Mothers March Sunday, Jan. 25

Wheeler's Young Homemakers of Texas Organization will lead the March of Dimes Mother's March for 1981. Chairman Wendy Cole challenges Wheeler citizens to improve the quality of life for future generations by preventing the needless wasting of children's lives by birth defects. In an effort to motivate citizens to respond to the needs of the Golden Spread Chapter March of Dimes for volunteer leadership in Wheeler, Mrs. Cole reminded citizens that the Mothers March on Birth Defects is slated for Jan. 18, 1981.

"Many of us mistakenly think there are no more frontiers to cross, but science has only begun to penetrate the world of the unborn. Medical authorities estimate that improved maternal and child care could have saved 14,000 infants alone last year," continued Mrs. Cole explaining, "the National foundation March of Dimes has dedicated itself to fighting birth defects and improving the quality of life for future generations. But, public support is needed to accomplish this goal."

Every year the March of Dimes Mother's March on Birth Defects is conducted in an effort to provide financial assistance, medical and allied health professionals at teaching hospitals and major medical centers around the nation. The programs range from investigating causes of birth defects, to providing prenatal care for "high risk" pregnant women, to skilled treatment of many kinds of defects, providing intensive care for critically ill newborns.

Mrs. Cole reminds Wheeler citizens to show concern for the health of our children by adding the stamp of approval to the efforts of scientists, physicians and health professionals who are confronting this challenge to our nation's well-being. Birth Defects are forever yours who help. Caldwell Will Receive Award

Genevieve Britt Caldwell, one of Texas' most active civic leaders, will receive the Distinguished Alumna Award from Southwestern University on Friday, Jan. 23.

The Alumni Association of the state's oldest university will present the coveted award to Mrs. Caldwell for her leadership "in civic, service, philanthropic and church organizations."

She is a 1942 graduate of Southwestern with a double major in English and in education.

A native of Wheeler and a resident of Clarendon for the past 32 years, Mrs. Caldwell was awarded the Texas Distinguished Service Award for Women in 1979 and was named by Beta Sigma Phi as "Woman of the Year" in 1978.

Her church, young people, the arts, and the search for a cancer cure have been high on the list of activities to which Mrs. Caldwell has given her time.

She served a double term as local Parent-Teacher Association president and receive a life membership in the National PTA.

She served as a Girl Scout leader and neighborhood chairman and received the group's highest award for volunteer efforts.

Active in the Donley unit of the American Cancer Society and on the board of the Panhandle Area Cancer Council, she was instrumental, through this group, in the building of the Dona and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center in Amarillo and was recently named to its Board of Directors.

The North Wheeler County Volunteer Ambulance service is accepting donations for the purchase of Lifepak 5, a portable piece of equipment for use in the treatment of those patients suffering from heart problems. In the case of heart and trauma patients, the heart can be monitored from the time the ambulance arrives at the scene of the incident until the patient arrives at the hospital, and in the case of complete heart failure, Lifepak 5 will provide the electrical shock which may result in the saving of the patient's life.

In 1979 with the completion of the training of seven para-

medics in the county, the commissioners approved the purchase of two Lifepak 5's—one for each of the two ambulance services; these have been in continuous use since installation in the ambulances. The local ambulance answered 176 calls in 1980 with sixty of those patients requiring the use of the Lifepak 5.

Both Wheeler and Shamrock have an ambulance equipped with Lifepak 5 and a third ambulance (without Lifepak 5) which was used as a "backup" when either of the ambulances made a transfer. The commissioners recognized the need for a fourth ambulance after several double transfers left the county with only one ambulance; a new ambulance was purchased in October and placed in Wheeler.

The North Wheeler County Volunteer Ambulance crew would appreciate your cooperation in purchasing a second Lifepak 5 for Wheeler. An effort is made to always leave the Lifepak in Wheeler if it is not needed in transfer, but the case may arise when the equipment is needed in two places at the same time. (Both ambulances were in service Monday, but neither needed Lifepak).

Lifepak 5 will cost in the neighborhood of \$6500. '54 Study Club has kicked off the drive with their donation. Again, these donations are tax deductible.

Jaws of Life Fund Drive

The Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department reports two additional donations to the "Jaws of Life" fund drive. A donation was made by T. M. Britt and a second by Dorothy W. Daniel in memory of Mrs. Georgia Wise.

Wheeler Being Considered For Convalescent Home

Mayor Pete Burton was informed this week that a "Certificate of Need" has been filed with the state health department for a 90 bed convalescent home to be located in Wheeler.

Provided the certificate of need is approved the principals of the company proposing to build the home in Wheeler are now operating five homes. Two are located in west Texas and three in the Dallas-Ft. Worth Area with a total of 607

beds in the five homes. The location of the home if approved will be in the Parklane Estates addition, located on a 300'x300' lot at the southwest corner of Continental Drive and Kiowa Street.

The proposed name would be Wheeler Convalescent Center, the estimate cost of construction, furniture, fixtures, equipment, land etc. would be some \$750,000.00 and would need some 35 employees.

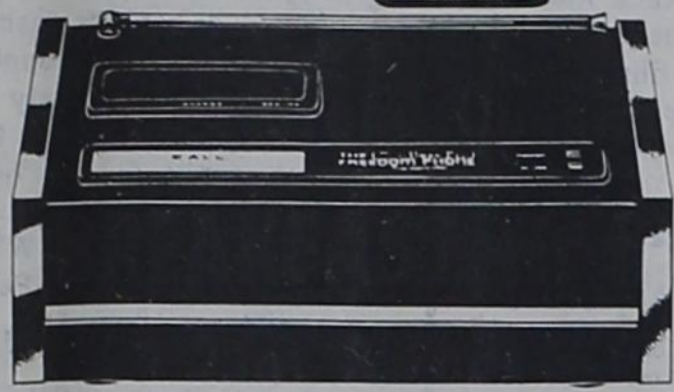

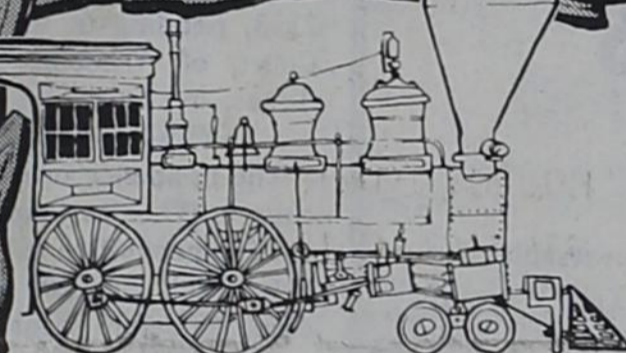

Many senior citizens carry additional health insurance to "fill in the gaps" not covered by Medicare, because Medicare was never intended to cover all the health-care bills of people over 65.

Saving Not Good Back-Up
Some senior citizens are able to pay for health costs out of their savings, but it's really not a good idea to rely on savings to pay for everything Medicare won't cover since it's often impossible to know in advance how large one's medical bill will be.

Carry-Over Insurance
Another idea is to carry over the health insurance you had before age 65, if that choice is available to you, but, of course, not all previously employed persons qualify for this carry-over.

Major-Medical Policies
As another choice, you may be able to get a major-medical policy which gives broad coverage of most medical expenses.

With this choice, you still pay a certain amount of your bills yourself (perhaps \$50 or \$100), but after the deductible, many major-medical policies will pay 80 percent of almost all your health-care expenses.

Catastrophic Coverage
The most important thing to look for in a policy is the catastrophic-coverage feature. Be sure the policy will pay for a long, serious illness.

'Be-Careful' Steps
If you are shopping for a health-insurance policy—or "medigap policy"—there are several "be-careful" steps you should take:

1. Try to cover yourself with one policy. Because of fear or

One study has found that 25 percent of the people with "medigap" policies have overlapping coverages. That is a waste of money.

2. Avoid single-illness policies—policies that cover only one type of illness. Instead, look for policies that will cover ANY illness. More insurance protection usually is afforded by policies that will cover any illness. Don't be misled by

salesmen selling cancer insurance, for example. A report by the House Committee on Aging concluded that some sales persons prey on the fears of older people to sell cancer insurance—the fastest growing and most profitable type of insurance for those companies.

3. Shop carefully before you buy, since health-insurance policies differ widely as to coverage and cost. Also, remember that companies differ as to service.

4. Check policy limitations concerning "pre-existing condition exclusions." Do not be misled by the phrase "no medical examination, but, also, it may not cover the illness you develop."

5. Beware of replacing coverage you already have with something new. Make sure you know all the facts before doing that.

6. Understand maximum benefits. Most policies have some type of limit on benefits, this may be stated in "dollars payable" or in "number of days" for which payment will be made.

7. Check your renewal privileges. Beware of policies that let the company refuse to renew your policy on an individual basis.

8. Know who you are doing business with. Agents must be licensed by the State of Texas to do insurance business here.

9. Keep a complete listing of agent and company names, addresses and telephone numbers.

10. Take your time in purchasing a policy. Do not let a short-term enrollment period high-pressure you. Remember, if a salesman is really a professional, he will not insist that you rush your decision.

11. Pay only by check, money order or bank draft made payable to the insurance company—NOT to the agent or anyone else.

12. Finally, remember that insurance to supplement Medicare is NOT sold by the government or serviced by the government. Do not believe advertising or agents who suggest that insurance to supplement Medicare is a government-sponsored program. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, color, race, sex, religion or national origin.

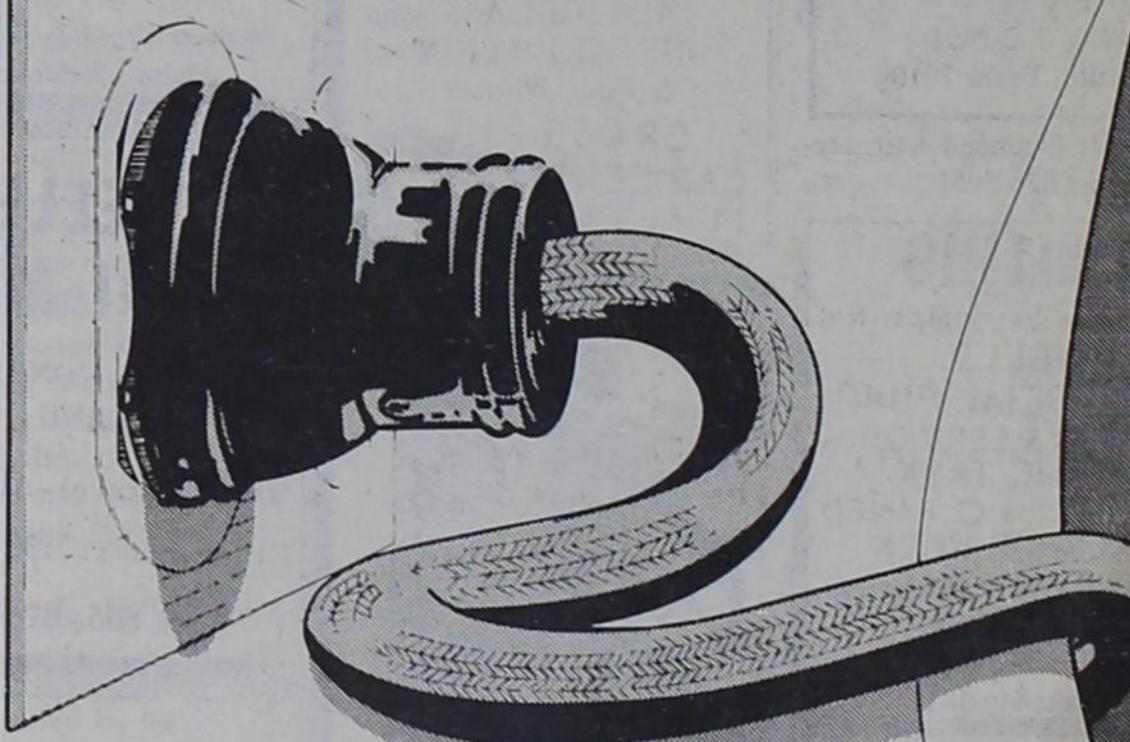

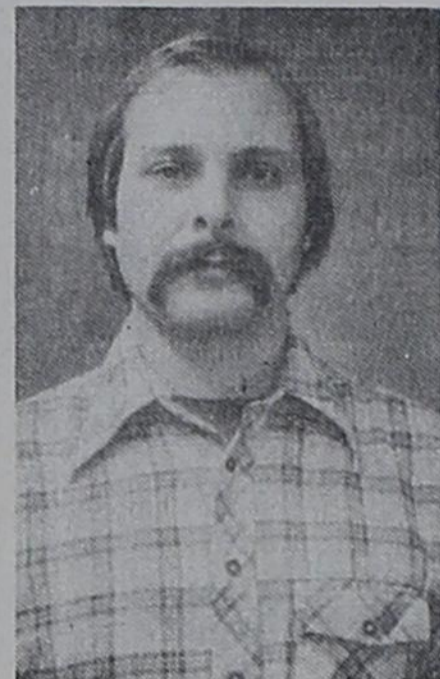
Jr. High Boys Beats Shamrock

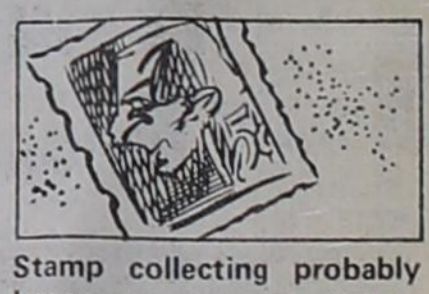
