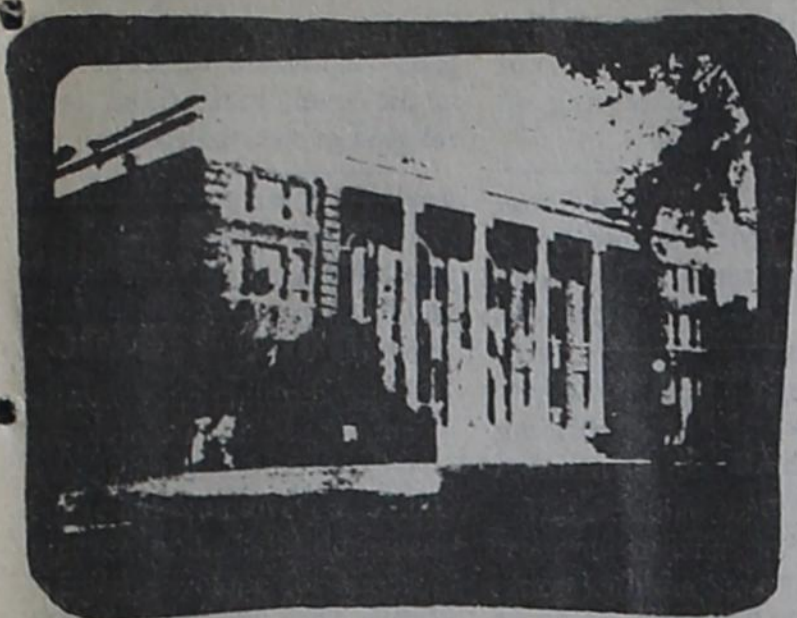
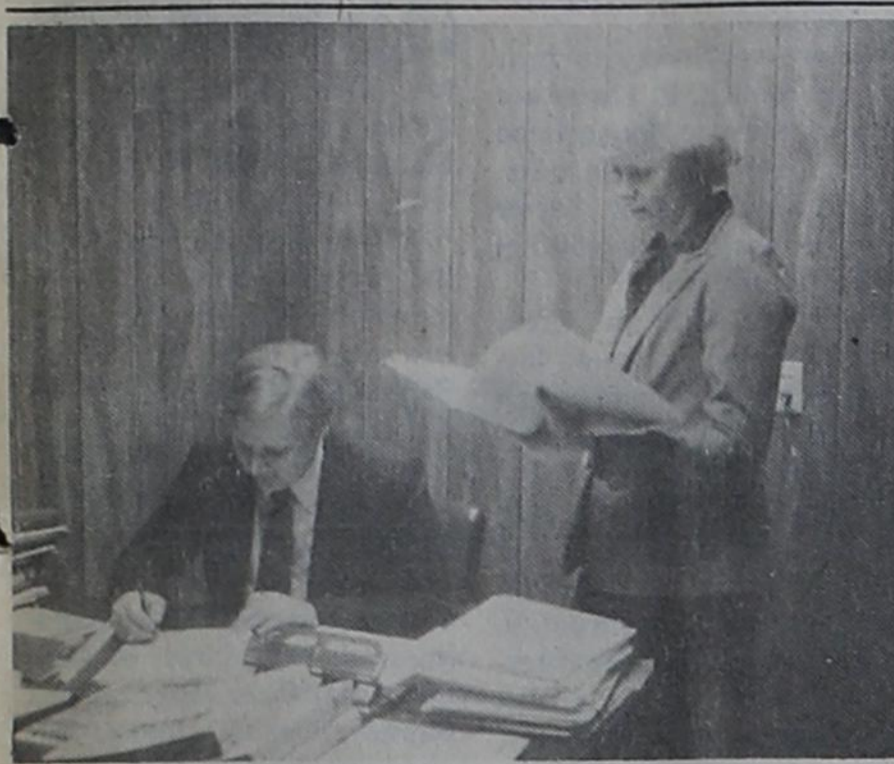

## RON HOPE IS CHARGED IN RAYMOND HAND DEATH

Ronald Jay Hope, 24 yrs. old of room 20, The West Motel in Wheeler, was arrested about 3:45 A.M. Sunday morning by Sheriff Doyle Ramsey and Deputies Art Allison and Joe Daniels. Hope was arrested on information from Beckham County, Oklahoma. Authorities that he was wanted for a murder that had occurred at the Hitching Post Bar parking lot in Texola, Oklahoma in the early morning hrs. Sunday, January 25. Hope had been observed driving into Wheeler by Constable Mark Frankenbery.

Hope was still in his vehicle upon arrival of officers at the motel and offered no resistance. Hope has been charged in Oklahoma with the stabbing death of Raymond Hand, also a resident of Wheeler. While waiting at the Wheeler County Jail to be returned to Oklahoma, Hope had what appeared to be a heart attack, and stopped breathing. Deputies Allison and Daniels were able to start Hope breathing again and he was transported by Wheeler Ambulance Service to Parkview Hospital where his ailment was diagnosed as hyperventilation. Hope remains in Parkview as of Wednesday noon. He will be extradited to Beckham County, Oklahoma upon his release from the hospital.

## Ala. Fugitive Arrested Here

Johnny Ray Cockran, 20 years old, of Hamilton, Alabama was arrested Monday, January 26, N.E. of Wheeler near the rodeo grounds and charged with being a fugitive from the state of Alabama where he is charged with probation violation and escape. Cockran fled on foot from the Sand and Sage Motel in Wheeler after Deputies of Sheriff Doyle Ramsey's Department went to the motel during a theft and burglary investigation. Cockran has signed a Waiver of Extradition to voluntarily return to Alabama and is presently in the Wheeler County jail awaiting officers from the Marion County, Alabama Sheriff's Dept. to pick him up and return to Alabama. Wheeler Vol. Dept. aided in the search.



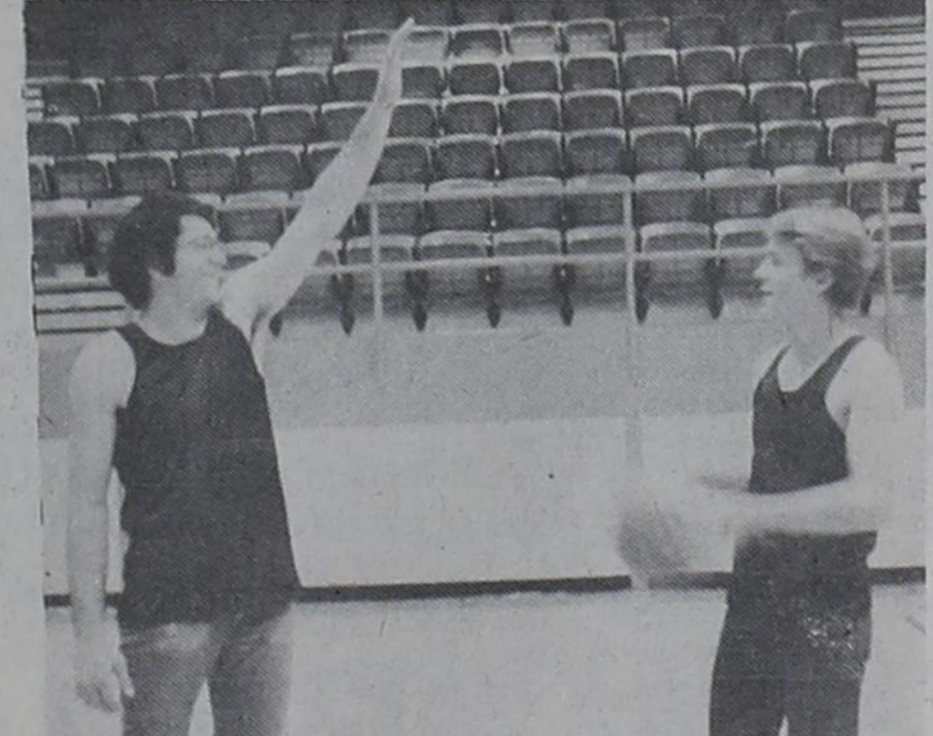

# Lines from Linda

## WOOL SWEATER CARE

Hand-wash wool sweaters at home to keep care costs down.

Although most woollens require dry cleaning, wool sweaters are an exception.

Before washing a sweater for the first time, trace an outline of it on heavy paper. Use a pencil or pen that will not fade or run when wet.

Label the paper pattern, and keep it to use each time the sweater is washed.

To wash a sweater, use lukewarm water and a mild detergent. Avoid using too much detergent—it's hard to rinse out of the sweater.

Never use chlorine bleach on wool.

Pretreat any spots with a diluted detergent solution.

Soak the sweater for five to ten minutes, then gently squeeze the suds through the sweater several times. Avoid scrubbing, twisting or stretching the sweater while it is wet.

Squeeze out suds. Rinse the sweater at least twice in clear, lukewarm water. Handle the garment carefully.

Squeeze out excess water after last rinsing. Lay the sweater on a dry terry cloth towel, and roll the towel up. Let towel absorb water for a few minutes.

Place the paper pattern of the sweater on a dry towel or sweater drying rack. Place the sweater on the pattern, gently shaping the sweater to match the pattern.

Let the sweater dry away from direct heat and sunlight.

When sweater is almost dry, turn it over to allow underside to dry more rapidly. Handle with care, and do not stretch sweater while turning it.

Use a straight stitch, stretch

stitch, tiny zig-zag or an overcast stitch that stitches seam and overcasts at the same time.

To finish the seam with a straight stitch machine, stitch

one-eighth inch from the seam through both seam allowances and trim close to stitching.

With a zig-zag machine, double stitch with zig-zag stitch.

Use an interfacing that has

built-in stretch where the stretch of the fabric is to be maintained. Use conventional interfacing where stability is needed.

Machine-made buttonholes will function better if they are placed in the opposite direction to the stretch of fabric.

Topstitching is an excellent trim to get the seam allowances to lie flat. Try a longer

stitch for topstitching—about nine stitches per inch.

When pressing, use brown paper strips under seam allowances and darts to prevent impressions from showing on

the right side.

## Winter Woes Of Colds & Flu

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## Texas Assessment of Basic Skills

Third, fifth, and ninth grade students from Shamrock, Kelton, Allison, Mobeetie and Briscoe Independent School Districts will participate in the second Texas Assessment of Basic Skills test program scheduled for February 2 to 20th, 1981.

The assessment plan, first of its kind in this state, is scheduled once each year under requirements set by the

Texas Legislature during its 1979 regular session. The students in the named school districts will be among 700,000 expected to take the reading, writing composition, and mathematics tests during the February statewide testing period. Each of the tests will require a maximum of 40 to 60 minutes to complete.

The school districts will report its district and campus aggregate scores to the public at a May or June meeting of the board of trustees, according to W.R. Burcham, district test coordinator. However, individual student scores will be reported only to the student, parents or guardian, and the school personnel directly involved.

"This testing program is designed to help the student and the school improve achievement," Mr. Burcham points out. "For this reason, results will be reported in a manner that will help everyone become more effective."

"Third grade students were added to the annual testing sequence for the first time this year. The three tests will make up an annual assessment effort designed to help both state and local school officials improve their services," Mr. Burcham says.

Overall student performance, both by campus and by district, will be reported each year to the public by the local board of trustees.

CTB/McGraw-Hill of Monterey, California will help administer the 1981-82 series under contract to the State Board of Education. The California firm will also operate a computerized inventory of all test booklets to assure strict security at all times.

"Each test question will relate to a specific objective or skill students are expected to learn by the time they complete the particular grade," Mr. Burcham points out.

"We use the term 'criterion-reference' simply because it is a short way of saying the answer to each question must lead back to a specific objective," Mr. Burcham explains.

Ninth grade students who do not make a satisfactory "exit level" score may re-take the test each year they remain in high school. However, they will not be required to take it more than once. Later attempt to improve scores and evaluate any remedial programs will be voluntary.

The annual test program will be administered by specially-trained personnel in each school district under the guidelines and supervision of the Texas Education Agency.

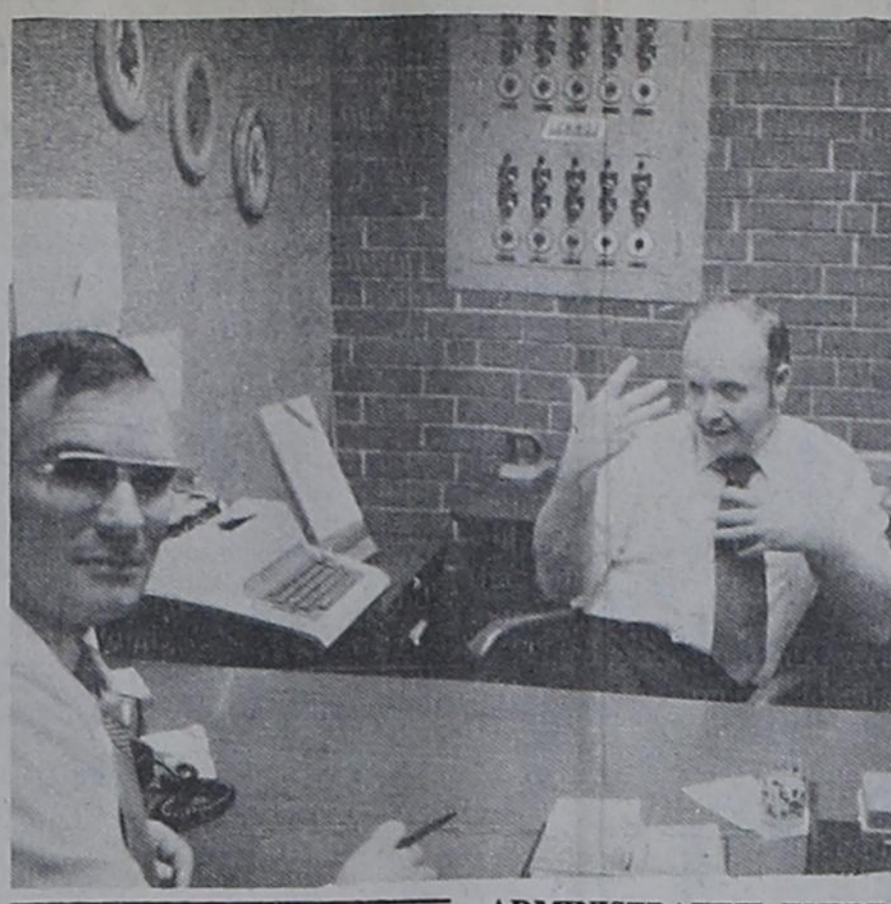

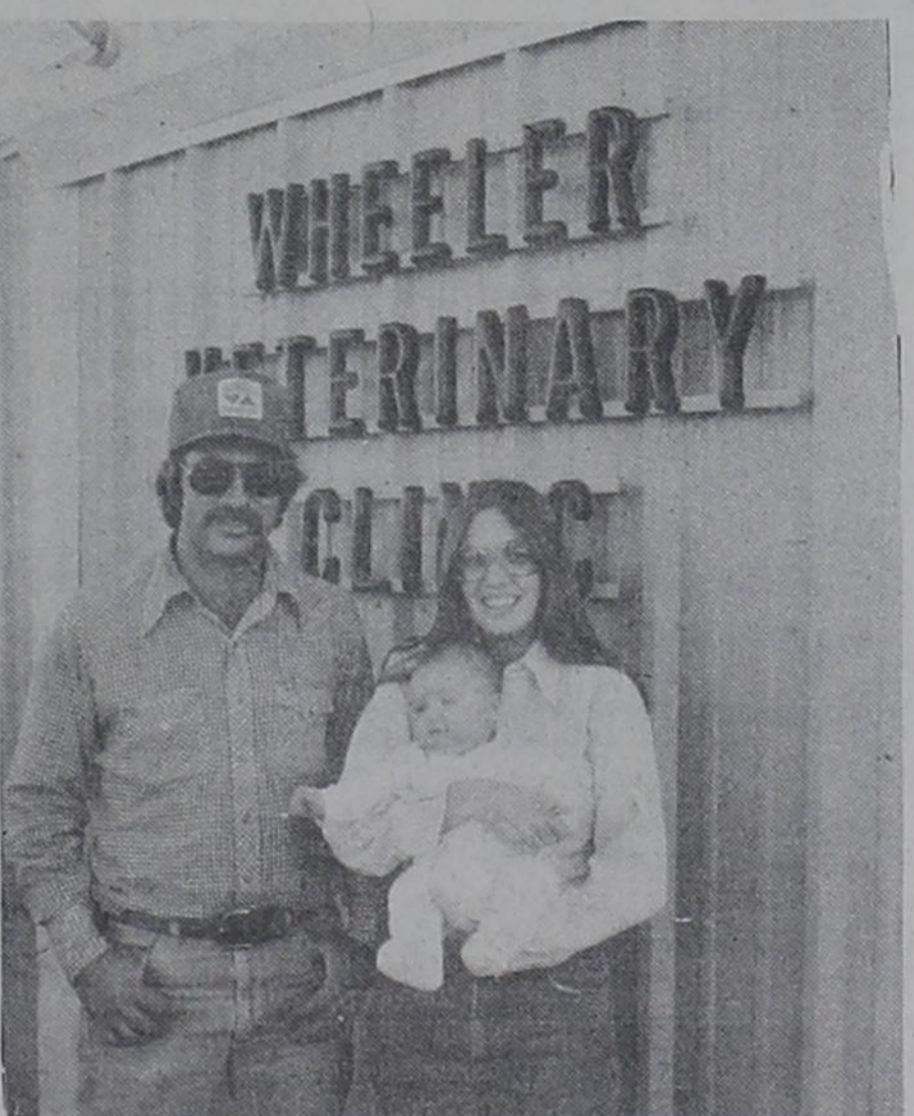

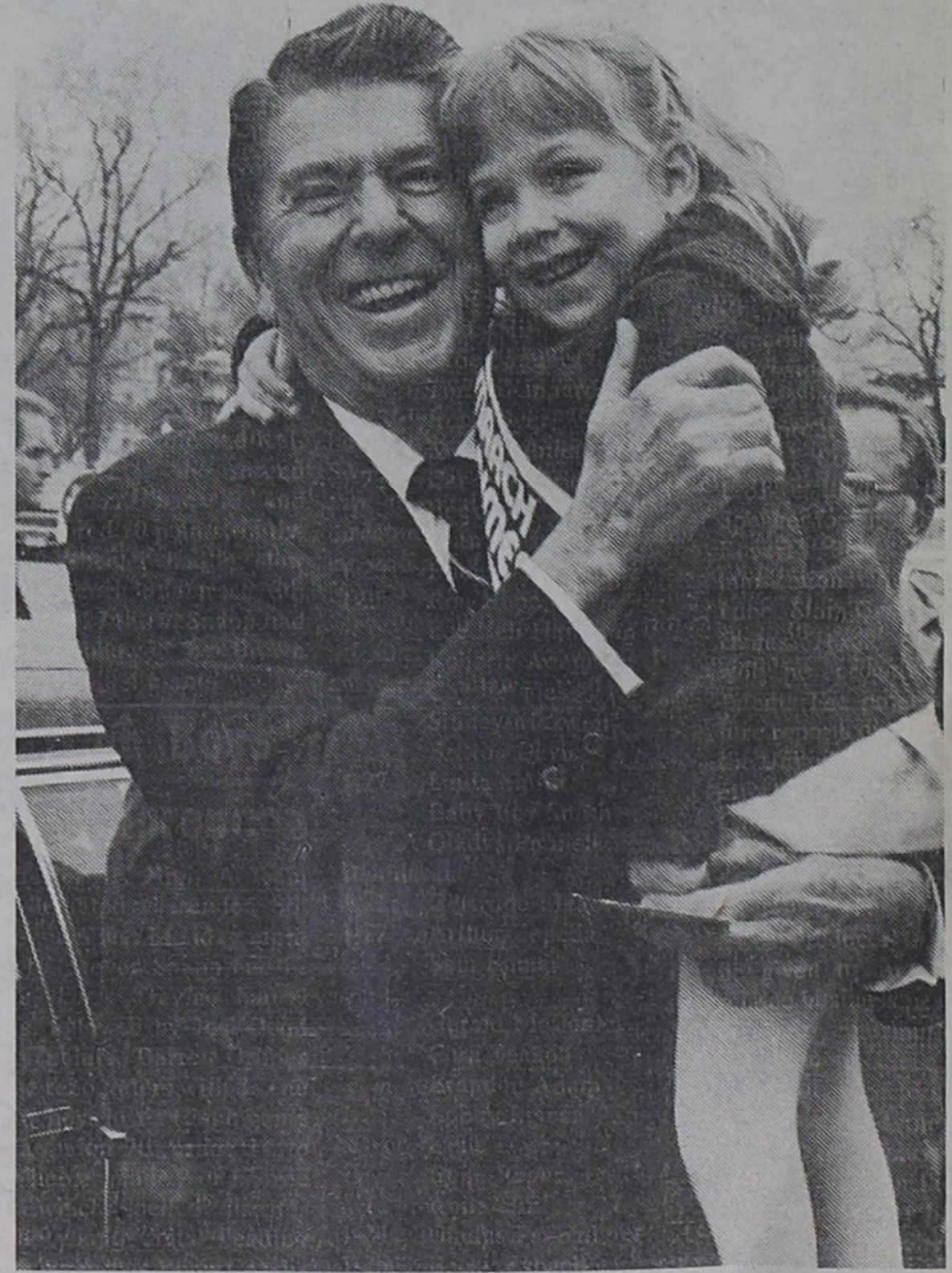
