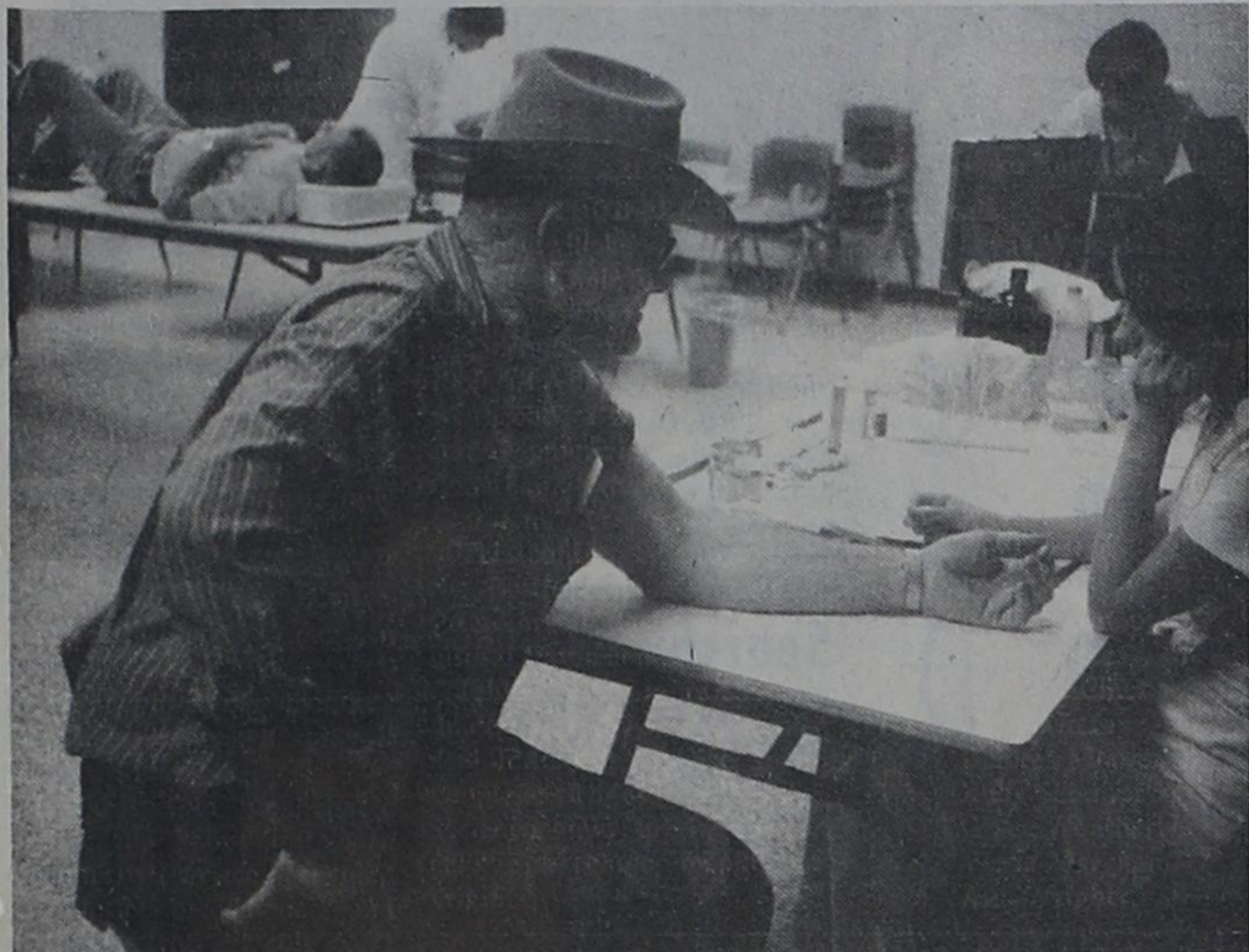

## MUSTANGS BLOW CLYCLONES AWAY 33-7



**THE ARM OF THE LAW:** Nature makes it easy to give blood. A person has about 10 to 12 pints in his body and can easily spare a pint. When blood is given, the body responds promptly to restore plasma volume; the vital red blood cells are constantly being replaced in the bone marrow.

Giving blood is safe and simple. Blood is collected under medical supervision by a medical technologist or nurse. It takes just a little of the donor's time and can mean a lifetime of health for someone who is sick or injured. This picture was taken in 1978 as Sheriff Doyle Ramsey offered his pint of blood, he

Recovering from their disappointing loss to Clarendon, the Wheeler Mustangs got back on the winning track again last Friday night as they completely dominated the Memphis Cyclones to the tune of 33-7.

The victory kept the Mustangs dim hopes for a playoff berth alive but it all boils down to the Clarendon Bronchos getting defeated and the Bronchos got over another big hurdle with their win over Canadian.

Benny Baker, as he has a number of times this year, led the Mustangs ground offensive effort as he scored three touchdowns and paced all ball carriers with 119 yards on 17 carries.

Add two 31 yard field goals by Russell Gaines, who also kicked three extra points, and these two young men tacked all but six points the Mustangs put on the scoreboard.

Weakened by injuries and illness, the Mustangs really had no trouble with the Cyclones and used two fumble recoveries to set up the first two touchdowns.

Memphis hadn't run an offensive play when they turned the ball over on a kick at the Memphis 40 and it was just one play later when Baker broke loose and went the distance to put the Mustangs

up on top 7-0 with less than 2 minutes gone in the game.

A fumbled putt attempt by the Cyclones recovered by the Mustangs at the Memphis 6 really hurt the visitors late in the first period when Baker got his second TD. This touchdown came from the 6 after the Mustangs were penalized five back to the 11.

Scott Wright, who once again ably filled in at quarterback for the injured Ty Henderson, passed 25 yards to Mike Gallagher for the Mustangs third touchdown of the first half and added to Gaines' first 31 yard field goal gave the Mustangs a 24-0 cushion at halftime.

Bogging down on their initial drive of the second half at the Cyclone 14, the Mustangs called on Gaines again and the senior tight end responded with his second three pointer.

A pass interception by Arthur Zepeda at the Memphis 38 and returned to the 27 once more gave the horses great field position and they quickly took advantage of it when Baker crashed over from the 7 four plays later.

The visiting Cyclones averted a shutout when Robert Montgomery got the Cyclones lone six pointer on a 4 yard run to cap a 79 yard drive late in the game.

## BLOOD DRIVE TUESDAY

Thursday Review Club will again sponsor the annual blood drive Tuesday, November 11 from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the high school.

Every person able to donate blood is urged to be present. A pint of blood donated will insure the availability of all the blood needed by a member of your immediate family for the coming year-at no cost to you. The drive this year is dedicated to Betty Davis. Mrs. Davis was involved in an auto accident near Miami and is presently in Parkland Burn Center in Dallas. At last report she has received 25 pints of blood; the blood can be replaced through donation at cost to the family. If more than one member of your family donates blood, specify Mrs. Davis for the extra pint. Students 17 and 18 years of age may also donate blood. Parents written permission is required for any 17-year-old to donate blood, but no permit is required for anyone 18 or over. Young people, it is time for you to become involved. Your blood is special-it can't be purchased or synthetically reproduced. Blood is a vital human resource and can only be donated by us. The United States uses an average of 18,000 pints a day. Coffee Memorial Blood Center in Amarillo requires over 1000 pints of blood per month. Help to insure its availability if you need it. Blood isn't an "unalienable right" you know. It is a community service provided by volunteer blood donors, and if all of us who are able don't give blood, then who says it will be there later in case we need it. Your efforts will soon be reflected by a successful blood drive, which will produce many pints of life-saving blood for patients in our area hospitals. There is no substitute for human blood. When it is needed, it has to be there for the doctor to utilize in helping to save a life. Each person who donates a pint of blood may receive a type of family blood insurance. The blood plan costs the donor nothing except one pint of blood per year and it will pay 100 per cent of any blood charges that the donor, spouse or children might need. Extra people are being

brought to Wheeler this year so there will not be a waiting line. The needle in the arm is almost painless and your pint of blood might save a life.

**ENERGY SAVERS, MEET THE INDUCTION RANGE**  
Energy savers, meet the induction range, the "something new" that's "cooking" in the kitchen.

Induction (cool heat) countertop ranges are unlike any conventional range—mainly they're highly energy efficient, since they turn the cooking utensil itself into a burner. Also, they wipe clean, and the surface "doubles" as a cutting board or countertop.

In addition, they feature several safety precautions—they won't let a pot burn if it "boils dry," for example.

**EXTREME ENERGY EFFICIENCY**  
Cooking without the usual heating elements, the induction range induces heat directly into the cookware—rather than the usual method of heating up a cooktop and then transferring heat to the cookware.

Specifically, here's how it works: an electromagnetic coil beneath a ceramic cooking surface creates a magnetic field.

When iron or steel cookware is placed within the field, it heats up instantly and cooks the food in the cookware.

Because the cookware itself becomes the burner, the only heat generated is the heat in the pan, although the pan might reflect a small amount of heat back to the countertop.

Consequently, the induction unit is extremely energy efficient, and this method of cooking is cooler and safer than conventional methods.

**TYPES AVAILABLE**  
Two types are available—a free-standing range with the induction cooktop and drop-in cooktop for built-in counters.

**VERSATILE HEAT CHOICES**  
Controls are permanent magnets of the slide-rule type, and they activate power switches inside the range—so you get infinite heat selection from "high" to "off."

Cooking starts rapidly and the heat decreases quickly at the end of the operation.

**USUAL WIRING NEEDED**  
Induction ranges operate on a standard 200-volt, 60 ampere, AC power—the same needed for conventional electric ranges.

**SAFETY FEATURES**  
Several unique safety features guard against misuse of the induction range.

A pilot light indicates when a unit is on.

Also, the range will automatically shut off if no utensil is over one of the units or if a pot "boils dry."

If the homemaker accidentally uses copper or aluminum cookware—and the current in the induction coil begins to climb, the current is limited automatically to a lower safe value.

**USE IRON AND STEEL**  
Induction ranges do need special cookware—steel, or iron ONLY.

This includes stainless steel and porcelain enamel steel, along with cast iron or enameled iron.

These materials give a desirable range of cooking heats, since they possess enough resistance to the flow of current to provide and easy path for a magnetic field.

On the other hand, glass and ceramic materials offer too great a resistance to current flow, so they will not heat on induction ranges.

Also, aluminum and copper have too little resistance to the current flow, so they don't provide enough heat for cooking either, although they are good conductors in conventional cooking methods.

**WIPE-CLEAN SURFACE**  
Since the range top never becomes hot, any spills or stains cannot burn on—they simply wipe off. Also, the magnetic controls lift off for easy cleaning.

In addition, you can use the entire top as a counter work surface—even as a cutting board. Ceramic is so tough that it isn't damaged if utensils are dropped on it.

## LEARN NOT TO BURN

### Survival Part Three

7. Drop and Roll.  
If your clothes catch on fire, drop to the floor and roll to smother the flames.

Be certain that all children and adults in your home know never to run if their clothes catch on fire. Running just gives the fire more oxygen.

As part of the family practice, stage a "drop and roll" session. Also tell your family how to help if someone else's clothes catch on fire. Tackle or knock the person down and make him roll. Or, get him to the ground and throw a blanket or rug around him to smother the fire.

8. Once You Are Out Of The House, Go Immediately To Your Meeting Place.

You have to find out who is still inside so the fire fighters can be informed when they arrive.

9. Call the Fire Department. Make Sure You Give Your Complete Address and Say If You Think Someone Is Trapped In The Fire.

Don't attempt to call from your home. It's too dangerous.

Call from a neighbor's house. Fire departments need to know the address first, and information about people trapped inside.

Try to be calm when you call the fire department. Give them whatever information they ask for and be sure to stay on the telephone until you have answered all questions. The firefighters will be on their way immediately as you talk to the dispatcher. A longer call will not delay their arrival.

If there is a fire alarm box nearby, use it and stay there until the fire fighters arrive.

10. Once You Are Out, Stay Out. Never Return To A Burning Building.

The professional fire fighter is trained in saving lives as well as in putting out fires. His specialized training, protective clothing and emergency air supply give him an edge.

11. Don't Permit Anyone To Go Back Into The Building. Just as you may have to

fight the urge to return to your home and try to save trapped family members, others may be fighting the same urge. Do Not permit anyone to go back in; keep a firm hand on small children. The risk is too high. 12. Cool A Burn. If someone gets burned, don't gamble. Get a doctor or hospital immediately. When a burn happens, use cold tap water to stop the heat injury.

Don't use ice or butter or ointments. Cool the burn with water immediately. Delay worsens the injury.

Remember that fire and smoke are deadly combination

that requires calm, deliberate action. With a clear understanding of the nature of fire and how it functions, you and your family should survive if fire strikes.

With an early fire warning system and escape plan, you have both peace of mind and the key to survival in case of a fire.

## COIN OPERATED TELEPHONES

Coin telephones continue to be a prime target for vandals, costing General Telephone, and ultimately General Telephone customers, over \$1 million a year, or almost \$2,600 daily, in labor costs alone.

J.H. Davis, Memphis Division Manager for General Telephone, said the company has around 10,000 coin telephones in its four-state service area.

"On any given day, one in four of these coin telephones is out of service," Davis said, "and in most cases the out-of-service is caused by vandalism. In a large number of the vandalism cases, the damage is apparent, but in others the damage cannot be seen, such as broken wires, removed

parts or jammed coin chutes. "The person trying to use an out-of-order phone is not the only one affected even though that person is the one irritated at the time. The public phones are there for public use and the cost of maintaining and repairing these phones is a part of our expenses paid by all customers."

The company's objective for coin telephones outlined by Davis is to keep them available for use 24 hours a day, often for emergencies.

"We realize our coin phones must be operational as customers use them for business and regular telephone service as well as emergencies. We also realize that out-of-order coin phones cause frustration.

Even though vandals are the culprits in most cases, General Telephone gets the blame.

"The company is working to solve some vandalism problems by replacing the standard box-type phone booths with more vandal-proof canopy booths and relocation of coin phones to places with better lighting or other security.

Vandals damaging coin phones affect not only the telephone company, but every citizen who may be confronted with an emergency," the division manager said. "Customers are urged to report vandalized public phones to the operator and to assist the company by reporting any acts of vandalism they have witnessed to local police.

"In addition, although most customers do not need coin phones often, we urge them to make mental notes of coin phone locations around town. With such information, if an emergency does occur, they will know where a public phone is located," the telephone manager said.

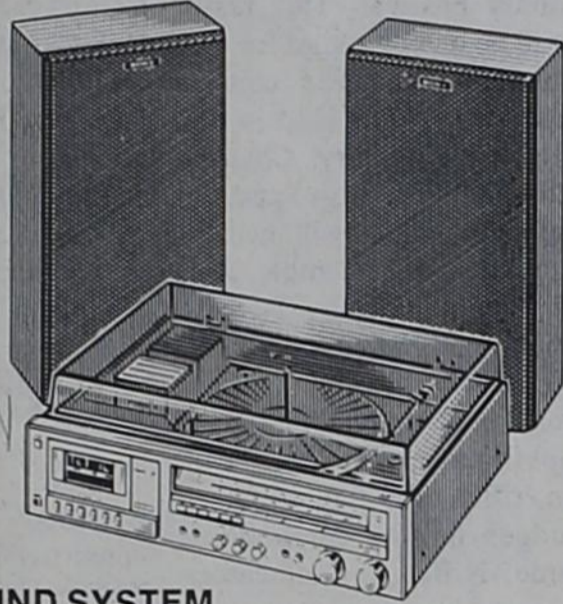

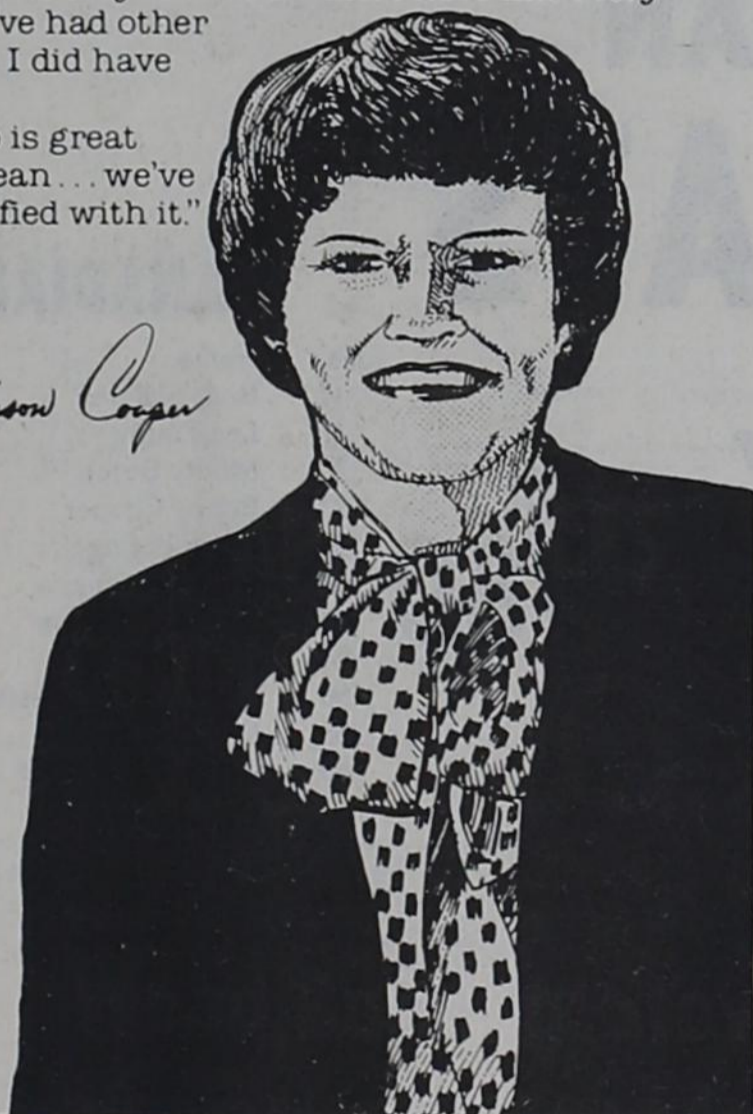

## Foreigners Visit SPS Plant

W.R. "Bill" Esler, vice president of engineering and construction for Southwestern Public Service Company, has announced that the electric company hosted visitors from the Austria Power Authority last Thursday at the request of the White House and the United States Environmental Protection Agency.

The visitors included an environmentalist and a planner, and the group toured Southwestern's Harrington Station, northeast of Amarillo. Austria, like many other countries, is in the process of switching from fuel oil and natural gas to coal as a fuel for the generation of electricity.

The visitors were especially interested in the fabric filter system or "baghouse" at Harrington. The system is used to control the fly ash that results from burning coal in boilers.

Southwestern Public Service Company was selected by the EPA to measure and analyze the performance of a large fabric filter or baghouse on a boiler using low sulfur western coal, because of its progressive approach to environmental control. The information being collected under this agreement with EPA is being shared with other utilities in the United States as well as others around the world," Esler said.

Southwestern has had visitors from Japan, Australia, Israel, West Germany and the Netherlands who are all responding to the same need for change to the utility from burning petroleum fuels to coal. Most of the foreign visitors have similar environmental quality controls that make their interest in Southwestern's research on fabric filters a valuable asset to their engineering and design knowledge.

Besides these foreign visitors, Southwestern has shared through national conferences and correspondence
