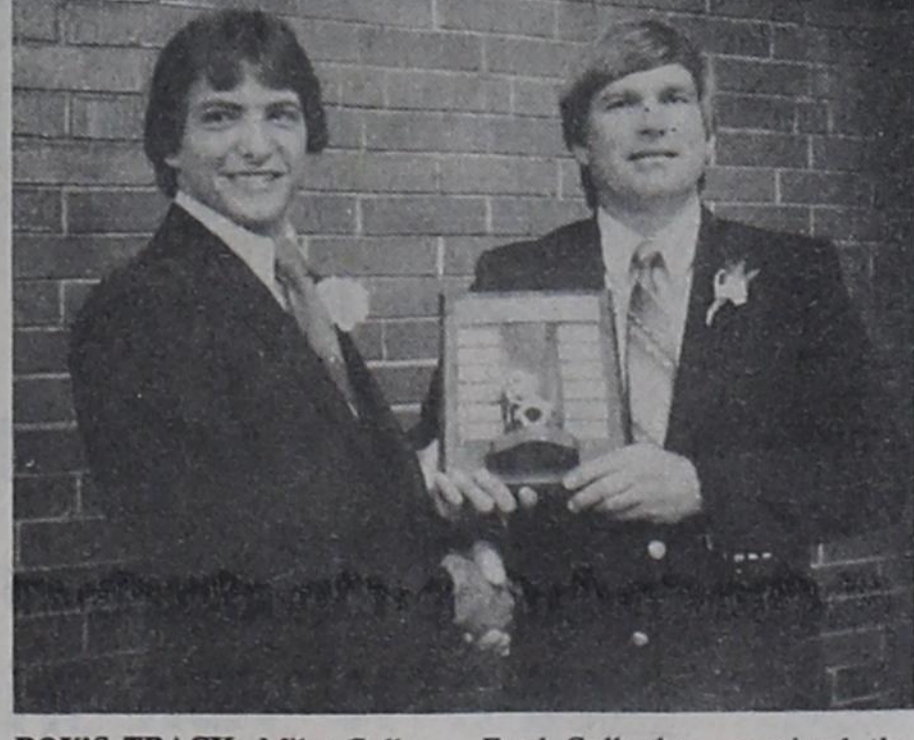

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
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Terry Dupont Graduates in Okla.

4-H College Scholarship

Present and former 4-H members may be eligible for \$5,750 in college scholarship grants if they meet requirements set by the Cooperative Extension Service.

All but one of the grants are valued at \$1,000 each, and primarily are for young people planning careers in agriculture, or such related fields as forestry, veterinary medicine or animal science, points out Linda Daughtry, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. The other scholarship, valued at \$750, has no limits placed on choice of study. These scholarships are provided by private sector donors and arranged by the National 4-H Council, a non-profit organization serving the 4-H program.

The Warren Scholarship, established this year in memory of Gertrude L. Warren, a pioneer 4-H leader often described as the "Mother of 4-H," is a \$750 grant awarded to one present or former 4-H member matriculating this fall at an accredited college, university, technical or trade school. The recipient can major in any recognized field of study and must have been influenced by 4-H in selecting a future career.

A \$1,000 scholarship, donated by Educational Foundation of Alpha Gamma Rho, goes to a current 4-H member who will be enrolled as a college freshman this fall. The recipient must be planning to major in agriculture, forestry, veterinary medicine.

Allied Mills Inc. donates scholarships to two present or former 4-H members who will be enrolled as college juniors this fall and who plan to major in animal science.

Two former 4-H members currently enrolled in a college of veterinary medicine can each earn \$1,000 scholarships provided by Champion Valley Farms, Inc., Recipe Division.

All scholarship applicants must have completed at least one year of 4-H work. Winners are selected by the Cooperative Extension Service and will be announced prior to the 60th National 4-H Congress, Nov. 29-Dec. 3, in Chicago, Ill.

Tax Statements

By Charles Buzzard

Once all the renditions have been received, or made by the tax assessor, the assessor begins preparing what are called assessment lists. These should include all taxable property within the jurisdiction. He places on these lists his estimates of the values of the properties as of January 1 or the current tax year.

If you rendered your own property, the assessor must decide whether the value you submitted is reasonable and accurate. If he thinks so, he places that value on his assessment list.

If he feels, however, that the value rendered is too low, he will place on his list a value he thinks more accurately fits the property.

In the case of property not rendered by the owner, the assessor makes his own decision of the property's value and places his opinion of value on the assessment lists.

In 1981 and later years, taxing jurisdictions will be required to use full property value in determining the amount of property taxes due instead of assessment ratios. Assessment ratio is the percentage of the full property value on which your taxes will be based.

It should be noted that full property value or market value refers to the value for tax purposes set by the assessor. Usually, when the assessment ratio is eliminated, jurisdictions reduce their tax rate to keep taxes from increasing simply because of the switch to full property value.

How does an assessor estimate value of properties? This question will be discussed next week.

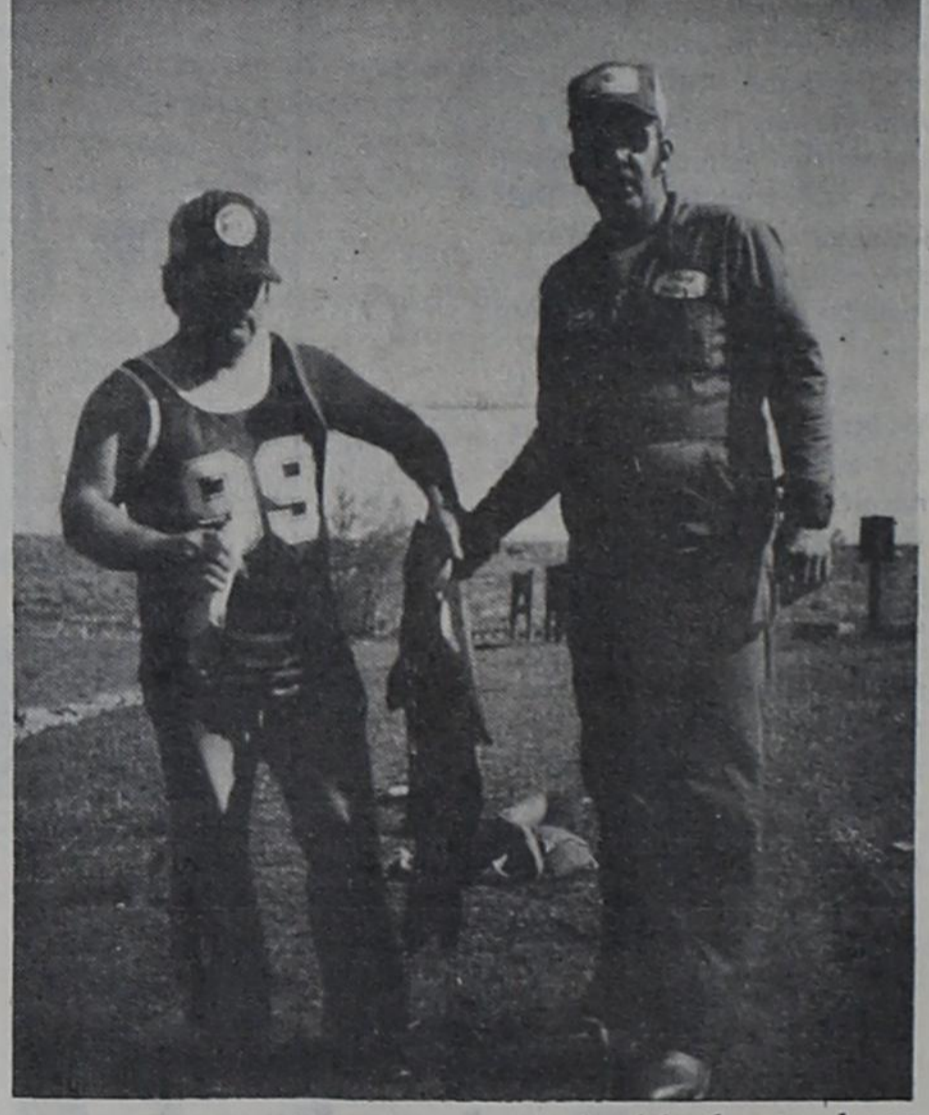

Michele Keelin, Leslie Johnson, and Michael Killingsworth competed in 5th and 6th grade oral reading with Michele Keelin winning 1st place

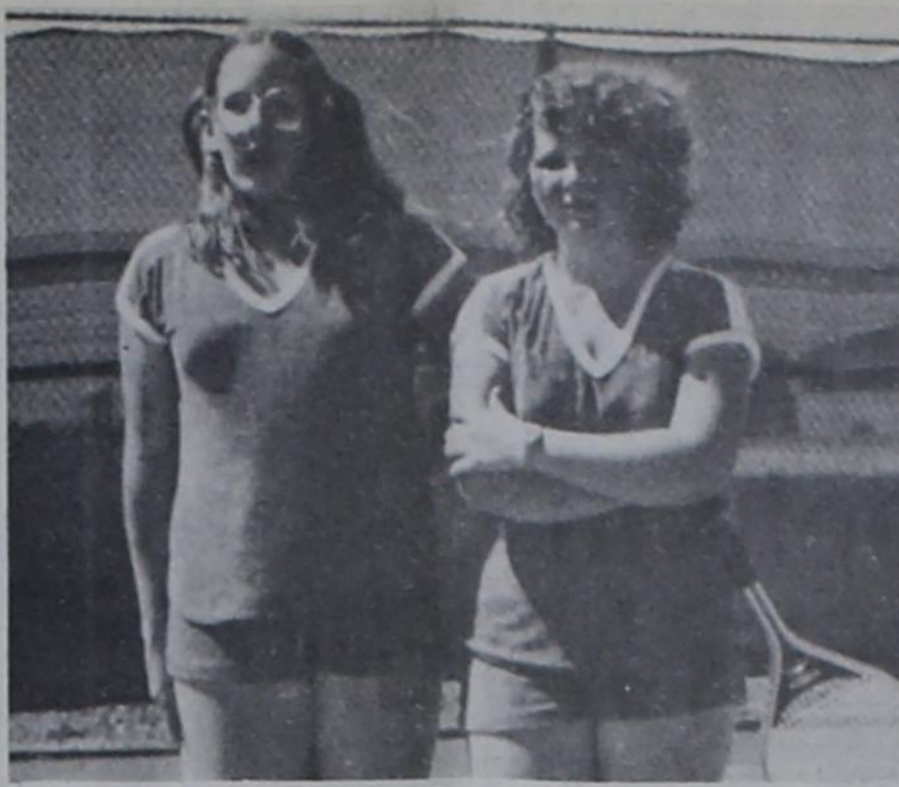

DEVOTIONAL

We are not interested in writing anything about our church in this column (other than to let you know the source of these devotionals). We want to publicize the good news about Jesus. Jesus is the Way to Heaven. Jesus is the Way to salvation. Jesus is the Way to Abundant Life.

We want to convey to the sinner the news that there is a better way than the way you are living. There is deliverance from sin and misery. It is possible to have a happy, exciting life. Actually, most Christians need this same message. It is a sad thing, but absolutely the truth, that many people who have received Jesus as their Lord and Saviour do not know that Jesus has made available to us a victorious, thrilling existence. Some folks think that there is no difference between a Christian and a sinner except that the Christian has forgiveness of sins—that's all. The Bible teaches a different doctrine.

God has made it possible for us to live ABOVE sin, not in sin. We do not have to sin a little day. We are new creatures in Christ. We do not have two natures in us after we are saved. The nature of the devil is gone when we accept Jesus. We must renew our minds and present our bodies to the Lord. That is a different thing than it would be to just be forgiven but still have the same sinful nature in us. If God can't change that sinful nature and we still have it after getting born again, then we are hopeless. We can't then live above sin. But Praise the Lord, the Word of God teaches that if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature. It says that old things are passed away and all things are become new.

God has made it possible for us to live ABOVE sickness. He has made it possible for us to live ABOVE poverty. He has made it possible for us to have peace and long lives and obedient children—children that will bring much delight and joyous. He has made it possible for us to be free from bad destructive habits.

I don't have space to write about all of these blessings and others that we have in Jesus in this one column, but I will be sharing in the weeks ahead bits and pieces of the good news about the Abundant Life in Christ. I also broadcast this message on radio 6 days a week of KBYP Radio from Shamrock. That's at 1580 on the radio dial and is on Monday through Friday at 10:30 a.m. and on Saturdays all morning. 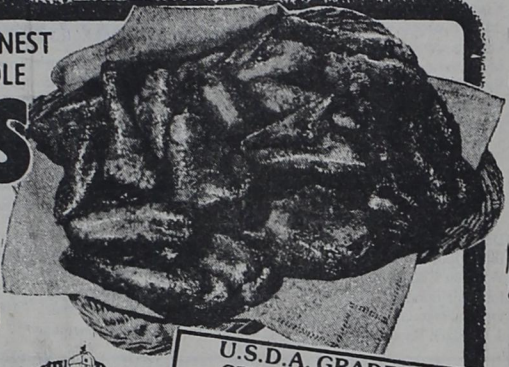
