



"The people who can lease afford it are being hit hard by the tax. Many elderly people on fixed incomes depend on their monthly royalty checks to make ends meet. The tax is putting them in a critical financial condition," said Pitts. He added that the tax will take \$65 billion out of Texas in the 1980's - enough money to triple the number of wells drilled each year in Texas for the next ten years.



### SPEND CHARITY

**DOLLARS WISELY** Spend your charity dollars wisely-they will help make up more than \$35 billion given each year to charitable, philanthropic and religious organizations.

Direct-mail appeals, telephone solicitations, door-todoor and street appeals are frequently used to encourage people to donate to a wide array of different causes.

However, widely publicized s andals involving financial mismanagement have tainted the image of charitable groups and fund-raising expenses at the time of solicitation.

A few states and cities have enacted charity laws.

How can you know if a particular charity is reputable? Two national groups presently rate charities, based on disclosure-or lack of disclosure-of several factors, including administrative practices, staff expenses and solicitation procedures.

Both groups maintain files on thousands of national and international organizations. Their published "ratings" are available free of charge or for a Coninal fee.

The Council of Better Business Bureaus has developed following questions to help consumers in deciding whether to give to a particular charity:

Mail Appeals

Does it make a clear statement of purpose and need? Is the appeal deceptive or

disguised as a bill or invoice? Does it state clearly that you are not obligated to pay for or return any enclosed, unordered items, such as stamps or key rings?

Does it include an address where you can write for more information?

Does it state whether donations are tax-deductible?

Is the appeal overly emotional in trying to pressure to give?

**Telephone Solicitations** Does the solicitor state

clearly at the outset the identity of the sponsoring organization and purpose of the call? Does the appeal have over-

PARADISE ALLEY by Sylvester Stallone. G.P. Putnam's Sons. 217 pp.

Sylvester Stallone's first novel is a simple tale of three brothers trapped in poverty and in the sweltering heat of the postwar summer of '46. Like Rocky, PARADISE AL-LEY is a poignant and romantic story of ordinary people in extraordinary circumstances.

The Carboni brothers are know to everyone in their neighborhood:

Victor is a sweet, 28-year old giant who drives a battered ice truck through Manhattan's West Side slums. Victor isn't the best-looking or brightest guy in Hell's Kitchen, but as the iceman, he's a welcome and familiar figure.

Cosmo is a small-time hustler and con man who prides himself on his wit and his appeal to the ladies. Most days he can be found perched on a peach crate, pretending to be a blind disabled veteran.

Lenny is the oldest and handsomest of the Carboni boys, but certainly not the happiest. He hasn't been himself since he returned from the war. His leg injury has given him a permanent limp and his war experiences have left him bitter and curioursly disconnected from life around him.

A midsummer night's brawl in Mickey's Bar dramatically changes the lives of the Carboni brothers. After winning an arm-wrestling battle with the infamous Frankie the Thumper, the neighborhood's dirtiest fighter, the sweettempered Victor goes berserk when Cosmo is menaced with a knife. Victor's unexpected metamorphosis from iceman to fighting machine gives Cosmo an idea that will transform the Carboni brothers from losers into winners: Victor wrestle at the local club, ironically called Paradise Alley. Managed by Lenny, trained by Cosmo, Victor becomes known as Salami," the undisputed champ of Paradise Alley.

Stallone's engaging story of the rise of "Kid Salami" is full of energy and vitality and proves again that heart will always triumph.

entrap the heads of children and strangle or asphyxiate them. CPSC reports two incidents have occurred, resulting in the strangulation of an 18month-old girl and asphyxiation of a 16-month-old boy, resulting in irreversible brain damage.

Approximately 600 infant toys knows as crib exercisers have been recalled by the toy's importer, Play Spaces International of Wattham, Massachusetts. The toy consists of an elastic cord strung with 11 colored wooden rings and balls and is intended to be suspended over the crib from one railing to the other. At present government, business, industry, insurance, and private organizations (like the National Fire Protection Assocaiation) are actively seeking ways to reduce the incentive for arson, to detect the crime, and to convict arsonists.

lead to a solution of the arson crime that could occur in your neighborhood. Only you can do that!

For instance, if fires or proven arson is becoming a trend in your neighborhood, you can form a community action group and stimulate coordinated action by agencies that can solve or prevent the arson.

### What can an individual do to prevent arson? [These preventative measures

will prevent other crimes too.] 1. Protect and secure your home and business with strong locks on all windows and doors. Install effective night

2. Eliminate readily available fuel for fire-wood piles, paper, leaves, trash combustibles.

SAFE USE OF GAS

APPLIANCES Use and maintained properly, gas appliances are very safe. Here are some simple

rules to be sure that the gas appliances in your home or place of business are bing used in a safe manner. 1. Gas appliance installat-

ions, repairs, and adjustments are jobs for an expert. Always be sure they are done only by qualified personnel.

2. Always follow the manufacturer's instructions regarding the care and operation of your gas appliances.

Use each of these appliances only for the job for which it was disigned. Nevel, for example, use a gas range to heat a room.

4. Keep gasoline and other highly flammable materials out of rooms where gas appliances are located. 5. Do not store combustible

materials such as papers, clothes or rags near a gasappliance or a gas appliance vent pipe.

6. Keep the areas around your gas appliances clear and accessible.

7. Be sure chimneys, flues and vent pipes are securely installed, free of obstructions and properly vented to the outside. Inspect them periodically for signs of deterioration such as holes, rust or accumulations of soot. Replace them whenever neces-

8. Teach young children not to turn on, light, or tamper with gas appliances.

9. Do not use flammable liquids, cements or household cleaning agents near any of your gas appliances.

10. Do not hang or attach anything to your gas pipes. The added weight could cause the pipe joints to loosen or disconnect, creating a hazardous condition.






