Top 'O Texas Dates Announced

Plans are complete for the 34th Annual Top O' Texas Rodeo to be held in Pampa, July 10 - 12 with performances at 8:00 p.m. Beutler Stock Producers of Elk City, Oklahoma, are returning to Pampa to produce this year's rodeo. Clem McSpadden, former senator from Oklahoma, will be at the microphone once again this year to describe the action in the arena.

The "Country Critters" the U.S. Air Force Western Band from Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, will cue the Rodeo Events. The "Critters" will also give a 30 minute concert at 7:30 p.m. before each rodeo performance and will also give concerts in various shopping areas in Pampa each afternoon on Rodeo days.

Hank Thompson and his western band will play for the rodeo dances on Friday and Saturday nights, July 11 and 12. The dances will be held in the improved Clyde Carruth Pavilion and will begin at 9:00 p.m. each night.

Two of the nation's leading bullfighters and funnymen, Quail Dobbs and Ted Kimzey, will once again be on hand for each performance, with some of their top specialty acts for your entertainment.

Entries for PRCA and GRA members will open July 3, at 12:00 noon and close July 7 at 11:00 a.m. To enter call the Central Entry Office (800) 525-7157. Local entries will be taken at the Rodeo Office in the Chamber of Commerce from 9:00 a.m., June 30 until July 3, 5:00 p.m.

The rodeo parade will be held Saturday, July 12 at 10:30 a.m. featuring entries from all areas of the Panhandle.

An Amateur Jackpot Double Muggin event will be offered, with an entry fee of \$30.00 plus a \$5.00 stock charge. Entry fees will be split 40, 30, 20, and 10 percent.

The Kid Pony Show, with events for children through age fifteen, will be held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, July 7, 8, and 9 at 7:00 p.m. Entries will open June 30 at 9:00 a.m. at the Rodeo Headquarters in the Chamber office. Children in that age range are invited to participate.

General Admission tickets for the rodeo performances may be purchased from various Pampa Merchants or the Rodeo office. Reserved seats may be secured by calling (806) 669-3241 or by writing to Box 1942, Pampa, Texas 79065.

DARE TO CARE

Plans for Wheeler's 75th birthday celebration continue with the naming of committee chairpersons. Overseeing the August 22-24 activities will be the steering committee which will consist of the chairperson from each committee.

For those Wheelerites who have moved away, the dates were announced early for you to plan your vacation to include a return visit to Wheeler. We will see that you and the local citizens are entertained and well fed.

The program has not been arranged, but a lot will be included in the three days. Saturday will be the big day with a few activities Friday evening and a community church service Sunday morning. Planned for Saturday will be an Early Settler's Reunion, Fiddlers Concert, a picture show, picture display, street dance, kiddie parade, and barbecue to name a few. At the same time groups and organizations will operate carnival type

booths and offer souvenirs and food.

The picture display will be a great deal of interest to everyone, but will take the cooperation of all as will all the activities of the celebration. We have asked in an early edition of the "Times", and will repeat the request. Take time to go through your collection of pictures and make copies of those which you feel would be of interest to others—in fact, make several copies, so each of the "kids" will have a copy. Send one copy to Sallie Harris, chairperson of the picture display; after the celebration, the pictures will be placed in the library for future reference. Note: The pictures do not have to be old; pictures of general interest is what is wanted—the more recent pictures will someday be old. If possible, date the pictures.

Booths will be outside and are limited only to the imagination of the organizations. An effort will be made to eliminate duplication and by contacting Mrs. Steve Walker you can reserve your booth. Here is an opportunity for a church group, club or other organization to earn some money and have a good time at the same time.

A Bit Of History

HENRY FRYE, PANHANDLE SETTLER OF 1877
Henry Frye, was born in Virginia, the son of a Presbyterian minister, The Reverend Henry Frye. The preacher's son, Henry, became adventurous and left Virginia at the age of twenty one and landed at Austin, Texas where he got his first job as harvest time cutting wheat by hand with a scythe and cradle. He met another young man here who worked in the harvest with him. They were paid the sum of \$8.00 per month and received room and board. Mr. Frye worked on this farm for three months. Mr. Frye said he could never forget the first Sunday in this home. Biscuits were baked for breakfast, a rarity, usually corn bread was baked. There were several small children seated on a bench, at the table, looking longingly at the plate of biscuits. They did not take any. Flour was hard to get and a luxury they seldom enjoyed. Mr. Frye said he and the other workers would not eat any biscuits so that the children could have their share. They could not stand to see the children looking so wishfully for a biscuit yet hesitating to take any, as there was a limited amount. Mr. Frye had been taught, he stated, to wait until others were served first; the children got their fill of biscuits that Sunday mornig for breakfast. When Mr. Frye collected his first pay for the three months work he bought himself cowboy equipment and went to work for Mr. Chism, who established the Chism Trail. He worked for two years then joined Bill Miller for a job and went with a herd of cattle up the Chism Trail twice to Dodge City, Kansas. At Dodge City, he met Mr. Miller's wife and daughter, Lula Miller. Lula was only thirteen years when he first met her. On his second trip up the Chism Trail to Dodge City, two or three years later, he and Lula Miller were married. Mr. Miller had been impressed by Frye's work and dependability so had him take two hundred heifers on half interest for five years. This inspired Henry Frye to come back to Washita Creek, in Hemphill County, to settle on land that was later the Frank Young ranch. This was in 1877 that Henry Frye settled on this luscious grass land to raise cattle from his two hundred heifers. He had seen this wonderful grass land as he passed through on the Chism Trail drives. During the winter Mr. Frye noticed that his cattle kept drifting south to Sweetwater Creek to graze and would not come back. There were no fences and no one to object to his cattle going where they chose. So Mr. Frye just moved his cattle permently near Sweetwater and built a half dugout to live in. The land he bought here was owned by Dick Bussell, who had bought the land from the State. The Tom Puryear ranch today is the original Henry Frye place. Since the cattle liked the grass and water better than on the Washita, Mr. Frye assumed it the better place to settle. The first place that Mr. Frye settled on the Washita with his 200 heifers was about five miles south and east of the Donley-Fletcher Stage Stand, on the Washita. There were three boys and two girls born to Mr. and Mrs. Henry Frye. The first child, Will, was born in the half dugout. A few

about three horse thieves being caught and hanged on the ranch. Patton, now Gordon Stiles place. and the bodies buried there near the tree where the hanging took place. (Supposedly still there). The lumber for the rock house, two large rooms with a fireplace in each room, was hauled by wagon from Dodge City by Henry Frye. The rock for the house was quarried by Frank Simpson of Mobeetie, from 'rock hollow' located on the Stiles ranch West of Frye ranch. A two room lean-to was later built onto the rock structure by Uncle Billy Pete of Canadian and Mobeetie.

A Frye post office was granted in 1897 located in the rock house with Mrs. Lula Frye as first post master. In 1898 Sophie Rathjen was appointed and James E. Nunn in 1899. A historical medallion and plate has been placed on the Frye rock house as a Wheeler County Historical point of interest. Mr. Henry Frye was one of the qualified voters who signed the petition to organize Wheeler County in 1879. Will Frye recalls several interesting stories of happenings around Mobeetie about this time, as told him by his father Henry Frye. Mr. Riley (Tom), had a saloon at Mobeetie and was called away for several days so got Mr. Stoker to tend to his business at the saloon. Mr. Stoker was sitting with his feet on the counter propped back in a chair asleep when Mr. Riley returned. "How is business?" Riley asked, "It's fine, replied Stoker." Mr. Riley saw that business had really boomed as far as plenty of drinking was concerned, for all over the room lay men who had passed out. But there was no money in the till. Stoker had no time to get money for his sales. There was an Irishman named, Murtagh, who often got drunk when he came to Mobeetie for supplies. On his way home one cold, snowy, winter day he got lost so he tied the lines together and hung them over the dash to let his team take him home, he knew they could find the way so he laid down in the wagon and fell asleep. It was morning when he awoke almost froze to death and saw that the team was not at home but in a strange place. He was finally aroused and helped into a nice warm room. As he awoke when asked how he was feeling, he blinkingly looked around the room and shouted loudly, "Faith and begorry I believe I am in the wrong house." After he was given a good warm breakfast by Mr. and Mrs. John Brown, he was able to drive home that day. In 1884, when the large rock house was completed a big celebration took place. People for miles around came to enjoy a feast and an all night dance with music furnished by fiddling cowboys over the area. Will says he remembers he earned his first money when he challenged Milo Burlingame to a race (horse). Milo would not be a piker so put up money and the race was on. Will won. Milo was rather famous for winning all his races around Mobeetie, so Will was highly excited and felt pretty important to be able to win. As a small boy, Will Frye, made many trips to Mobeetie with his father. He remembers seeing, wide eyed, many piles of gold nuggets and coins stacked around on tables in the saloons and gambling rooms. There was no bank for keeping money but Mr. J. J. Long had a place in the back of his store where he kept a safe and stored money for anyone who wished him to keep it. He recalls that at one of the Old Settlers, meeting at Mobeetie, Mr. Miller told about a court session held in Mobeetie. A man was charged with stealing a yearling. Mr. Frank Willis was the judge and Miller the attorney for the trial. The first day before the case got before the Judge he adjourned the court until the next day. They all got into a poker game that night and got drunk. About midnight Mr. Miller went out for a walk and to get some fresh air. He kept walking and walking and finally he saw a barn so walked into it and crawled into the hay manger to lie down awhile for some rest before

returning to the game. When he woke up the sun was shining and it was hot. He asked himself, "Why am I in this place?" He looked at his watch and it was 11:00 o'clock, almost noon, then he thought, "oh court, an it opens at 9:00." He crawled out of the hay, washed his face in the horse tank, and hurried back to the court session. He found Judge Willis asleep in his chair and the jurymen were joking and laughing and waiting for the judge to start court proceedings. He hurriedly woke the judge and they had the trial but the jury hung. The Judge postponed it until another day and the officers and jury proceeded to get into another poker game and again got drunk. The next morning when court convened again they all decided that the yearling wasn't worth much anyway," just turn it loose." Court dismissed. Another day when Will went to Mobeetie with his father, two well known business men wished to go bird hunting but wanted someone to drive them out in the buggy. Mr. Frye told young Will to go take, J. J. Long and Tom O'Loughlin on this hunting trip, but to be sure and get back before dark. "Well they got their jugs, guns and shells and off we went for a few miles where they wanted to hunt, East of Mobeetie. They were to pay Will a \$1.00 for his time and effort of driving for them. "They drank out of their jugs, all the way, then they decided to get out sit on the ground and drink some more. They had taken a bird dog to retrieve for them." Will just watched the team and waited for them to go on and hunt some birds. "They talked and talked and drank and drank and I told them to go on and hunt because it would be time to go back soon as father told me to get back to town before dark. They kept drinking and never got up to fire a shot". At last Will tried to get them to get back in the buggy but they could not walk. He became very worried about how he would get them back to town. He began maneuvering one at a time till he finally lifted them into the buggy and drove to the back of Long's store. There was a couch in the back room so he dragged them onto the couch and they never did wake up until the next morning, his father later learned. They had had a very exhausting bird hunt all afternoon.

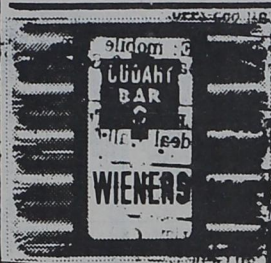
