

Scouts Hike **Philmont Trails**

A group of Scouts from the Wheeler area arrived Friday, July 18, at Philmont Scout Ranch and Explorer Base, four miles west of here. Philmont is the largest camping facility in the world. The 214 square mile ranch is operated by the Boy Scouts of America.

The Scouts are: Danny Alexander, Paul Topper, and Wade Wills.

They are among the 13,000 young Scouting men and women expected to explore Philmont's numerous trails this

The group is under the adult leadership of Dewey Shepard. During their 12-day stay at Philmont, the Scouts will visit several of the ranch's 22 mountain camps, backpacking between 50 and 75 miles. Rock-climbing, rifle safety, Western lore and conservation are just a few of the skills they will learn as they visit the various camps. > Pioneer Citizen Joe W. Barr

At this time it seems very Wheeler's real pioneer citizens, Joe W. Barr. In 1910 he and a half brother, Ed Cosper, moved to Wheeler from Jones County, Texas simply because Wheeler had "Good Water"! They were both single and eager to make a new beginning in farming. They purchased several quarter sections of land not all in one location. After getting settled, Ed went back to Stamford and brought back "Miss Hannah" to be his bride.

Mr. Barr made history for Wheeler as being responsible for a few of the "first's," one of which was that he owned and operated the first movie theatre in Wheeler. location was at the old pavillion building which stood near where our present PCA Building stands. His business consisted of a small grocery stock, bulk candy, a cracker barrell and cheese, and silent movies.

It was even told around Wheeler that J.W. Barr robbed the Citizen State Bank, for in Dec. 1918 he married the Banks Cashier, Miss Bertha Duzan. She came from Kansas to work for her Uncle Dennis Holt, she was a niece to Mrs.

LEARN NOT TO BURN

Don't Let Your Family Burn

The burning of people is an epidemic in America. Deadly, nearly without public notice or concern, this epidemic takes thousands of lives. Hundreds of thousands of burn victims are treated by doctors or are admitted to hospitals for agonizing, lengthy treatment each year.

At best, a person can be left scarred and somewhat disabled for life. Some burn victims say that living with the pain and the scars is worse than death.

Children and older persons are the most likely victims of the burn epidemic. While adults often have the knowledge and the physical coordination to react correctly in an emergency, children and older persons often do nothing or do the wrong thing. They have not been alerted to the special dangers that face them in a fire or how to prevent a fire from occurring.

What Can You Do?

1. Teach and reward firesave behavior in your home. It is your job to convey your knowledge and expertise to those family members who need it and depend on you.

2. Buy fabrics labeled flame-retardant, especially in sleepwear for children up to size 14. Ask that it be made available as well for the el-

Get information from your state and federal representatives about the status of legislation on fire-retardant materials.

What You Should Know About Flame Retardant Fabrics **And Clothing**

You should consider four qualities of fabric when you buy clothes especially for children and the elderly. These are WEAVE, WEIGHT, TEXTURE, and FIBER. Loose weave, lightweight, fuzzy fabrics made of flammable fibers will burn the fastest.

Buy tight weave, heavy weight, smooth fabrics. Some safer fibers are made of glass, modacrylic, and wool. Cotton and rayon and other flammable fabrics can be made

flame-retardant by treatment. If a fabric is treated, the label will show that it is flameretardant. Treated fabric sold in fabric stores is also labeled

flame-retardant. **Style And Size** Is Very Important

Loose fitting garments are dangerous. You can unknowingly brush against an open heater or allow a sleeve to fall near a lighted stove burner. Loose-fitting, full clothing allows burning both on the inside and the outside.

Dress children in clothes

that are the correct size. Avoid clothing that belongs to larger brothers and sisters. Avoid blouses, dresses, and nightgowns with full sleeves. Buy pajamas rather than nightgowns for girls. holiday costumes should be labeled

Metal In Microwaves Don't use metal in microwave ovens - even when manufacturers approve.

Even when the manufacturer's instructions do not prohibit the use of metal pans, it's generally not advisable to use them for several reasons.

First, metal pans reflect microwave energy instead of transmitting it, so the timeand energy- saving advantage of microwave cooking is lost.

Second, foods, especially frozen ones, will cook unevenly in metal pans deeper than three-fourths of an inch.

Another important reason is that a metal container or a dish with metallic trim may cause arcing, a lightning-like effect causing sparks that can damage the pan or pit the wall of

Arcing is less likely with substantial amounts of food at least two cups in the pan because moisture-carrying foods primarily attract the microwaves.

Use metal skewers as long as only the ends are exposed. Remember that arcing will occur if metal touches the oven at any point.

If metal twist ties are used on cooking bags or frozen loaves of bread, sparks from arcing may ignite the covering of the ties and melt the plastic bag.

Conservation Cookin' "Conservation cookin"

saves time, money and energy - and "the proof" is in some actual recent tests. Homemakers and industry

both share the task of making kitchen ranges more energy prove big savings are possible and easy.

Volunteers in a "conservation cookin's" test saved a whopping one-third in energy - just by the way they cooked, according to all the reports.

Of course, that's the homemaker's part. But what about industry?

It, too, has a share in the task; and the appliance world is a buzz with word of new designs on the drawing boards and in testing stages - all focusing on greater energy efficiency for ranges.

As consumers learn of the innovations in ranges, they can be on the lookout for them to study and compare - then consumers will be more apt to insist on the most energy-saving features for their money whenever they actually buy.

Homemaker Tasks But, until industry's

"brightest energy stars" hit the market, homemakers can save one-third - or more right not just by learning the easy techniques of "conservation cookin' ".

Before you learn what to do, remember the "what not to do's" first - since they make the big difference.

During the recent "conservation cookin' " tests, the energy wasters were found "guilty" of these practices:

* they opened the oven door frequently, * they cooked on the high

setting too long, • they turned on the wrong

surface unit, and * they often failed to reduce

the heat during cooking. Once you have the "don'ts" firmly implanted in your mind,

We believe that teenagers need constructive activities. We also believe they need leaders. When parents and other adults do not provide that needed leadership, the result is an unpleasant situation.

We do not believe that drinking alcoholic beverages is constructive. Neither do we believe the adults of our community are providing leadership when teenagers are allowed to engage in this and disorderly conduct without limitation or controls.

We recognize the fact that we are misunderstood by some. Our endeavors are thought to be a "putting down" of youth. Nothing could be further from the truth. The Concerned Citizens for Constructive Change care about these young people. We care about what is happening now--habits being formed, attitudes being shown, responsibility being taken. We care about the future that lies ahead for many of these teens if the above mentioned things are never learned properly because of adult irresponsibility in Wheeler.

We are very much concerned about what will happen because of alcohol consumption. Statistics show the following:

1. There are 664,655 alcoholics in Texas.

2. 80,000 people between ages 13 and 17 have an alcoholic problem IN TEXAS.

3. Nationwide, 93% of boys and 87% of girls drink alcohol before graduating from high school.

4. 23% of teenage drinkers exhibit potential problem signs. 5. Over 50% of all fatal automobile accidents are alcohol related.

The percentage is much higher among young people.

6. Any drink of alcohol damages brain cells permanently. 7. Mearly, 8,000 young Americans are killed each year in accidents

involving young people and alcohol. 40,000 more are disfigured. Two beers can impair driving ability by 30% for a male of average

9. Conservative estimates are that 1 of 10 who start to drink will become addicted and others will be killed or injured in accidents, fights, etc. that relate to alcohol.

Upton Sinclair (Pulitzer Prize Winner) in The Cup of Fury said, "It has been my fate to live among drinking people: novelists, poets, playwrights, and stars of stage and screen. I have seen two-score of them go to their doom, eleven as suicides. I say it is a frightful thing that so much of the talent and genius of America should have been distorted by alcoholic

So you see, young people, we are not being cruel to you or depriving you of fun by asking the City of Wheeler to stop the drinking in our beautiful town. That is no more cruel than it would be if you were playing with rattlesnakes and we asked it to be stopped. In fact, the Bible says that alcohol is like a snake (Proverbs 23:32).

We do not believe that all the young people in Wheeler are involved in this. We also believe that some are as much opposed to it as the Concerned Citizens for Constructive Change. Those who are in this category are urged to call the Hotline number to express your desire to be a member of this group.


