Another break, this time a recovered fumble at the Boys Ranch 43 led to the Mustangs second six pointer. After a five yard fine, Ty Henderson spotted Paul Bentley open about the 30 and hit him with a pass and Bentley cut back inside the pursuit and got the touchdown to complete a 46 yard

Pushed back to the 1 by a Roughrider punt, the Mustangs covered the 99 yards to paydirt in three quick plays. Baker got 24 yards in two trips sandwiched around a penalty to put the ball out to the

Henderson passed to Boyd Waldo around the midfield strip and Waldo made a good catch in traffic and reversed his field to the right and the Mustangs split end went untouched for the Mustangs third TD when Willie Valencia literally wiped out a pursuing Roughrider. Valencia, incidentally, received a badly sprained ankle later in the last half and sat out the rest of the game. Gaines booted the extra point and the Mustangs led by 21-0 at 7:18 of the third

IGNITION SOURCES are everywhere! They can claim your job or even your life if you're not careful to keep combustible materials or flammable liquids away from them. So take great care at work (and at home) when around \_ sources of ignition.

The principal sources of ignition referred to as hazardous are:

Open flames and heaters - smoking, torches, gas flames, lamps, furnaces, ovens,

Friction - hot bearings, rubbing belts, grinding, shredding, polishing, cutting, drill-

Electricity - arcs and sparks, including lightning and static; and

Chemical reactions, particularly those liberating heat.

A fire hazard exists if a combustible material - which, if burned, could jeopardize life or property - is exposed to a source of ignition. Many materials encountered on the job will, when ignited, result in fire or explosion. Major



How are burns caused?


Sunburn, hot water from faucet, splashed hot oil, hot liquids being carried, pots tipped over, climbing on stove, playing with matches or candles, smoking in bed, using dasoline near heat or flame, climbing on high voltage wires.

What should you do if your clothes catch fire?

Stop, drop, and roll.

Cool the burn. Cooling stops thermal injury that continues after the flame or heat is removed. It reduces the swelling and scarring, and helps numb the pain. Use tap water, not ice. Don't use butter or ointments. Treat burns immediately; delay worsens

### 10 Ways to Reduce Fire Hazards

Good "housekeeping" on the job means more than a clean place to work - it means a workplace kept as safe as possible from the hazards of fire.

Every employee, as well as every owner, has a responsibility to keep fire risks at a minimum in the workplace. A good way to achieve this is to develop routines for following and monitor-

Here are 10 suggested activities to carry out on a regular basis:

1) Remove rubbish and other waste from the workplace daily - and more often if necessary. Store safely until proper disposal is

2) Keep rubbish and ordinary waste in metal industrial waste containers until removal can take place.

3) Place highly combustible waste and rags in special cans with self-closing covers; set the cans up off the floor.

4) Handle hazardous materials in accordance with safety rules of the plant. (For example, liquids should be stored in safety cans

designed for that purpose.) 5) Do not accumulate large quantities of combustible metal scraps. Keep salvagable or reclaimable pieces in clean, dry, tightly

Every employee can help fight arson by reporting any suspicious activity before, during or after a fire. This includes observation of any people or vehicles present at an unusual time of day; any arguments or threats; any acts of vandalism or loud noises prior to a fire; and any unusual odors, such as a strong smell of gasoline.

In Fire

October 5-11 marks this year's Fire Prevention Week. Observed annually by the United States and Canada, Fire Prevention Week always falls during the Sunday-through-Saturday period that includes October 9.

About Fire Prevention Week . . .

This date is the anniversary of "The Great Chicago Fire of 1871" that killed 250 people and destroyed property totaling \$168 million. The disaster inspired real community efforts toward fire prevention.

To remind people of the need to practice fire safety, the Fire Marshals Association of North America, now a Section of the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), established Fire Prevention Day in 1911 on the 40th anniversary of the Chicago fire. First President to officially proclaim the Day was Woodrow Wilson, in 1920.

In 1922, under NFPA sponsorship, the observance was extended to a full week and President Warren Harding issued the first Fire Prevention Week proclamation.

Each year, NFPA sponsors this week to bring international focus to the importance of fire safety.

### You and Your Fire Department: Partners in Fire Prevention

You can help your fire department during Fire Prevention Week and all year long by being a "Partner in Fire Prevention." This means keeping your home and your community as safe as possible from the dangers of fire, and following the recommendations of your fire department. Start at home. Conduct a home inspection and correct any household fire hazards you find. Are electrical cords in the open - not under rugs? Not through or across door openings? Are they

in good condition? Are you using a minimum number of extension cords and keeping outlets from

becoming overloaded? How's the fuse box? Is the right size fuse in each socket and do you always replace a fuse with one the same size? Check your housekeeping. Are your closets, basement, garage and yard free of all combustibles like paper, cartons, old furniture, draperies, and rags? Is paint kept in tightly

closed metal containers? Are your appliances and heating equipment in good repair or do they require checking by a serviceman? Do all your appliances carry the seal of a safety testing laboratory?

### Learn Not to Burn

Teach your family correct fire safety behavior. Make sure they practice burn prevention in the kitchen by not wearing long, loose sleeves when cooking or working around the stove. Small appliances and hot pans should be kept out of reach of little children.

If anyone in the family smokes, make sure they use large, sturdy ashtrays and that they dispose of smoking materials carefully. Keep matches and lighters away from young children and remember to check upholstered furniture for cigarette butts left to smolder.

Everyone in the family should know escape procedures and the agreed-upon meeting place outside the home.

### Do Your Part for Fire Safety

You can act as a "Partner in Fire Prevention" by being a good citizen. Organize local assistance programs for victims of fire. Report any information about suspicious fires to the authorities, and cooperate with them during their investigations. Help spread the word about the importance of fire safety by setting up and supporting local educational programs for children and adults.

Remember - keeping the world safe from fire is a shared responsibility. So be a "Partner in Fire Prevention" and help make this a more fire-safe world in which to live.

### A Match Is A Tool

County and area leadership is provided by about 10,000 extension agents specializing in agriculture, home economics and 4-H. At the local level, each of

nearly 580,000 volunteer leaders devotes an average of 20 eight-hour days annually to 4-H. Parents also play an important role in local 4-H.



### WEATHERFORD RODEO

Sparked by the all-around championship performance of Cole Tindol, the Southwestern State University Men's rodeo team swept to the team title at last week's seasonopening fall rodeo at Pratt County Community College in Pratt, Kan.

Southwestern, which placed fifth at last spring's National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association finals, piled up 3011/2 points, easily outdistancing defending NIRA champion Southeastern, which totaled 201. Dodge City Community College was next at 791/2, followed by Panhandle State with 781/2 and Western State of Altus with 78.

"We had a good rodeo," said SWSU rodeo faculty advisor-Dr. Don Mitchell. "We placed 12 people\_and had four place twice. We made a couple of mistakes or we'd have had a really super

Despite his squad's strong shoeing, Mitchell expects Southeastern to be the team to beat in the Central Plains Region of the NIRA.

"The difference (at Pratt) was that we were ready." Mitchell explained. "Southeastern wasn't because they don't have everybody in shcool yet. When they do, they'll be

Tindol captured the all-around title despite being shut out in his specialty, riding. The Canadian, Texas junior placed first in the bareback division and second in brone riding.

Lexington sophomore Marty Cummins and Tryon freshman Clay Spencer split fifth and sixth in the bareback competition. Spencer also finished second in steer wrestling.

In calf-roping, Southwestern had three placers: Milburn Outhier, VICI junior, who took second; Mike Perry, Enid sophomore, third, and Lynn Noble, Yale junior, fifth.

Saddle bronc riding turned out the SWSU-strength. Tindol took second place, while Fairview freshman Michael Lynch finished third; VICI sophomore Danny Salisbury, fourth, and Southland, Texas junior Tom Eckert, sixth.

Probably Southwestern's biggest improvement this season will lie in the team roping event. At Pratt, SWSU placed first, third and sixth, with Noble and IMO senior David Craig copping championship honors. Third-place winners were Lynch and Miami senior J.D. Droz, and sixth-placers were Droz and Olustee senior Tim Drury.

"We're stout (in team roping)," admits Mitchell. 'We're stronger there than we've ever been."

Southwestern's women did not fare nearly as well as the men, winding up fifth in the six-team field. Two SWSU cowgirls did place--Wynnewood junior Ken Chaney was fifth in barrel racing and Roosebelt freshman Kay Block ended up in a four-way deadlock for sixth in the same event.

Both the men and women take Homecoming week off before getting back in action Oct. 10-12 at the Panhandle State Rodeo in Goodwell. The final rodeo of the fall season will be Oct. 17-19 at Garden City, Kan.
