## REWARD OFFERED IN ROBBERY-MUGGING

An \$8500 reward is being offered in the case of the June 30 robbery of the Koshare Shop in Wheeler. Mr. and Mrs. Frank Walker, Jr., and others are offering a \$4000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction

of the person or persons responsible for the robbery and brutal beating of Roxie Hanks, a Koshare employee. An additional \$4500 is being offered if the thief is convicted and the jewelry is recovered. The informer can remain

completely anonymous—even to the Sheriff's Department. The Wheeler County Sheriff's Department informed the "Times" of the procedure to be used in the event a caller should contact the department. No effort will be made to identify the caller either at the time the call is received or at the time a reward is paid. The caller will be given a number and that number will be used for collection of the reward.

Information is all that is required of the caller. The Sheriff's department will do the investigation and proving in the case. When placing the call, the informer should ask for Sheriff Doyle Ramsey or Deputy Lonnie Miller; he should then give them as much information as possible. The more complete the information, the better chance of a conviction.

Be prepared to call back. If the call is placed at a time when neither Sheriff Ramsey or Deputy Miller are in the office, it will be necessary for the caller to hold the line or return the call at a time specified by the caller.

The daring daylight robbery occurred around 3 p.m. Monday afternoon, June 30. Mrs. Hanks was beaten about the face and chest, knocking her unconscious, and a number of pieces of diamond jewelry were taken from the shop along with the employee's purse. Mrs. Hanks, an employee of the jewelry and antique store for the past seven years was alone in the shop at the time of the robbery.

The robbery was reported to the Wheeler County Sheriff's department around 3:30. A couple from Shamrock went to the Koshare Shop on business and discovered Mrs. Hanks. Sheriff Doyle Ramsey arrived at the scene followed by the Wheeler ambulance. The victim was taken to Shamrock General Hospital and later transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Mrs. Hanks was unable to describe the person or persons who attacked her. She was unable to relate to time when the ambulance arrived and did not know how long she had been unconscious. In the ride to the hospital, she described the last customer she remembers and estimated the time to be around 3. She also recalled pleading with the assailant or assailants not to kill her. Roxie telephoned her sister, Fannie Calloway, for help, but does not recollect placing the call.

The condition of the patient and the absence of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Walker, Jr., owners of the shop, made it impossible to determine the amount of the loss immediately. The Walkers returned from an out-of-state business trip Monday evening.

Some jewelry boxes taken in the robbery were recovered Tuesday evening in the barrow ditch along highway 83, south of Wheeler. The purse taken in the robbery was found on a fence post near Twitty on Thursday.

Roxie Hanks underwent surgery Tuesday in Amarillo to repair a broken jaw she received in the beating. She returned home last week and is reported to be recovering.

### Tax Statements

Public confusion over who is responsible for setting property tax policy often hampers efforts to improve assessment practices. Property assessment involves locating and describing properties, appraising or estimating the value of all properties, keeping records linking properties to their respective owners, and designating the official value for tax purposes taking into account legal reasons for altering appraised values. Property assessment, therefore, is an administrative function.

Elected officials, however, are responsible for setting property tax levies and rates.

Popular misconceptions about who is responsible for the property tax arise because assessors adjust assessed values to reflect changes in market value, which increases or decreases property tax liabilities. Texas has enacted disclosure procedures which restrict property tax revenues to the amount raised before a reappraisal unless a local governing body give notice of its intent to raise its levy and holds a public hearing on the proposed levy increase. These hearings enable taxpayers to express their views on the service they expect to receive and to obtain satisfactory justification for the property tax burden they ultimately bear.

Elected officials face a difficult problem in reconciling property tax policy with various public goals. Preserving farmland and open space land, for example, may be adversely affected by market value assessments. Some taxpayers notably the poor and elderly, may be overburdened even if the assessment function is performed perfectly. However, property tax relief for the poor and elderly can be accomplished through tax credits and abatements without destroying assessment uniformity. Farmland and open space land can be preserved by restricting the use of such properties. In this way market value is equal to current value.

These property tax relief measures discussed above can help overcome opposition to better assessments from those who fear the consequences of an accurate reflection of current market values in assessed values.

**Fighting Mildew Problems**  
There's "hope" for solving today's mildew problems, plugging energy-tight houses where moisture has become trapped.

"Prepare ahead of time" to avoid mildew problems is the best rule of thumb. To prepare, remember the key is a well-ventilated house.

**Ahead-Of-Time Steps**  
Most mildew problems will focus on the bathroom and closets.

These areas need more ventilation and more heat.

As a general prevention step, you can use dehumidifiers or ventilate the house more thoroughly and frequently.

For a more concentrated airing—in the bathroom, for example, install a small ventilating fan.

In closets, install an incandescent (conventional or ordinary) light, and keep it burning during ware, humid weather. One 75-watt bulb should generate enough heat for a closet as large as six-foot square.

**Face-To-Face Steps**  
Even the best ahead-of-time steps can't always prevent mildew, although certainly they will help reduce its possible damaging effects. So if after all, you're face-to-face with prolonged humidity, be ready to fight! mildew!

Start by even more ventilating of the house, and use heat to dry out the house.

If mildew does start growing on walls and ceilings, wash them with a strong solution of chlorine bleach.

Be careful with the cloth you use and change cloths often so you don't spread the mildew to uncontaminated areas.

For mildew-stained ceilings and walls, you can try washing them with 1/2 cup trisodium phosphate, one quart chlorine bleach and three quarts warm water. If the stains aren't too bad, this will help in some cases.

Remember, though, washing the walls and ceilings with chlorine bleach will help remove mildew, but it does not keep mildew from returning. Again, only enough ventilation and heat can really stop mildew.

If you plan to repaint walls or ceilings, use a paint that has a mildew retardant.

Do not paint a mildewed wall UNTIL you remove the mildew and dry the wall well. Otherwise, the mildew will come back again.

To get mildew stains and odors out of upholstered furniture, take it outside and sweep it with a broom to remove as many mildew spores as possible. Then vacuum to remove embedded spores. Discard the vacuum bag so spores don't spread.

Then air furniture in the sun for several days. Be sure to bring furniture inside at night to keep it out of damp night air.

After airing in the sun, remove stains with a mild detergent solution.

If that doesn't work, mix lemon juice with non-iodized salt, rub it on the stains, and allow them to bleach in the sun with the solution still on them.
