

MOBEETIE TO HOST BLUEGRASS & OLD TIMER'S MUSIC FESTIVAL JULY 25-27

There will be a bluegrass festival in Old Mobeetie. Musicians from all over the Tri-State area will be in Mo-

beeite the weekend of July 25-27 for the first Panhandle Bluegrass and Old-Time Music Association's festival. Co-sponsors of the festival are the Old Mobeetie Jail

House and Museum Association. "The reason we chose Old Mobeetie is that we wanted a place where people could bring their campers. There

will be food on the premises and gas nearby," she said. "A&P catering of Amarillo is bring the barbecue and there will be craft booths set up all around."

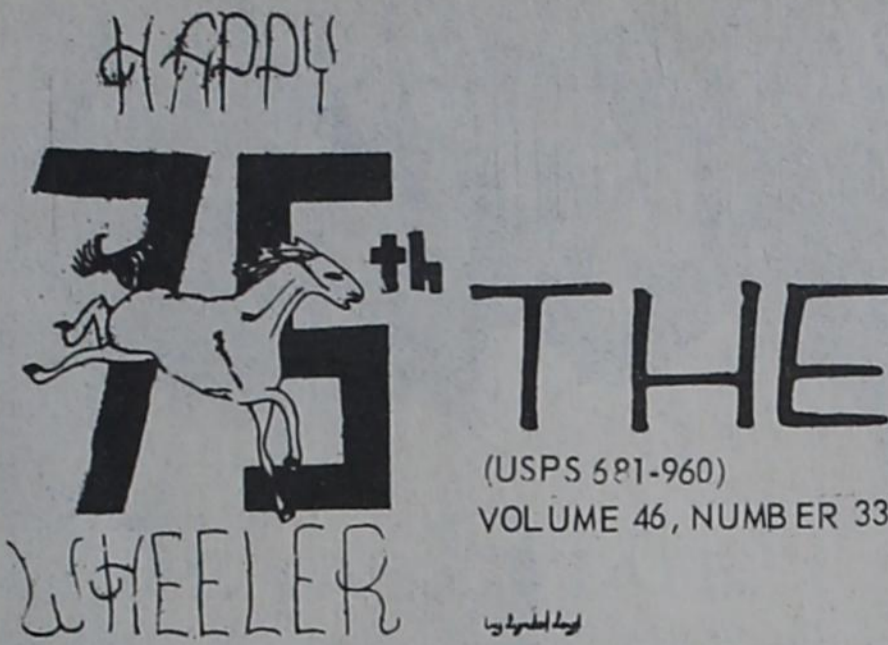
Some of the bands scheduled to perform at the festival are: Prairie Grass, Gifford Grubb and Depew Too; Tri-State Bluegrass Express; West Texas Grass; The Dinings; Fire Side Convention; and Flat Land Bluegrass.

Mobeetie is about a two hour drive from Amarillo on Highway 152. President of the Old Mobeetie Association, Sallie B. Harris of Wheeler, said the city has been preparing for the festival this week. "We have fixed outdoor restrooms, and mowed about 15 acres. We're expecting a lot of people. We have set up benches and tables for people to sit at. We constructed one stage with a roof, and have another on the way. And there will be an outside pavilion with a roof over it for dancing," she said.

"There are shade trees all around. One grove covers acres. These will be cool places for people to park their cars and set up camp," said Mrs. Harris.

Mobeetie is a historical site. The Old Mobeetie jailhouse is the oldest jail in the Texas Panhandle, contracted in 1881 and completed in 1886.

It was also the home of the legendary second sheriff of Wheeler County, who was first to occupy the jail—the late Texas Ranger Captain G.W. "Cap" Arrington.

Wheeler County Youths Win Area Horse Shows

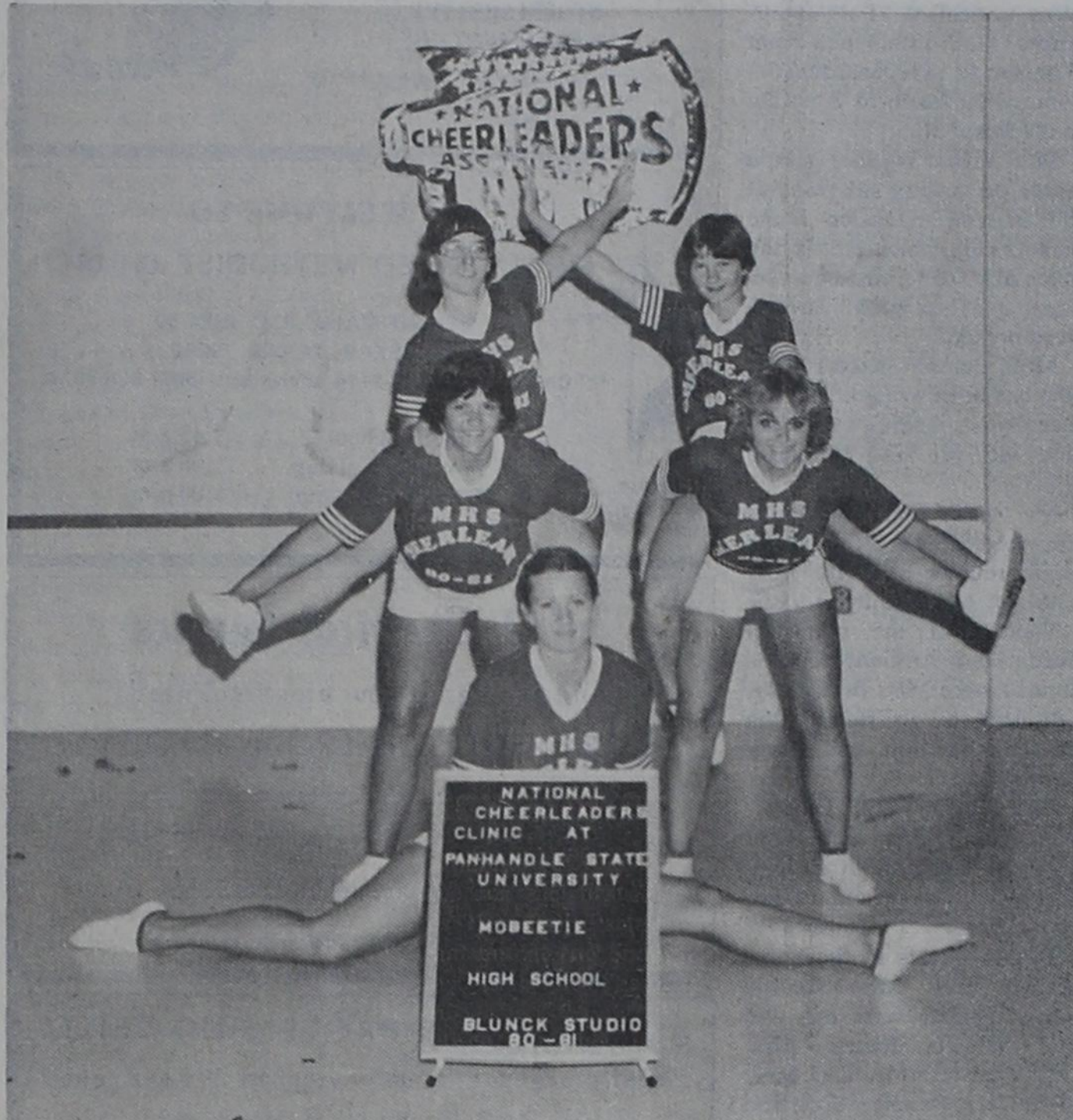

Wheeler County Officers' Salaries Being Considered

The death of M.L. "Corky" Guthrie, a Hemphill County Deputy, has brought the low salaries paid law enforcement officer to the attention of the people of the panhandle. Many articles have appeared in area papers comparing County Sheriff and Deputy's wages.

"Corky", a native of Wheeler, a dedicated officer and well liked by the people he served, many times risk and finally gave his life while protecting someone's possessions, for a \$700.00 a month, take-home pay. He chose the profession, attended the schools, and realized the risk.

At the time of his death, Guthrie was working up to 16 hours a day without overtime because of a shortage of help.

Are the citizens of Wheeler aware of the salary paid their County Sheriff and two deputies? An article which appeared in the Sunday edition of the Amarillo Globe-News was in error. Sheriff Doyle Ramsey has \$755.61 left of his check after everything is taken out; the salary is \$12,600 per year with a car furnished. The deputies start at \$900.00 and \$875.00; this leaves them \$744.33 and \$648.31 to take home after social security, withholding and retirement. The county carries \$10,000 insurance on the sheriff and \$5,000 on the deputies; they also carry group insurance, pays 5 percent of the retirement policy and carries workman's compensation.

The deputies are also furnished a car.

In looking at salaries, one must consider the hours worked. The sheriff and deputies can not work from 8-5 and then go home and relax; they are on call 24 hours a day. Many an evening and night are spent working an accident, answering a disturbance call, checking a burglar alarm or trying to catch a criminal.

The commissioners of Wheeler County held a budget hearing Monday, July 21, and will hold another Monday, July 28, they are setting the salaries for YOUR county officials. The budget calls for a 12-15 percent salary increase for each employee. These hearings are held to give the public an opportunity to express their opinions on salaries and other county expenses—very few county citizens have shown concern on this matter.

Ambulance Answers 12 Calls

The Wheeler Ambulance Service had an extremely busy week, July 14 through the 20th. They responded to 12 calls, resulting in caring for 19 patients. There were eight transfers, four to Pampa, three to Amarillo, one to McLean. One of the calls was west of Mobeetie at 12:50 a.m. Upon arrival it was learned that the victim had disappeared. He

had rolled his pickup; a passer by had helped him out of the crushed car. The ambulance requested that Mobeetie Fire Department assist in the search for the injured man. He was found lying in a maize field about 200 yds. from the accident scene. Mobeetie's Fire Department's help was greatly appreciated.

On Wednesday, the 16th, the ambulance was called to a one vehicle roll over at Allison.

A second ambulance was dispatched where it was learned there were eight persons injured. Four patients went to Parkview and four to Shamrock General Hospital. Two were later transferred from Parkview to Amarillo for further treatment.

Star's Offspring To Appear Fri.

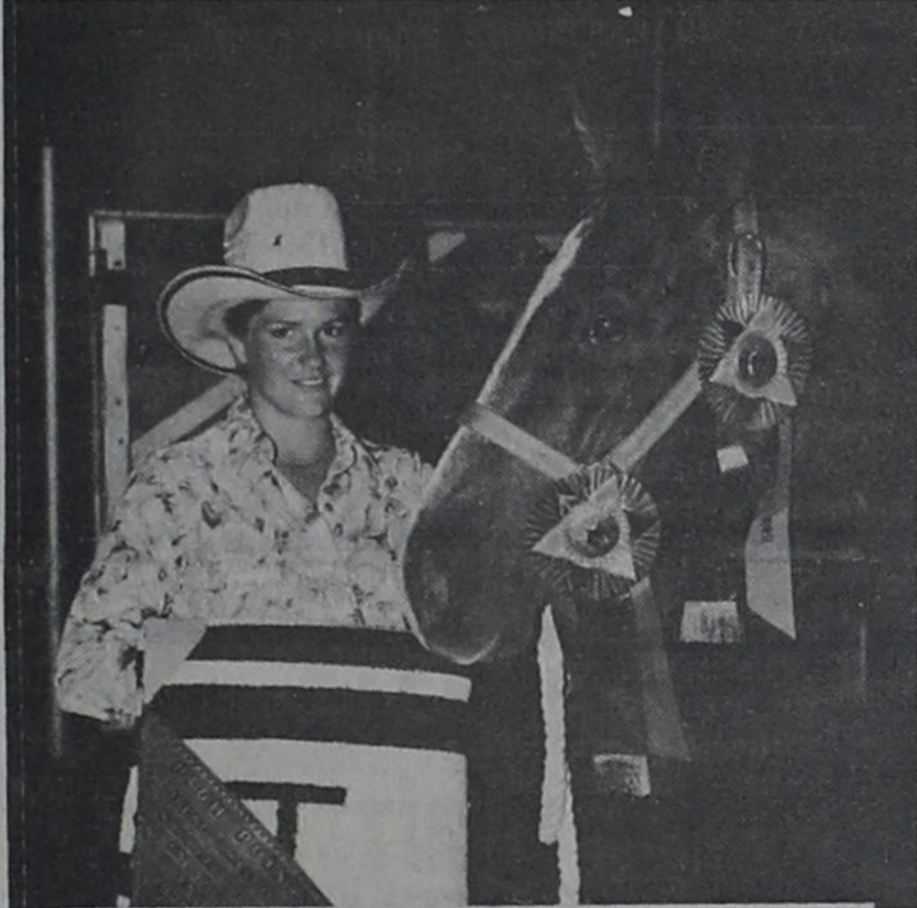

LEARN NOT TO BURN

Fire Station

The station may be in use day or night. The size, design of the building, and operating costs vary from station to station depending on community support, but every fire station has fire fighting apparatus. Some have training, sleeping, eating, and meeting facilities to accommodate round-the-clock activity, as well as maintenance and communications equipment.

Fire Fighting Equipment

Our engines and other fire apparatus are selected to meet the needs of our area. Rural, city, and suburban areas can have altogether different needs. Basic fire equipment usually includes a pumper, ladder truck, tanker, and rescue vehicle.

The pumper is used to move water from a hydrant or other water source to the fire. Water pressure is controlled by an operator at the pump panel, which had hose connections and valves. By increasing the water pressure, the operator can pump water on the fire at a much faster rate

than it flows from the source.

The tanker is used to carry water to the fire when none is available at the site. Rural areas may rely on the tankers in the absence of hydrants. The tanker may have to return to the source of water and fill up more than once if a fire is large.

The rescue vehicle carries a variety of tools and other aids. The basic equipment carried to each fire can include breathing equipment, portable extinguishers, lights, first aid kits, blankets, stretchers, special cutting tools, ropes, jacks, salvage covers, brooms, and mops.

Expertise of Fire Fighters

The complex nature of a fire fighters job is sometimes underestimated by the public. In addition to fighting fires, the fire fighter is called upon in all kinds of life and death situations such as natural disaster, civil disturbance, airplane crash, or health emergency.

All the operations performed require a variety of skills, knowledge, study and constant practice. Actions are not taken haphazardly, as it sometimes may appear at the fire scene, but according to analysis of the fire conditions and careful evaluation of alternatives.

Each move can be a life or death decision. (This is also true for a persons having a fire—if you do the right thing your chances of surviving a real emergency are excellent).

Areas of Fire Fighter Study and Training

Some of the areas of study in fire fighter training include the science of fire and hydraulics, rescue, emergency medical training, ventilation, salvage

(protecting the building from water damage), overhaul (making sure all fire is extinguished), hose, rope and ladder practices, fire streams and water supply, forcible entry, sprinklers. Fire fighters also learn to operate and maintain fire apparatus and other equipment.

In addition, fire fighters study the causes of fire and learn to inspect buildings. Fire prevention education for children and others in the

community is becoming a more important activity in fire departments.

By educating the public, fires can be prevented before they start.

Communications and record keeping are also growth areas. By keeping and analyzing local fire statistics, fire department management can determine what efforts and expenditures will be most effective in reducing fire incidents.

Southwestern Public Service Recommends Average Billing

Extremely hot weather has increased the use of electricity for air conditioning during the last few weeks and has established a new system peak for Southwestern Public Service Company. The peak, which is the highest amount of electricity used during the year, reached 2,651,000 kilowatts on July 14, at 5:00 p.m.

Cooling systems are one of the largest users of electricity and as a result, many customers will see their electric bill go higher than in the past few months.

SPS officials say that on an average, customers with refrigerated air conditioning will experience an increase of about 42 percent over the same period last year. The increase is due in part of the increase in rates granted June 2, but due mostly to the hot weather.

Larry Fuller, Panhandle Division Manager for SPS in Amarillo, said today, "many more of our customers are beginning to take advantage of our Averaged Billing plan to minimize the effect of higher bills in the summer. The plan help smooth out the highs and lows that occur in electric bills during the year and arranges for the customer to pay an average rather than the actual amount used each month."

Fuller explained that with the averaged billing plan, the amount of the electric bill each month is determined by aver-

aging the actual dollar amount of the bill for the past twelve months. For example: if the bill was \$50 in July and had been \$25 for the past 11 months, the customer would pay \$27.08, using the averaged billing plan. "The averaged billing plan does not change the rate for electric service and the cost over a year's time is the same. It simply allows the customer to pay for less than actually used during the high-use months and make up the difference by paying for more than actually used during the low-use months."

"Any residential customer of Southwestern Public Service Company with satisfactory credit and whose bill averages \$25 or more can request the averaged billing plan. There's no charge for participation and a telephone call to our office is all that's necessary," Fuller said.

Fuller also pointed out several steps that a residential customer can take to control electric usage; proper insulation, storm windows, caulking, and thermostat settings. In addition, SPS has available free booklets explaining these steps and others to help conserve energy.

"We are not experiencing any difficulties providing the electricity our customers need. This is because we have built and are continuing to build coal-fired power plants," Fuller continued.

Heat stroke will kill, if you don't take immediate action. Heat exhaustion, on the other hand, usually is not life threatening.

HEAT STROKE — Warning signs are reddened skin, fiery hot to the touch and DRY. The victim is obviously feverish but NO LONGER PERSPIRING.

The victim might be disoriented — or possible unconscious. Most heat stroke victims collapse.

Heat stroke victims can be suffering body temperatures up to and over 108 degrees cooling mechanisms have quit functioning.

HEAT EXHAUSTION — Warning signs are pale skin that is cool and moist to the touch, and the body temperature is about normal.

The victim might be disoriented. A few heat-exhaustion victims do become unconscious and collapse.

Act Fast For Heat Stroke Minutes count in cases of heat stroke.

Reduce the body temperatures at once.

Call for an ambulance or medial help, then start cooling the victim with whatever means you can find.

Bathe him with cold water if possible.

But be careful if he's unconscious, so you won't accidentally get water into the nose or mouth.

Another warning: watch for respiratory distress, and assist his breathing if necessary.

Due to the necessary rapid cooling of the body, the victim may go into shock, and that can affect breathing.

Heat-stroke victims should be hospitalized and observed for several days — in case there might be kidney or nerve damage.

Early treatment of heat exhaustion involves moving the victim to a cool spot and trying to get him to drink cool fluids, such as water or lemonade.

Also, loosen or remove clothing and cool him off by bathing with cool water.

Usually the person will feel better promptly, but if he seems tired, or if he is elderly or has a chronic disease, make sure he sees a doctor.

How To Prevent

Preventing heat exhaustion and heat stroke usually can be achieved by following some simple, common-sense precautions.

During hot weather:
—Don't expose yourself to the heat when you don't have to.

—Wear loose-fitting, light-colored clothing that reflects the sun's rays and allows for better sweat evaporation.

—Don't go out in the hot sunshine without a wide-brimmed hat.

—Drink water often, even when you don't feel the urge.

—Stick to cool drinks and food — and salt your food liberally.

IF YOU ARE ON A LOW-SALT OR SALT-FREE DIET OR SUFFER FROM HEART DISEASE, HYPERTENSION, DIABETES, LUNG DISEASE OR OTHER CHRONIC DISORDERS, CONSULT YOUR DOCTOR BEFORE INCREASING SALT INTAKE OR APPRECIABLY ALTERING YOUR DIET.

—Don't overeat or overindulge in alcoholic drinks.

—Don't exercise just before or after meals.

—Avoid sudden changes in temperature. For example, don't dash from an air-conditioned building to a hot car. Open the car up for a few minutes before getting into it.

—Don't exercise strenuously in the sun or heat.
