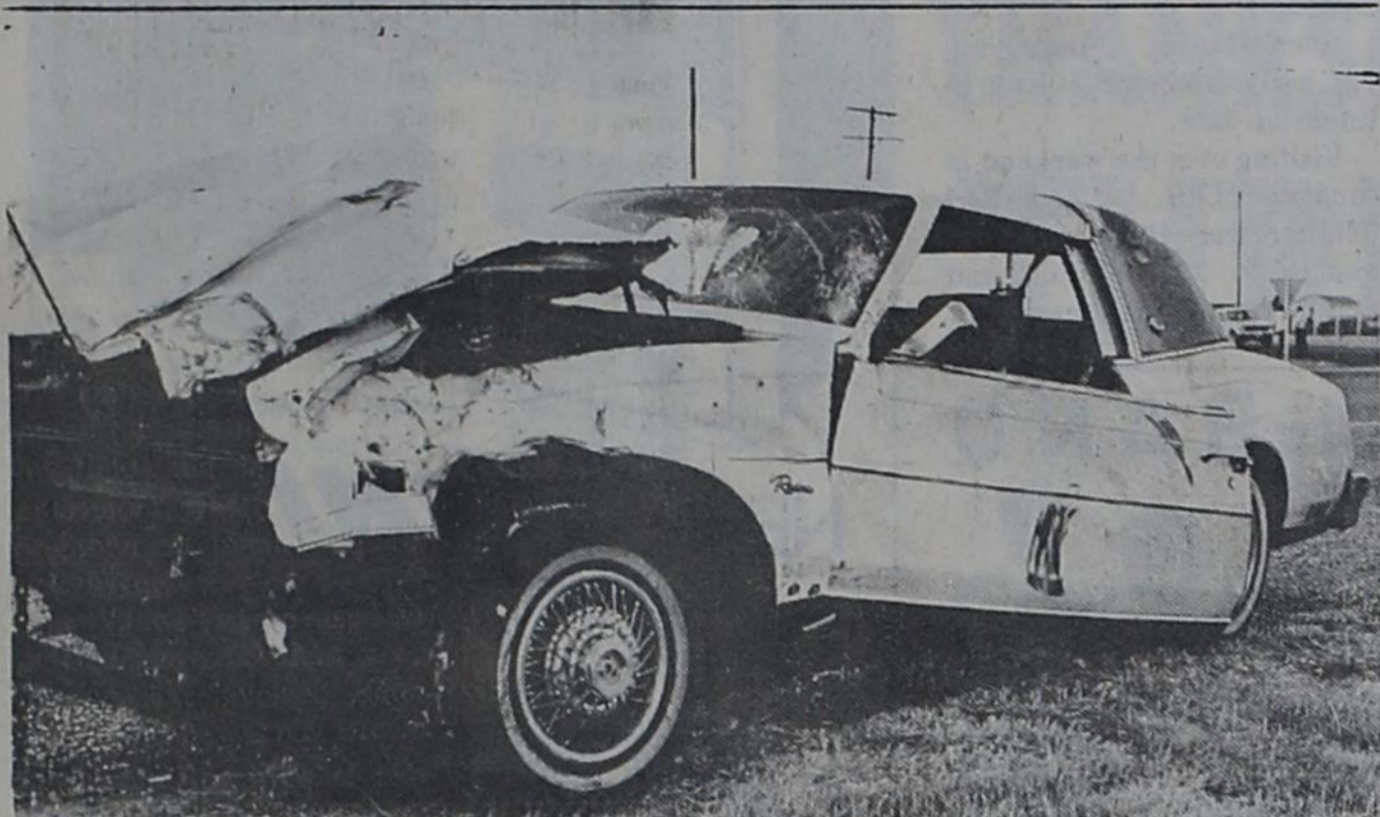

### Beth, Ora B. Stiles Killed In Accident Near Pampa

Miss Elizabeth "Beth" Mackey Stiles, 77, and Mrs. Ora B. Stiles, 72, were killed Saturday afternoon in a two vehicle accident. The collision of the Stiles vehicle and a Pampa Ambulance occurred at the intersection of Highway 60 and Loop 171. The driver of the ambulance, Jay Kraft, 19, of Pampa, died Monday in Amarillo from injuries received in the accident. The sisters-in-law were traveling east on U.S. 60. The ambulance driven by Kraft was traveling north on Loop 171; Loop 171 traffic has stop signs. The vehicles collided in the left-hand lane of the east-bound traffic; the highway is 4-lane at this intersection. The ambulance rolled following the collision. Both women were pronounced dead-on-arrival at Highland General in Pampa. Joint services for the two women were held Monday, November 10, in the First United Methodist Church in Wheeler with Rev. Ernie McGaughey, pastor, and Rev. Jerry Hogan, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in the Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of Wright Funeral Home. Miss Elizabeth "Beth" M. Stiles, a member of a pioneer family, was born in Mobeetie and moved with her family to the Stiles ranch east of Wheeler in 1905. Miss Stiles taught school from 1924 to 1930 in the Wheeler schools, and from 1930 to 1933 in the Rock school. She then taught in the Kelton school until 1948. She was a member of the Methodist Church. She is survived by one brother, Gordon Stiles of Wheeler, and five nieces and nephews. ingsworth, John C. Vise, Don Whiteley. Mrs. Ora B. Stiles was born in Wheeler County with her family in 1920. Her father, the Rev. A. C. after the host Wildcats took advantage of a fumble recovery at the Wheeler 34 to put the first points on the board. Hopes of the Wildcats and Mustangs really proved academic when the Clarendon Bronchos swamped the Wellington Skyrockets on the same night to clinch a playoff berth. A 15 yard pass from Shafer to Craig Young on the Wildcats first play from scrimmage set the pattern for the Wildcats attack and the Wildcats then stayed on the ground to take a 6-0 lead at just 8:52 of the first quarter. Wheeler drove to the Canadian 18 following the kickoff but another fumble killed the drive at the 22. In fact, the Mustangs were in Wildcat country three times in the first half only to come up naught as drives were stopped at the Canadian 22, 43, and 10. In between these threats by Wheeler, Canadian put together drives of 80 yards and 69 yards to touchdowns and gave the Wildcats their 20-0 lead at halftime that was to stand up against the Mustangs second half charge. Once more it was the passing of Shafer that did the dirty work and he hit Dennis McPherson with one scoring toss covering 26 yards to cap an 80 yard drive and his second TD pass was 22 yards to Van Morrow. A miraculous catch of a pass from Scott Wright by Mike Gallagher was good for 35 yards on the Mustangs first possession of the second half and kept a 66 yard drive alive that was culminated with

Gallagher going over for the 1 and with Russell Gaines extra point kick, the Mustangs were back in the game. Stopping the Wildcats on fourth down at the Wheeler 17 three plays deep into the final twelve minutes, the Mustangs launched their final scoring drive that covered the 83 yards in 13 plays and saw the Mustangs overcome two procedure penalties in the process. A big pass play from Wright to Gaines for 27 yards got the Mustangs out of the hole at their 12 and with the Wildcats

keying on the inside running of Benny Baker, the horses turned their ground game to the outside and this moved the Mustangs to the Canadian 23 from where Wright hit Gallagher with the 23 yard scoring pass that just missed being intercepted. Gaines kick put the Mustangs within 6 at 6:11. Driving for perhaps the winning touchdown, the Mustangs stumbled at the Wildcat 34 with a lost fumble and even though the Mustangs had once last desperate shot in the last minute, the Wildcats hung on for the 20-14 victory.

### THOSE FABULOUS WINTER COATS

**HOW TO BUY!**  
Buying knowhow for today's winter coat can make your winter one of those "fabulous winter coats" you've always wanted to own.

A winter coat is the most expensive single clothing purchase for most people.

Although a coat may not be purchased each year, it's important to choose one that meets your needs-to get the most for your money.

**Get Maximum Warmth**  
For maximum warmth, look for these design features: Hood that fits closely around the head. Neckline that fastens securely under the chin—perhaps with a turn-up or stand-up collar that closes with a tab.

Remember, a fur collar that stands away from the neck may look warm, but unless it can be buttoned or secured closely, it won't be warm.

Sleeves that are long and narrow and cover the wrists. Inside cuffs add even more warmth.

Front closures that are secure—such as buttons or zippers with protective flaps—and that extend all the way down the front.

Full length coats are the warmest. At least, make sure they cover the torso.

Extra capes, scarves or shawls that provide insulation around the shoulders and head also add extra warmth.

Deep pockets that are big enough to hold your whole hand are a "must."

Belts at the waist will keep wind out. Big, unfitted coats allow cold air to circulate.

Double-breasted styling or a wide front overlap on lapels

will make the coat less likely to flip open.

Flared skirt on a woman's full-length coat will provide extra insulation while she's standing and full cover when she's sitting.

Easy fit will allow the coat to go over heavy sweaters or suits.

Finally, you may not be able to find any coat that includes all the above features, but a warm coat will have many of them.

**Layers Ensure Warmth**  
Also, in looking for a coat, think about the layers you'll have for ensuring warmth.

There are three key layers: a protective outer layer, an insulative middle layer and a breathing layer underneath.

**Breathing Layer**  
Regular daytime clothing worn under coats usually has the breathing layer usually.

This provides comfort and allows perspiration to move away from the body, especially if the clothing is made of

absorbent fibers, such as cotton or rayon.

In the coat itself, the main concerns are the protective outer layer and the insulative layer.

**Protective Layer**  
A coat's outer protective layer acts as a wind barrier, and it can shield against rain or snow. Also, it must be an attractive, fashionable fabric.

This layer doesn't have to be thick, but it must block the wind. It has a "bonus" feature if it's water repellent, too (NOT WATERPROOF).

Materials with protective characteristics are: tightly woven nylon taffeta, ripstop or sharkskin fabrics, polyester and cotton blends or 100 percent textured polyester twills and poplins, tightly woven and napped wool fabrics.

Leathers, on the other hand, such as calfskin, pigskin and sheepskin, are good wind barriers, but they may be damaged if exposed to rain.

Manmade films, such as

vinyl and polyurethane, are made to imitate real leathers, and they are wind and water repellent, but they may stiffen and crack in cold weather.

**Water Repellent**  
Water-repellent finishes are often added to polyester/cotton blend coat fabrics.

These finishes help fabrics resist stains and moisture, and they allow them to "breathe" or transfer air and moisture to the outside.

On the contract, waterproof, finishes seal the spaces between yarns on fabrics and make garments more uncomfortable as a result.

**Insulative Middle Layer**  
The insulative quality of a coat holds "still" air close to the body.

Again, most coats are more comfortable if they're made of lightweight fabrics, and this is just as true for the insulative middle layer as it is for the protective outer layer.

Good insulative fabrics are wool and wool blends in flannels, tweeds, gabardines, heringbones or houndstooth.

Other good insulators are foam laminate, flocked, quilted, fur and pile fabrics.
