SIX WHEELER MUSTANGS MAKE ALL-DISTRICT FOOTBALL TEAMS

With the conclusion of the District 2-AA football race, which saw the Mustangs tie for second place and notch a fine 7-2 overall season record, Wheeler was well represented on the all district team that was announced last week.

Garnering six spots on the first team offensively and defensively combined, the Mustangs also saw seven players selected on the second team and three were named on the honorable mention list.

Two Mustangs seniors and one junior were honored on the first team offense with the same number making the first team on defense.

Benny Baker, who gained over 1200 yards for the Mustangs, grabbed one of the running back slots and Wes Westmoreland, who was one of the most consistent players the Mustangs had, made the offensive team at tackle. Diminutive Arthur Zepeda was the lone junior from Wheeler on the first team offense and he made it at a guard position.

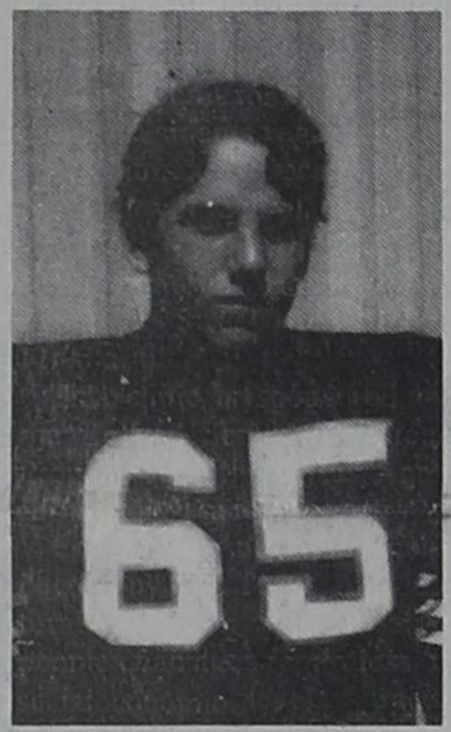
Defensively, the Mustangs were represented on the first team by seniors Benny Watson and Russell Gaines and junior Ricky Bond. Watson, another of the Mustangs most consistent performers was chosen for a linebacker post and "Mr. Automatic", Russell Gaines, made the elite eleven as a kicker. Gaines continued the Mustangs tradition of excellent place kickers. Bond, who was perhaps the quickest of the Mustangs forward wall,

was selected as a down lineman.

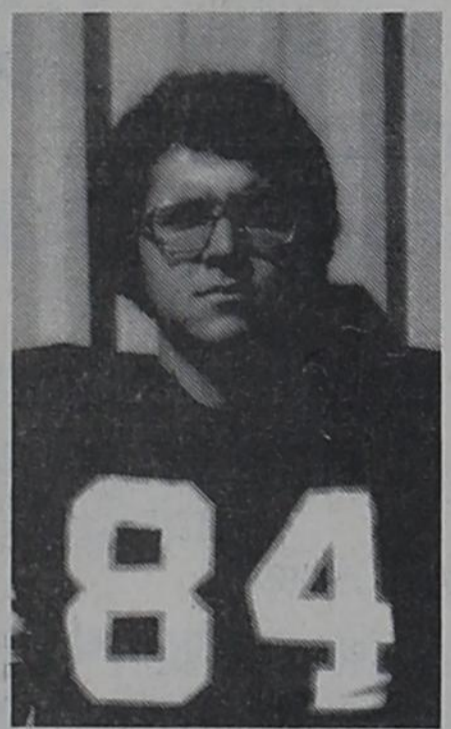

Receiving honorable mention spots from Wheeler were Paul Bentley and Russell Gaines at end and Bobby Jones at center.

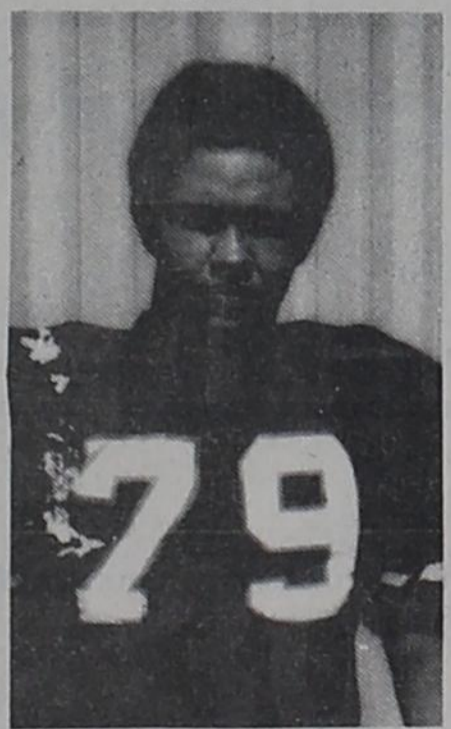

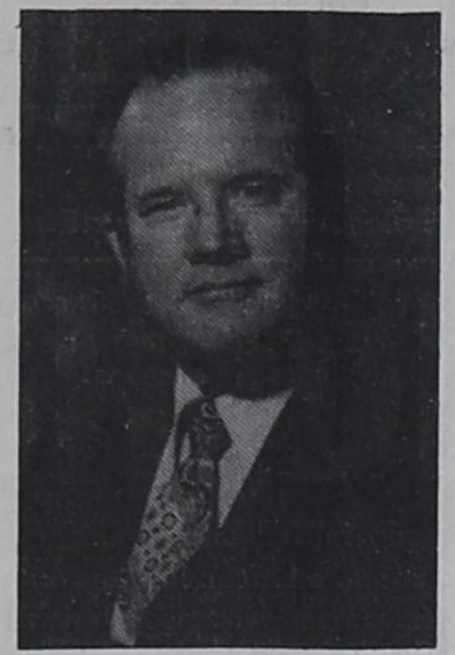
Nazarene Church Revival Date

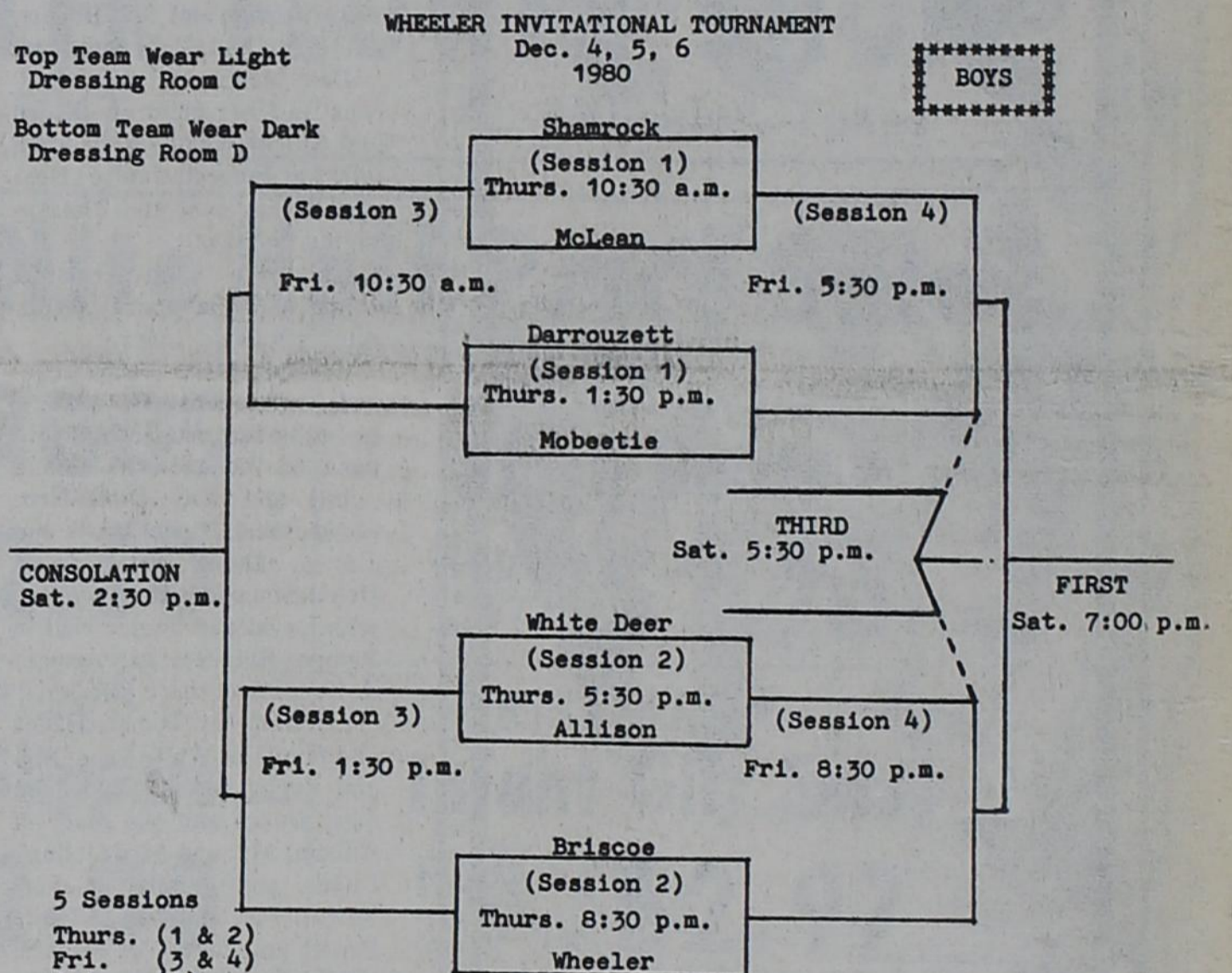
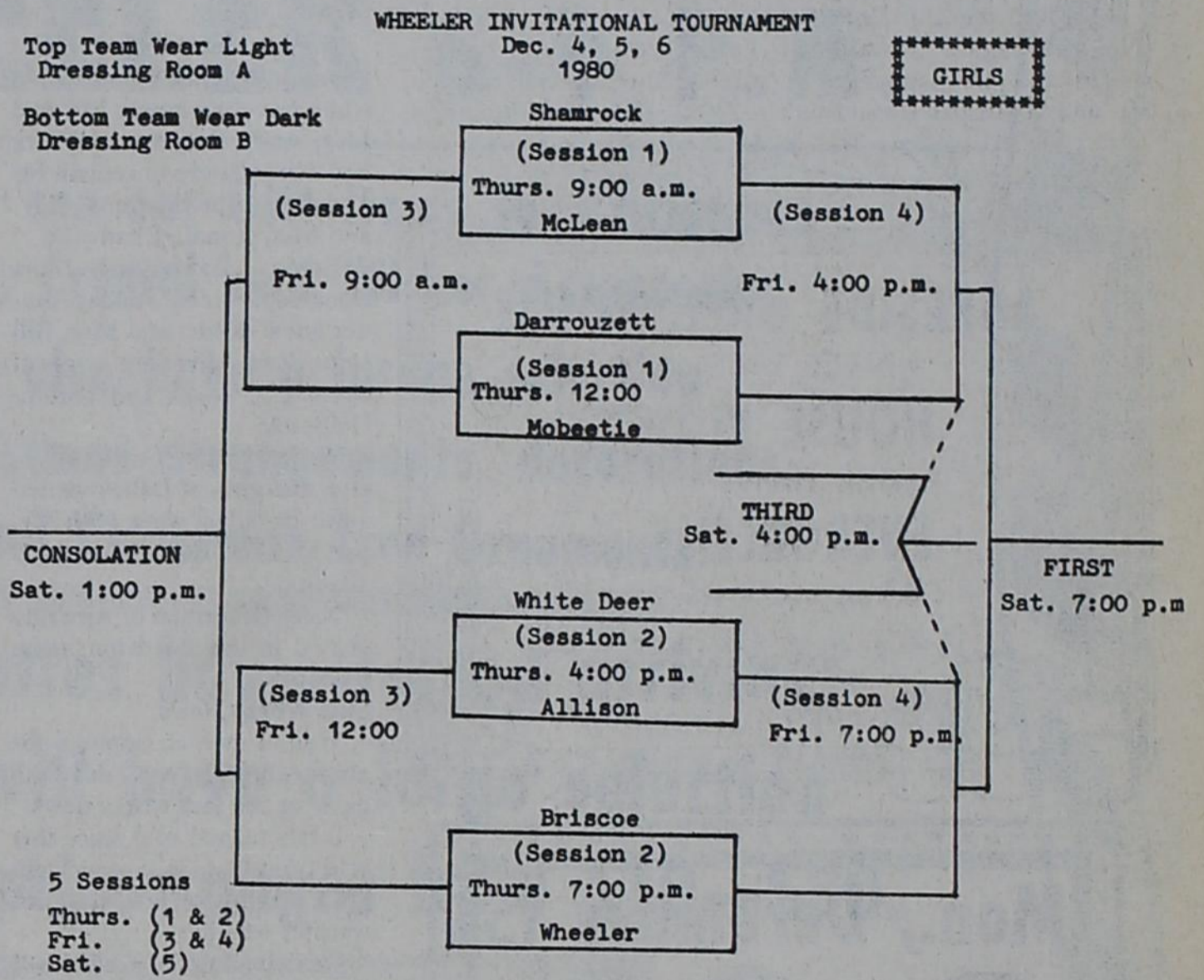

DR. TOMMIE A. HENNARD DIES; SERVICES ARE MON., DEC. 1

Dr. Tommie A. Hennard Jr., 51, a veterinarian and Wheeler county emergency medical service leader, died Saturday, November 29.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Monday, December 1 in First Methodist Church, Rev. Ernie McGaughey officiated. Burial was in the Wheeler Cemetery by Wright Funeral Home.

Dr. Hennard began operating the Wheeler Veterinary Clinic in 1972.

He was certified as a paramedic in 1979, after earning certification as an emergency medical technician in 1976. He took the emergency training courses when he learned the existing ambulance service would be abandoned.

He provided paramedic skills as a community service. He was a former president of the North Wheeler Volunteer

Ambulance Service, a non-profit service which was largely financed through his efforts.

He also served as Wheeler County representative of the medical council of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

Dr. Hennard served one term on the Wheeler City Council in 1973-74.

Dr. Hennard was born in Honey Grove, where he married Betty Jo Deyhle in 1950.

He received a bachelor's degree from the University of Oklahoma. *Continued Page 7*

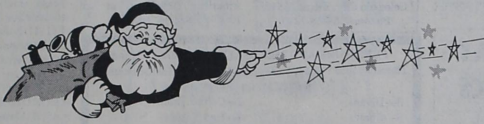

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

ERROR IN DELIVERY RESULTS IN DONATION OF TV EQUIPMENT

Christian Center began programming 24 hrs. a day on Channel 3 as of Thanksgiving. The gospel programs on this channel have been placed on the cable by Christian Center since May of 1978. For 2 1/2 years, it has been necessary for people of the church to be available to change the video tapes. Most of the time this had to be done every hour, and sometimes on the half-hour. It took a lot of time and a lot of effort by several people just to keep a few hours of programs per day on the channel.

Now the Lord has blessed not only Christian Center, but the city of Wheeler with the means to stay on 24 hours a day with the gospel. There is no natural explanation for how this came about. It is the blessing and provision of God.

A man in Illinois unknown to anyone in Wheeler received a video-cassette tape from Christian Center by "mistake (?)". The tape did not even have his address on it correctly and was not supposed to go to him. It had part of his address and part of somebody else's address in Ohio on it. Nevertheless, this gentleman received the tape which gave him his contact with Christian Center by means of the return address on the label. As the man and his wife began to pray believing that in the providence of God this was not an accident, they sensed that God wanted them to give to the TV ministry in Wheeler

some equipment to be used to advance the gospel in greater fashion than was already being done. These people are not preachers. They are laymen who have been used of God to help the body of Christ in various parts of the country to present the good news of the gospel via cable-TV.

Their gifts to Christian Center include an automatic tape-changing machine which will play as many as 12 tapes without anyone present to operate the machines. Then, additional equipment is programmed into the system to switch the machines over to a Scripture verse or an announcement on the screen with gospel music to come into your home until the programs start the next day. The announcement also is seen between each program. So, this gives Wheeler the privilege of having gospel programs or music coming into their homes on channel 3 24 hours a day, 7 days a week but with less effort on the part of the people of Christian Center. Tape changing takes place now once a day instead of every hour or half-hour.

Watch the TV page of this newspaper for the new program schedule. It isn't ready at this time. Miscellaneous programs are being shown, but no fixed schedule has been determined. No changes are planned, however, for the 6:30 to 10:30 p.m. time period that has already been showing.

Association Is Offering Membership

The Sheriffs' Association of Texas is offering memberships to citizens who wish to support the fight for good law enforcement.

Sheriff Doyle Ramsey has announced that citizens of Wheeler County joining in 1981 will become Associate Members of the organization.

The Sheriffs' Association of Texas was founded over 102 years ago as a professional organization dedicated to the preservation of peace and the protection of the lives and property of the citizens of this state, according to the sheriff.

"We are inviting the public to help us better serve them, by joining the fight for effective law enforcement," Sheriff Ramsey said.

"Membership dues are used to upgrade, professionalize and train our officers to better protect the men, women and children of Wheeler County."

"One problem we have is getting an application to everyone who might want to join," Sheriff Ramsey said. "If you don't receive an application by mail, you can pick one up at the Sheriff's Department, or you can send your name, address and check—\$20.00 for an individual membership—to Sheriffs' Association of Texas, Post Office Box 4488, Austin, Texas 78765."

The sheriff said all new members will receive a membership card, two windshield decals, and a year's subscription to the quarterly magazine of the Sheriffs' Association of Texas.

"I hope that every law abiding citizen in the county will take advantage of this opportunity to become involved in the fight for good law enforcement by joining the Sheriffs' Association of Texas when the membership letter is received," Sheriff Ramsey said.

Question and answers concerning Sheriffs Association.

Q1. When was the Sheriffs' Association of Texas First Formed and Why?

A1. Our organization was started 102 years ago. The original purpose was to bring together all of the sheriffs, former sheriffs and deputy sheriffs for the mutual exchange of experience and ideas and to defend the rights and ideals of the sheriffs' office.

One of the objectives has

always been to promote good will and cooperation among the sheriffs and all federal, state and city officials in the performance of our duties.

Q2. What is the Sheriff's Role in Law Enforcement?

A2. Actually, we have three major roles in fulfilling the responsibilities of the Sheriff's Office.

Number one—As enforcers of the law, it is our duty to apprehend all criminals and all violators of the law. We have the power to investigate all crimes, including major murders, traffic incidents, and misdemeanors.

Our second role is as an officer of the courts. It is our duty to serve all warrants and civil process papers and to provide courtroom security.

Probably one of our most frustrating roles is that of jailor for the county jail. As chief administrator of the jail, we are responsible for the rights of all inmates housed there. We must make sure that jail conditions are sanitary, humane, and meet certain standards being handed down

by the federal courts. Many a sheriff has spent his day in federal court because an inmate filed suit and jail standards were not quite up to par. The frustrating part is that many conditions cannot be remedied without sufficient funding, and county taxpayers are not likely to spend their money on jails in inflationary times.

Because of our varied roles, we're really involved in all aspects of the criminal system.

Q3. How did the Office of Sheriff Originate?

A3. The history of the office of sheriff goes back to the common law of England. The name sheriff came from the Saxon word "scyre" meaning shire or county and "reeve" meaning keeper. The Sheriff was the keeper of the shire in old England, and this has evolved into the modern day role of sheriff as chief law enforcement officer of the county.

The shire reeve (sheriff) was the local representative of the King appointed to represent the King's interest. It was his duty to keep the King's peace,

act as treasurer for the collection of the King's revenue, and preside over the town—the sheriffs court.

The office of the sheriff in America today carries all of its common law duties and powers except where they have been modified by state law or statute.

Q4. What are some of the current goals and interests of the Sheriffs' Association of Texas?

A4. Right now, we are concerned about the lack of manpower and compensation to do the job the public demands — and that they deserve. Our Association is working diligently to gather support from the public for more training and better salaries for our officers.

Our job is becoming more and more complex. The criminals we're up against are highly intelligent and involved in many complicated operations such as drug smuggling and organized crime. We have to be smarter to outsmart them.

Because of the long hours on the job and inadequate compensation, we are finding it harder and harder to attract qualified applicants to the field. The Association plans to survey manpower needs and compare compensation throughout the state in order to assess this need and better address it in the future.

We are also very much concerned about citizen involvement in the fight against crime. If we can gain more public support, much can be done at the local level to help prevent crime. There are many neighborhood programs that citizens can participate in to help prevent crimes such as home burglaries, drugs in the local schools, juvenile crimes and many more.

Q5. Sheriff, How many members belong to your organization?

A5. Over 1600 actives members in our Association which includes Sheriffs, Deputies, Federal, State, County and Municipal Officers. This year, we are expanding our membership to include the general public, so that local citizens can become involved in the fight to upgrade and professionalize law enforcement in order to more effectively combat the crime problem.

We are currently sponsoring a statewide membership drive to solicit Associate Members from the law abiding population. Those persons who join in 1981 will become Associate Members of the Sheriffs' Association of Texas.

Q6. Exactly How can citizens in our community become associate members?

A6. Anyone who has not received a membership invitation by mail can contact my office and request an application. Or, they can send their name, address and check—it's \$20.00 for an individual membership—to the Sheriffs' Association of Texas, P.O. Box 4488, Austin, Texas 78765.

Q7. What will the \$20.00 be used for, Sheriff?

A7. The money will be used to better train our deputies to protect the lives and property of the citizens of Texas. It will go a long way towards upgrading and professionalizing sheriffs' departments statewide.

Q8. How will the associate members benefit from joining your organization?

A8. They will be kept up-to-date on activities of the Association, current issue in law enforcement (crime prevention, juvenile delinquency, drug smuggling). . . through the quarterly magazine of the Sheriffs' Association of Texas.

Their money will be used to support good law enforcement which in turn will insure them of better service and security.

In addition, all new members will receive a membership card, two windshield decals, and a year's subscription to our magazine.

Q9. Sheriff, do you really think the public should be involved?

A9. Definitely! The public cannot afford to look the other way and leave law enforcement to a handful of people. They must keep abreast of the issues, realize the kinds of things we're facing in our everyday jobs, and help us upgrade law enforcement. After all, it's everyone's life and property we are protecting.

The A and B team boys will travel to Memphis on December 4. The games will start at 5:00.

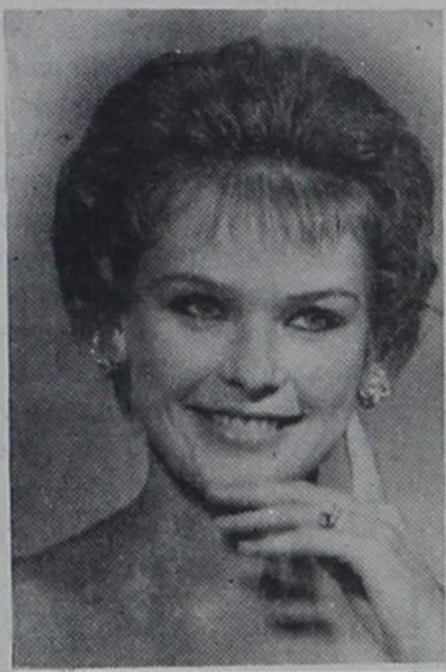

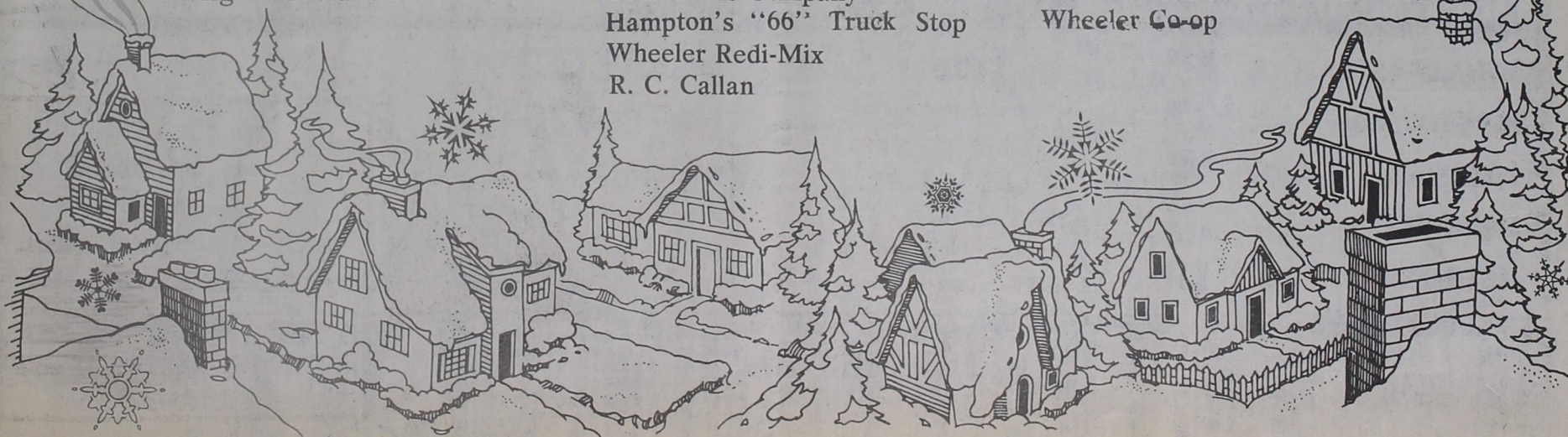
