Archie Hibler, Former Mayor Dies Wed., July 2

Archie Layton Hibler, 64, died Wednesday, July 2 in Amarillo.

Services were at 2:30 p.m. Friday, July 4 at the First United Methodist Church in McLean, Rev. Tom Thomson, pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Wellington, officiated.

Burial was in Hill crest Cemetery under the direction of Lamb Funeral Home.

Mr. Hibler was born in Roswell, N.M., and moved to McLean in 1918. He moved to Wheeler in 1940, where he owned and operated Hibler Implement Company. He was

Mayor of Wheeler April 1964 to April 1966. He moved back to McLean in 1974 and was engaged in farming and ranching.

He married Lila Massey in 1940. Mr. Hibler was a member of the first United Methodist Church and Wheeler Masonic Lodge No. 1099.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Lee Hibler of Wheeler; one daughter, Kitty Owens of Wellington; one brother, Guy Hibler of McCombs; one sister, Verla Jones of Lubbock; and four grandchildren.

Wheeler's 75th Birthday is drawing close; August 23 is just a little over a month away and it looks like we're going to have lots of fun. So check your schedule and help us spread the word—the more the merrier. Activities will start Friday, August 22 with the Mustang's first scrimmage of the season. Saturday will be the big day with the Early Settler's Reunion, Fiddler's Concert,

an afternoon movie, picture display, street dance, kiddie parade, variety of booths with food, drink and games, and free barbecue.

The booths will be outside and are limited only to the imagination of the organization. Any group or organization is welcome to contact Mrs. Steve Walker and reserve a booth; reservations are necessary to eliminate duplication. Mrs. Walker reported Wednesday morning that only 12 booths have been reserved; They are: a kissing booth, cake walk, ring toss, lemonade stand, country store, country kitchen with ice cream and cake, dunking board, coke booth, bingo, going fishing, Wheeler Fire Department display and one booth to feature popcorn, snow cones and cotton candy. As you can see, there are a number of ideas that have not been "spoken for" so put the thinking cap on and help you club or organization earn some

money.

The picture display will be a great deal of interest to everyone, but will take the cooperation of all as will all the activities of the celebration. We have asked in an early edition of the "Times", and will repeat the request. Take time to go through your collection of pictures and make copies of those which you feel

would be of interest to others—in fact, make several copies, so each of the "kids" will have a copy. Send one copy to Sallie Harris, chairperson of the picture display; after the celebration, the pictures will be placed in the library for future reference. Note: The pictures do not have to be old pictures of general interest is what is wanted—the more recent pictures will someday be old. If possible, date the pictures.

The deadline for work on the brochure on the history of Wheeler and its buildings is drawing near and everyone is really finding the research interesting. Estes, Presidents Honor Scholar

President's Honor Scholars at West Texas State University have been named from 160 schools in a five-state region for the 1980-81 academic year.

The 350 students from Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma and one student from Bloomington, Ind., have been chosen to receive \$100 scholarships.

The program was begun with contributions to the president's Development Fund. Scholarships since have been awarded through interest on the fund, \$200,000 from the Harrington Foundation and \$1,000 from Dr. Charles Townsend, WTSU professor of history.

The first group of President's Honor Scholars numbered 216 and 322 were awarded scholarships last year, said Keith Winter, director of development, whose office awards the scholarships.

Students must be members of National Honor Society chapters in high school or a similar honor organization or graduate with honors.

Winter's office receives a list of eligible students from NHS sponsors and high school principals in the Texas Panhandle and South Plains area, eastern New Mexico and other areas. The program also is discussed when admissions advisers visit schools to recruit students.

President's Honor Scholars will be honored at a reception at WTSU on Sept. 9 and parents will be invited to a reception on Sept. 27.

The President's Honor Scholar from the Wheeler area is Sheryl Estes of Mobeetie High School. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Estes of Mobeetie.

Murder Trial To Be Retried

The trial of Russell Eugene Gailer which started Monday, June 30, ended Thursday morning with a hung jury. No date has been set for re-trial.

The jury was selected Monday and the state gave its testimony Tuesday. The defense presented its case Wednesday with the jury deliberation beginning at 3 P.M. After working until 7:30 Wednesday, the jury recessed until 9 Thursday; at 11:30 a.m. the jury reported they were deadlocked at 7 for conviction 5 against.

Gailer who pleaded insanity is charged with murder in a shooting incident on Interstate 40 on March 19 of 1979.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church and Texas Peace Officers Association. He married Allene Sanders in 1914 in Rhone.

Survivors include his wife; four sons, Lonnie Holt of Archer City, Coyse Holt of Farmington, N.M., Wayne Holt of Wheeler and Kenneth Holt of Fort Worth; three daughters, Mrs. Vera Moore and Mrs. Ruth Miles, both of Wheeler and Mrs. Glenda Cano of Higgins; a sister, Mrs. Effie Davis of Fort Worth; 22 grandchildren, 47 great-grandchildren and nine great-great-grandchildren.

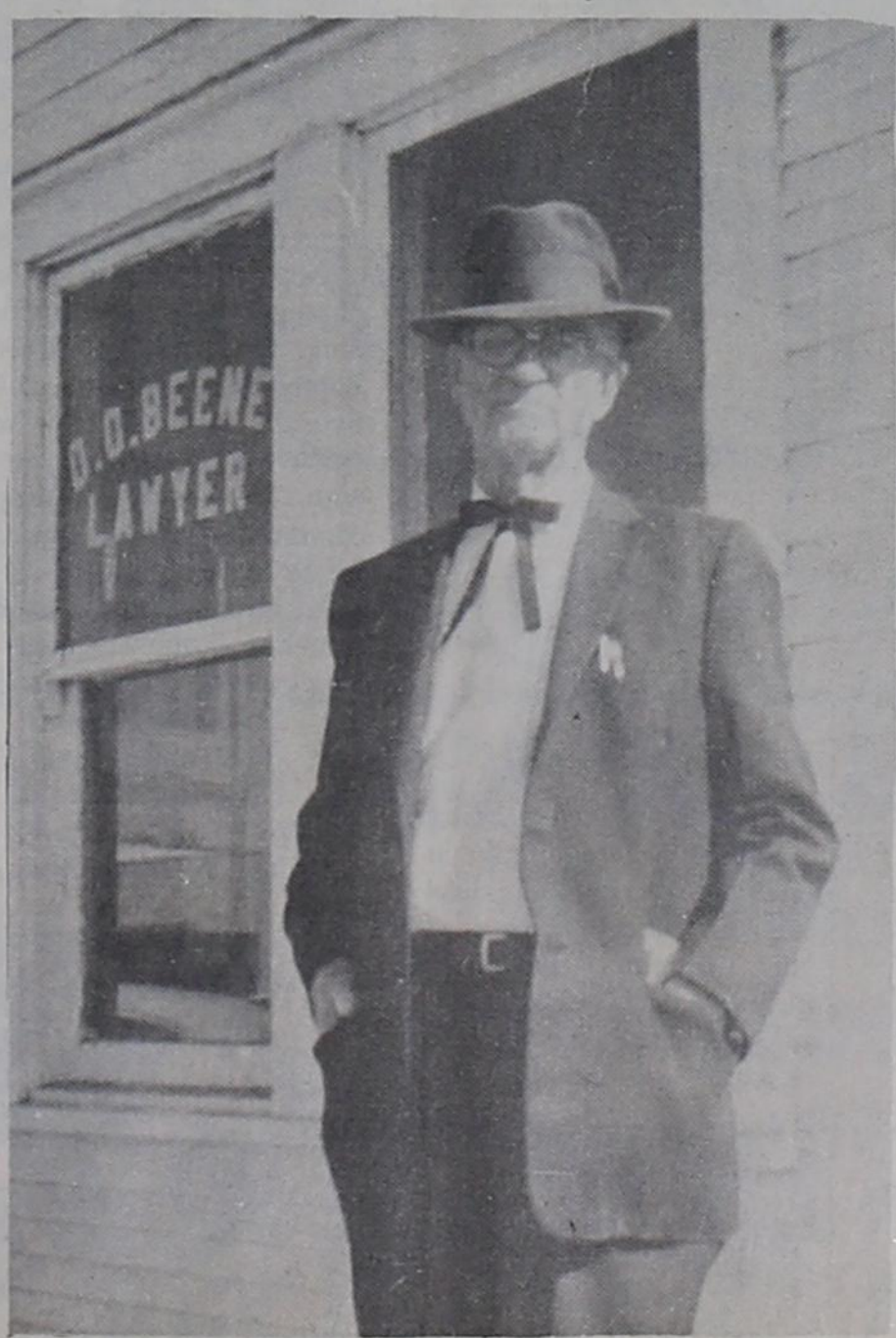
D. O. Beene, An Early Wheeler Professional Man

D.O. Beene, Attorney at Law, moved to Wheeler in 1927 from Wichita Falls, Texas. He practiced Law in Wheeler County from that time until his death in 1973 at the age of 85 years. Five years of that time he lived in Mobeetie, representing the railroad in securing the right of way and examining land titles. He also served as town site agent in the sale of lots in the new towns opening along the railroad which included New Mobeetie, Briscoe, and Allison in Texas and Reydon, Oklahoma.

Mr. Beene was a member of

the First Baptist Church and the Masonic Lodge. During his membership in the Order of the Eastern Star he served three terms as Worthy Patron of the Wheeler Chapter. For twenty years Mr. Beene was active in area politics and served as the County Chairman for the Republican Party.

His wife, Ollie W. Beene owned and operated the Guaranty Abstract and Title Company. Mrs. Beene died in 1976. The couple's three children, Pat, Lucille, and Bessie attended the Wheeler School system.

Accident Victims Are Recovering In Amarillo

Three of the victims of the Wednesday, July 2, automobile accident remain hospitalized in Amarillo.

Jesse Stepps underwent surgery Monday morning to repair a broken clavical and will require further treatment for back injuries. Paul Durham was thrown into the windshield in the accident and is undergoing testing to determine injuries. Harvey Green received a broken leg in the accident and underwent surgery to have a bone pinned.

Jesse Smith remained at Parkview Hospital until Wednesday, July 8, when he was dismissed.

In last week's paper, it was reported that Harvey Green climbed the embankment to the road for help. The "Times" was in error, Jesse Stepp went for help and was then transported by private vehicle to Parkview.

The men were returning home to Mobeetie Wednesday morning after working morning tower near Sayre. The driver apparently went to sleep at the wheel and car left the roadway and went over a 20' embankment before striking a concrete abutment. The vehicle was completely hidden from passing cars and

nothing on the highway or shoulder appeared disturbed; the accident would not have been discovered had one not been able to go for help.

Canyon Museum Receives Grant

A grant of \$26,000 has been recently made to the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum of Canyon, Texas, by the National Endowment for the Humanities. The grant will enable the Museum to research and plan its first traveling exhibit, which will be entitled "The Last Migration: European Folk Islands in Northwest Texas." The exhibit will depict the histories and folkways of German, Austrian, Czech, Polish, Norwegian, Swedish, and Russian immigrants who settled in the region between 1890 and 1920. The research and planning of the exhibit will be conducted between July and December of 1980. The unveiling of the exhibit is scheduled for the summer of 1981.

The rich European cultural heritage of this region of Texas which has been largely ignored will be fully documented by the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum.

The resulting exhibit will feature photographs, artifacts, and descriptions of the various groups portrayed. Hopefully it will make the people of Texas much more aware of a heretofore neglected aspect of their heritage.

This summer and fall researchers will visit the towns of Slaton, Wilson, Follett, Oslo, Waka, Paken, Wichita Falls, Thurber and others in search of interviews with descendants of immigrants, objects of historical interest, photographs, and historical data. The project directors, Bobby Weaver and Dianna Everett, would like to make contact with anyone familiar with those European communities listed and any others that might exist. Border Development

Any sound wildlife planning should include practices to improve wildlife habitat. One practice that is useful is border habitat. Wildlife need shelter for protection close by when feeding or traveling. Some type of plant that provides cover as well as food is preferred. Some species adapted to this area are wild plum, skunkbush, honeysuckle, hackberry, mulberry, locust, russian olive, red cedar and aborvitae. These plants are available from nearby nurseries at reasonable prices. They should be planted in February or March. For further information on wildlife planning, contact the Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

Irrigation Water Management
A simple definition of irrigation water management is the means of determining and controlling the rate, amount, and timing of irrigation water in a planned and efficient manner.

The purpose of irrigation water management is to effectively use the available water supply and control the moisture supplied to a crop, which in turn promotes crop response. One goal of water management is to minimize soil erosion and the loss of plant nutrients. Another goal is to control undesirable water loss and to protect water quality.

Some important factors involved in developing, and managing an irrigation system are:

determine when irrigation water should be applied, how to measure or estimate how much water will be required for each irrigation, normal time needed for the soil to absorb this water, ability to adjust application rate or irrigation time, estimate amount of water runoff, and the need to evaluate the uniformity in which the water is applied.

point of view it seems inconceivable that a county seat town, the central point or hub of a county, should be without a newspaper. The "Times" management has received much verbal encouragement. Recognition of this condition has, in the main, been conducive to better co-operation and greater harmony between business men of an individual town. Antagonisms that may have prevailed in other days have largely been laid aside. The foregoing conditions need not, however, foster nor encourage strife or ill-will between different towns. Each is out to offer the best possible inducements to the trading public. At this point the newspaper enters the picture. It is the aim of "The Wheeler Times" to be of service to Wheeler and Wheeler County. To carry the news of the town and county as completely and accurately as possible; to afford a medium wherein the business interests of the city may advertise their offerings, and to boost for Wheeler, its institutions and advantages is a part of the program the "Times" expects to present.

Public Response to "The Wheeler Times"
If you were the editor of a newspaper laboring in the throes of getting started, in a strange community where infinite details must be ironed out, and a page advertisement—with the cash in hand—was brought and laid on your desk, what would you do? That is just what occurred in the "Times" office this week. And is the management appreciative of this event! We say yes in no uncertain terms. Not only is the act appreciated from its financial aspect, which cannot be ignored, but the contents of the page itself—coupled with the unanimous support given—reaches a point demanding the highest possible expression of appreciation and thanks. However, there is nothing to prevent the management from seizing this opportunity to thank these gentlemen—and also those who signed the document, which will be found on another page of this issue. We do thank you all for this proof of your friendship, support and good-will. **Subscribers Responding** Together with other evidences of appreciation of the "Times" must be mentioned subscription activities. A number of people tendered their subscriptions even before they had seen a copy of the paper. Since the first issue of last week, new

readers have been added to the list rapidly—many coming directly to the office, and others placing their names with either Mrs. Jennie Miller or J.M. Newsome, circulation solicitors for the new county seat weekly.
