Rural Loan Rate Increase

Talmadge P. Porter, manager of The Federal Land Bank Association of Memphis, announced today that the Federal Land Bank of Texas' billing rate on farm and ranch land and rural residence loans will be increased from 9 1/4 percent on farm and ranch loans to 10 1/4 percent.

The rural residence loans will be increased from 10 1/4 percent to 11 percent effective January 1, 1981.

In making this announcement, Mr. Porter stated that the increase in the billing rate became necessary because of the continued high cost of funds to finance the Banks' lending operation.

"While we regret that this action is necessary, even with the increase in our rate, it is still substantially under rates being offered by other lenders."

The Federal Land Bank Association of Memphis makes long-term real estate loans on farm and ranch land and rural residences throughout this area.

John 'B' Haning Services Held

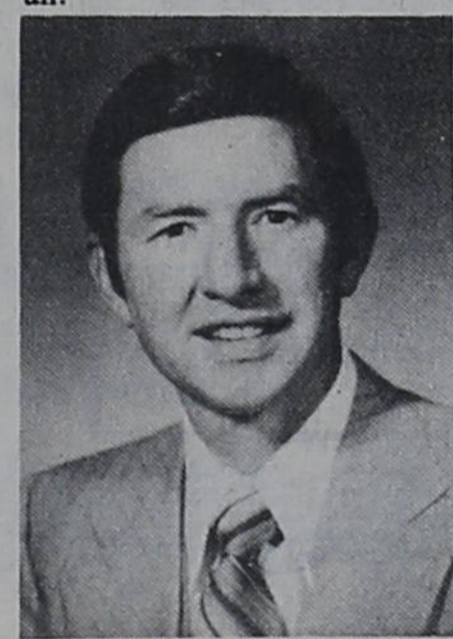
John F. 'B' Haning, 92, died Wednesday, January 7, 1981 in Pampa.

Local Ambulance Answers 176 Calls During '80

1980 was a busy year for the Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance Service. They answered one hundred and seventy-six calls. In 1979 the ambulance service received one hundred and forty-six calls. Of the one hundred and seventy-six calls, ninety-one were emergencies and eighty-five were transfers. Most of the transfers were to Amarillo and Pampa. Two transfers were to Oklahoma City and one to Rising Star, Texas. Three hundred hours were spent by ambulance personnel in caring for and transporting these patients to various hospitals for further care.

Sixty of the one hundred and seventy-six calls were heart patients, approximately thirty-four per cent.

No Excise Tax Reduction

The nation's telephone customers will not get a one percent federal excise tax reduction on telephone service during 1981 as expected.
 President Jimmy Carter signed the Fiscal Year 1981 Budget Reconciliation Bill Dec. 5 which contained a provision maintaining the excise tax on telephone and teletypewriter service at the two percent level in effect during 1980.
 The tax, originally 10 percent, was enacted as a "temporary" measure during World

War II. Congress voted in 1970 to gradually eliminate the tax, reducing it one percent per year beginning in 1973 until completely eliminated in 1982.
 The continuation of the 1980 two percent tax level during 1981 delays elimination of the

tax, and is the first time the reduction has not been made on an annual basis since 1972.
 General Telephone Company of the Southwest estimates continuation of the two percent level means its customers will pay \$4.5 million more in excise taxes during 1981 than if the one percent reduction had occurred.

Brown Named Score Chairman

W.W. Brown, former football star and retired Lubbock businessman, has been named Chairman of the Lubbock SCORE Chapter for the year 1981, it has been announced.
 Brown, who takes office as the head of the SCORE Lubbock Chapter on January 1, 1981, succeeds retired advertising expert Richard L. (Dick) Cook, who has served 18 months in the top chair.
 William W. Brown is known primarily by his "Coach" name, which has come down through the years from his football days. Not only does he readily respond to "Coach," but he is inclined to address all others as "Coach." Coach Brown was one of three brothers, all football men, one of whom was the late motion picture star Johnny Mack Brown.
 Coach Brown was born and raised in Dothan, Alabama, achieving his primary and secondary education there, before attending the University of Alabama. In addition to football, he also specialized in basketball and baseball. He was a member of the Alabama team that took on and beat Washington State in the 1931 Rose Bowl New Year's game, giving Alabama the Breakthrough for recognition of Southern college football process.
 He coached football at Dothan High School and moved to the football coaching staff at then Texas Technological College (now Texas Tech University) from 1946 to 1948.
 On the business side, Coach Brown began to work for his father in a men's wear store. He worked four years through college at similar stores.
 He was in business for himself in Lubbock, Texas, Brown's Varsity Shop, on University Avenue at Broadway. He retired from active business in 1978 and entered SCORE work as counselor in 1979.
 As Chairman of the Lubbock SCORE Chapter, Coach Brown will administrate and oversee all activities relative to the Chapter's work. As a SCORE working member, he will also continue to maintain his SCORE counseling assignments and will preside over the regularly scheduled monthly meetings of the Chapter held the first Friday of every month at the Headquarters, Federal Office Building, 1205 Texas Avenue, Lubbock, Texas.

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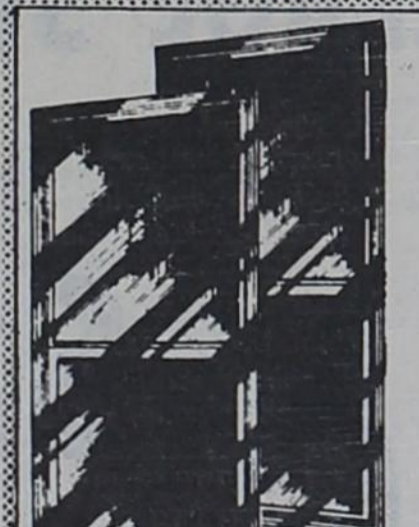

Successful Pasture Management

County Extension agent
This is the time to begin thinking about a successful pasture management program. It takes planning to produce the forage that will be needed during the coming year.

Dr. Frank Petr, Area Agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will present a program on forages and pasture management Monday, January 12. The meeting will be in the District Courtroom of the Wheeler County Courthouse in Wheeler beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Dr. Petr will discuss the various forages that might be used in Wheeler County. While lovegrass is the dominant pasture grass in the county, there are other grasses that may be considered. There has been a lot of interest in Old World Bluestem. Also tall wheat grass and fescue offer the possibility of increased forage production in sub-irrigated areas or where limited irrigation is available.

Dr. Petr will also have information on lovegrass management, including establishment, fertilization and grazing management.

This meeting is being sponsored by the Livestock, Range, & Pasture Committee of the Wheeler County Program Building Committee and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Everyone interested in forage production is welcomed to attend. Educational programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

Destroy Overwintering Garden Pests

A neglected garden site this winter can become an insect haven waiting to explode next spring.

So, it's important to destroy insect food supplies and shelter so cold winter weather will take its toll.

Ideal places for garden insects to survive are trash, vegetable stubble, unharvested fruits and tubers, boards, mulch, grass and weeds along borders and fence rows. Removing crop residues and disposing of debris, weeds and other volunteer plants eliminate food and shelter for many garden pests such as cutworms, webworms, aphids, wireworms, white grubs, millipedes, sowbugs and spider mites.

When garden plants stop producing, spade them into the soil or take them to the compost pile.

Deep plowing or spading will expose many insects for birds and other predators. For best results, till soil at least twice during the winter months.

Remember to not only keep your garden site clean but to mow and maintain its surroundings.

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
