MUSTANGS WILL OPEN SEASON FRIDAY Stinnett Rattlers First '80 Opponent

The Wheeler Mustangs get the 1980 football season kicked off this Friday night when they travel to Stinnett to take on the Rattlers at 8 P.M.

After dominating Class B football the past three years with two state championships and a runnerup spot to their credit, the Mustangs were reclassified into Class 2-AA this past spring and will compete in that classification for the next two years.

The Mustangs and the Canadian Wildcats have been chosen as the premier teams in what promises to be one of the most exciting seasons in years for Wheeler Mustang fans.

Experience and the winning tradition are the two big things going for the Mustangs in this campaign but Coach Joe Allen's gridders will be ham-

pered by lack of speed in their new classification.

Speed is what the Mustangs aren't blessed with and Friday night's opening opponent has it to burn with three gridders clocking 10 flat or under. In fact, the Rattlers boast the state Class A 100 yard dash champion in Willie Dodd who ran a 9.6 100 last spring.

Dodd has been moved to the quarterback slot in the Rattlers' veer attack to utilize his great speed and he is complimented in the backfield by Arden Beagle and Tim Harris, both 10 flat halfbacks.

Kevin Freriks, a 6', 220 tight end who also doubles at defensive end, is being touted by many as all state material and heads up the Stinnett forward wall both ways.

"Stinnett probably has as much backfield speed as we will see this year and slowing them down and keeping them from breaking will be the key to the ball game Friday night. We can't let them break on us for the long one because we don't have anyone to catch them," Coach Allen stated this week.

"We haven't really gotten a good idea of what our kids can do yet as we haven't been pushed too much in our scrimmages with Claude and Groom but we are anxious to get started and play a team of Stinnett's caliber," the Mustangs head coach went on the say.

Warren Besly from Elkhart, Kansas, and Greg Marshall from Socorro High School in El Paso have been added to the Mustangs football coaching staff this fall and with holdover coaches, Ronnie Karcher and

Mike Morgan, will comprise the assistants staff under head coach Joe Allen.

Offensively the Wheeler Mustangs will lineup Friday

night with Paul Bentley and Russell Gaines at tight end, Wes Westmoreland at strong tackle, Ricky Bond at strong guard and Bobby Jones at center. On the quick side will be Arthur Zepeda at guard and Benny Watson and Billy Westmoreland at tackle. John Harris will be the Mustangs split end. Ty Henderson will be at quarterback and will head up a backfield of Benny Baker at fullback, Willie Valencia at tailback and Mike Gallagher at wingback.

On defense in the Mustangs split four arrangement they will have Bentley and Jones at defensive ends, Bond and Wes Westmoreland at the tackles and Zepeda and Watson inside and Gaines and Valencia outside as linebackers. The three deep defensive secondary will see Gallagher and Wade Moore at halfbacks and Henderson at safety.

According to Hamker, the conference is designed to bring PCA directors up-to-date on services provided to PCAs by the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Texas, source of most PCA loan funds. Discussion leader is James Rogers, the Credit Bank's senior vice president. Also scheduled on the program is Melvin Sims, president of Growmark Ink Incorporated. His topic deals with effective directorship.

A special feature of this year's conference will be the Directors' Seminar scheduled September 4. Conducted by Louis A. Allen Associates, Inc., the seminar will feature director's roles as Association leaders and a systematic approach to leadership.

LEARN NOT TO BURN

They should be a part of a total system that includes smoke detectors. Home heat detectors react when air temperature reaches a certain point, usually 135 degrees F. Used in conjunction with smoke detectors, heat detectors are useful in kitchens, attics, basement

and attached garages. A few "do's" when purchasing a smoke detector: Check for the label of a testing laboratory; don't buy a detector that doesn't have a laboratory label. Read instructions, especially the schedule and means for testing the detector. Install the detector as recommended by the manufacturer. Install the detector as soon as possible. Make certain that batteries are locally available and reasonably priced. Consider These Locations:

1. Locate your smoke detector near sleeping areas. The preferred location is in hallways or areas adjacent to bedrooms.
2. Protect escape routes. Bedrooms are usually located farthest from convenient exits. Therefore locate your smoke detector in areas your family must pass through to escape. This will help prevent your family from being trapped by

3. dense smoke or flames. Locate your smoke detector on the ceiling or high on a wall. The preferred location may be in the center of the ceiling at the top of a stairway, or at least 4 inches away from any wall. A wall-mounted detector should be from 4 to 12 inches from the ceiling. Stick to the locations recommended by the manufacturer.
4. Always locate your smoke detector at the highest point on any sloped ceiling.
5. Test your location before final installation. Again, your smoke detector has to waken all sleeping persons, even behind closed doors. Before final installation have all members of the family go to their bedrooms and close the doors. Test the detector. Every member of the family should be able to hear the alarm loud and clear.

drafts that might affect detector sensitivity. Don't leave your smoke detector in an unheated home where temperatures may fall below performance levels (40 to 100 degrees). Always heed the instructions in the installation guide. Certain smoke detectors may be adversely affected by humidity, temperature extremes or stagnant air. Since homes vary greatly in design, it's a good idea to ask the local fire department for advice. A member of the department will be glad to advise you in placement of your detector. **Make The Most of Your Good Investment**

As more and more detectors enter the market, the consumer has many choices—in price, size, and style, battery or house current models. Regardless of your choice, you'll have to keep the detector in working order. You must periodically perform a "smoke test." This may mean blowing smoke into the alarm. Some models may even have a built-in test. Read the owners' manual carefully to learn how to test your detector and how often.

You must also regularly check the power source for your smoke detector. As an extra precaution, always check the power when you've returned from traveling. Be sure that your smoke detector is unobstructed at all times. NEVER paint your smoke detector. Keep the unit free from dust and dirt, clean it at least once each year by holding the nozzle of a vacuum cleaner to the side slot openings. Don't be lulled into a false sense of security just because you've bought and installed a smoke detector. Even after it warns you of a fire, you only have moments to escape. Unless you have planned and practiced a family escape plan, those few moments warning might not be enough. **Next Week: Meet Edith**

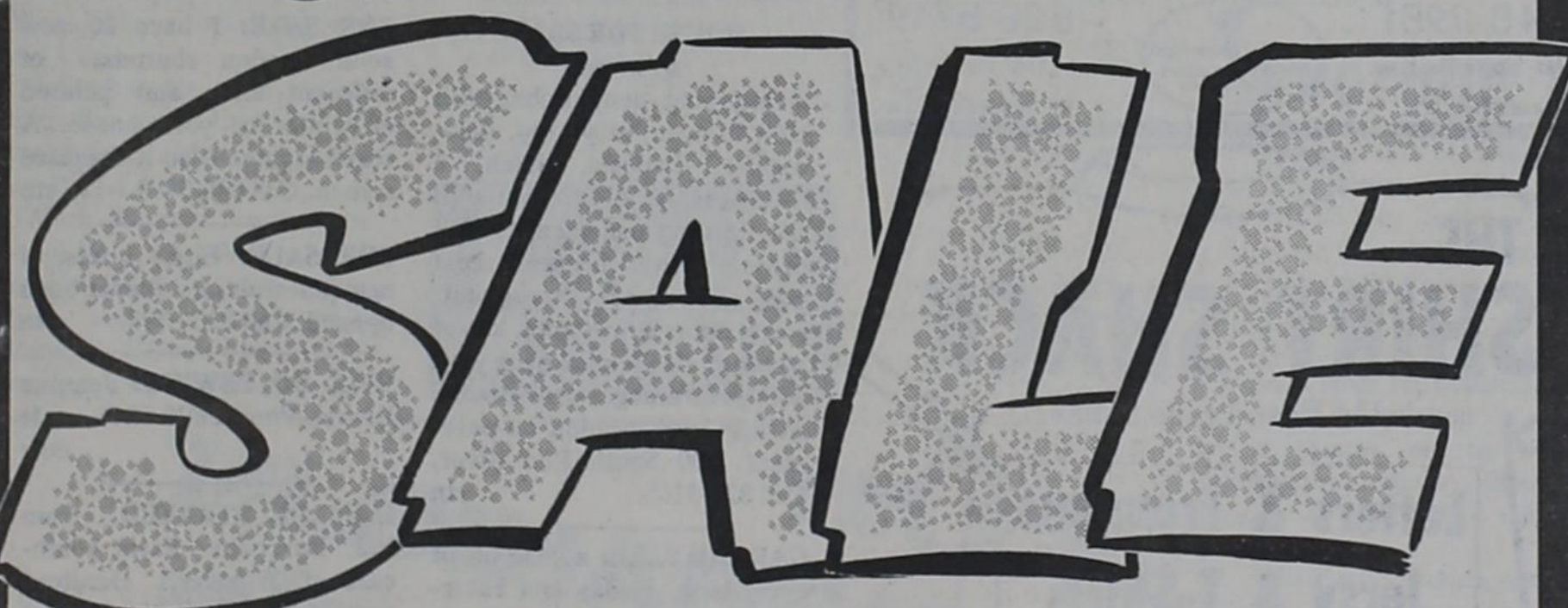

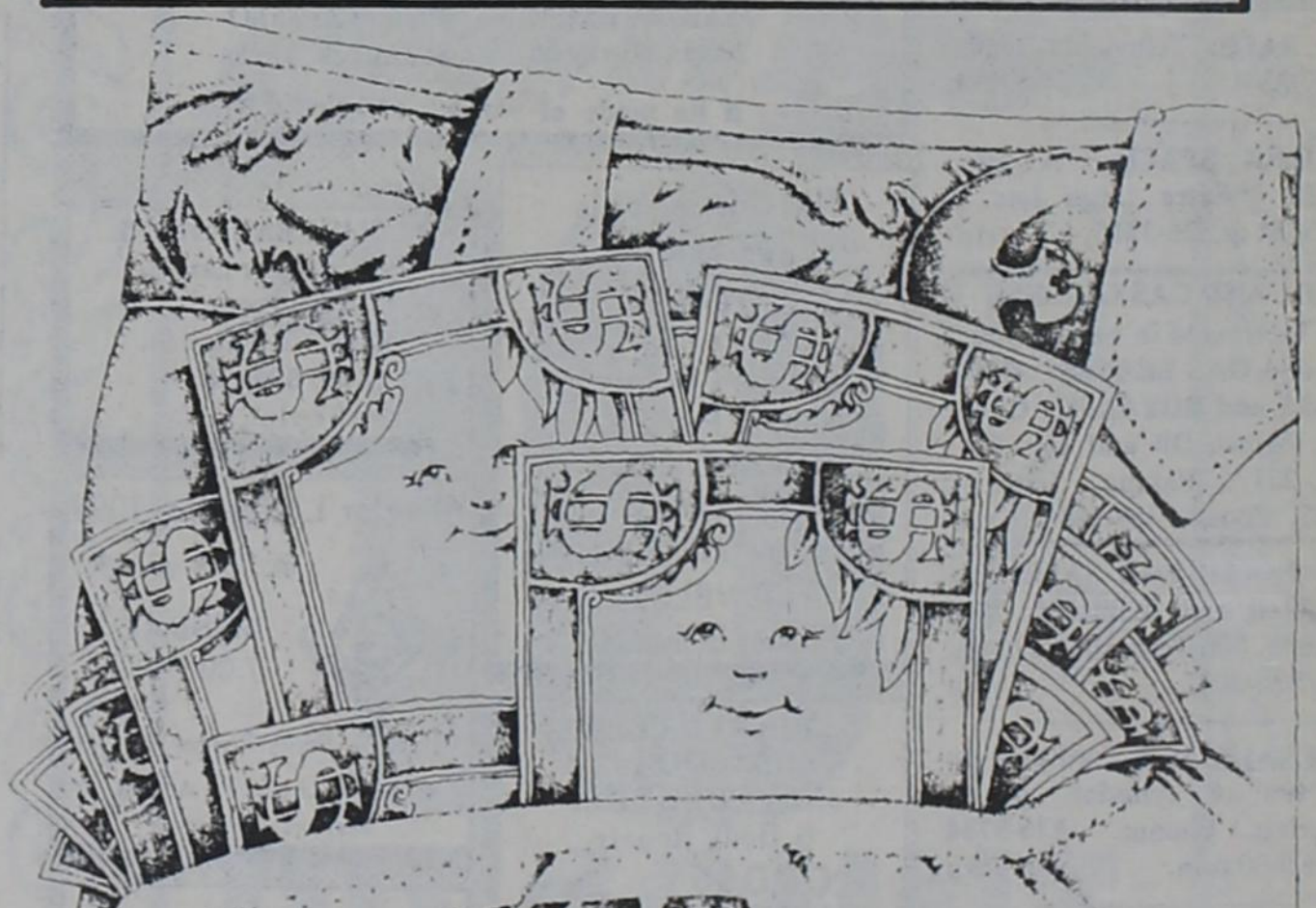

DROUGHT PLANS

DROUGHT. There is probably no word in the English language that arouses more worry and fear among farmers and ranchers. Most people are more than willing to fight the majority of problems associated with farm and ranch operation but sometimes drought looks unfightable. At present, Texas is experiencing a drought of varying intensity. In some areas the conditions could become as critical as they were during the worst of the 1950's.

"The lessons learned from the droughts of the 30's and the 50's have resulted in conservation stocking rates for most ranchers since that time" according to Charles Coffman, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler. "However, conservation stocking is not enough to enable ranchers to survive the bad effects of a drought without damage to the forage resource. This is the reason a drought plan is such an important part of any sound ranching operation."

Drought plans provide for controlled reduction of livestock numbers before forage supplies are depleted. A sound drought plan should consider when the plan will be initiated. The plan should be initiated early enough that forage resource does not suffer permanent damage. The dates will vary with each ranching operation and forage resource.

In addition, the rancher should consider exactly what action will be taken as a result of the drought. Will all or a percentage of the livestock be sold? Will livestock be confined and fed in a drylot condition? Will calves be weaned early and sold? Will livestock be moved to a reserve ungrazed pasture? Will additional forage be leased? There are a number of options based on the individual ranching operation.

The rancher should also determine what set of circumstances actually constitute a drought. When these circumstances are reached, the drought plan should be implemented. For further information on drought plans and range management contract the Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler.

Average Drilling Costs

Average cost of drilling an oil or natural gas well in Texas is \$51.95 per foot, a 238% increase from 1970, according to Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Assn.

The calculation is based on figures from the Association's annual compilation of facts and figures on the Texas petroleum industry, titled "80 Facts About Texas Oil and Gas."

"80 Facts" points out that Texas oil and gas operators drilled nearly 85.9 million feet of hole in 1979, and lost \$1.4 billion in dry holes.

Like its predecessors, "80 Facts" will be distributed free to the general public, according to William H. Abington, Association executive vice president.

In addition to its section on drilling, "80 Facts" includes data on production, offshore, refining-processing, employ-

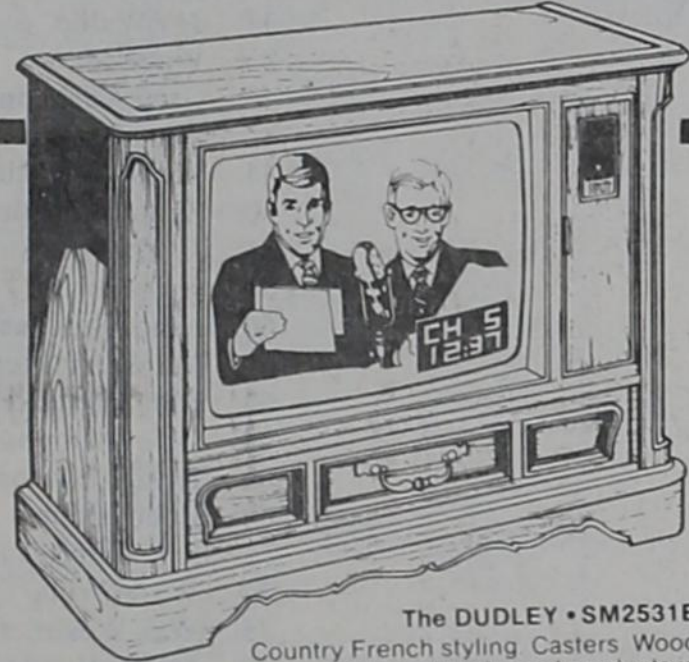
