## Tax Statements

In Determining the value of property, the assessor uses three common methods:

1. Market Approach-This is the method most often used, and it simply asks, "What are properties similar to this selling for in our jurisdiction?" By making a comparison between the property being valued and other similar properties which recently have been sold, the assessor can estimate what the property would sell for if placed on the market. After making a number of such comparisons, the assessor can make a highly reliable estimate of the property's value. This estimate is then used for the full market value of the property on the tax rolls.

2. Income Approach-By using a rather complicated procedure, the assessor determines what an intelligent investor would be willing to pay for a property in anticipation of recovering his investment plus a reasonable rate of return. This approach considers such things as the gross income of the property, (such as rent on a building), the various expenses to maintain the property, the amount of money invested, the age and expected further life of a structure, and comparisons to other similar income-producing properties. Property owners seeking additional information on this form of valuation would be well advised to consult with an appraiser.

3. Cost Approach-This method is most often used to determine the value of a commercial or industrial property, such as a shop, plant or factory. It asks, "How much did it cost new, how much has it depreciated in value due to age, and how much would it cost to reproduce?" As with the income approach, owners of such property usually call on appraisal experts to estimate the value of their shops and plants.

By using one, combination, or all of the approaches, the assessor should be able to determine values for a certain class of house. Remember, the assessor is using a Mass Appraisal technique. Mass Appraisal is the practice of appraising several properties in a short time. To Mass Appraise, therefore, an assessor must classify property. I will discuss this more in a couple of weeks.

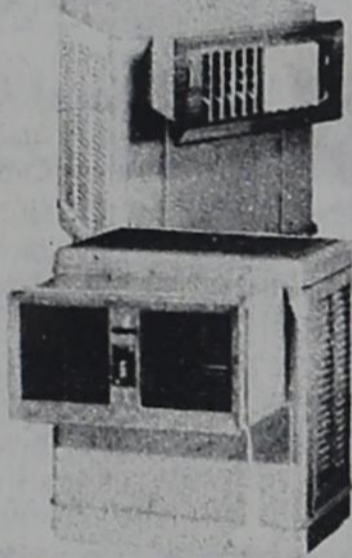

Friday morning a major two car accident occurred ten miles north of Wheeler, at the Briscoe turnoff.

The Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance as well as the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department Rescue Squad, were dispatched to the scene. Mean while a paramedic from Briscoe received the call and was on the scene in a matter of minutes, as well as the Briscoe Fire Department. 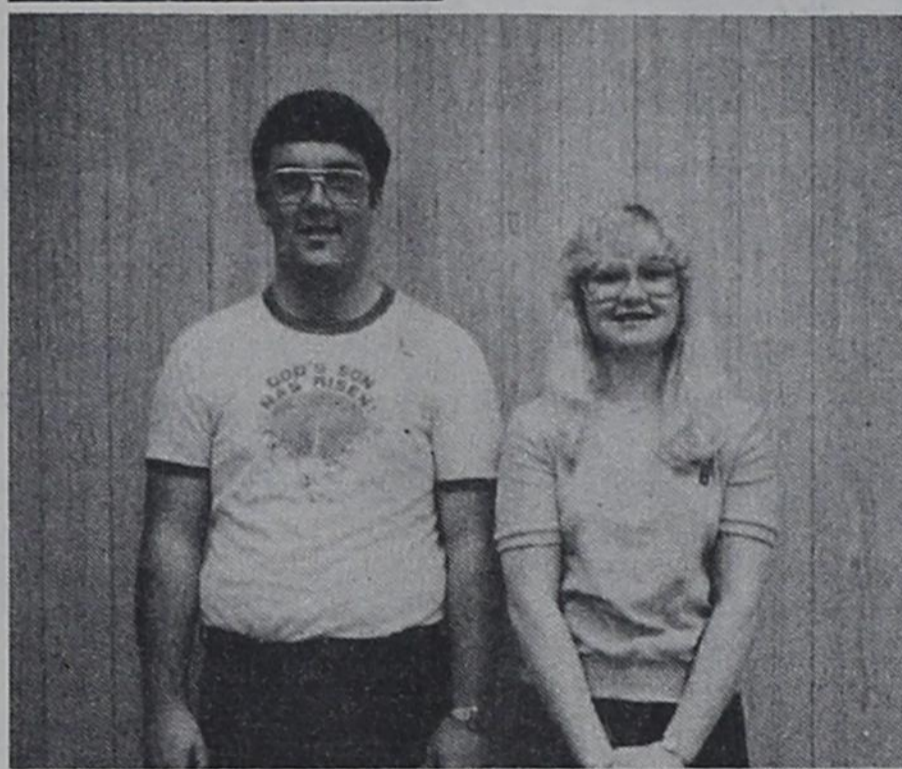
ved from Wheeler, as well as one Briscoe paramedic and their volunteer fire department.
