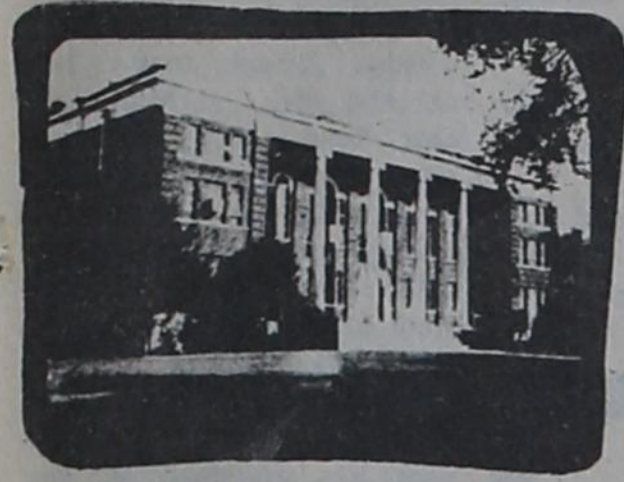

MARCH 4 IS DEADLINE Parkview Sets Election To Fill Election Apr. 4 3 City Positions

The Board of Directors, North Wheeler County Hospital District, has set Saturday April 4, 1981, for the election of Hospital District Directors. The election will be held jointly with the school trustees' election.

Three districts will elect directors this year. They are Allison, Briscoe and Mobeetie. These districts are currently represented by Louis Grayson, Allison; David Zybach, Briscoe; Melvin May, Mobeetie.

This election will be held in conjunction with the school and city election on April 4, 1981.

Any qualified taxpayer desiring his or her name to be placed on the ballot as a candidate for director shall file a petition signed by not less than five qualified voters residing in the candidates voting precinct, asking that the said name be printed on the ballot.

Such petition shall be filed with the secretary of the Board of Directors at least twenty-five days prior to the date of the election.

Petitions for filing may be obtained from Charles Hix, Administrator, Parkview Hospital.

Kelton School To Hold Election

The Kelton I.S.D. Board of Trustees called a school trustee election to be held April 4, 1981 in the Kelton School Building. The necessary forms to file for these positions can be obtained in the Superintendent's office at Kelton Schools.

Two trustees have expiring terms and one trustee will be elected for a one year unexpired term. Bob Hink and Glen Waldo, Sr. now hold positions on the board that are expiring. George R. Davis was appointed by the board to fill a vacancy and that position will be on the ballot as the one year unexpired term.

Candidates filing for these positions must designate if they are filing for one of the two 3-year regular term positions or the one 1-year unexpired term position.

The filing deadline for these positions is March 4, 1981.

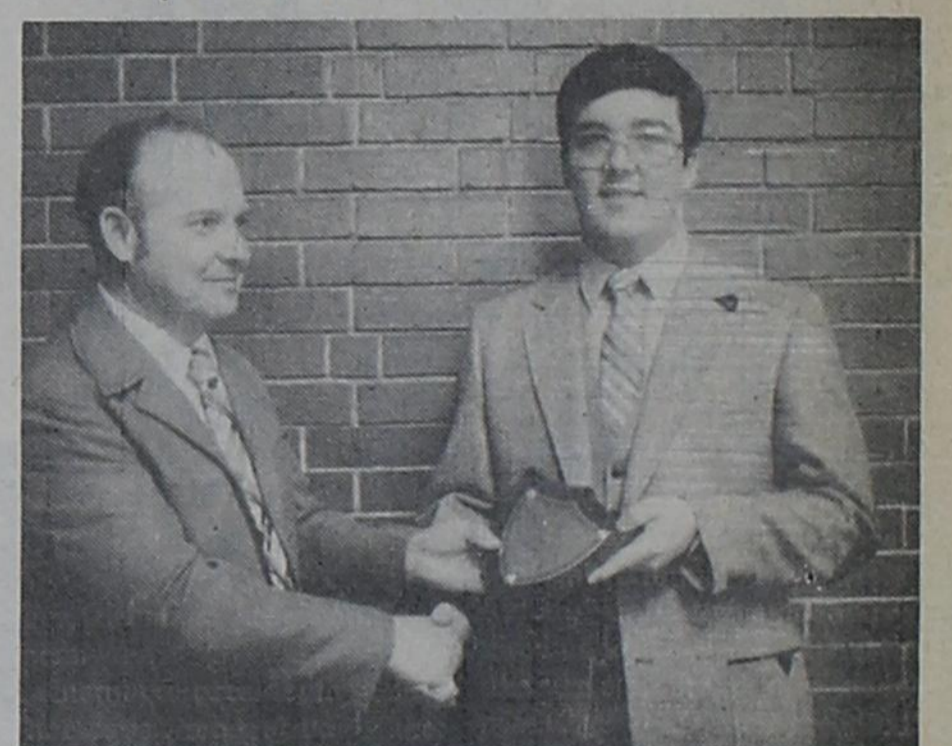

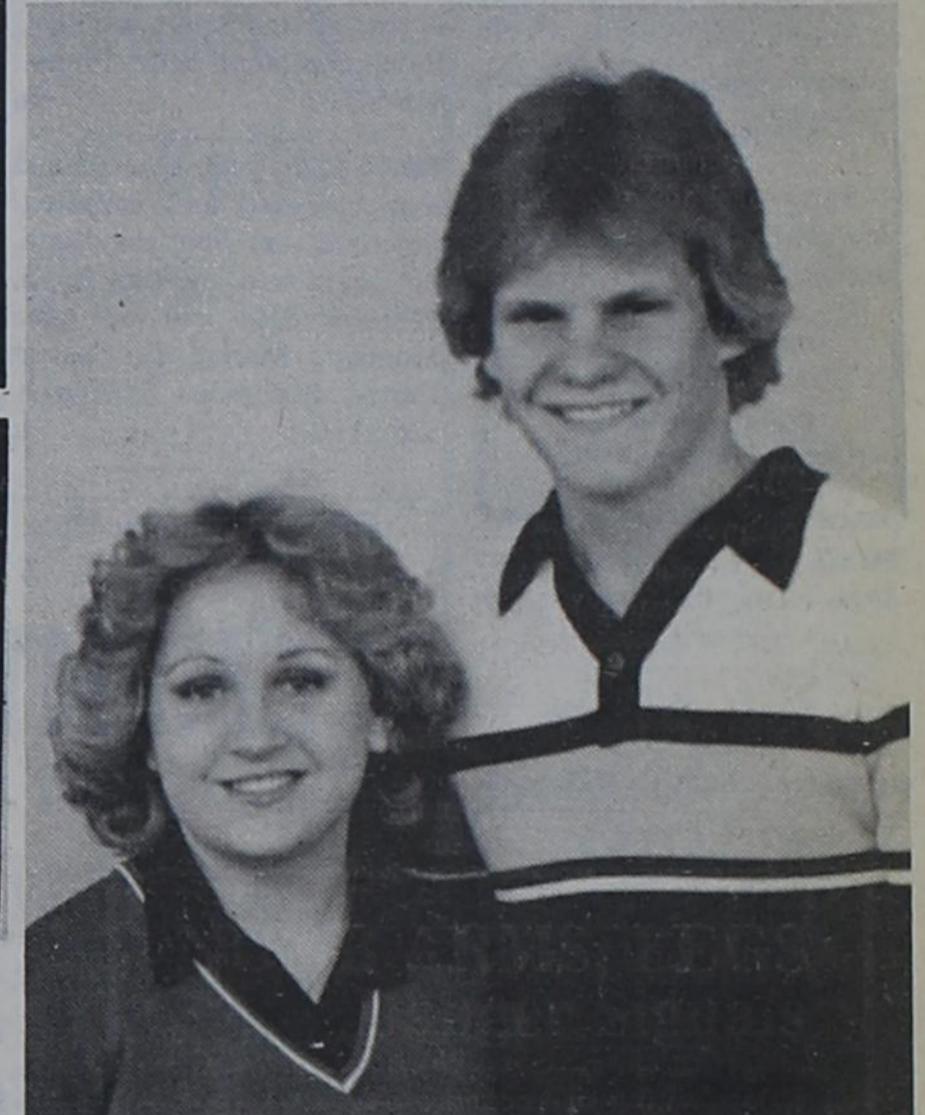
