



Tax **Statements**

By Charles Buzzard

Many essential services such as fire and police protection, street construction and repair, utilities, and public schools are provided for the benefit of the community and must be paid for by its citizens. All government bodies collect taxes to pay for these and other services.

The property or ad valorem tax is the primary source of local government revenue in Texas. The property tax is the only tax which is locally controlled, locally generated and locally collected. Therefore, the property tax is the one form of taxation over which you have the most direct control.

Yet property taxes are confusing to many citizens. They become even more confusing in cases where individuals receive three or four tax bills on the same property, all from different taxing units. In Texas, more than 2000 governmental jurisdictions

collect property taxes. It is very important that you understand your responsibilities regarding taxes on your property. While you as the Taxpayer have certain rights in the tax process, these rights go hand and hand with certain obligations. You may waive or lose the rights by not fulfilling your responsibilities.

There are four basic stages in the property tax process that takes about 13 months to complete. In the following weeks, I will go through these stages to help you understand your rights and respon-

sibilitites.
