Another big threat was thwarted by a clipping penalty at the Clarendon 6 following a 33 yard gain on a pass from Scott Wright to Paul Bentley. The Mustangs had to settle for a 32 yard field goal off the toe of Russell Gaines.

A big goalline stand in the second quarter by the Mustangs kept the Mustangs in easy reach on the scoreboard at halftime but that went by

Seeing their attempt to extend their winning streak to 20 get blown away at Clarendon, the Wheeler Mustangs are in a have to win category this Friday night at Nicholson Field when the improving Memphis Cyclones come to town. Any hopes of sharing the district 2-AA title depend on the Wheeler Mustangs winning their final three games and the Mustangs certainly can't look past Friday night to the Canadian tussle or the season finale against arch rival Shamrock.

The Memphis Cyclones bring a 1-6 record into Wheeler but the young Cyclones have been improving each week according to Wheeler scouts and were still in their last two games with Canadian and Wellington going into the final quarter. "The loss to Clarendon was a tough one but I think we will snap back because we are still

in the championship race and besides these kids have a lot of pride," Coach Allen said of his Mustangs. The one ingredient that has hurt the Cyclones in 1980 has been their lack of speed in the backfield but they have proved to be very aggressive both offensively and defensively. Memphis uses a wing T similar to the Mustangs and could have the use of their starting quarterback, Scott Lockhart, who adds greatly to their offense. Lockhart did not play in the Cyclones loss to Wellington last week. Besides the game being real big for the Mustangs this week, the other biggie in the district will be at Canadian as the district's two unbeaten tangle and all Wheeler fans will be pulling for a Wildcat win over the Clarendon Bronchos. PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS (ENMIENDAS PROPUESTAS A LA CONSTITUCION)

- No. 1** The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience. (La enmienda constitucional permite a la Legislatura autorizar que los bancos usen máquinas registradoras automáticas (teller machines) dentro del condado o ciudad de su domicilio en un plan de cooperación para conveniencia pública.)
- No. 2** The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused. - No. 3** The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes. - No. 4** The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations. - No. 7** The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5000 or less to perform private road work. (La enmienda constitucional autoriza que los condados con una población de 5000 o menos trabajen en caminos privados.)
- No. 8** The constitutional amendment to change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals and the names and qualifications of the justices of the Supreme Court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate courts. (La enmienda constitucional que cambia el nombre de Cortes de Apelaciones Civiles y el nombre y requisito de los Jueces de la Corte Suprema y dicta la jurisdicción y autoridad de las cortes de apelación.)
- No. 9** The constitutional amendment allowing spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property. FABRICS FOR FURNITURE
Fibers and fabrics for today's furniture are in a "Manmade" trend, and it's likely to continue due to consumer demand.

Three-fourths of today's fibers are man-made. Because of that, it's important to know some basics about both fibers and fabrics.

FIBER FACTS
RAYON—is the most widely used man-made fiber in upholstery because of its versatility and extensive color range.

It's often blended with cotton, an equally important fiber for upholstery. Rayon frequently is used as the dominant fiber in high-level blends of 80 percent or more rayon.

OLEFIN—commonly known as polypropylene, is a fiber creating lots of new excitement in the upholstery business.

It has exceptional durability, built-in soil resistance and

color fastness. Olefin, unlike other fibers, must be solution dyed, however. And while this assures lasting color, it does limit the spectrum.

NYLON—also is widely used for upholstery because it has incredible strength and soil-and-abrasion resistance. Nylon is the predominant fiber for flocked fabrics. POLYESTER—while not a major upholstery fiber now, is making inroads in the jacquard and print cloth markets.

Woven polyester velvets are available. Polyester is used as a fiber-fill, a cushioning material for upholstered furniture. ACRYLIC—often used in knits and woven velvets, is soft and lightweight, resistant to sunlight, and it holds its shape well.

FABRIC TRENDS
Velvet currently is the favorite upholstery fabric, accounting for about 40 percent of the market—with indications pointing to further growth.

Flat textures and print cloth rank next, followed by vinyl and jacquards (accounting for nearly 60 percent). The remaining percent is held by knits.

Experts attribute the shift to man-made fibers for furniture in recent years to consumer demand—they make life better for the consumer.

They offer fabrics with greater durability, soil resistance and a wide range of exciting new looks. They offer a practicality coupled with attractiveness that the public wants.

FLAMMABILITY for today's fabrics is a concern. Flammability requirements of both government and industry.

The Consumer Product Safety Commission is studying the possibility of a mandatory or voluntary flammability standard for upholstered furniture, which could take effect this year or next year.

Presently, the furniture industry is adopting a voluntary flammability-testing program aimed at producing furniture with improved resistance to cigarette ignition, since this is the primary cause of most furniture fires.

There is a possibility that the CPSC may adopt the voluntary industry program as its standard.

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How Candidates Stand on Major Issues

Jimmy Carter

ABORTION: Believes personally that abortion is wrong, but is against a constitutional amendment which would overturn the Supreme Court decision permitting abortions.

ERA: Strongly supports ERA; determined to "do everything within my power" to ratify the amendment. Has used the White House to further the cause of ERA.

SCHOOL PRAYER: Opposes an amendment on school prayer; cites separation of Church and State; feels it would discriminate against atheists.

HOMOSEXUAL RIGHTS: Supports legislation which would remove homosexuality from a list of "sexual aberrations" for which aliens can be denied immigration. According to a White House staff member, gays "have in the White House a President who is meeting with you and respects you."

DRAFT: Has called for draft registration in response to the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan. Supports drafting of women. Carter believes in the Volunteer Army and sees need to upgrade pay-scale and benefits.

DEFENSE: Opposed B-1 bomber, deferred production of neutron bomb, delayed production of cruise missile, Trident submarine, SSN-688 attack submarine, and Trident missile system. Has now asked for authorization for "rapid deployment force," and a 5% increase in defense spending.

SALT II: Supports the SALT process; feels it is "in our nation's interest," but that because of Soviet presence in Afghanistan is "inappropriate at this time."

ECONOMIC POLICY: Plans to continue his policies of wage and price guidelines, regulatory reform, and restraints on government spending. He does not favor wage and price controls. Carter is now seriously considering a tax cut for 1981.

MIDDLE EAST: Brought about the historic signing of a peace treaty between Egypt and Israel in March 1979 following the Camp David Summit. Does not support West Bank settlements of Palestinian autonomy.

ENERGY POLICY: "We will never be completely strong at home or secure abroad until we have solved our nation's excessive dependence on foreign oil." Proposes standby gas rationing plan, converting electric power plants from oil to coal, development of alternative forms of energy and synthetic fuel. Says we must cut our imports of foreign oil in half by 1990.

DEATH PENALTY: "There are certain crimes that are so heinous that the death penalty would be appropriate."

Ronald Reagan

ABORTION: Opposes abortion-on-demand. Believes that "interrupting a pregnancy is the taking of a human life and can only be justified in self-defense; that is, if the mother's own life is in danger." Suggests a constitutional amendment banning abortion.

ERA: Opposes ERA: "I do not believe that the ERA is the answer. The amendment would not itself redress inequalities in rights, and, by increasing the courts' legislative power, could do more harm than good."

SCHOOL PRAYER: Proposes an amendment to permit voluntary school prayer. "We are a nation under God." Says people are interpreting freedom of religion to mean freedom from religion.

HOMOSEXUAL RIGHTS: Does not advocate "gay lifestyles." Does not feel that any unique lifestyle should be given favored attention. "An employer should not be subject to special laws (such as 'gay ordinances' passed in some cities) which, in effect, would compel him to hire a person because of the person's sexual preference."

DRAFT: Opposes universal service and the drafting of women. Supports all-volunteer army. "Universal service rests on the assumption that people belong to the state, and are simply statistics to be manipulated by social engineers."

DEFENSE: "Thousands of years of human history have demonstrated that the most effective deterrent to armed conflict is military strength, not weakness." Supports development of B-1 bomber, neutron warhead, and MX missile.

SALT II: Sees it as fatally flawed. "... more of a strategic arms build-up than an arms limitation... should be shelved and the negotiations should go back to the table."

ECONOMIC POLICY: Tax cuts a priority. Plans to cut taxes by 30% over next 3 years. Hopes to provide substantially less government interference in people's lives. Plans to cut government costs, consolidating some departments and dismantling others, such as Energy and Education.

MIDDLE EAST: Strong supporter of Israel. "The crucial element determining the success or failure of American policy is the fate of Israel. Israel is America's natural ally."

ENERGY POLICY: Plans to dismantle the Department of Energy and its allocation rules. By DOE's own admission, "regulation has compounded any problem arising from imperfect market structures. Allocation formulas were mainly responsible for last summer's gasoline lines."

DEATH PENALTY: "I favor the death penalty. I believe society has the right to defend itself—to take the life of those who commit murder with premeditation and planning."

John Anderson

ABORTION: An opponent of the recently passed Hyde Amendment which gives Congress authority to refuse to federally fund abortions. "As a matter of conscience, I am saddened by the high incidence of unwanted pregnancies." The choice is a matter to be decided by a woman in conjunction with her God and her physician. Poor women should have government assistance to finance abortions.

ERA: Strong supporter. "The ERA is needed to enshrine in the Constitution the moral value judgment that sex discrimination is wrong." Voted against states' right to rescind, for the extension of the ratification deadline.

SCHOOL PRAYER: Anderson voted against school prayer in 1971, and according to his staff, would vote against a school prayer amendment again.

HOMOSEXUAL RIGHTS: Anderson is co-sponsor of H.R. 2074, a bill to amend the Civil Rights Act of 1964 to include homosexuals.

DRAFT: Opposes reinstatement of peacetime draft registration or compulsory service. "I am unalterably opposed to the draft during peacetime in the absence of compelling circumstances. Such circumstances do not exist."

DEFENSE: "Every four years (during presidential elections) there is heightened fear about the Soviets as an excuse to take our minds off domestic problems." Opposes deployment of MX missile. Opposes defense hikes beyond 3%.

SALT II: Strong supporter. Believes SALT process should be continued to include an even more restraining treaty.

ECONOMIC POLICY: Supports holding down government spending, boosting productivity, encouraging personal savings, lessening the burdens of regulation and taxation on business, increasing research and development, and providing meaningful job training and continuing education programs. "Productivity is a vital national issue and should be brought to the forefront of domestic policy. Otherwise, we shall have to accept the resulting economic stagnation."

MIDDLE EAST: Supports an intermediary role for the U.S. without becoming an advocate for either Israel or Egypt.

ENERGY POLICY: Believes that a solution to energy crisis is to increase price of gasoline by fifty cents per gallon. Revenue raised would be redistributed through tax system to the poor and other groups.

DEATH PENALTY: "Anderson declares his outright opposition to the death penalty."—Washington Star, January 9, 1980

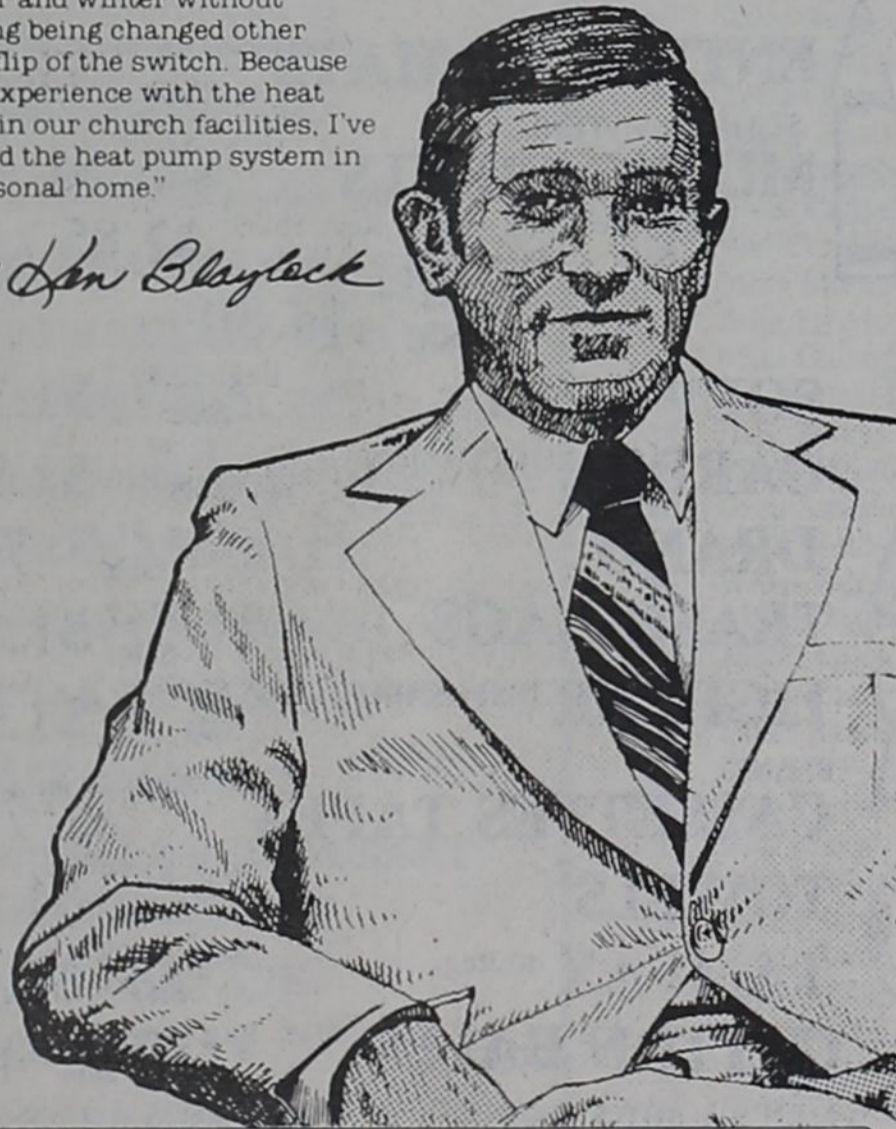

5. USE WINDOWS FOR ESCAPE AND RESCUE.

If your first exit, the door, is unsafe, you will have to use the second choice probably a window, to escape the fire. To aid in using windows, you may need escape ladders for use in upper story bedrooms.

Your family needs to know the following steps in using the window to escape a fire.

First, make certain the door is closed tightly. Otherwise, the draft from the open window may draw smoke and fire into the room.

If the window is more than two stories from the ground and you don't have an escape ladder, balconies or other structural aids to use for escape, you should not jump, but wait for the fire department. In such a case, open the window a few inches at both the top and the bottom. Fresh air can enter from the lower opening and any smoke or

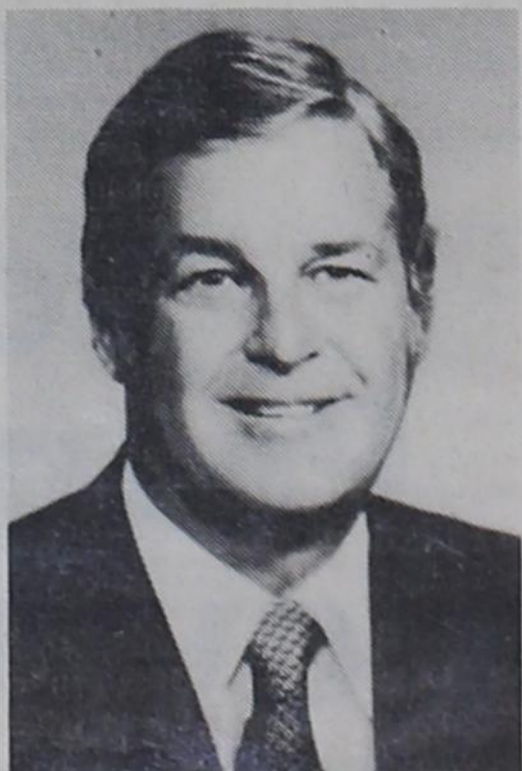

gases can ventilate through the upper portion. Stay at the window, keep your head low to get fresh air, and wave a light-colored towel, sheet or some other obvious signal to help the fire fighters locate you.

If on the first or second floor, you can probably drop from your window. It may be helpful to move a chair or some other piece of furniture to the window to make it easier to climb out.

Either straddle the window sill of back out of the window, maneuvering so you can slide out on your stomach, feet first. Hold on with both hands to the sill. Now let go of the sill and drop to the ground, bending your knees to cushion the landing.

You can lower small children from the window. There may be someone outside to catch the child and help break the fall. If not, you must lower the child as far as possible. Don't leave the room.

ses, such combined expense not to exceed \$24,740.00 (personnel payments, \$22,240.00, communication \$2,500.00), without prior approval of the County, as billed by the City with such billings to be submitted on a monthly basis as nearly as possible to the first day of each month.

SECTION VII

The County shall provide housing for the dispatch system and shall be responsible for all utility billings with the exception of telephone service. All long distance calls shall be logged by the person placing such call and both parties hereto shall be responsible for payment of all such long distance calls logged by the representatives of such parties. Each party hereto shall be responsible for fifty percent (50%) of the "base" telephone and teletype charges and unidentified long distance calls. The City shall be responsible for insuring the communications equipment of the dispatch system.

SECTION VIII

This contractual agreement shall be for a period of one year beginning October 1, 1980, and ending September 30, 1981. At or before the end of such period the Parties hereto shall meet together for the purpose of re-negotiating a similar contract for the ensuing year. This contract may be terminated by either of the parties hereto by the giving of a written notice of intent to terminate with such termination to be effective not less than thirty (30) days from date of such written notice.

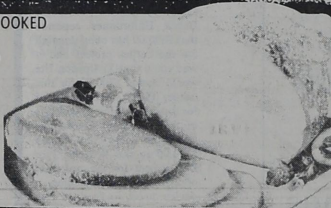
