions--setting standards for handling sensitive personal records and limiting government access to, and use of, personal information.

Consumers interested in making their voice heard on this Act can write their representatives at the federal and state level to express an opinion.

Also, when consumers talk to credit bureaus and insurance companies, they can make their views clear regarding privacy, along with the idea that they will only do business with companies that respect consumer rights.

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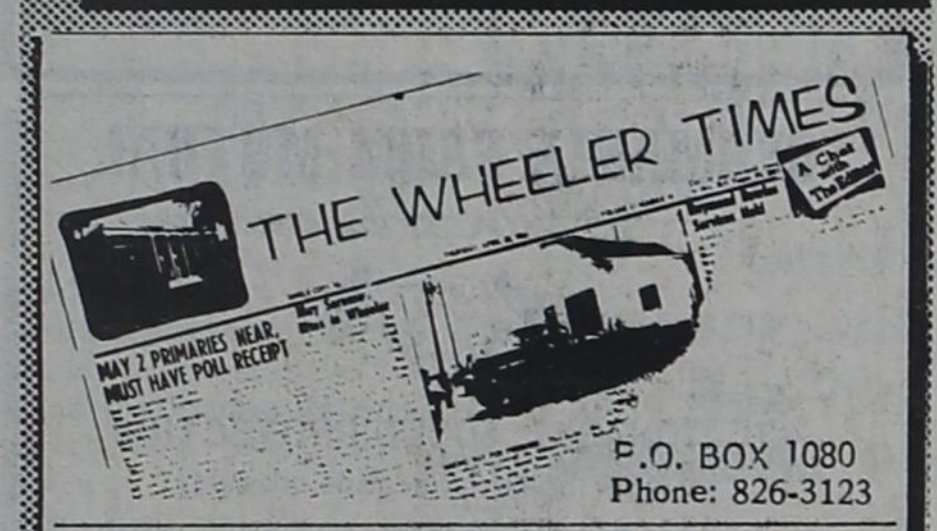

I am not trying to run the town, but you can mark it down that anytime people try to bring something into the places of business here that are wrong and evil, I will let my voice be heard. If someone tried to bring pornographic magazines in, I would take a stand. So, whether you personally like me or not, I love you and I love our town, and as long as I am here I will do what I can to keep it clean and a nice place to live.

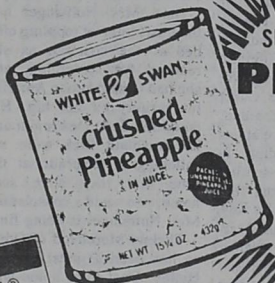

 Book of Records was the "greatest number of dollars pledged to a televised charitable event in history." A record 94 million people watched the show, and A.C. Nielson ratings showed that, in the U.S. alone, it was viewed in 36,960,000 homes—47% of all American homes with television sets.

The money raised by the Telethon supports MDA's global research effort and free medical service program for patients with any of 40 neuromuscular diseases. Students who wish copies of additional tests may obtain them upon request from ACT at a cost.

Information reports resulting from the tests and the questionnaire are sent to the students and their high school counselor, as well as to those colleges and other institutions designated by the students.

It is recommended that students use the ACT Assessment as early as possible in their senior year so that resulting information will be available in time to be of maximum assistance to students and their counselors in education and career planning. Wheeler students who are uncertain if they need to use the ACT Assessment, or who are concerned about location of the nearest test center, are urged to contact Shepard at his high school office.

Tax Statements

by Charles Buzzard

How does your office appraise property? This question has been asked numerous times. An appraisal made for property tax purposes by the assessor and one made for some other purpose by a fee appraiser are much the same. Each is based on the same appraisal principles. Each is aimed at ascertaining the property's present market value as of a given date. Each requires some physical description of the property. Each is based on the same typical buyer and seller. In other words, tax appraisals are based on the same value concepts as other appraisals. They require the same economic sense, or judgment.

The main difference is that in tax appraisal work the appraiser's job is to appraise not just one piece of property, but to appraise or assess all parcels of real estate there are in the taxing districts. The job is to do so uniformly and within a relatively short period of time. As a result, the appraisal process has to be streamlined. Compared to other appraisers the assessor spends less time inspecting the properties; he spends more time studying maps, collecting data, developing standards, and analyzing the major factors influencing property values in his area. The tax appraiser may spend no more than 30 minutes inspecting a residence, no more than an hour or so inspecting a farm or ranch. This does not say he forms an opinion as to value during this period of time. It merely says that this is the time he takes to record the physical data which will later

provide the foundation or basis for arriving at the property's value.

The term used to describe the appraisal process used is the mass appraisal technique. This technique consists of the standardized collection of appraisal data for purposes of appraising as equitably or fairly as possible each and every parcel of property within a tax district. Mass appraisal thus becomes a procedure whereby trained appraisers analyze the data and, subject to an inspection of each individual parcel, apply them to each and every property in the district, thus estimating their values. Although the term used is mass appraisal technique, the final figures are both separately and individually appraised values.

In the following weeks, I will be explaining the various activities that the Wheeler County Appraisal District staff will be responsible for during the appraisal or assessment process.

A good thought: The person who gets ahead is the one who does more than is necessary ---and keeps on doing it. Here's peekin' at you!

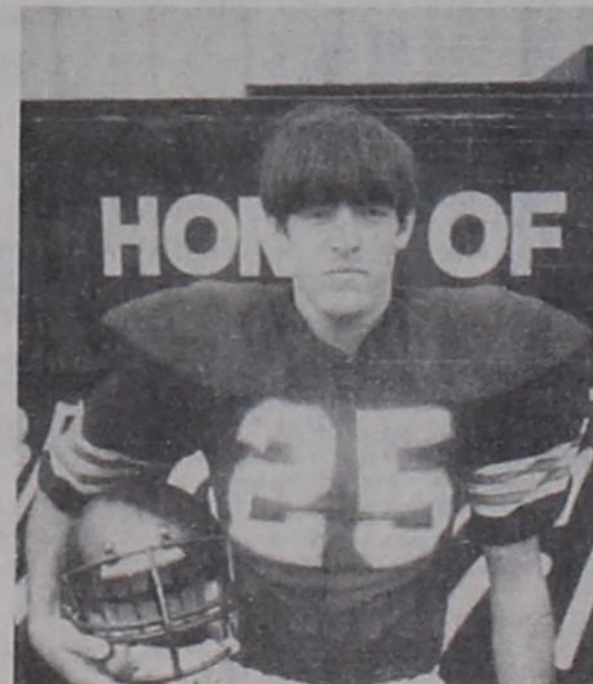
