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## WANDA JACKSON WILL APPEAR IN CRUSADE

Vivacious and versatile — talented and terrific — are the adjectives to describe the artistry of pretty Wanda Jackson. Wanda, a veteran star of Country Music in a relatively short time, has been singing and entertaining fans of Country Music throughout the United States, Canada — even around the world — since her early teens.

A native of Oklahoma, Wanda's talents were discovered by another great entertainer from the Southwest, Hank Thompson. Wanda confesses that much of the state presence and technique that she possesses was learned from Thompson when she appeared on many shows with him after first entering her career. Wanda has consistently been a best seller for Capitol Records and has thrilled millions of fans throughout the world in her personal appearances.

Aside from being a great favorite of country music shows, fairs, rodeos, and all types of presentations all across the United States and Canada, Wanda is one of the few country music artists who has been so talented as to record her songs in native languages in both German and Japanese. In 1971 and 1972

she was voted "The Favorite Female Country Music Singer" of the Scandinavian countries — Norway, Sweden, Denmark, etc., and just a few years before had received a tremendous reception from country music fans in Japan, Philippines, Korea and the Far East. In 1972 Wanda was chosen as one of the country music stars to make the first U.N./CMA sponsored tour of Australia, New Zealand and Japan, where a triumphant reception was received. Wanda has been nominated for the Grammy Award for Best

Female Performance twice. In real life, Wanda is a devoted Christian and lives happily with her husband and manager Wendell Goodman and their children in Oklahoma City. Although her preference is performing for the public and her religious work, she still finds the natural mother's instinct best of being with and caring for her family. A talented and versatile star of television, moving pictures and stage, that's the best description of Wanda Jackson.

Wanda will be singing Feb. 17 in the Larry Jones Crusade.

## Co. Jr. Livestock Show, Barbe Scheduled For February 19-21

Wheeler County 4-H and FFA members will exhibit their livestock projects in the Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show February 19-21. The show, sponsored by the Wheeler County Livestock Show Association, will be held in the Wheeler County Agricultural Center in Wheeler. The show will begin Thursday evening, February 19, with the weigh-in of animals at 6:00 P.M.

The show will get underway Friday morning at 9:00 A.M. with the lamb show. The lamb show will be followed by the beef cattle show. The market hog show will begin at 6:30 p.m. on Friday.

On Saturday, the barbeque will begin at 5:30 p.m. and the highlight of the show, the auction sale, will begin at 7:00 p.m.

Champ Davis, President of the Livestock Show Association, will serve as general superintendent of the show. Charlie Puryear, superintendent of the sheep show, and Gordon Estes, assistant reported that the sheep numbers have increased from 45 last year to a record 88 lambs this year. The lambs will be judged by Buddy Logston, County Extension Agent for Hall County.

There are 28 steers and eight heifers entered in the beef cattle show. They will be placed by Don Reeves, Collingsworth County Extension Agent. Paul Macina is the beef

cattle superintendent and Steve Zybach is his assistant. As in the past, the market hog division is the largest part of the show with 120 entries. David Zybach will be swine superintendent and Phillip Gaines and Gary Hall will be assistants. Keith Robertson will serve as judge.

Dr. Krehbiel states that the field of beef cattle production must take a close look at efficiency of production in the future. With land prices, feed, and taxes rising, the producer is meeting more and more competition for the consumer's dollar at the meat counter. From the economic view of the beef cattle business, there is every indication that in comparing the producer of yesterday and the producer of tomorrow, beef must be produced more efficiently in order to be a profit-making business. Dr. Krehbiel indicated that the beef production short course will deal with methods of producing beef at a lower cost and the ways of producing the kind of beef that the home-maker wants to buy. The course will include such important topics as nutritional requirements, winter feeding, minerals, vitamins, feed additives, implants, facilities, equipment, selection of bulls and cows, animal identification including freeze branding, crossbreeding, feeder cattle grades, diseases, parasites, reproduction, market trends and management for efficient production. The course can be altered to meet the wishes and interests of the farmers and ranchers attending.

## Short Course On Beef Production

There will be a beef cattle production meeting Tuesday, February 23rd in the District Courtroom in Wheeler.

Dr. John McNeill, Area Beef Cattle Specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will discuss cow herd nutrition and supplementation of cows during the winter. Dr. McNeill will also give a presentation on the brucellosis program that went into effect in 1980. There are several aspects of the program that affect every cattleman involved in selling heifers, cows or bulls. In addition, Dr. Carl Patrick, Area Extension Entomologist, will talk about internal and external parasite control in cows and calves. Dr. Patrick will also discuss the outlook for the grasshopper situation during the coming summer. He will also have information on the grasshopper control program of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service of the USDA and the Texas Department of Agriculture. Educational programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve all people regardless of socio-economic level, sex, race, religion or national origin.

## Beef Production Course

A beef production short course for adult farmers will be held March 9-12 under the sponsorship of the Allison High School Vocational Agriculture Department according to Mr. John Solis, Superintendent, and Mr. Ricky Smetana, Teacher of Vocational Agriculture.

Dr. Elmer V. Krehbiel, Beef Production Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University, will be the instructor for this course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Dr. Krehbiel has a strong background in animal production and genetics. He received a B.S. degree from Oklahoma State University in 1950, and M.S. degree from the University of Arkansas in 1959, and a Ph. D. degree from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1966. His graduate studies were based on selection for type and reproduction performance of cow herds.

Between periods of formal training, Dr. Krehbiel worked with the beef cattle industry as artificial insemination technician, beef cattle herdsman and ranch manager in Oklahoma. He also served as beef cattle research assistant in Arkansas, and animal geneticist for the USDA at Miles City, Montana. For two years prior to joining the Agricultural Education Specialist Program, he served as Area Livestock Extension Agent in Ohio.

The short course at Allison High School is scheduled to begin March 9 at 6:30 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture building. During the dates the short course is in progress, Dr. Krehbiel will be available to assist cattlemen with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Ricky Smetana.

Cattlemen interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Solis, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Ricky Smetana, at 806/375-2444, or 806/375-2433. An entry fee of \$5.00 will be charged. Beef Production Short Course certificates will be presented to each cattlemen who attends all the training sessions.

## Tax Statements

The four stages in the property tax process are Development of Tax Values; Meeting of the Board of Equalization; Adopting a Tax Rate; and Tax Collecting.

The first stage begins on January 1 of each year. The development of tax values by the tax Assessor usually will continue through July. The rendition period is when the taxpayers are responsible for asserting their rights.

The rendition period is the time during which taxpayers must assert their claims for tax relief. To be entitled to tax relief, the taxpayer must file an application each year. Your applications have to be filed with each appropriate tax office for 1981, during the rendition period. The rendition period is between January 1 and April 1 or April 30 of each year. The last date varies with each jurisdiction. Check with your local assessor to insure that your applications will be timely. The assessor has the authority to grant a 60-day extension, but only for good cause. The determination of what is good cause lies with each local assessor only. The best idea is to apply before the deadline. If you miss these deadlines, you miss your opportunity for tax relief.

Several forms of tax relief are available to Taxes taxpayers. Among these are Homestead Exemptions, 65 and Over, Disability, Disabled Veterans or Survivors, Productivity Values. These tax relief measures will be described in detail in the coming weeks.

## 4-H Home Economics Projects Offer Information

Youngsters enrolled in the 4-H home economics projects learn practical information and develop useful skills in a

variety of projects, including home environment, consumer education, child care, home management, clothing, and food and nutrition.

These project activities help members learn more about their roles as members of families, points out Linda Daughtry, County Extension Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. They develop a better understanding of parenthood, too.

Those in the home environment project learn to make their homes attractive, comfortable and convenient places to live. This has become a real challenge for many 4-H'ers with limited family resources. Members also become more aware of the values of old furniture as they learn to refinish and reupholster pieces for their homes.

Participating in the 4-H home management project teaches members to set realistic goals based on family values and needs. They also learn to take advantage of available resources to help them reach the goals.

Young people make consumer decisions every day. They select items for personal use and influence family decisions on household purchases.

Spending their dollars wisely is the goal of boys and girls enrolled in the 4-H consumer education program. 4-H members learn to distinguish wants from basic needs, prepare budgets and set short and long-range pending goals.

Practical consumer education activities help 4-H'ers shop discriminantly. They begin to look critically at advertisements and commercials, examine hangtags and care leaflets, study warranties and time-payment contracts, and compare features and prices of products.

As they become aware of consumer rights, young people find they are entitled to truthfully advertised products that meet certain health and safety standards.

As informed consumers, 4-H'ers realize their responsibilities of following instructions on products and using, not abusing, credit. They learn about exchange and refund privileges, too.

The 4-H food-nutrition program teaches that an adequate diet should contain a variety of foods daily. The greater the variety of foods, the less likely a person is to develop a nutrient deficiency. Food alone does not assure good health, but good eating habits of moderation and food variety

contribute to improving nutrition and health.

The 4-H food-nutrition program also helps young people develop skills in planning, purchasing, preparing and serving tasty, attractive and nutritious meals and snacks. The program urges boys and girls to learn by doing and to become familiar with the principles of nutrition as they relate to good health, physical fitness and an attractive appearance.

Sewing can be educational and fun for young people in the 4-H clothing program. These 4-H members plan and create attractive garments that express their individual lifestyles.

4-H clothing projects and activities are geared to different age and skill levels. They emphasize basic fabric selection and clothing construction that ensure wearable finished garments.

4-H members also develop consumer skills in purchasing ready-to-wear clothing, accessories, and sewing equipment and supplies. They learn how to evaluate and care for their wardrobes. They also try practical needlecraft arts like crocheting and knitting.

Information on any of these 4-H home economics projects is available at the county Extension office.

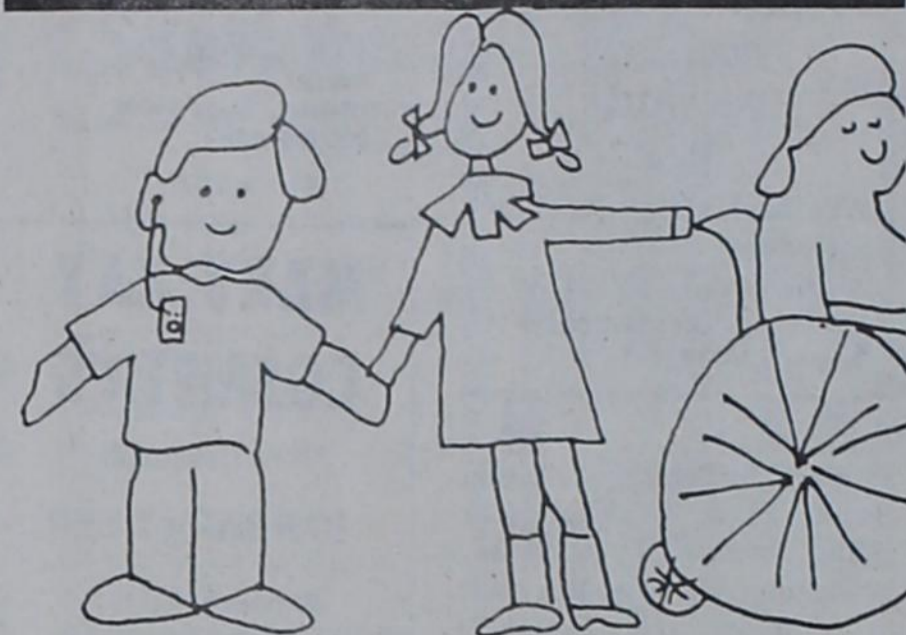

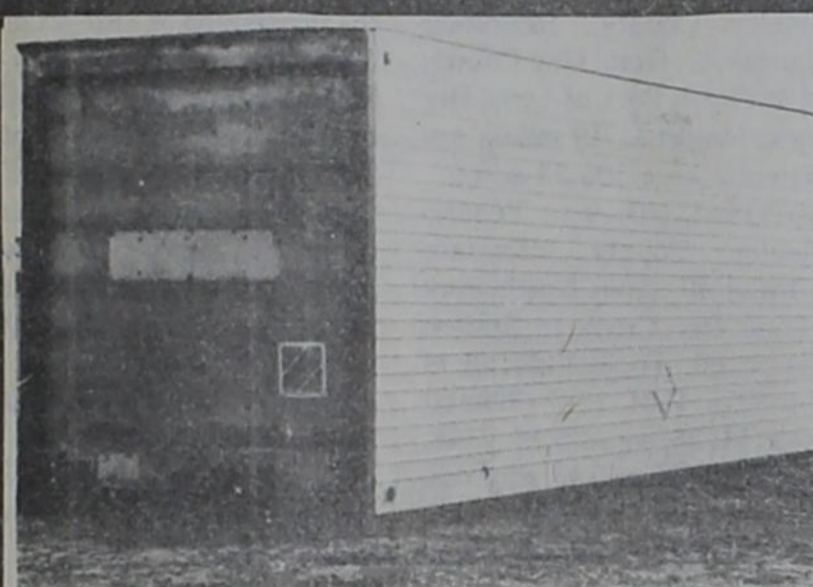

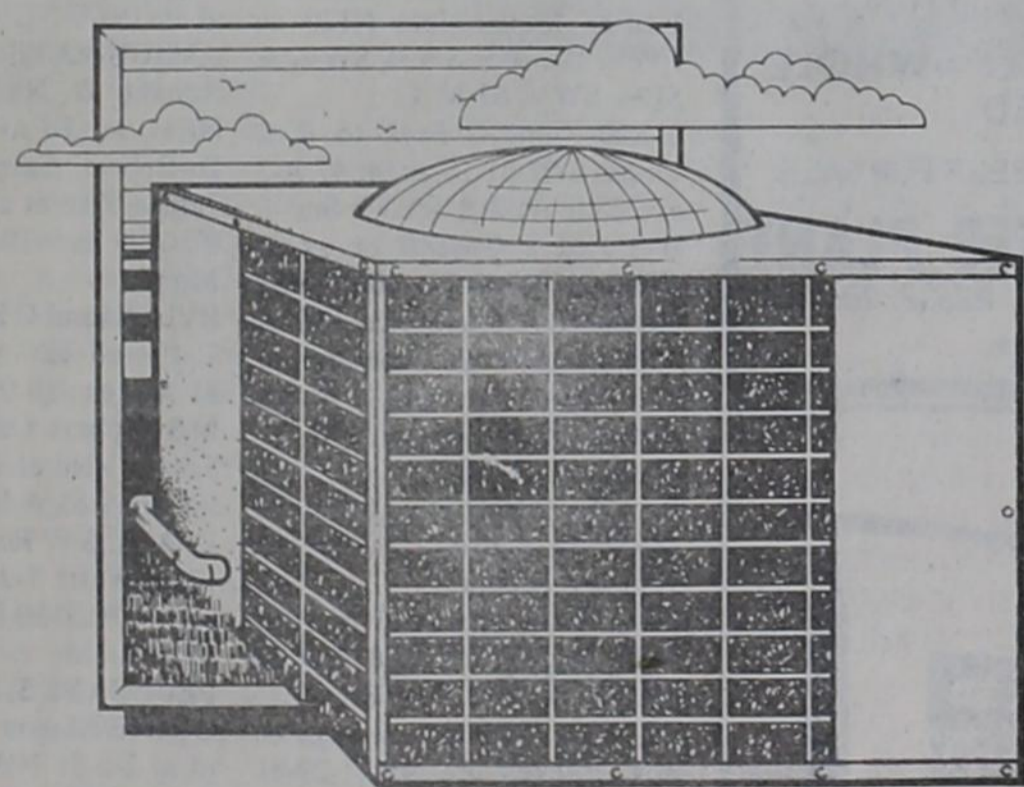

#### THE FLU — 1981

Influenza, or "the flu," can mean more than a bad case of the sniffles for the aged and chronically ill. Here are answers to some frequently asked questions about flu.

#### WHAT FLU IS

QUESTION: Just what is influenza, or the flu?

ANSWER: Influenza is an acute respiratory illness. Symptoms include fever, coughing, sore throat, a runny nose, and general aches.

Most patients recover completely within a week, although many continue to feel unusually tired for some time.

#### FLU DANGERS

QUESTION: Can influenza be dangerous for certain individuals?

ANSWER: The risk of complications and death from influenza is high for those over age 65 and for children and adults with chronic health problems.

These problems can include diabetes, severe anemia and disease of the heart, lungs, or kidneys.

In addition, patients who are on medications that lower the body's resistance to infection, are considered to be in the high-risk group.

Pneumonia is another factor that makes the flu dangerous. either "primary" pneumonia due to the influenza virus itself or "secondary" pneumonia caused by bacteria invading the diseased respiratory tree, is a complication that prolongs the flu beyond its usual one-week course.

#### FLU VACCINE

QUESTION: What type of influenza vaccine is being offered this year?

ANSWER: According to the Texas Department of Health the vaccine recommended for the 1980-81 winter is a trivalent preparation offering protection against B/Singapore 79 and two other strains, A/Brazil/78 and A/Bangkok/79. Persons 28 years of age and older will require only one dose of the new vaccine.

The Texas Department of Health is making flu vaccine available for high-risk groups through the department's regional public health clinics, local health departments, private physicians, and nursing and convalescent centers.

About 80,000 doses will be available free to high-risk individuals.

Because of the lack of exposure to previous strains, people under 28 who did not receive at least one dose of the 1978-79 or 1979-80 trivalent vaccine will require two doses of the new vaccine.

#### FLU TYPES

QUESTION: What are the different types of influenza?

ANSWER: Three types of influenza virus that have been identified are called types A, B and C. Research has shown that influenza A and B viruses change their genetic make-up slightly each year. The annual changes are known as "drifts."

As a virus changes or "drifts," immunity created by previous infection or vaccines becomes less effective.

In the past, influenza-A viruses have caused a major outbreak about every 10 years.

On the other hand, influenza caused by type B viruses have had widespread occurrences, but the disease is generally milder.

Type C viruses never have been associated with a large epidemic.

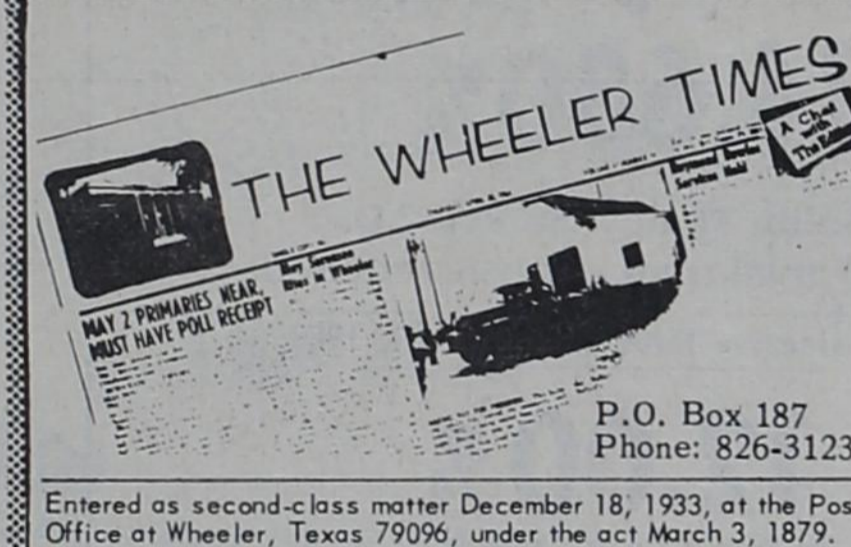

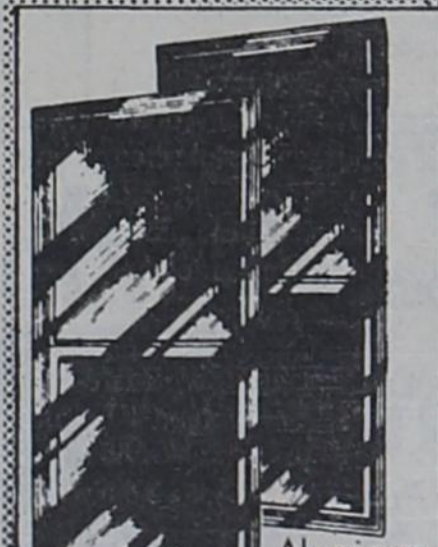
