## Alan L. Bean Plans to Retire

According to an Associated Press news release, Astronaut Alan L. Bean will be devoting his time to painting moonscapes instead of walking on the Moon. Bean was the lunar module pilot on Apollo 12, on November 14-24, 1969—our second landing on the moon.

Alan L. Bean, the fourth man to walk on the lunar surface, has been with the space program since 1963. When his acceptance into the program was announced, Wheeler began receiving publicity as being the birthplace of the astronaut. After much effort in trying to tie him to some of the families still living in the area, it was learned his time spent in Wheeler was a matter of months. Bean's father was a government employee, living in Wheeler at the time; the hospital was located upstairs at the corner of Main and Oklahoma—City Cleaners and Fabric or the Old City Drug.

Alan L. Bean returned to Wheeler and was honored by the area citizens in 1969. The name of Shamrock Street, Highway 83, was changed to Alan L. Bean Boulevard, Bean was given a "Key to the City" and a barbecue was held at Nicholson Field.

Bean, 49, has been studying art since the late 50's. He plans to devote his painting to moonscapes; his first hand view of space will enable him to capture the true colors—mostly gray.

## Tax Statements

**By Charles Buzzard**  
If you have gathered information on sales of similar property, you can expect sincere and thoughtful consideration of your arguments by the board of equalization.

**Remember these points:**

1. Make an appointment and be there on time. Visit or call the tax office to request an appointment time to fit the board's schedule and so that you will not have to wait.

2. Stick to the facts of your presentation. You have not been invited to a gripe session on rising taxes, inflation, politics or other personal views. And since the BOE does not set the budget for the jurisdiction, that also should not be discussed.

3. Be direct, concise, and honest. Be sure that the information and comments you bring before the Board are strictly in keeping with only the matter of the value assigned to your property.

4. Recognize that the board is serving a judicial function, just as a judge and jury would be in a court case. The board is there to make sure you get a fair deal on your property value, and its members appreciate your cooperation.

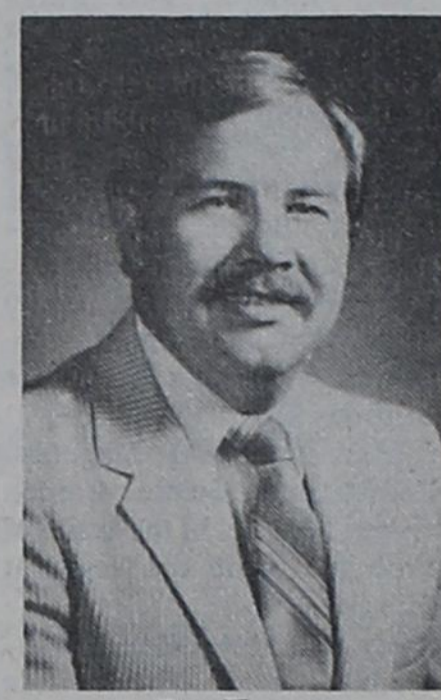
5. Prepare a simple but well-organized presentation. Since the board hears so many property owners with their statements and evidence during the long periods of hearings, it is possible that strong and convincing facts of your presentation might be missed, or misunderstood by members.

So, it is to your advantage to stress your key facts and figures by writing them down in logical order and making copies which you can hand to each board member as you begin your presentation. It is also a good idea to print your information in the same order on a large poster, or other written display, which you can refer to as you discuss your property values.

If your arguments are sound and well supported by this material, your chances for remedy are greater since the board can quickly and easily understand your arguments.

Many taxpayers may not be aware that the board of equalization's sole authority is over the value of the property. The board must limit the taxpayer's discussion only to matters concerning the value of property.

Discussions regarding the amount of taxes imposed or the injustice of taxes merely waste the taxpayer's time. These complaints should be referred to the governing bodies or to the legislature.

# Lines from Linda

Linda Daughtry, CEA (Home Economics)

**Get Fresh With Greens & Potatoes**  
Nutrition as fresh as spring starts with greens — so get fresh with greens as a big item on your menu. Low-calorie greens provide vitamins A and C and fiber.

Use a few buying, storage and fixin' basics, and you can serve your greens with that touch of culinary expertise so traditional in grand Southern cooking.

Here they are

**Buying Basics**  
Look for crisp, clean leaves that are fresh, young, tender, crisp and which have a good healthy green color.

Avoid leaves with coarse, fibrous stems, yellowish-green color, softness or decay or a wilted condition.

Look for evidence of insects — they're hard to see and equally hard to wash away.

Buy about 1 to 1½ pounds for four servings.

**Storage Safeguard**  
Greens will keep in the refrigerator crisper or a plastic bag for three to five days.

Or, to freeze, use young, tender leaves. Wash and remove tough stems or imperfect leaves. Cut leaves into pieces as desired.

Heat in boiling water two minutes — all greens except spinach which needs only 1½ minutes. Cool, drain, package and freeze immediately in moisture, vapor-resistant packaging.

**Fantastic Fixin's GREENS SOUTHERN STYLE** — Simmer bacon or salt pork in a small amount of water, then slowly simmer the greens in that "Pot liquor" for 15-20 minutes. Use a pan with a tight-fitting lid. Serve with vinegar, green onions and hot cornbread for a great Southern treat.

**Preparation**  
To boil potatoes, use as little water as possible, or steam the potatoes. Both methods will help conserve nutrients. Also, potatoes in their skins to prevent loss of nutrients.

You can get fresh with potatoes and make nutritious menu magic when you know basic buying, storage and preparation techniques.

**Selection**  
Two main types of potatoes are available — red and russet. Russets (more elongated and of a brown color) are best for baking. Reds (rounder shaped and reddish in color) are a more general-purpose potato — they do well when prepared by boiling, mashing or frying. "New" potatoes are reds that are freshly harvested and marketed from January through September. The term "new" also is used to describe freshly dug fall-crop potatoes not fully matured.

Regardless of the type, select firm, smooth, well-shaped potatoes. Avoid those with a green color or blemishes. Avoid badly sprouted or shriveled potatoes or those with irregular or knob-shaped growths, since these probably will lead to a significant amount of waste.

**Storage**  
With proper storage, general-purpose and baking potatoes will keep for several months, and new potatoes will keep for several weeks. Do not wash potatoes before storing — dampness increases chances of decay. Store potatoes in a cool (45-50 degrees F.), dark, well-ventilated place. If you must store them at 70-80 degrees F., use them within a week or two. Higher temperatures often cause sprouting and shriveling. On the other hand, temperatures lower than 40 degrees F. for a week or more may cause potatoes to develop a sweet taste since some of the starch may change to sugar. To improve flavor of these potatoes, store them at a higher temperature for one or two weeks before using.

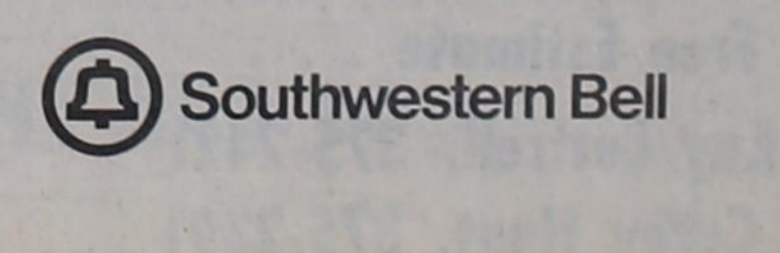

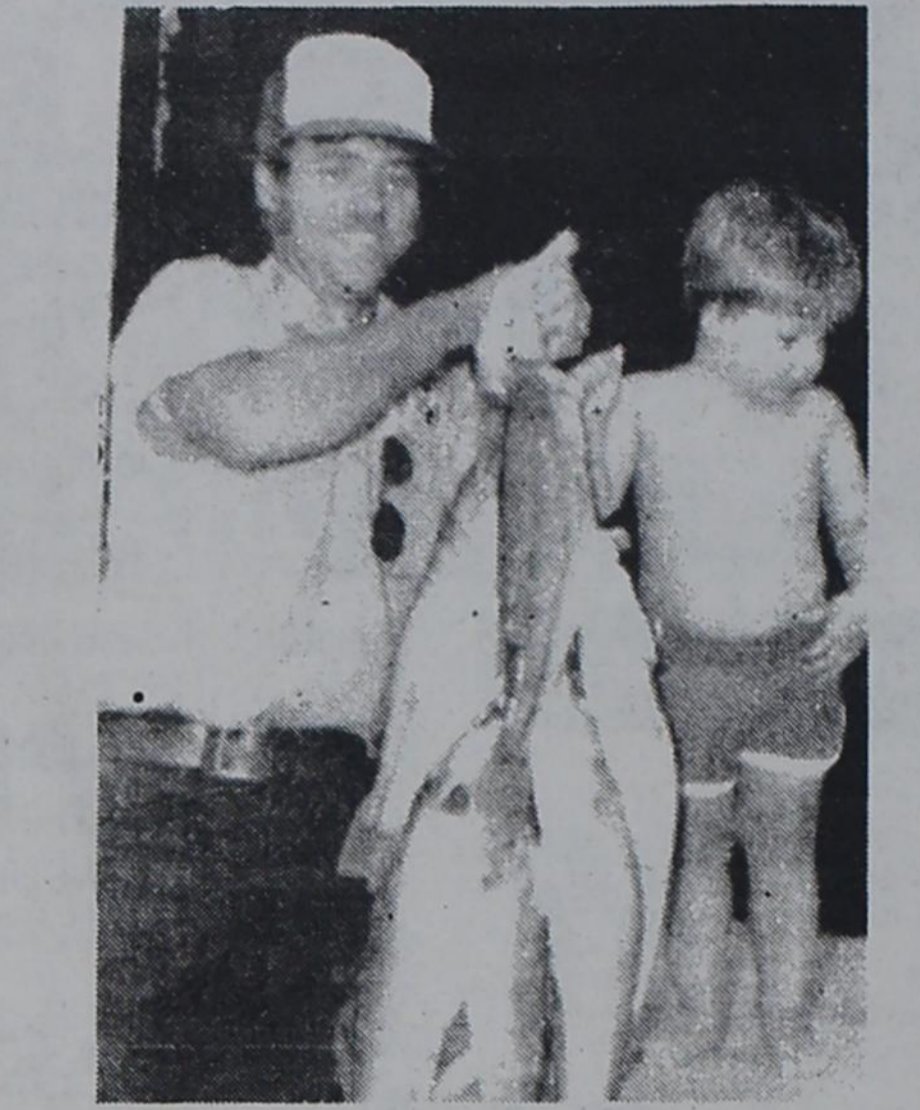

more, when both the sales promotion and your agreement to buy are made somewhere other than the seller's place of business.  
To cancel, simply mail a written notice of cancellation to the company within the three-day period.  
**"Anytime-Cancel" Rule**  
There's another section of the law that allows you to cancel at any time.  
Sales contracts you sign are required to tell you of your right to cancel under the three-day circumstances, and you must be given a separate "Notice of Cancellation" form for this purpose.  
If you do not receive the required cancellation notice and form you may cancel at any time, not just during the three-day "cooling-off" period, according to Texas law.  
After you cancel a contract, you must return the goods if the seller requests you to.  
If you are not requested to return the goods within 20 days, you are under no further obligation.  
The seller must refund all money you have paid within 10 days from the date of cancellation.  
**Protect Yourself**  
Of course consumers can take two steps to protect themselves from unsatisfactory situations in door-to-door sales in the first place.  
Make sure you're dealing with a legitimate, authorized sales representative who conducts business fairly and ethically.  
Also, decide whether purchasing the product meets a real need or if you are acting impulsively.

**Do You Fall For Supermarket Gimmicks?**  
Have you ever gone to the store for strawberries — but went home with the little shortcake package and whipping cream, too?  
Perhaps you bought the extras just because they looked so good in the supermarket display.  
Do your children find great delight in picking out all the sugar-coated cereals the store has to offer?  
This may happen because those cereals are displayed at children's eye levels.  
If so, you fell for marketing gimmicks.  
Not so bad, since all that is fun occasionally — but not so good if you sacrifice family nutrition with impulse gimmick buying — frequent buying.  
To avoid this, take time to plan purchases. Shop with a list so you aren't vulnerable to "point-of-purchase" influence at the supermarket.  
Read labels and study food advertisements.  
Understand as much information as possible about nutrition and needed serving sizes.  
Also learn about the "cost per serving" method of buying meats and product. "Cost per serving" starts with "cost per pound" or "cost per ounce" — and then you must figure how many servings that pound will make or how many ounces will make a serving.  
In addition, seek information from your County Extension Office about food buying and nutrition. Many booklets and pamphlets are available to the public at no charge through the County Extension Offices across Texas.  
Finally, be aware of supermarket gimmicks such as the strawberry shortcake displays and the sugar-coated cereal shelf placement.  
Other gimmicks include colorful banners, slogans and marketing products themselves — all of which induce a mid-hypnotic-trance in many consumers, according to one study.  
Remember, unless you're careful, these gimmicks can lead to the purchase of more high-profit, eye-appealing, self-gratifying — and less nutritious — buying.

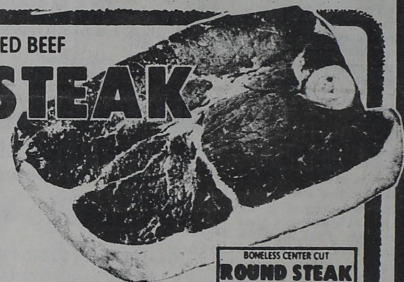
