Wheeler's coaching staff. It should be noted, the players receiving awards were deserving. One player does not make a team and one player does not deserve all the awards. But, the attitude of our coaches is most unbecoming to the sport of football and all players in general.

The most outstanding players should be recognized at these awards presentations and this was not accomplished. Perhaps it is time to change the method of selection so this situation can be corrected.

# Tax Statements

By Charles Buzzard

In Determining the value of It was presented at the property, the assessor uses three common methods:

1. Market Approach-This is

the method most often used, and it simply asks, "What are properties similar to this selling for in our jurisdiction?" By making a comparison between the property being valued and other similar properties which recently have been sold, the assessor can estimate what the property would sell for if placed on the market. After making a number of such comparisons, the assessor can make a highly reliable estimate of the property's value. This estimate is then used for the full market value of the property on the tax rolls.

2. Income Approach-By using a rather complicated procedure, the assessor determines what an intelligent investor would be willing to pay for a property in anticipation of recovering his investment plus a reasonable rate of return. Mass Appraisal is the practice of appraising several properties in a short time. To Mass Appraise, therefore, an assessor must classify property. I will discuss this more in a couple of weeks.

Texas Law requires that all children admitted to an educational facility must have been immunized against diptheria, pertussis (whooping cough), tetanus poliomyelitis, measl-

1. DPT or Td-At least three doses are required provided at least on dose has been received on or after the fourth birthday. A booster dose is required every ten years after the dose obtained on or after the fourth birthday.

2. Polio-At least three doses 3. Cost Approach-This me- of oral polio are required, provided at least one dose has been received on or after the fourth birthday.

Measles-All children must ahve received measles vaccine on or after the first birthday. All histories of measles illness must be verified by a physician's statement.

4. Rubella-One dose of rubella vaccine is required thru age twelve.

5. Mumps-One dose of mumps vaccine is required thru eight years of age. Beginning September 1, 1980 and each year thereafter, children one year older will also be required to have received mumps vaccine. All histories of mumps illness must be verified by a physician's stat-

When a child transfers from one school to another, a copy of the immunization record should be sent within thirty days.


