Beef Cattle Company was selected as one of the feedyards in the Texas Panhandle to be toured by a group of 17 cattle specialists from Japan on Tuesday, June 2, 1981. Those visiting here from Japan were Masataka Niiyama, Yuji

Yamashita, Seiji Terada, Masao Tashiro, Toshihiro Shintaku, Masao Yoshinari, Yukihito Takigawa, Makoto Takano, Tomoo Kondo, Kazuyuki Murabayashi, Mamoru Matsubara, Hiroaki Murai, Ryoichi Nishizaki, Toshiharu Saito, Akira Matsumoto, Miyoji Kikuichi, and Ken Yoshida.

The President's List includes Jerry Finsterwald, a senior mathematics major from Briscoe.



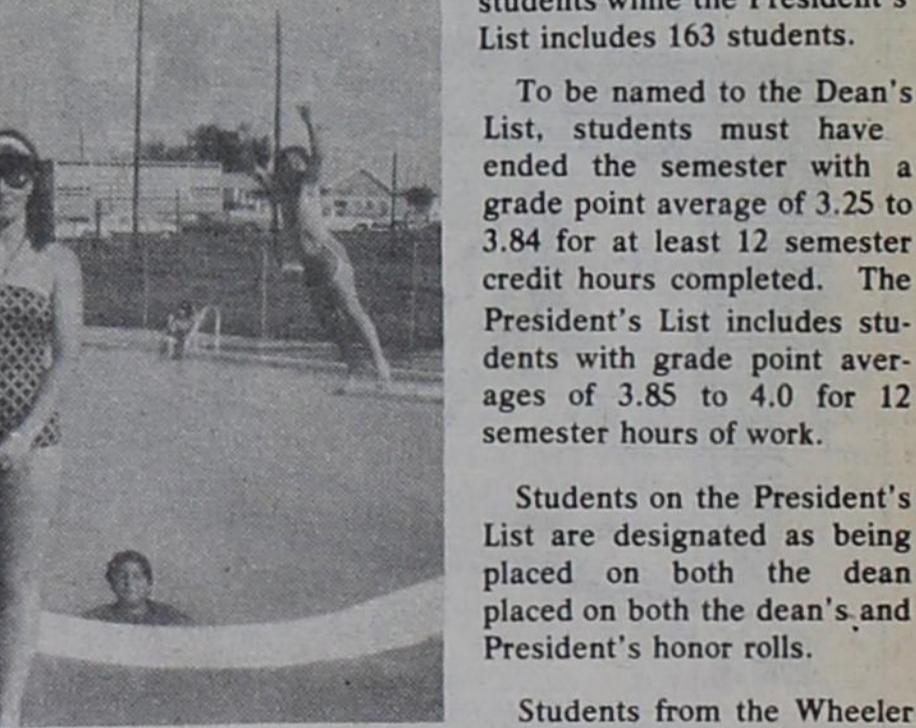

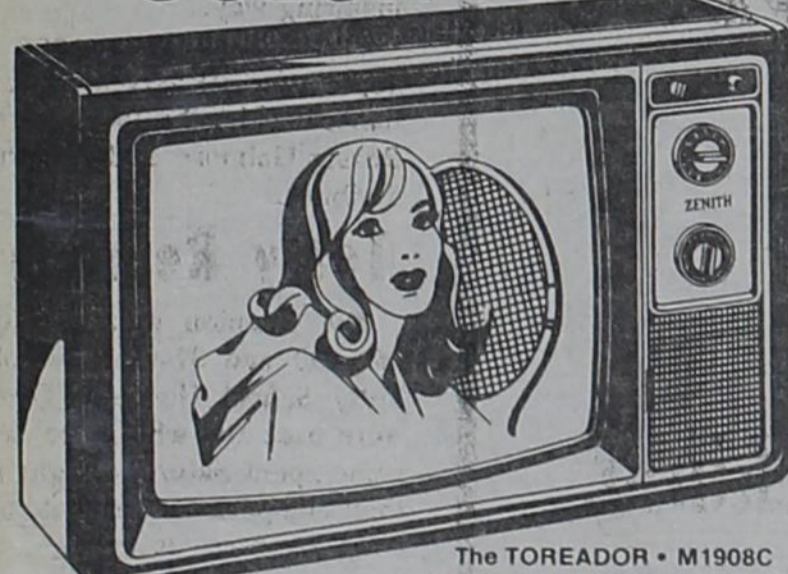

WHO SAID RAPTURES
